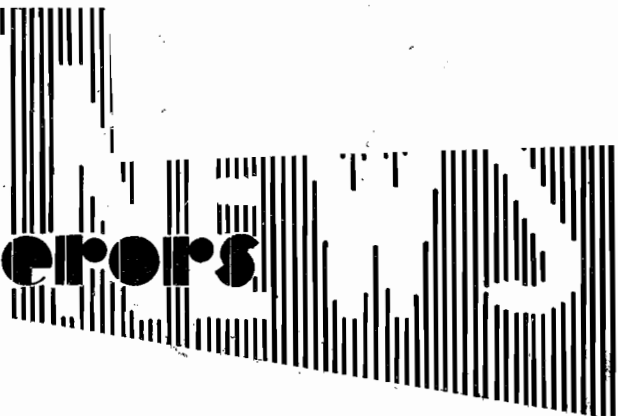

LETTER FROM THE RICHARDSONS

July 24, 1964

Dear Bro. Rose and Saints of the Indiana District,

Greetings in the wonderful name of our Lord Jesus Christ; Have been planning to write you for some time to change our mailing address for the Pentecostal Conquerors News as we would not want to miss receiving it, but as the Grants have been so faithful in forwarding our issue to us we just put it off. Now that the Grants have moved I decided I had better get a letter off to you to make sure we keep getting the paper. We are always anxious to receive our issue of the News for it always is full of the happenings back in Ind. and the Lord's doings there, also the good articles are always a blessing.

I trust this finds you and yours all well and enjoying the blessings of the Lord. As for us we are all just fine. We have gotten somewhat used to the climate and the living conditions as they are here or I suppose as used to them as anyone ever gets. At least we learn to accept them as they are and arrange our life accordingly. The weather doesn't really bother us as badly as at first, even though it is hot we can handle it so much better so we are thankful for that also.

The Lord has blessed us much and we continually praise him for this opportunity we have of fulfilling God's will for us. We have now been in the Philippines for more than two years and in Mindanao more than a year. It has been a blessed experience. Of course many trials also and many times must really pray and seek God to know what to do but in it all we Praise God that he has taken care of us thus far just as he said he would do and we find him the same Great God here as he proved to us to be in the Homeland. Praise His Name. Many have been baptised in Jesus Name and filled with the Holy Ghost and as long as we can see souls borned into his kingdom, sacrifices do not seem like burdens anymore for this is our hope and our very life.

We have a very great need here that I ask you to help us pray about. We have tried to no avail for many months now to find a place to have service in the City of Davo. It is very, very crowded and especially so since we had a fire in early 64 which burned over 600 residence and business establishments. Rent and property is very, very high owing to this condition and yet the church people are very poor and only the very rich can hope to own property here. The situa-

tion appears hopeless and yet we are trusting God somehow to supply this need. So far we are having services in our home and praise the Lord that we do have a large room which we can use for this purpose but we are 4 kilometers out of town and know if only we could somehow get into town we could reach many more people. We have been unable to find anything suitable to rent so we feel that if we can somehow get a lot we can build a temporary native chapel so we ask you to help us pray to his end.

The children are all fine and seem to be well adjusted to Missionary life and happy. Judy and Jerry are a great blessing with their music and singing, also Jerry is feeling his call to the ministry so is helping some here and there. He and Judy also are a great blessing in helping the Sunday School work. Judy is about finished with her high School course and Jerry has about another year, I suppose. Randy is now in the 6th Grade and Cathy is in the Fourth. They are about half thru their courses with their mother as their teacher so we are all a very busy family and ask you to pray for us as we push forward here for the cause of Christ,

The Downward Journey of Prayerless Church Folk

—By B. E. Echols—

With all the Divinely-Inspired admonitions and warnings concerning prayer, few laymen and ministers pray as much as they should. When one seeks for the root cause of all these backslidings (downward journeyings) it can inevitably be traced back to the lack of prayer. See Matt. 26:41 with Luke 21:34-36.

I would now like to introduce, what I would call, my "sub-title" for this message which should give you a "full-scope view" of what I am writing about. Please check it carefully and Scripturally.

THE AFTERMATH OF PRAYERLESSNESS

Definitely "The Downward Journey of Prayerlessness Church Folk" leads to such things as **spiritual emptiness, carelessness** (Heb.2:3), **lukewarmness** (Rev. 3:16), **fretting and worrying** (Psa. 37:1, 7, 8.), **pouting** (Psa. 119:165), **quarrelling** (Titus 3:2—"They must NOT quarrel"—Moffatt), **backbiting** (censoring or criticising absent folk), **murmuring and complaining** (Phil. 2:14; I Cor. 10:10; Jude 14-16), **buying TV sets and watching these damnable "Living Room Picture Shows"** (see Eccl. 4:3; Psa. 101:3, 4; II Cor. 2:13), **wearing these THIGH-length dresses and ONE-legged skirts** (I Tim. 2:9, 10), **envying and hating people** (I John 3:15), **drinking intoxicating drinks** (I Cor. 6:9, 10), **sex familiarity and immoral living** (Heb. 13:4 with Eph. 5:3-5), **lying** (Psa. 101:7. I John 3:8), **much doubting and fearfulness** (Rom. 14:23; Isa. 33:13, 14 Rev. 21:8), **cursing** (Deut. 5:11), **divorcing and remarrying** (Matt. 24: 38, 39), **gambling and stealing, killing and murdering people** (often the unborn infants), **brutality and beastly heartedness, homosexuality and Sodomy** (sexual desires and relations between those of the same sex or with animals — see Rom. 1:26, 27; Ex: 22:19) and finally, **"a REPROBATE mind"** (Rom. 1:28-32).

So you see that one evil or sin leads to something worse and that there are MANY "corrupting evils and sins" to help further one on that "downward journey" away from God and His Church. A great many of these evils and sinful conditions, into which one will drift as he "journeys downward," are not in view of the person when he first begins his journey downward. One by one he drifts into them AFTER he ceases to pray "IN the Holy Ghost" (Jude 20 with Rom. 8:26,

27.)

The Apostle Peter informs us of what we may expect if we allow ourselves to "journey downward" or backslide as follows: "For it HAD BEEN BETTER for them NOT to have known the way of righteousness, than AFTER they have known it, to TURN FROM the holy commandment delivered unto them" (II Peter 2:21.) Then he said, in verse 20 of the same chapter: "For if AFTER they have escaped the (dirty, nasty and lowdown) pollutions (corruptions) of the world (such as immoral living, drinking intoxicating drinks, homosexual practices, etc.) through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are AGAIN entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end IS WORSE with them than the beginning" (even before they were ever saved.) No wonder Peter had already said "Dearly beloved, ABSTAIN from fleshy lusts, which war against the soul" (I Peter 2:11).

When I was preaching in California some years ago I was informed that one of our one-time holiness preachers, and a good one when he lived for God, had been making his place of abode on "Skid-Row" in Los Angeles; also that he had several times been placed in one of those "Alcoholic Anonymous Clinics" where they endeavor to get a poor mortal freed from drink when he has become so badly addicted to it that he is drinking himself insane and to death physically. A man has gone a LONG WAY downward when he has journeyed that far away from God and His Church; but such is happening ever so often right before our eyes. Regardless of all this, men and women, boys and girls refuse to accept the warnings and admonitions of the Scriptures to "watch and pray" (Luke 21:36; Mark 13:33; I Thes. 5:17) and to "Abstain from ALL appearances of evil" (I Thes. 5:22). . . . by STAYING filled with the Spirit (Eph. 5:18) and "Watching thereunto with ALL perseverance" (Eph. 6:18.)

There is no such thing as one living for God and being careless and indifferent about his prayer life, church attendance, Christian devotions, his obligations of supporting the church with his tithes and offerings, etc. He is certainly going to journey downward if he neglects such Christian duties. If we would live for God as we should, we must fully dedicate our

lives, time and talents to the Lord and His work, else we will soon turn face about and be on "That Broadway" that leads to corruption, misery, woe and hell. See Psa. 9:17 with Rev.. 21:27, 8.

Did you know that it is an evil and WICKED thing for anyone to depart "from the living God?" See Heb.3:12 and Psa. 18:21. Therefore, "The WICKED (those who depart from the Lord) shall be turned into hell, and all the nations (of people) that FORGET God" and "journey DOWNWARD." To you who are now living for God, I feel inspired to warn you again to "WATCH ye, therefore, (for these reasons), and pray ALWAYS, that ye may be accounted worthy TO ESCAPE all these things that shall come to pass and to stand before the Son of Man." If you will do this you will never be found "journeying downward."

“ANYBODY COULD PREACH”

DR WILBUR CHAPMAN often told of his experience when he went to Philadelphia to become pastor of Wanamaker's church. After his first sermon an old gentleman met him in front of the pulpit and said, “You are pretty young to be pastor of this great church. We have always had older pastors. I am afraid you won't succeed. But you preach the Gospel, and I am going to help you all I can.”

“I looked at him,” said Dr. Chapman, “and said to myself, ‘Here's a crank.’”

But the old gentleman continued: “I am going to pray for you that you may have the Holy Spirit's power upon you, and two others have covenanted to join with me.”

Then Dr. Chapman related the outcome. “I did not feel so bad when I learned that he was going to pray for me. The three became ten, the ten became 20, and the 20 became 50, and the 50 became 200, who met before every service to pray that the Holy Spirit might come upon me. In another room the 18 elders knelt so close around me to pray for me that I could put out my hands and touch them on all sides. I always went into my pulpit feeling that I would have the anointing in answer to the prayers of the 219 men.

“It was easy to preach, a very joy. Anybody could preach with such conditions. And what was the result? We received 1,100 into our church by conversion in three years, 600 of which were men. It was the fruit of the Holy Spirit in answer to the prayers of those men. I do not see how the average pastor, under average circumstances, preaches at all.

“Church members have much more to do than go to church as curious idle spectators, to be amused and entertained. It is their business to pray mightily that the Holy Ghost will clothe the preacher with power and make his words like dynamite.”—**Pentecostal Light.**

Later, Bridges added the chorus to his song:

Fills my every longing,
Keeps me singing as I go!"
