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About Bro. and Sis. Bibbs, Read by Bro. N. A. Urshaw At Their Anniversary Service Oct. 29, 1964

In the year 1900 Bro. N. J. Bibbs was born in his beloved state of Kentucky and in the town of Carrollton. The Bibbs family of eight children later moved to Indiana, living in various cities throughout the state.

From the state of Indiana the family traveled to West Virginia and there established a new residence near the Kanawha River valley area.

It was in the town of St. Albans, West Virginia, in a small school house that Evangelist Rail preached to a group of people who were keenly desirous to have a close walk with God. Bro. Bibbs was in this meeting, and possessed with the desire to have an experience such as these folks had, he made his way to this old-fashioned altar. He was baptized in Jesus name by the pastor, Bro. Chapman, and he received the gift of the Holy Spirit.

In the meantime his folks moved to Hawthorn, Pennsylvania. He re-

mained in St. Albans while working at the glass factory.

During an occasional visit with his parents, he attended an Evangelical Revival. Several friends of the family were present, including the family physican, Dr. Sayers. Bro. Bibbs was asked to give his testimony. Knowing the jubilance of any Holy Ghost filled person, it is not surprising to learn that Bro. Bibbs' exultation took the entire length of the service. The Doctor said they wouldn't need a sermon, they had already been given one.

This same night, he was invited to a Nazarene Prayer Meeting by Mr.

and Mrs. Coleman.

Bro. Bibb's attendance at this prayer meeting marked the beginning of a most precious love affair. You see, the Coleman family was blessed with a lovely daughter, Bessie, and Bro. Bibbs was impressed with her almost immediately. In fact he informd his mother that he would someday marry that girl.

Fate was good to him. He inquired about the girl and wrote her a letter asking her about a revival meeting in the town and if she would be attending.

She was attending the night he was privileged to baptize the Nazarene preacher. Bro. Bibbs asked her to hold his coat for him. She told her friends that "he really did have his nerve." However, she didn't mind too much because she held the coat.

Bro. Bibbs later stayed with the Coleman family, "How would you like to be an evangelist's wife?" She approved of the idea and on September 27, 1922, they were united in marriage.

Bro. & Sis. Bibbs have been blessed with three children: Francis Lucille,

George Henry, Annetta Roxie.

When their first child was six months of age, Bro. Bibbs took his family back to Indiana. They lived here until the child was five years old, at which time they moved to Niagra Falls, N.Y. It was here that Bro. Bibbs was ordained on May 31, 1929. Sis. Bibbs received the Holy Ghost in this town also.

This same year the Bibbs family moved back to Anderson, Ind. Sis. Bibbs was still a trinitarian. It was during Bro. Bibbs' first revival at Bro.

Bennett's in Anderson that Sis. Bibbs was baptized in Jesus name.

While they were visiting the P. A. of W. conference in Indianapolis, Bro. Bibbs was invited to Elwood for another revival. It was during his stay in Elwood that he baptized our Ladies Auxiliary President for the state of Indiana, Sis. Simison. He served as pastor here for 2½ years. From Elwood they went to Marion for 16½ years.

In 1936 Bro. Bibbs was selected as State Presbyter of the Eastern states, serving this post until 1942. The organizational policy was changed in 1942 and Bro. Bibbs was installed as District Superintendent. And thus he remains.

"THE HARVEST IS PAST, THE SUMMER IS ENDED-OUR CAMP IS NOT FINISHED"

I realize the timing for this article is not the best, actually it would have been psychologically better for it to have appeared in the October issue. However, the points to be stressed will be plain for all to read and understand.

Going back to Jeremiah 8:20 we notice the full quotation from the scriptures are "The Harvest is Past, the Summer is ended and we are not saved." Quite likely this was a complaint given by Jeremiah, who was representing the disturbed, broken and backslidden nation of Isreal. This was a very bad plight for them to be in. Especially since there was balm in Gilead and a physican present that would have helped the health of the daughters of Isreal to Recover.

Much of this chapter could be paralleled with many of our plights, circumstances and strange situations that many of GODS people are encountering today.

It is true that outside the kingdom of GOD and in regions of the world there are many, many deplorable and unethical conditions, such as unconcern for GOD and nation, a breakdown of moral integrity and a general turning from honest work to hand outs from the federal government.

Such acts are indications that someone is not willing to face the total responsibility of his or her country. thus, showing a very selfish spirit which will not only spoil the life of individuals engaged in such behavior, but will also tax the general constitution of the American Way of life.

WHATS WORSE THAN THIS?

It is when this same spirit and condition sweeps over the people of God. In unity there is strength. The people having a mind to work for a common cause is still a very virtuous jesture.

I notice in this same chapter verse 19 it speaks of strange vanities. This worries me because all of us know it is so easy for our lives to be filled with vanities. This will always be true if we do not guard against the pull and tug worldiness, regardless what form and fashion it may appear to us in. So often we want to pick our own rights and wrongs and nourish them with deep convictions. But I confess to you that I am thoroughly convinced that any person, place or thing that hinders, prohibits or stifles your part and my part of responsibility of the work of the Lord is wrong and borders on to worldiness.

Never should GODS people get themselves as individuals into a cramped financial position of otherwise, where they cannot assume their share of the load in relationship to GODS work.

" WE NEED YOU!"

I am quite sure that in order for some of our ministers, churches and people to have a personal share in the building of our camp, they will have to plan well and budget their income. These might feel they should be excused from camp obligations, but not so ———.

Jesus complimented the widow who gave her mite, and did not suggest that she should be excused, from her GOD ordained privilege and opportunity. If there should be any rich among us they should give and do more. But we who are not blessed with this worlds goods cannot be scriptually excused from this position of GODS work.

Remember, the camp has long been discussed and talked about over a period of time. It is well in the position of being sanctioned by our entire state or district. Officials as well as non-officials, have talked and given liberally to this cause, making it a well known fact that we do not "WANT but we NEED a camp grounds.

As an official and one intereted in our camp, I could suggest many

helpful things that "YOU" could do.

May I suggest your personal participation in work and giving. How about our teenagers, along with others of Conquerors age, purposing in your heart to channel all or part of your vacation pay for 1965 towards the camp grounds? Those of us older, could use vacation pay in erecting a cabin or cottage on the camp grounds. Or you may suggest to your church or presbyter or your Conquerors officials, that you pool part or all of your vacation pay to help build a Conquerors dormitory, or any other building facilities our camp grounds we may need.

It is too bad some of these ideas could not have been put into practice when many of GODS people perhaps drove by the camp grounds on the way to or back from their selected vacation trip.

I know I may sound a little strange with some of these statements but there are these wonderful people that have worked through the hot summer months on our camp grounds, not for past time, but for a godly purpose. We could mention many but time and space will not permit. I would like to single out one of our ministers namely; Bro. Ben Bonney who is not physically able to drive the 80 miles one way to our camp grounds, but goes and persistently takes his place amang the workers. This is enough to convince me that there are many more who could share with us in the manual labor as well as finance in building our camp grounds. GOD bless Bro. and Sis.
