

## THE PASSING OF AN OLD SOLDIER



The First Pentecostal Church of Oakdale where funeral services for Brol Robert LaFleur were held on Saturday April 4. Bro. LaFleur had pastored this church for thirty-five years.

Within a few days, two old soldiers were called away from this earth. One of them had devoted a long and heroic life to his country, the other had given his noble life for God and His church. The list of battles for General Douglas MacArthur included a long list of historic places covering more than half a century, in far distant and far separated spots on earth, in three wars. France, the Philipines, Bataan, Corregidor, Japan and Inchon were some of the places where he led the battle.

For Bro. Robert LaFleur the list of battle grounds also was impressive. His was the war of truth against error and he led in the battle for more than half a century. The battle started when He found the Lord in East Texas more than fifty years ago. He led the battle for the Pentecostal message to Louisiana and such names as Elton, DeQuincy, Oakdale and many others became prominent in the struggle of truth.

For the past thirty-five years Bro. LaFleur had been pastor of the First Pentecostal Church in Oakdale, a position that he efficiently and devotedly filled right up until the time he was called home. Out of these thirty-five years of ministry in Oakdale, seventeen ministers have been called into the work of God. These seventeen served as honorary pall bearers to their fallen pastor and leader.

Bro. Robert LaFleur went home to his Lord on Thursday, April 2, at the age of 74 years. He had been active to the end. On the Sunday before he was called away, he preached in the services of the church. An outline which he had prepared for the Wednesday night Bible Study was read at the funeral service by Bro. O.F. Fauss.

A great crowd of ministers, saints and friends gathered at the Oakdale church on Saturday afternoon for the funeral service. The church was banked with many, many floral tributes. More people were outside the church than were able to get in. A most impressive service was conducted. The choir sang songs that Bro. LaFleur had loved while here with us. The presence and comfort of the Holy Ghost was felt as the service progressed.

Those taking part in the service at the church included Bro. J. Roy Weidner, District Secretary who read the obituary, Bro. Page 4

A.L. O'Brien his presbyter read the scripture reading and prayer. Bro. O. F. Fauss, Assistant General Superintendent spoke of the early days of this Pentecostal message in Louisiana and their associations together. Bro. LaFleur ordained Bro. Fauss on August 7, 1917. Bro. A. T. Morgan, General Superintendent said among other tributes, "If any man in this time could be called an apostle, Bro. LaFleur could be called an apostle to Louisiana".

Our District Superintendent, Bro. C. G. Weeks delivered the main message of the service. He spoke on the subject, "The Balance Sheet of a Great Life". In a most able and sincere manner, Bro. Weeks spoke of this our departed brother. It would not be possible to give a full report in this space, but a few of Bro. Weeks' remarks are given here:

"The victory has been won. He made it!"

"He won't be forgotten, and he won't be replaced."

"Man has to have some fight in Him!"

"He has never varied from the first message we heard him preach," as Bro. Weeks reported what some of the faithful saints of the church said about their pastor.

"These men will be expecially missed by me," said Bro. Weeks in speaking of Brothers Fuselier, Wise, and LaFleur, all pioneers who have now passed away.

"Many a man will have to answer for this man's message."

"One of the most humble men I ever knew."

The great American general, Mr. MacArthur, wore a simple, tropical khaki uniform as he was laid to rest. This soldier and general for King Immanuel, Bro. LaFleur, had in his hands the "Sword of the Spirit," that he had loved and used so long. As I passed by with the many hundreds of others to see Bro. LaFleur; I was most impressed as I looked at the Bible in his hands, with II Timothy 4:7-8 marked. Surely the words of Paul were also his, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."

The body was taken from the church and laid to rest at the Oakdale cemetery. There at the graveside the scripture reading was read by Bro. Calvin L. Rigdon, and the Committal given by Bro. Gerald Mangun, both members of the district board. The prayer of benediction was prayed by Rev. R. E. Johnson, a minister and pastor, saved in Oakdale under Bro. LaFleur's ministry.

## I REMEMBER OUR BROTHER ROBERT L. LA FLUER

(Our Editorial space this month is given for a report of the funeral service for Rev. Robert L. LaFluer, beld at the First Pentecostal Church, Oakdale, La. Saturday, April 4.

I first met "Bro. Robert," an evangelist at a Camp meeting in August, 1914, held on the outskirts of Cleveland, Texas. He was full of zeal and a passion for souls. He invited me to be a member of his band of workers, which I did a year later.

That sermon he preached one night of the camp meeting, never has left me. His text: "For the bed is shorter than that a man can stretch himself on it: and the covering narrower than that he can wrap himself in it." Isa. 28:20. His cry against sin and evil, drew my soul to him, for in my heart the "call of God" was burning inside me to "Lift up my voice like a trumpet, cry aloud and spare not!"

We met again the first camp meeting ever held in the state of Louisiana under the name "Pentecostal". It was in 1915. The fire in his mininstry had not diminished. His courage and zeal seemed to charge my very soul with a determination to enter the battle with him. This became a reality the first of September of that year, at DeQuincy, Louisiana in that great revival which "turned the world upside down".

Brother Robert LaFluer, with Brother Bennie Baggett, whose tent we were using, became the greatest men in my life. They taught me to "endure hardness as a good soldier," both by precept and example.

After about seven weeks, preaching against sin and proclaiming the soon coming of the Lord, the power fell on September 9, 1915 and nine were filled with the Holy Ghost that day. Men, women and children were added to the Lord every day for the following weeks.

Bro. LaFluer's mighty illustrated sermons: "The Gospel Plow", "The Strait and Narrow Gate", and the "Blessings brought to us by the Cross", along with many others, seemed to set the world afire.

During that revival, the LIGHT OF TRUTH began to shine: BAPTISM IN THE NAME OF JESUS. Together we searched the scriptures daily. On the morning of October 18, Bro. LaFluer had all of us workers awake at sunrise. We had to decide about how we were going to baptize some people that day. Bro. LaFluer finally came up with the "right" answer: "We just as well baptize them RIGHT today. IN THE NAME OF JESUS so we won't have

to come back later and do it all over." We all agreed, LIGHT HAD COME, appointed him to do the baptizing, and we would not let anybody know any different. As he would say, "I baptize you in the NAME of the LORD JESUS," there were four more workers standing on the bank, wanting him to baptize us too. Fifty-six were buried in the Name of Jesus that day.

Together, Bro. LaFluer and I walked into the water on December 19, 1915 at Elton, Louisiana Bible Conference, and were baptized in the great NAME of the LORD. We remained together after that Bible conference for several months at DeQuincy, where the first tabernacle was built. He was my counsellor and guide, in everything, except my choice of the girl I chose to marry. He later agreed that I was right, and volunteered to perform the ceremony. This took place on July 10, 1916, at his revival being held at Westlake, La.

Bro. LaFluer was a member of the "Board of Elders," Which called me in, (from the kitchen) at a conference in Kinder, La. in 1916. They laid their hands on my head, dedicating me to the ministry, giving me my first little license, as issued by those of the Louisiana brethren. He also with Bro. L. C. Hall conducted the Continued on Page 12)

## IN MEMORIAM

Robert Labasso LaFluer was born August 15, 1889 at Augusta, Arkansas and departed this life to be with the Lord on April 2, 1964, at the age of seventy-four years, seven months and seventeen days. Bro. LaFluer married Sister Maude Mae Herrin January 4, 1916. To them were born four children: Cloviece Labasso, Robert Lee, Arthur Lavelle and Mary Janette. They have nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Bro. LaFluer's first visit to Louisiana was as an Evangelist possibly at DeRidder or DeQuincy in 1913. He returned to Texas but came back to Louisiana to LaBlanch in 1914 to help in a revival which had broke out under ministry of Bro. Bennie Bagget and Sis. Maude Herrin (present Sis. LaFluer). A great revival had come with many receiving the baptism of the Holy Ghost. After coming to Louisiana this time in 1914, he never left, but stayed to minister here for a half a century.

Bro. LaFluer began pastorate in Oakdale in 1918, but only was there a short time. He then went to DeQuincy in 1919-1920 and pastored there until March 1929, when he came back to Oakdale. He then remained as pastor in Oakdale until the time of his passing, more than thirty-five years. The latest count of ministers that came our of Bro. LaFluer's Oakdale ministry is twenty-five.

Bro. LaFluer, pioneer minister and faithful soldier, was an honored member of the Louisiana District, and served as Honorary member of the District Board. His knowledge and wisdom and many years of experience make his counsel of great value. He shall be greatly missed by all of us in the Louisiana District.

## WHO SHALL SEPARATE US?

When the Apostle Paul asked this question in Romans, Chapter eight, Verse thirty-five, he was writing to the Christians at Rome. He was writing to Christians with the very same experience as we have today. They were baptized in the Name of Jesus and were filled with the Holy Ghost and spoke in other tongues, just as we do today. Paul said in Romans 6:17, "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you." The form of doctrine of which he spoke was baptism in Jesus Name and the infilling of the Holy Ghost, and the living of a holy life thereafter. This is the doctrine Paul taught. Acts 19:1-6; Romans 6:1-6.

When Paul said, "Who shall separate US from the love of Christ?" he included himself, because he had the same experience as the Roman Christians. We are included in the same message. The apostle pressed the question further, shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine or peril or sword. He referred to martyrs such as Stephen, who was stoned to death by those to whom he preached. Stephen whould not let the stoning separate him from the love of Christ. The last words he said was, "Lord Jesus receive my spirit and lay not this sin to their charge."

Many saints were stoned, beaten, burned at the stake, thrown in lions' dens, sawn asunder; but they were not separated from the love of Christ. Paul was beaten thrice, stoned and ship wrecked; but that was no reason for him to give up. Even in prison he could preach to the sinners, reach his hands through those jail bars for souls that were separated from Christ. It is a sad thing, but many Christians cannot hold out today, tho they have no persecution at all. What would they do if distress or peril came? The truth is they are so loaded down with the cares of this world, that the love of Christ is crowded out of their lives.

Paul's sound advice is to lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us. A true athlete will lay aside the weights that do hinder him in the race. Many Christians are trying to hold on to their pet sin and some things of this world, things that they had rather die than give up. I heard of a volcano that erupted near a small town. The people were warned to run for their lives, but as some ran, they carried some of their possessions still in their arms. It will be just such a sad picture when some Christians are brought out of the grave, clutching things of this world in their hearts.

Paul has made a list of many things that will separate us from the love of Christ. One of these is the wrong fellowship. There is something wrong with a Christian who loses the fellowship of a sinner more than a child of God. II Corinthians 6:17, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord." When a young or old Christian starts going with sinners they are disobeying God's laws. They are endangering their eternal life. I know they say they mean no harm. You cannot play with fire and not get burned. If you toy with the wrong idea long enought it will materialize. The lady snake charmer, that could put on such a beautiful act with the so called tame snake, was warned by many a friend that it was the nature of that snake to squeeze the life out of people. She assured them that this snake was a pet and had

been trained, and would do just as she bid. In her last act as the snake started the squeeze act, she told it to stop, but it would rather squeezed the harder. Friends tried to reach her, but it was too late. Many assure us as they go with their sinner friend that everything is all right, but it is the nature of a sinner to squeeze the life out of a saint. Paul said, "Be ye separate." That means apart from.

When I was in the service and on ship, we docked one night in the Panama Canal. I had the privilege of going ashore. I saw many sights that were of interest to me. One of the greatest interests was the ropes that were stretched across the alleys, with the sign on them "Out of bounds to sailors." I knew that if I crossed that rope I was on my own. That rope was put there for my protection. If I crossed, I would be in danger. Some of the boys did cross, and they suffered plenty for disobeying. There is an "out of bounds" for Christians, and those that go head long on their own will, will suffer.

Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Paul was persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any creature shall be able to separate us from the love of God.

Yes, it is true that none of these things can separate us from the love of Christ, but John said in I John 2:15 that the love of the the world will automatically separate us from the love of Christ.
