EDITORIAL

A Talk Someone has asked the question, "How long To Young should an engagement People last?" It should neither be too short or too long; but it should last forever, at least as long as marriage lasts, which should be until death does part. A serious courtship should lead to engagement and a happy marriage. I know of one couple who were engaged for three days and another couple who were engaged for three years. These two mentioned periods include the time which the couples knew each other before engagement, etc. In my opinion, one was definitely too short and the other too long a period of time to establish a rule. However, in both of these particular cases, the result has been happy and harmonious homes.

Friendship Let us not confuse friendship with courtship. It is right that boys and girls should be friendly with each other with proper social standards as becometh Christians. However, Christian workers cannot be too careful along these lines. Relationship with the opposite sex should not be treated lightly. Especially those who are engaged in the ministry and working in different churches at various places must watch their actions and conduct, lest they be misunderstood and their good be evil spoken of. Young people are attracted to each other. A single person must guard his or her friendships so as not to hurt or harm others who may become interested in them and attracted to them as new acquaintances are made. Friendliness should be the limit of relationship between those who are not entertaining any thoughts of marriage.

For those who are mind-Courtship ful of getting married, courtship will result in an engagement period which will eventually culminate in marriage. Courtship should be the relationship of those only whose intentions are to become engaged to each other. Until someone is ready to become engaged to another with serious intentions of getting married, they should keep their relationship upon a friendly basis only. It is common language to refer to a steady companion as a "steady boy-friend" or "steady girl-friend." Never at anytime in this sense of meaning should a Christian keep company with or have a "sinner boy-friend" or "sinner girlfriend."

Engagement Not until someone is ready to become engaged to another should courtship be allowed. Engagement is the promising of one to the other that at some future time they will be married. It is a sacred promise between two parties that should be respected. Any violation of the engagement vow is a breach of promise and is certainly wrong in the eyes of God. A safeguard against this is for the parties concerned to be seriously careful enough to be sure of their decisions *BEFORE* allowing themselves to become engaged.

Marriage is a joyous oc-Marriage casion. It is connected in our thoughts with the magic charm of a home, and with all that is pleasant and attractive in the tenderest and most sacred relations of life. Divine revelation has declared marriage to be honorable in all. It is an institution of God ordained in the time of man's innocency before he had sinned against his Maker, and before he had been banished from Paradise. It was given in wisdom and in kindness to repress irregular affection, to support social order, and to provide that through well-ordered families, truth and holiness might be transmitted from one age to another. Earlier, therefore, than ALL LAWS OF MERELY HUMAN ORI-GIN IT LIES AT THE BASIS OF ALL HUMAN LEGISLATION AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT. It is the proper foundation for the peace and well-being of every home and household in every land and nation. Any marriage that is consecrated should not be formed thoughtlessly, lightly and irreverently; but advisedly and discreetly in the fear of God. By His laws conduct of one sex toward the other is to be regulated. If the marriage vows be remembered and faithfully discharged they will add to the happiness of this life, by dividing its inevitable sorrows and by doubling all its blessedness.

Common-The term "common-law marriage" has been much Law Union abused. What is generally referred to as "common-law marriage" is nothing more or less than a vulgar disregard for the law of the land and utter disrespect for the Bible order of the Lord. In truth, common-law marriage is the ceremony that is performed by a common officer of the law, such as justice of peace, or judge or some other recognized officer of the law. The first described is lawlessness; the second is common-law.

A Final First: In thinking about Word marriage, we will do well to consider the admonishment given by the Apostle Paul in 2nd Cor. 6:14, "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers." The word of God plainly teaches "CHRISTIANS SHOULD NOT MARRY SINNERS." We cannot be too emphatic concerning this matter. "Christians should not keep company in courtship with non-Christians." To attempt to do so would be to openly defy and willingly violate the "thou shalt not" which is clearly implied in this statement of the Apostle Paul, just referred to.

Second: Young ministers should weigh seriously the fact that they have been called of God to the highest of all vocations, that of "preaching the Gospel," when they would think of getting married. It is very evident that the companion of any minister young or old must respect that "call of God!" THE PROGRESS AND SUCCESS OF ANY

More Stately Mansions

THE WORLD in which we live is not a world of chance. God is the Architect and Master Builder. Paul says, "You are God's field to be planted, God's house to be built" (I Cor. 3:9 Moffatt).

But Paul also says, "We work together in God's service" (Moffatt). What new dignity this gives to the job of making a life and building a character that will endure. What care we ought to take: first, to discover what God's plans and specifications are; and second, what kind of materials we put into the structure.

We need to remember that God takes a lot of time in building the temple of the human soul. This should give us patience with ourselves and with others. George MacDonald, in one of his stories, tells of a conversation between a woman and a little girl. The woman says, "I'm such a failure it seems useless for God to make me at all." To which the wise little girl replies, "Maybe not so much, but He is not done with you yet. He is just making you and you don't like it."

It is true that God is working with us today. We are God's building, and He is our Architect. The main problem we must face is how we can be submissive to God's will for us regardless of where it takes us or in whatever condition or position we find ourselves. The usefulness of the materials we provide the Lord with in constructing our spiritual lives will depend largely upon our willingness to submit such materials to the finishing process which will be necessary to make us the building that He desires.

The question may be asked, "Where do we get the materials that go into this building?" I do not wish to leave the impression that we have only our natural abilities to offer the Lord—as Master Builder—but we must admit that our natural abilities have a great deal to do with our usefulness for Christ, when those natural abilities are dedicated to God's service. True, God adds His beautiful handiwork and we thereby work together in the building of our lives.

In the Song of Solomon, the second chapter and fifteenth verse, we read these words: ". . . the little foxes, that spoil the vines:" referring to the many little character-traits and personal faults that slip into our lives and destroy our spirituality, and the fruits which should characterize the true Spirit-filled man or woman. It is true, most of us have many such defects that could be eliminated, and I believe that in eliminating them we shall be able to overcome a great many of our *personal problems* of characterbuilding.

Selfishness, for example, spoils LOVE. So many of us have been overly concerned about our own spiritual blessings, our own natural blessings, our own financial blessings, that we have had little concern about the other fellow, whether he, too, has the blessings of God. We are concerned too much about whether we have services in which WE are blessed, and little concerned for the sinner who never comes to our services because we show so little interest in him when he does come. I heard a statement made that no Christian worker can do much until he has been in a service where the saints were blessed and caused to shout and dance, and I was reminded of the time when Paul and Silas were thrust into the inner prison and their feet made

fast in the stocks. "And at midnight Paul and Silas prayed, and sang praises unto God . . ."

Thank God for a salvation that carries enough love in it to charge the hearts of men and women until they, too, can praise God and sing praises unto Him even in the midst of trouble, heart-ache, and persecution. The Word continues, "And suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken: and immediately all the doors were opened, and every one's bands were loosed." Then follows the wonderful conclusion where the "keeper of the prison" was converted and baptized.

We forget that lost souls are seeking for that something which will satisfy the hunger in their souls. When we allow selfishness to possess us, we rob others of the blessings that Christ died to give them. Lord, send us a revival of selfsacrifice! Jesus' command was, "Go ye," and He expected us to make a personal sacrifice to carry the "Good News."

Another problem many of us have to cope with is discontent which spoils joy. Too much of that spirit is in evidence today among the people of the world. It's in the air; it's the spirit of the anti-Christ-the spirit of the evil one-who is trying to instill that same spirit in the child of God. And if we give him half a chance, friend, I believe he will sow the seed of discontent, and we shall find ourselves dissatisfied with everything that goes on around us; we shall be dissatisfied with our family, our car, our home, and our church. I believe Jesus wants us to be content with what He has given us. I do not mean by that that we are just to sit back and not make any attempt to better ourselves, but if things should go against us we are to be content with what we already have. If Christ is the object of our affection, He will provide for us. Therefore, let contentment be part of the material that goes into our building.

Anxious thought spoils peace of mind. Peace is another wonderful spiritual attribute, but anxious thought—always being anxious or having a spirit of fear about us—will destroy that peace of

THE Lord Jesus Christ is more than man in that He is eternal in His divine nature, as the sacred scriptures record that Mary "was found with child of the Holy Ghost" (Matt. 1:18). Jesus has always existed as the Living Logos (Word), but He has not always existed in the form of man. The word again states that "The Word became flesh"— John 1:14 (American Standard Version). In other words the "word" took human form and life and was tempted and suffered therein, though without yielding to sin.

The meaning of the Greek term (Logos) of which it is a translation, is, reason expressed in speech, and as applied by the Apostle John to our Lord, signifies that from all eternity He was the Divine Reason, and after His incarnation became Divine Reason *expressed* in human form. "No man hath seen God at any time; the only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father, He hath declared Him" (John 1:18).

Jesus was not termed the Son of God until after His birth. He was in the bosom of the Father (or God) in the spiritual sense as Divine Reason, intellect, wisdom, living thought, purpose, etc. No man can be a son of any sort except he has a father and mother for the title son is one which designates relationship.

The doctrine that Jesus was the Son of God for all the eternal ages past, prior to His birth, is wild imagination. There is no doubt but what Jesus has always existed in the everlasting ages past-but not as the second person in the Godhead-rather He was the intelligence of Almighty God. When the Holy Spirit overshadowed Mary and the "seed Word" was planted and by the natural processes of conception and birth the Word was incarnated in human flesh; the human tabernacle or tent became a habitation of the eternal Spirit which we call God: "to wit, God was IN Christ reconciling the world unto Himself . . ." (American Standard Version).

Father and Son are here seen to be

united in a more intimate sense than some have been able to understand. It is here seen that Father and Son are mere titles that can be better understood by substituting such Bible terms as: Spirit and flesh—Divine and human—God and man. When you see Jesus you must see Him as the incarnation of the one true God in human flesh. It is not two persons—but two manifestations of the one and only God.

The Name Controversy

"And she (Mary) shall bring forth a son; and thou shalt call his name Jesus; for it. is he that shall save his people from their sins." (Matt. 1:21. Amer. Stan. Version).

Jesus means Saviour. Some state with good reason and clarity that Jesus means: the salvation of Jehovah. In the scripture God told Joseph that Mary was to bring forth a son, and for him to call the child's name Jesus. The next clause gives the reason and shows the meaning of Jesus by stating: "for it is he that shall save his people from their sins."

JESUS is the salvation name of God; "and in none other is there salvation for neither is there any other name under heaven, that is given among men, wherein we must be saved" Acts 4:12— American Standard Version.

The name JESUS was so important that it was always used in baptism by the Apostles. Acts 2:38, 8:16, 19:5-6; Romans 6:4. Jesus is the name that expresses clearly the character and purpose of the child born of Mary. Every act and teaching of Jesus expressed holy perfection and salvation, for all that is recorded about Him speaks of Him delivering the people from sickness, disease, infirmities, sin and death. When He prayed in Gethesemane He prayed for strength (in His flesh) to fulfill His mission and purpose in coming to earth -to save HIS people from their sins. The stripes laid upon His back gives us the right to claim healing for our bodies. I Peter 2:24. His death on the cross and the shedding of His life's blood gives us redemption from sin. Eph. 1:7. His resurrection from the grave promises us salvation from physical death---this will take place at His second coming. Yes, the name of Jesus expresses the very person and character of the "child of the Holy Ghost." He was Divine as well as human. I Tim. 3:16.

A Greater Than Moses

Moses was very faithful as a servant over the house of Israel. However, Moses was not entirely obedient nor did he always do those things that pleased God. At the age of forty he killed an Egyptian who had molested an Israelite. When he learned that this secret killing was known, he fled in fear to the land of Midian.

Forty years later God apprehended Moses by speaking to him out of the burning bush. God here called Moses to be the deliverer of the Israelites from the bondage of Egypt. Moses made excuses about his smallness, his slowness of speech, etc. God became angry with Moses. In other words, Moses displeased God. Many years later Moses, instead of obeying the voice of God and speaking to the rock in the wilderness to obtain water for the Israelites, smote the rock in his anger at the complaining children of Israel. Because of this disobedience, Moses was forbidden of God to enter the promised land.

The best and most beloved characters of the Bible had times when human failure reared its ugly self. Search the lives of Bible characters and you will find imperfection.

However, in the life of Jesus we can find no flaws. Jesus Himself said "He that sent me is with me; the Father hath not left me alone; for I do always those things that please Him" John 8:29.

Jesus is, was, and ever shall be greater than Moses or any other man. Jesus is more than man; Jesus is God-man. Jesus delivers His people from a greater and more terrible bondage than Moses did Israel from Egypt. Jesus saves us from our sins and will lead us all the way toward the heavenly promised land —and then on into the heavenly country.

Jesus is our paschal lamb! His blood delivers us from the wrath of God. He leads us across the Red Sea of water baptism on up to the Pentecostal Baptism in the Holy Ghost, speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance. Not only does Jesus lead us to the Holy Ghost—but will faithfully lead us by His Spirit within through the remainder of our days; then at last will lead us to our heavenly home.

On Monday Brother Browning and myself drove to Austin, Texas, to the Texico District Conference held in the beautiful Uni-versity Baptist Church, June 11th to 14th. Commerce. Niagara Falls has been rightfully called the Queen of Wonders. Its name is of Indian origin and means "The Thunders of Wat-ers." It is located both in the United States and Canada and the boundary line between these two great nations runs through the island in the middle of the picture and is known as Goat Island. The falls themselves are indescribable and there is only one other place in the world where this stupendous cataract has any rival, the Victoria Falls of Africa. Africa.

cataract has any rival, the Victoria Falls of Africa. The American Falls spread to a width of 1,100 feet and the torrent sweeps down a sheer descent of 160 feet from the crown to the base of the precipice. An ever changing hue of colors makes it beautiful beyond imagination. Here one sees an avalanche of supreme power--yes one stands in awe at the mighty forces of God that created this marvelous spectacle for us to enjoy. The Canadian or Horseshoe Falls, in the upper right of the picture, are 1,800 feet in breadth reaching from Goat Island to the Canadian shore and have a perpendicular drop of 162 feet. An enormous volume of water passes over this cataract estimated at almost 20 times the amount discharged by the American Falls. Because of the tremend-ous volume of water which passes over this part of the falls, the rock has been worn away until an almost perfect horseshoe for-mation has been created. These falls recede about five feet a year in the center. The beauty and awesome majesty of this great spectacle cannot be put into words. Sufficient to say are these words "The heav-ens declare the glory of God; the firmament sheweth his handywork."

There are no barriers or fortifications of any kind around any part of these falls—two great peace loving nations have dedicated this masterpiece of God's creation for the pleasure of all mankind.

MY SHEEP

By T. J. Miller, Toledo, Ohio

We would like to set forth a few thoughts in this brief message for your prayerful consideration. It might help us to get free from a certain trend of thought which is creeping into our ranks today. That is, we are not working for ourselves, but for the Master.

In the twenty-first chapter of St. John and beginning at the 15th verse, we read where Jesus rebuked Peter for going back to his fishing nets, in other words working for himself" after he had been called out from that work. We know that it is no disgrace to work because even the great apostle Paul did it but it was only for a short time and for a definite reason. Notice at the end of the 15th verse that Jesus said, "Feed my Lambs" and at the end of the 16th and 17th verses He said "Feed my Sheep."

"My Sheep" indicates possession. We are the sheep of His pasture. He is the Great Shepherd of the sheep. We be-long entirely to Him. He bought us at Calvary, bless His dear name. Our God is a possessive God. The earth is His and the fullness thereof. He requires that we be only His; body, soul and spirit.

In the 10th chapter of St. John, Jesus set forth the parable of the shepherd of the sheep. I wish to call your attention to the 27th verse and down to and in-cluding the 29th verse. "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me: And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall ANY MAN pluck them out of my hand. My Father, which gave them me, is greater than all; and NO MAN is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand." The Lord has not, nor will He ever give to any man, any of His sheep. They belong to Him and in fact He says that no man can take one of them.

The 4th chapter of Ephesians sets forth the place of the Ministry. I am sorry to say that some have stepped out of their places where God put them and have tried to usurp the place of God. They have taken over the Lord's place and call the sheep of God THEIR sheep. It is a wonderful thing that God has allowed the ministry to live from the flock but never gave it permission to take it over as their own and treat it as though it belonged to them. If the overseers of God's flock only stopped to consider who they belong to, they would

be more careful how they treated it. Also, if the saints of God would also consider who they belonged to, they would be more careful how they treated those whom God has placed over them to watch for their souls.

In the 11th and 12th verses it tells who and what the ministry consists of. "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." The apostle did not say here that they would all have a different message and a different work to do in the church. They were all to preach the same Apostolic message but in different manners (edify the flock). Paul's warning was to preach the Word and those things that become sound doctrine. We might as well admit that it has not been God who has caused division, and many times a scattering of the flock, but it has been because of the things that have been taught by the ministry. Jesus said, "Feed MY SHEEP." Why was it that God had to judge Israel? Was it not be-cause the leaders caused the people to err? When Jesus came was it not to bring His people back to the old paths of holiness and righteousness? The sects of the Jews had transgressed the law of God by their traditions. The ministry was placed in the church for the perfection of the saints and the edifying of the body of Christ, What we need today is a fearless ministry that will fight against the wolves that creep in for no other reason but to destroy and scatter the flock of God. They are responsible to God to see that no harm comes to the sheep. Many of God's true sheep have wandered out into the wilderness again because of a lack of oversight and looking after the sheep's interest, simply because the so called shepherds in many cases are only interested in their own selfish ends. God help us to be up and about OUR FATHER'S business. We must feed the sheep, help them and en-courage them until He that is the Great Shepherd of the sheep returns. Let us be found faithful stewards of God's flock which He has purchased with His own blood.

In 1st Peter the 5th chapter and the 2nd and 3rd verses we read about Peter's admonition to the Elders. Peter, no doubt thinking back to the time when Jesus had asked him the pointed questions concerning the "feeding of the

L and the fifth verse we find these words "And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might." The Prayer Way

Thousands of words have been written concerning prayer, yet the subject remains inexhaustible, and to the prayerwarrior, the greatest theme of the soul. Prayer can be called the hidden mechanism which keeps the church running smoothly. Prayer is the weapon through which the hosts of Satan are arrested in their onward march, their power broken, captives delivered, and Christ presented in His redemptive work. It is shocking, therefore, to notice the indifference shown toward this weapon of grace compared to our other Christian activities.

Let us quietly enter a prayer meeting where Jesus and His disciples are gathered. The Master has just ceased praying. The disciples are amazed. Such devotion, such fervency; John the Baptist had prayed like that. Had they not stood in the synagogue many times with bowed heads in silent reverence while the Rabbis had read long prayers? Had they not waited silently at the street corners until the Pharisees had finished their prayers? But the Master prayed not in this fashion. A deep longing possessed their hearts. One of the disciples speaks, "Lord, teach us to pray as John also taught his disciples." This request brought forth from the Master the beautiful words eft the Lord's Prayer, which is now called one of the masterpieces of all literature. Oh, how the Lord's disciples of this present day need to fall down at His feet in abject repentance and cry, Lord, again teach us to pray!

The work of the prayer-warrior is not confined to a given place or boundary line as in other types of work, but reaches out past their own threshold unto the uttermost parts of the earth. On bended know he prayer-warrior enters Gethsen with Jesus and there through but the tears pleads for the saints; the ministry; the missionaries; the church; that they fail not in their God given mission on earth. On bended knees the prayer-warrior reaches out beyond his own strength as the Holy Spirit takes control and with unutterable love and compassion toward sinners pleads their cause before the throne of grace. mind and peace of soul that comes only by submitting our will to His. Always worrying about what the morrow will bring and whether our personal necessities will be provided for causes many people to have unnecessary anxious thoughts, and peace flees from them. We spirit-filled. Pentecostal saints have a PEACE that is EVERLASTING and eternal. Praise the Lord!

Impatience will spoil the spirit of longsuffering. From Eden until today every person has had to fight this spirit in his life. Our characters are forged in the smithy of heat and bruises and crushings and defeats and victories. Great souls mark their advances by the heights they reach through the conquest over enemies, largely within their own personalities.

Paul gives us the method of conquest. It is not to attack the enemy directly, but to eliminate him by devotion to the good. Little by little we overcome our impatience and acquire the spirit of long-suffering. The best way to overcome a desire for cheap jazz music on the radio is to cultivate a taste for music that lifts the soul to higher levels of thought and encourages a spirit of worship. To be the victor over sin in any form, look at Christ, realize His presence, breathe the atmosphere of His triumph over evil. In the presence of a great mountain, one is not inclined to dwell in molehills. In view of Calvary, the soul does not wish to feed on filth.

Not the discomforts of the journey, but what awaits us at its end-this is what should preoccupy us in daily life. "Let us not be weary in well-doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

The man whose vision is filled with his material comforts grows frantic over their wreckage and despairs at their loss; but the man whose eye is on life's goal can stand beside Paul when his friends besought him with tears not to endanger his life by going up to Jerusalem. "What mean ye to weep and to break mine heart? for I am ready not to be bound only, but also to die at Jerusalem for the name of the Lord Jesus." We endure when our eyes are fastened by faith on "Him who is invisible."

Bitter words spoil gentleness. "It must needs be that offenses come," said Jesus, but even so, we may live above them as they come, and refuse to be offended by them. My capacity and tendency to take offense may serve as the index of my spiritual state. Do I get my feelings

hurt? Do I feel resentment when people slight or neglect me? Do I sometimes think of getting even with those who treat me shabbily or injure me? If so, then I have some distance yet to go before I reach the mind that was in Christ. The cure for an offended mind is gentleness of spirit, unruffled by what others may say or do. Gentleness is not an abstract quality obtainable by direct search or asking. Gentleness of spirit is a by-product of something else, a result of love that sheds abroad the steady, calm growing-out of conscious power and sufficient reserves.

A threatening curse of this age is its shallowness with regard to things spiritual. This is not true of the material world when we build skyscrapers or railroads or bridges; but we face that danger continuously when we turn to matters of the soul. The practice of veneering is by no means confined to wood-work. It is also employed by many in constructing their spiritual lives.

This error is far too prevalent in our religious life. Our conceptions of church membership lack depth. Our conceptions of the spirit-filled life are based too frequently upon fleshly, shallow experiences that lack a proper foundation. Great oaks never grow in shallow soil. Great buildings never stand on surface foundations.

It is not otherwise in the unfolding of great Christian characters. They must stand on the Rock, Christ Jesus, and not on the shifting sand of conventional morality; on the Rock, Christ Jesus, and not on the futile theories of men.

Dear friend, we are God's building to be built; therefore, let us be concerned with the materials that go into that building.
