JUST A TREE

"Who his ownself bare our sins in his own body ON THE TREE, that we being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed." I Peter 2:24.

The cross of Jesus, to which He was nailed, was made out of an ordinary tree. It is true that there are different species of trees, and this tree was of a particular specie (perhaps acacia wood), but it was only one tree of many trees like it in the woods. If it were possible for the tree, to which Jesus was nailed, to speak from the grave wherein its dust lies, it would surely bring us a message of eternal importance. With your permission I will try to characterize this tree. Listen to its message

"As I lay here in my grave I medidate upon those things that are past, and contemplate about those things which shall be hereafter. It has been a long time it seems to me since I was born upon a hillside with host of my kin all about me. I was so small when I first became conscious of my existence, and took knowledge of the things about me. I took a lively interest in the green carpet of grass with it's furniture of vegetation. The air and space about me was well papered with birds of various sorts. My environment was pleasant though rugged as I was forced to brave the heat and the cold, along with the pleasant beauties of nature

and God.

"Then one day some men came along who seemed to take unusual interest in me and a couple of my brothers. They walked about us and sized us up and down

with keen and seemingly cold calculations. It wasn't long until the purpose of their visit was made painfully clear to all three of us. With calm, cold purpose the men began to cut up the vegetation about us and throw it around with an attitude of unconcern, Then before we knew it. the men began to bite into our ankles with sharp in-struments of cruelty. I felt myself falling. There was a crash as I hit the ground and I felt bruised and broken. But if I thought the fall was bad, what followed was horrible. My arms were all cut off, my beauty was marred forever. My two brothers I noticed were being treated in the same manner. We were then dragged and hauled mercilessly into a city named Jerusalem. How long we lay there I cannot say, but I ironically noted the two stiff artificial arms that were given our skinned and mutilated bodies. Our arms struck grotesquely straight out. In reality it was one arm fastened in the middle and protruding out on both sides like two arms. My body felt so dry and life-less and I noticed it had shrumken a great deal. But

"One day I noticed a large throng of excited people cursing, crying, and demouncing a sad but benevolent looking man. This man seemed to be so kind looking in contrast to the evil appearance of the vast multitude that opposed Him. They spat upon His bleeding face and pushed Him around with rough lands. I watched as they laterated His back with a cruel looking whip.

"I could keenly feel

Strengthen Thy Brethren

In the 22nd chapter of the gospel of Luke, the 31st and 32nd verses we find the following statement which the Lord spoke to Peter, "And the Lord said, Simon, Simon, behold Satan hath desired to have you, that he may sift you as wheat. But I have prayed for thee that thy faith fail not; and when thou are converted, strengthen thy brethren. The point which we wish to bring to your prayerful attention is the words "strengthen thy brethren." Jesus knew that it would be necessary for Peter to possess more than he had at that time in order to carry out the words which were spoken to him. The Lord knew that when the New Testament church would become a reality on the day of Pente-cost, its inception would be accompanied by the supernatural outpouring of the Holy Ghost from heaven. He also knew the trials and tests which would be the aftermath of the visitation of the Holy Spirit and He impressed upon the mind and heart of Peter the necessity of strengthening the brethren and being a bulwark of defense against the onslaughts of the Pharisees, Saduccees and the other religious groups of that day.

Weapons of Warfare

He also knew that Peter, as well as the rest of the disciples, would have to be divinely equipped with the weapons necessary to combat the spiritual and natural forces that would arise to destroy, if possible, the infant church. Jesus made the matter of the "strengthming of thy brethren" of primary and utmost importance.

The events which followed Pentecost proved that it was vital that weapons of warfare from God had been given to the warriors of the cross in order to stand. An outstanding scripture which indicates the "strength" of the early church is found in the second chapter of Acts and the 42nd verse—"And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers."

The Secret of Success

Here was the secret of success and progressiveness of the early Christian church. There was unity of purpose, unity of doctrine, unity of faith and unity of walk with God. It was beset on every hand by those who would fain have destroyed it but the more the hand of oppression and persecution was laid upon it—the more it grew and prospered.

The Apostle Peter, the one who before Pentecost cowered before the questions of a damsel and openly denied and cursed that he was ever acquainted with the Man of Galilee, was a bulwark and tower of strength (after Pentecost), encouraging the weary, giving strength to the weak, healing the sick and afflicted and resolutely and with determination from above, standing strong and true. He was taken before the Sanhedrin and forbidden to preach in the name of Jesus, but he, threatened as he was with dire punishment if he persisted, withstood the whole august body of Jewish religious leaders and boldly and fee lessly declared "We ought to obey Golf rather than men."

The Bible is filled with examples of men and women who went forth conquering and to conquer when their lives were touched by the mighty, pulsating and regenerating power and grace of God. They faced the hatred and jeers of the ungodly, they braved the terrors of the unknown in their quest to bring the

Convention News From Mexico

The XV General Convention of the Apostolic Church of the Faith in Christ Jesus (Iglesia Apostolica de la Fe en Cristo Jesus) of Mexico, held October 24-31, 1946, in the city of Torreon, Coahuila, was a great success. Over 850 brethren from different parts of Mexico attended the convention. Some of them made the trip by plane, train and bus. Others had to walk on foot several days through the high mountains of the central part of Mexico until they came to a place where they could get a train or bus. A few came by "burro." However, everybody was happy and the Lord gave us a great revival in His name.

It was our special privilege to have with us for a few days Brother Howard A. Goss, General Superintendent of the United Pentecostal Church, who was official representative of that organization to our Convention and also the late


were introduced to the convention the same day at 12 o'clock noon. I must say that our work in Mexico is divided in this manner: the Women's societies work for the building of churches and also to help the poor people; the Young People for the support of missionary work and the Men's societies support the students in our Apostolic Theological Institute in Mexico City.

The Convention officially opened the same day at 6:30 p.m. There were 120 ministers present from different parts of Mexico and also some others from California, Arizona and Texas. Brother F. Rivas H., our General Superintendent, preached that night about "The Progress of the Apostolic Church." He gave an interesting report of the work in Mexico since its beginning in 1914 and told many of his experiences on the field of labor. We also heard from

His salvation. There was also a special meeting on Monday night led by the faculty and students of our Bible School and the graduate students received their diplomas. Bishop Maclovio Gaxiola, the Principal, talked about "The Apostolic Theological Institute; its beginning, its present work and its plans for the future."

Thirty brethren were filled with the Spirit during the Convention and 75 were baptized in the precious name of Jesus, During the Convention the previous year we baptized 66.

The Convention came to a close with a large crowd present on Thursday night, October 31st. Twenty brothers were ordained for the ministry and others were removed from their present fields of labor and sent to open new works in different parts of Mexico. We are looking forward, if Jesus tarries, to

Brother Eldredge E. Lewis, from Corpus Christi, Texas, who was official representative of the Pentecostal Conquerors. We all enjoyed their ministry very much and especially the information about the outpouring of the Holy Ghost in the early days of this century in the United States. They made some official representations to our National Officials and we sincerely hope the Lord will unite all His people for the advancement of His kingdom over the earth and especially in Latin America.

The first meeting of the Convention was held on Thursday, October 24th, at 5 a.m. There was a large attendance and Brother Manuel J. Gaziola preached about the Great Commission (Mark 16:15).

The official delegates of the Women's, Young People's and Men's societies Brother Goss who preached about the Pentecostal work in the United States and also in the rest of the world. We all praised God to know that this brother has walked with the Lord for over 40 years. The blessings of the Spirit of the Lord were manifested upon all the convention group while listening to Brother Goss.

Services were held every morning at 5 o'clock. Ministers and Young People had their business meetings every day at 9 a.m. the Women's and Men's societies had theirs at 10 a.m. There were prayer meetings every day at 9 o'clock in the morning and also in the afternoon. Night services were held daily from 6:30 to 10:30. On Sunday night there was a Young People's special meeting and we saw over 50 young people at the altar, seeking the Lord and

another great Convention next year and the brethren in Torreon hope to build a large church with accommodations for 2,000 and add other facilities for the increased attendance they expect to have

next year.

We all rejoice to be in fellowship with the United Pentecostal Church family of the United States. We sincerely appreciated the visit of Brothers Goss and Lewis to our Convention and hope that more American brethren will be able to attend our future meetings. Please pray for us, that we may send some of our representatives to your General Conference next year. Remember the work of Mexico in your prayers. The Heavenly Vision

"Where there is no vision the people perish: but he that keepeth the law, happy is he." Proverbs 29:18.

We often hear the first part of this proverb quoted, but the latter half of it is not so colorful or desirable to many. How wonderful it is to conjure up in our mind's eye a great and inspiring "vision" such as we imagine Columbus had which led him to embark on a hazardous voyage which resulted in the discovery of the New World, or that which Livingstone possessed which led him to the continent of Africa where he opened

up that dark place to the word of God. Yes, there must be an awakening to a vision like that which possessed those great men, and many others, in the hearts of our political and spiritual leaders or we shall be in mortal danger of perishing as a Christian society and nation. But the vision here spoken of does not necessarily mean that romantic, thrilling thing we would often like to make of it. In many places in the Bible, the "vision" is referred to as direct inspiration from God, or His clear revealing of His plans and His will to His prophets and His people.

"And the word of the Lord was preci-

ous in those days; there was no open vision." I Samuel 3:1.

The usual meaning of vision as here spoken of seems to be a direct revelation from God to His prophets or an opening of their understanding of the scriptures and God's will for His people. Sometimes it was a personal interview with His prophet in which God revealed His will and gave His "chosen one" his "march orders" as he did to Moses at the burning bush and with Paul when He struck him blind on the road to Damascus. Paul, in referring to this vision and the commandments the heavenly vision but showed it first in Damascus, and at Jerusalem, throughout Judea and then to the Gen-tiles, "that they should repent and turn to God and do works meet for repentance.

There were real visions in these two wonderful instances which were mani-fested to Moses and Paul where the great I AM appeared in His brightness and glory to tell them what He desired of them. This great physical manifesta-tion, wonderful as it was, and to the ones who received it precious and awesome, was not all of the vision. The mission which God gave and impressed upon their hearts, minds and souls and which stayed with them throughout their whole lives, making of them among the world's great human leaders, was, I believe, the REAL vision. If either had failed to pursue their calling, the meaning and significance of the original vision would have been lost to them and would more than likely have become a stumbling block and curse.

Here, in the Apostle Paul's own words, is the positive parallel and gospel fulfilment of Proverbs 29:18 with which our article begins: "Whereupon, O king Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision." Could we stand before the least on earth, not to men-tion her great, and say we are being obedient to the heavenly vision? Shall we be able to stand before the King of Kings and say, "O king Jesus, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision?"

Jesus is calling you. He is calling to every spirit filled child of God to "Lift

up your eyes and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages and gathereth fruit unto life eternal." John Jesus not only "invites" us to enter the harvest fields but "commands" us to "preach the gospel to every creature." Do you have a clear and impelling vision of the harvest fields? You don't if you have been in the habit of disobeying the little "visions" of usefulness to others and of winning that neighbor or the neglected children of your part of town to the Lord. If you have merited a real vision of a particular harvest field from the Lord, it is because He has trusted you would be obedient. To really obey God is your greatest opportunity and responsibility.

How precious and never failing are the wonderful promises of God. The Lord has given us many wonderful promises and also some fearful ones. Let us not forget the fearful ones. Study the subject of blessings and curses throughout the Bible and view yourself in the light of your findings. See Leviti-cus 26 - Deuteronomy 28 - etc. Is your spiritual vision dim? Do such scriptures as the one about the harvest fields "leave you cold?" Then you must have failed to obey somewhere along the line. Perhaps it was little by little or maybe it was one big denial of the Lord's demands upon you as His blood bought child. As Lord, He must be first in all

things.

He wants us to take His words to heart, to obey every word of His, to preach the gospel wherever and however He gives the opportunity, with the empowering of His Holy Spirit, attesting to His ministry through us with signs following. He wants us to glorify His Holy Name and to lift it high by

our living and verbal testimony.

"If ye will not hear, and if ye will not lay it to heart, to give glory unto my Name, saith the Lord of hosts, I will curse your blessings; yea, I have cursed them already, because ye do not lay it to heart." Malachi 2:2.

There is another portion of scripture

which ties obedience and vision together: "The law is no more; and her prophets find no vision." This is in the latter

half of Lamentations 2:9.

Do you want to hear from God; to be able to deliver the true gospel; to dis-cern between the good and evil ever before us that we may always be able to choose the good and perfect ways which God has for us? Then we must obey in every point and if we have a will to obey, and will humbly and diligently seek to know His will and commandments, He will give us vision, insight and wisdom for every step of the way. He will give them through our searching of the scriptures, yielding ourselves

to Him and praying always in the Spirit, and by obedient preaching, teaching and ministering to those who need it.

See a man busy obeying God and you will see a man of vision. If you desire a vision from the Lord such as a "Great door, and effectual opened unto me" as Paul saw in the city of Ephesus and recorded in I Corinthians 16:9, just obey God in those things that He is dealing with you and as obedience takes effect and works out His will then God can trust you with bigger things. Invest those little talents of opportunities He is pressing upon you, be they ever so small, and the greater vision, opportunity and anointing will follow.

"Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that He would send forth laborers into His

harvest." Luke 10:2; Matt. 9:38.

Obey in every point as Jesus, through the word and the Spirit, reveals Himself to you and He will give you vision, will send you forth, and will reward you even as He has others. Praise the Name of Jesus, our Lord of the Harvest. By W. T. Witherspoon, Columbus, O.

The thing that has brought us into the glorious latter day light and the revelation of Jesus Christ is that we have been constrained to insist on fulfilling the scripture just as it is. We have insisted on the speaking with other tongues as the evidence of the baptism of the Holy Ghost and that baptism in water must be in the Name of Jesus simply because that is the only Name used in the Word.

Now if the above be so, it is obvious that we will only get at the real truth of other doctrines by sticking to the Word. This brings us to the subject of this article, "Backsliders," which word is not in the New Testament. We use it to designate those who have gone back into the world and have fallen from grace. It is not definitely a wrong term, but it is evidently not God's term or He would have had the Apostles use it. It is not used simply because it can-not be applied to the New Testament saint who breaks with God. The reason it cannot be applied is because of the difference between the New Testament and the Old Testament experience. Old Testament experience consisted of keeping the laws and performing the ceremonies as set forth in the law. This justified the worshipper before God, but in no sense did it clear his conscience of inbred guilt. The most perfect lawkeeper—Saul of Tarsus—was con-strained to cry out "Oh, wetched man that I am" when he came into the knowledge of God's righteousness.

By the above you can see that it is possible to backslide only from an experience that was without. You cannot backslide from an experience that is within, no more than you can slip away from your heart and lungs. The baptism of the Holy Ghost is a seal unto the day of your redemption. Up to this point it would seem the "Eternal Security" called, is correct, and it is so far as God's thought, intent and purpose is concerned. But the teachers of that doctrine refuse to take into consideration the free moral agency of the saint and the many scriptures that show clearly that one can fall from grace. Paul said concerning the Galatian church "I fear lest I have bestowed labor upon you in vain." What a terrible statement if they were still saved, after taking up with false doctrines.

Of course they were better off no matter how far they would have fallen if they were still saved. Paul, in another place, says "We are not among those that draw back to Perdition," and in still another place, concerning those that have gone back into sin: "The last state of that man is worse than the first." This could not be if they were still sa ved.

No, there is something far worse than backsliding to a New Testament saint, who sins wilfully and puts Christ to an open sharne. He does not backslide, but he conducts a second enacifixion, and this time it is within himself, and Paul says in the 6th chapter of Hebrews when they have done that, there is nothing ahead of them but a certain fearful looking forward of judgment and fiery in-dignation which shall devour the adversary. Concerning those that have such a high place in God and such a "secure" position, we are reminded that even the angels in heaven were cast out when they obeyed Lucifer.

Concerning his first crucifixion, "He came unto His own," and they crucified Him. Concerning His second crucifixion, again "He came unto His own" and many of them are saying "We will not have this man to rule over us." They persecute Him by rejecting the leading of the spirit; they put Him to an open shame in many ways and many places. If this is persisted in, He will again

say, "It is finished," and "there remaineth no more sacrifice for sin."
You may ask, "What is the sign of this awful condition." I answer, "When there is no repentence." Someone said, "What is the unpardonable sin." Rather, it is an unpardonable condition. "Him that cometh unto me I will in no wise cast out," but you can get in a condition where you cannot come. Be careful to foster a spirit of repentance. A broken and a contrite heart are the sacrifices of God. Genuine repentance and confession is getting to be a scarce article. DON'T PUT OUT THE FIRE

Text: "Quench not the Spirit." - I

Thessalonians 5:19.

A short text, this, whose real vividness has not been too well carried over from the original. It might be rendered: "Don't put out the fire of the Holy Spirit!"

The Holy Spirit as fire! It is a powerful figure, but not a surprising one to those who are familiar with the Scrip-tures. Over and over fire is taken as a symbol of God: His presence and might, His holiness and glory. The experience of Moses in the desert and Isaiah in the temple are only two among many illus-trations in the Old Testament. The symbolism is continued in the New Testament, where it is employed specifically with reference to God as He acts in and through the Holy Spirit. "He shall bap-tize you with the Holy Ghost and with

fre," said John concerning Jesus.

And He did—and still does. Read the second chapter of Acts: the "day of Pentecost fully come" — the disciples "all with one accord in one place"— "a sound from heaven as of rushing mighty wind"—and then!—"there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire." What an amazing combination of scenic symbolism and solid fact! The towering fact was: "They were all filled with the Holy Ghost."

Thus we see the appropriateness of the figure which appears in the text and thus we catch sight of the truth which lies behind it; the truth, namely, that fire is a picture and emblem of the Holy Spirit as He relates Himself to us in His active ministries of grace and guidance, His living energies of love and power. Fire illuminates, so does the Spirit. Fire warms, so does the Spirit. Fire melts, so does the Spirit. Fire purifies, refines, so does the Spirit. Fire energizes, so does the Spirit. Fire fuses, welds, unites; so does the Spirit. And on one might go with the analogy.

But here a startling and solemn thing intrudes itself. The text admonishes "quench not!" Don't put out that flame! It is plainly implied that it lies within your power and mine to hinder, to hurt, and to halt the living, loving ministries of the Spirit of God. In this realm of moral relationships and spiritual experiences it is terribly true that the human can hinder the Divine, the finite can frustrate the Infinite. Hence the warning: Take care! Quench not! Be sensi-tive—always, at all costs—to the im-pulses and influences of God's gracious Spirit!

Now what are some of the fiery ministries of the Holy Ghost which we are in danger of crippling or cancelling? Our answer to this inquiry will be found in a review of four remarkable passages from the New Testament.

Don't Put Out the Spirit's Testimony

Flame!

Turning to Acts 5:32, we come upon these words: "And we are his witnesses of these things, and so is also the Holy Ghost whom God hath given to them that obey him." It is the speech of Peter. It is intended to explain to their critics the persistency and ardor with which he, John and other Spirit-filled ones have



been testifying to their experience of Christ. Previously they had been told that they must desist from their Jesus propaganda, but neither bans nor threats had silenced their voices. They have been arrested again, and the authorities complain, "Did not we straitly command you that ye should not teach in this name? and, behold, ye have filled all Jerusalem with your doctrine." Blessed compliment. To the solemn charge Peter makes brave answer: "We ought to obey God rather than man." In that "ought" is a flame of fire. We are Christ's witnesses, we are made so by the revelation of Christ which has come to us in the gift of the Holy Ghost. Christ is real! Christ is living! Christ is adequate—all victorious! We have found it so. We must tell it. That—God help us to see it—is normal Christianity.

Now, sadly enough, there are many among us who have failed to pass on to others the word of life that has come to them. Their failure has become their of Christ which has come to us in the

to them. Their failure has become their impoverishment. Their delinquency in witnessing has carried defeat into the whole of their Christian life. They have throttled the urge to testfy until, alas, the urge is no longer there. John Fletcher has left us the record of his own unhappy experience in this matter. He confesses that five different times he lost the assurance of his having been made "perfect in love," simply because he was

afraid to bear his testimony.

There is a principle here which even the psychologists recognize. William James taught that no worthy impression should ever be left without its appropriate expression. And someone has more recently remarked, with a nice play on words, that "impression minus expression equals depression." The vision must have a voice, or it will fade. The unacknowledged blessing withers in the heart. The shut-in flame goes out for want of a draft. "Quench not the Spirit!" Don't Put Out the Spirit's Prayer

In Romans 8:26 Paul tells us, "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities; for we know not what we should pray for as we ought; but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groaning which cannot be uttered."

The teaching values here are rich and varied: real prayer without the Holy Spirit is impossible; our human limitations ("infirmities") are such that, without Him, we know neither the how or the what of prayer; His presence and guidance are given to overcome this

handicap.

It is the work of the Spirit of God to supply both the impulse and the intelligence for effective praying. The impulse may be common or uncommon; common in the constant, gentle, persuasive "push" of the mind toward communion with God; uncommon in those special "bur-dens," those seasons of soul "travail," which come again and again in the life of prayer. But an urge or a burden without enlightenment would be a blind and fruitless thing. So the Spirit directs our praying in keeping with the mind and purpose of God. Basic guidance comes through the Holy Scriptures. Special guidance comes through that mysterious play of mind on mind, that voice of the Holy Ghost in the soul.

"I cannot tell why there should come to me

A thought of someone miles and miles away,

In swift insistence on the memory,

Unless there be a need that I should

"Perhaps, just then, my friend has fiercer fight,

A more appalling weakness, a decay Of courage, darkness, some lost sense of right.

And so, in case he needs my prayer, I pray."

But suppose I do not! Suppose I am pettily preoccupied. Suppose I am neglectful and heedless. Then what? The answer is unavoidable; I quench the Spirit; I damp the prayer flame. And the mischief of this sort of thing is that it tends to repeat itself. The Holy Spirit does not leave us on the slightest provocation (God forgive us if we leave that impression with the people who wait upon our ministries!) but these failures, be they ever so small, do have a benumbing effect upon us. Shortly the correction and reproof of the inner Monitor must be heeded or paralysis will settle upon our praying. And when this occurs, the defenses of the soul go down and all manner of temptations may tramp in upon us to crush us. And when these evil intruders reach the Holy Place of the now defeated life they find upon its cold altar the dead ashes of a once glowing prayerfulness. Oh God, the pity of it!

Don't Put Out the Spirit's Love Flame!

The next scripture to pass before us in this review is Ephesians 5:30-32, which reads: "And grieve not the Holy Spirit of God, whereby we are sealed unto the day of redemption. Let all bitterness, and wrath and anger, and clamor, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: and be ye kind one to another, tender-hearted, forgiving one

JAMAICA...Land of Tropical Delight

The cry of mourning doves, the lapping of the waves against the shorecountless limestone caves, mineral springs, hundreds of short rivers and tumultous streams that tumble down hills and mountains in cascades and

waterfalls-this is Jamaica!

We land at Port Antonio with its twin harbors, embowered in hills half wooded with cocoanuts and begin our trip across the island to Kingston, chief city and capital. Cacao, cocoanuts, clumps of bamboo, spreading breadfruit trees and whole valleys full of bananas decorate the rugged landscape as we drive along. We catch sight of the beautiful cloudcapped Blue Mountains, clothed in greenness the year round. The road from Port Antonio to Kingston is a changing panorama of high mountains, deep green valleys, and rich tropical vegetation.

The density of the suburban cottages in the foothills tell us that we are entering the capital city. After some in-quiries, we locate THE APOSTOLIC GOSPEL CHURCH, a fine two story structure on Wildman Street, about two miles from the sea front. We are in time for service, though a little late, and slip, unobserved, into the back of the building. A praise service is going on and we are both surprised and delighted with the response. Is it possible that these people on this little island, far away in the Caribbean Sea have had similar experiences and praise the Lord in the same way our people do. We quote a testimony from one sister, whose name, we discover, is Gladys L. Kiddoe:

"I was an Anglican for over twenty years, brought up under strict Anglican parentage and worshipped in the St. Michaels Church, Kingston. As time went on I became dissatisfied with my religion but could not really find out what I needed. I wanted a deeper life in Christ. Some days passed by and I decided to visit the assembly at Wildman Street, I heard Pastor Russell and other saints of God preach and testify. I heard the gospel message of repentance and baptism in Jesus name, the infilling of the Holy Spirit and Speaking in Tongues. I yearned for prayers. I decided to confide my desire to a sister whom I had met in the assembly that night and she introduced me to the pastor. Before I left the building the pastor and a couple of saints prayed for me. In a couple of weeks a baptism was arranged and on March 12, 1944, I was baptized in Jesus name at Hope River, St. Andrew. oppression from my unsaved family impeded my infilling; nevertheless, on Sun-day, October 21, 1945, praise the Lord, I received that precious gift of the Holy Spirit.

"Saints, I did not find it an easy task, reaching up to this Light, but praise the

Lord today I can say:

"I have made my choice forever, I will walk with Christ my God, Naught from Him my soul shall sever, For I am trusting in His love.' Preaching follows the testimony service, then the altar service. At the close of this we eagerly seek our Pastor Russell and his wife and introduce ourselves. We find them to be charming people and evidently efficient workers, from what we see of their work that night and the days that followed. We ply them with many questions:

"How old is the church?" "It has been here ten years." "Is it the only Jesus Name Pente-costal Church on the island?" "Oh no! We have five other churches;

at Glengoffe, Seaforth, Ulster Spring, Duncans and Brown's Town. Each has its own pastor."

We are curious to know how "it all began," and Pastor Russell gives us the

story:

Holy Ghost Falls in Jamaica

"A missionary party consisting of seven left the metropolis, Kingston, Jamaica, to visit a little countryside town known as Brown's Town in the parish of St. Ann in the year 1916. On reaching the town, our hearts were touched with the great poverty which was brought about by a severe drought which had dried up all the crops on which these people had depended for a living, leaving them very little to exist on. It was under these conditions that the people's hearts were opened to call on God. We prayed for the natural rains and so you can imagine when the showers began to fall in answer to our prayers how the sinners became interested in their soul's salvation.

"We began our mission with outdoor meetings; none of us had received the baptism of the Holy Ghost at this time, but we were very sincere and tried to live up to what light we had. As the meetings continued we were able to procure a meeting hall, and as the crowds began to increase we had to add to the building by putting up temporary cocoanut booths to accommodate the people. We had stepped out in faith with actually no funds but it was sur-prising how the Lord took care of us. On the first Sunday after six days of prayer, the Holy Ghost fell copiously when sixty young men and women were filled and spoke in other tongues as the Spirit gave utterance. At this great awakening hundreds were drawn to Christ.

Learn of Baptism in Jesus' Name; Sixteen Towns Reached

"We heard of the arrival of Elder Arthur Watson of Ontario, Canada, who was a oneness man. He brought the message on the revelation of Jesus Name and water baptism in His Name for the remission of sins. ALL GLAD-LY RECEIVED THE WORD. Our first baptismal service was held shortly after when 82 were baptized in Jesus' mighty name. On this occasion we had to walk eight miles to the sea and before the service came to a close eight additional souls came forward. After this the revival continued until 16 towns and villages were awakened to the glorious high calling in Christ Jesus. I regret I cannot give the story in a more detailed way but must impress you that the message swept the entire island and here and there witnesses stood boldly for the true and only Gospel of the Kingdom of Christ."

The Visit of Bro. and Sis. Witherspoon

"Our present work which is now standing for 10 years is the fruit of that revival. The work has been sorely persecuted by other denominations as the membership of such places was greatly reduced just at that time. We were fortunate to have read some of Brother A. D. Urshan's writings which were very helpful to us. In the year 1936, when we felt the need of having someone come from abroad to help us, Brod Urshan referred us to Brother W. T. Witherspoon of Columbus, Ohio. We prayed and wrote to him and Brother and Sister Witherspoon came to us on their first missionary trip to the island. We had wonderful meetings; during their stay 70 were added to the church, Their coming to us aroused the interest of many and gave us courage to press

Need a Bible School

Curious to know more about this most interesting mission field, we questioned them further: "What are your greatest

(1) We have found among the young natives a great ambition for further knowledge of the Bible by attending a

Bible School.

(2) Transportation is another problem. On account of not owning a service wagon or motor car, we find great difficulty in visiting the interior as the rates asked for mileage on cars are exorbi-

(3) We find in our work that an occasional visit by our missionaries would help to extend the gospel here as so many do not realize the large body of saints with which we are connected.

(4) We are always in need of a good

supply of tracts and books on the Faith. Sunday School literature cannot be ob-

tained in Jamaica.

(continued from page 1) sympathetic convulsions go through me as I remembered how cruel men had cut me down in like manner as they were doing to Him. Yet I felt that I more deserved my misery than He for I realized that this Man was greater than anyone that I HAD ever seen before. As the tormenting of this prisoner went on I began to see how small I really was in the light of this Man's greatness. He never complained once, and gave never a look of hatred or vengeance. There was only that look of love and tenderness that shined brighter to me than a thousand suns. I repented there of my complainings and self love.

"From where I was I could hear the jeers and cries of mockers and scoffers who seemed to shout 'Crucify Him, Crucify Him.' In this crowd there were poor people and rich people. I noticed some Pharisees with their religious rivals, the Sadducees; they took a very active part in this demonstration. Also there was the High Priest with other priests who seemed to me to have deserated the very robes and the office of reconciliation; they acted like monsters of the pit. In fact the whole gathering seemed to be an eruption of howling

beasts from the Abyss.

"I shuddered as I mentally prophesied the inevitable death of this innocent victim. A man called Pilate argued with this unreasonable mob for a while, but in despair he gave up. He tried to bargain with them, offering Barabbas to their awful designs, but this had no effect.

"I learned the name of this Man from

"I learned the name of this Man from hundreds. Most of them used His name blasphemously; but I noticed a few women and a man or so who spoke His name reverently. With curses the name 'Jesus' hissed from the mouths of men and women who seemed like a mass of vicious serpents. It was just the few women and a man or so who spoke the name 'Jesus' reverently.

"Then the end began to come quickly. This Jesus was sent to Herod. But nothing came of this toward His deliverance, for Jesus was brought back

in the mock robe of a king.

"Finally Pilate in exasperation gave up all argument and 'took water, and washed his hands before the multitude, saying, I am innocent of the blood of this just person: see ye to it.' Then answered all the people, and said, 'His blood be on us, and on our children.'

blood be on us, and on our children." "I watched the soldiers (who were Roman) take Jesus into the common hall. They removed the mock but gorgeous robe given Him by Herod. They put on Him in its stead a scarlet robe. Upon His head they pressed a crown made from thorns. They placed a reed in His right hand as a mock sceptre. They then mockingly bowed saying 'Hail King of the Jews!'

the Jews!'
"They mistreated Him in so many
ways that words fail me in describing

in proper terms that scene.

"Then comes to me the greatest and most soul terrifying experience of my time. I watched as some men strode viciously eager to where I was. They picked me up and carried me over to where He was. 'Here carry this,' they barked, 'this will make you a good throne to rule from.' Then they laughed uproariously.

"With such humility and meekness I

never realized could be shown, this Jesus took me upon His back and began to stumble along with me. Oh, how I wished that I could have carried Him away from this howling mob of monsfers, but lo, I was only a tree!

"With laboring breath and bleeding

"With laboring breath and bleeding back Jesus staggered forward. Finally He fell, but not to my surprise. I was only surprised that He had held up so long. Not one time did I hear Him mutter or gasp out anything in the way of complaint. I would of known if He had, for I was held against His neck and head as He bore me on His shoulder.

A man from Cyrenia took me up from the back of Jesus at the command of the soldiers and carried me to the top of the hill. They called this ghastly place Golgotha or 'a place of a skull.' I was never in such a grisly place in my life. With cruel but capable hands they nailed His tender hands to my artificial arms. They pounded spikes through His feet.

"I was so taken up with this excruciating experience, that until now I had not noticed two other trees (my brothers) being used as a background for the bodies of two rough looking individuals. I heard screams and cries pierce the air as nails crashed through their hands and

"But Jesus did not utter one sound. We were all hoisted aloft: three trees and three men. For six gruesome hours Jesus was held aloft in mid-air. He once prayed, 'Father forgive them; for they

know not what they do."

"I learned that the two other men who were borne aloft by my brothers were thieves. When one of them asked Jesus, 'Lord remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom,' I began to grasp the significance as to who Jesus was. But this knowledge increased further when Jesus answered: 'Verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise.'

"Like a streak of blinding light I understood why Jesus was so strong though so weak. He was not afraid of death! He knew that His kingdom was not of this world, that death was a means by which He could pass from one state into another state. I could see that Jesus would not be defeated in death, but was, through death, conquering him that had power over death, even the

devil.

"I began to think less of my own welfare, and saw the wonderful cause for which He was dying. I was but a tree, but Jesus was the saviour of mankind. His death was to be for sinners. But death on a tree was not going to hold Him; neither was a grave; for He was going to conquer death, hell and the grave.

"As I look back from my grave in reminiscence, I thrill to the Conqueror's tread. Jesus died in my arms, but I can see a light shining from the darkness of that day which will never go out.

of that day which will never go out.

"Yes, I am in my grave, and all that I know of Him is His passing and death; but He is out of His grave, He is risen as Conqueror, I cannot save anyone, but I am stained with the blood of ONE who is mighty to save and strong to deliver.

"Over nineteen hundred years have passed and gone. I have been an emblem of suffering and sacrifice. I have been eulogized by preachers, statesmen and

"We Are More Than Conquerors Through Christ"

But Prayer

By David Coote, San Antonio, Texas

"Peter therefore was kept in prison: but prayer was made without ceasing of the church unto God for him." Acts 12:5.

The greatest power in the world today is not atomic energy, it is PRAYER. Atomic energy moves the elements, but prayer moves the God that made the elements, and when His hand is stretched forth, there is no power in heaven, in earth or the regions of hell that can stop Him.

The Bible is filled with examples of how prayer alone brought victory. There is Hannah in the temple, Elijah on Mt. Carmel, Solomon in his desire for wisdom and Hezekiah on his death bed. But a most outstanding example is found in the twelfth chapter of Acts: the case of Peter in prison. In this amazing incident we find three outstanding principles, each of which can be applied to any need, anywhere, to-day.

First, we see a DESPERATE DISTRESS. Peter was in the clutches of Herod, a cruel brutal king who had just killed James with the sword. Peter was guarded by four quarternions of soldiers and was sleeping between two of them. He was bound with two chains, the keepers were at the door and it was the night before his execution! Could any situation have been more desperate?

Perhaps you are in great distress today. But is it any more desperate than the distress of Peter? You say, "But I'm beyond the reach of human help." So was Peter. In the natural there wasn't a thing the church could do for him and he was powerless to help himself. Does the doctor say, "Incurable?" Does your empty pocketbook moan, "No use?" Do the circumstances of your case shout aloud, "Impossible?" Then surely you are in desperate distress. But wait, don't give up. This is the place where God can meet you. Man's extremity is still His opportunity.

And so we come to the second part of our story. "Peter therefore was kept in prison"—that is Act 1. That shows DESPERATE DISTRESS. Now comes Act 2, SHOWING DETERMINED DEPENDENCE—"But prayer was made without ceasing of the church unto God for him." Notice it doesn't say, "but weeping was made" or "but a compromise was reached in doctrine" or "but a sum of money was offered for his release." No! It says... "but prayer." Get this—"BUT PRAYER!" The saints did one thing and one thing only, but they did the one thing that counted. They went to their knees. They bypassed every human agency and went straight to the Supreme Court of the Universe and before Him who hath "all power in heaven and in earth" they pleaded their case.

And they held on! "Without ceasing," it says. Prayer is only powerful when you prevail in it, when you persist and persevere. When you know you pray in His will, then refuse to take "No" for an answer. Thus it was with Elijah in his prayer for rain. Six times the answer came back, "There is nothing." But he held on and "there was a great rain." Thus it was with Hannah in her request for a son. I Sam. 1:12 says, "she continued praying" and in verse 15 we hear her say to Eli, "I have poured out my soul unto God." She DEPENDED ON GOD and Him only and she was DETERMINED in it. And so we see this little flock of saints gathered at the home of Mary, John's mother. An hour passes slowly by and they are still praying, another hour and another and they are still holding on. The sun disappears beneath the horizon — still they pray. The shades of evening darken — still they pray. The hour of midnight approaches—still they pray! Something had to happen, and it did.

ACT 3 — DIVINE DELIVER-ANCE. "And behold, the angel of the Lord came upon him (Peter) and a light shined in the prison; and he smote Peter on the side, and raised him up saying, Arise up quickly. And his chains fell off from his hands." Oh Glory! The wonder of it all! God never late. He knew the need, He saw the little band of praying people, He knew that the hour of execution was drawing dangerously near. Then in the very dead of night, in the innermost prison cell—suddenly a light! When God comes, light comes. Friend, though the tunnel of trial seems long and dark, though you be wandering in a dense, seemingly impenetrable fog of tradition and unbelief, though your sins seem as black as hell itself, God is still the God of LIGHT.

"And his chains fell off from his hands." A message in itself. When deliverance is Divine, it is complete. Brother, sister, when God saves you He breaks the chains of evil habit. "He that the Son hath set free is free indeed." Are you a slave to a cigarette? Ask God to deliver you and determine now never to smoke again, and deliverance is yours. The same with every chain of sin—they can and must fall off.

Back to the story. With his garments girded around him and his sandals on his feet, Peter follows the angel. Past the first ward they go, then the second, and finally to the great iron gate that leads into the city. Surely here is defeat—but No, it opens to them of its own accord!

Is it hard to believe? It was for Peter too. He thought he saw a vision. Just a few minutes ago he is chained to two Roman soldiers, surrounded by guards, trapped in the innermost prison ward—

but now he is free! Suddenly he comes to himself and right there in that deserted city street we hear him exclaim: "Now I know of a surety, that the Lord hath sent his angel and hath delivered me out of the hand of Herod, and from all the expectation of the people of the Jews." But why had it happened. What yower was working? Peter knew but one answer—somebody, somewhere had been holding on to God for him. And so it was, for "when he had considered the thing, he came to the house of Mary... where many were gathered together PRAYING!"

So friend in every DESPERATE DISTRESS, your DETERMINED DE-PENDENCE on God, will always bring DIVINE DELIVERANCE. For there is no power like the power of prevailing prayer.

Our beloved Brother Eldredge Lewis, pastor at Corpus Christi, Texas, has departed this life to be with Jesus. His life will ever be an inspiration to the yasta of our great movement. Brother Lewis was last President of the P. Y. P. A., the youth organization of the former Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ, and as a member of the National Youth Committee of the United Pentecostal Church contributed greatly to the establishment of the Pentecostal Conquerors. Though only 25 years of age, the outstanding spiritual qualities he manifested, the wisdom, humility, and great love for God's work marked him as a young man of rare and beautiful character. The Pentecostal Conquerors charter stands as a monument to him whose life and ministry was always for others. We who worked with him on this Committee will always remember him and the loving, gracious spirit he possessed. His last work for the Pentecostal Conquerors was to represent them at the Annual Conference at Torreon, Mexico, of the "Iglesia Apostolica de la Fe en Cristo Jesus," the Mexican Jesus Name organization. And now, though saddened, we look forward with joyful anticipation to the glad reunion in the resurrection morning! We shall meet thee then, dear Brother!

another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

It is possible to make a distinction between the offense of grieving the Spirit and that of quenching the Spirit.
But the difference is not great, and our present purpose is practical; hence this treatment of the matter.
"The fruit of the Spirit is love." Love in the spirit is love."

is at once the inclusive and the indispensable grace. Other Christian virtues are phases and expressions of love. To allow things that are alien to love to have any place in our hearts is to wound and hinder the Spirit of God. Such

things as:

Bitterness! You, or someone close to you, receives some slight that is either real or imaginary. Instead of committing the matter to God, you brood on it. Soon you open a crack in the door of your mind through which sour-visage censoriousness stealthily passes. He begins to play a steady stream of icy water on the fire of your love. There is

trouble ahead.

Clamor! There is strife—in the home,

in the board meeting, in the church.

And evil speaking! How cruel and unfair and hurtful the tongue that has been loosed from the sweet restraints of Christian love!

Look now. Love's fire, once a thing of kindling beauty, is a smouldering by-gone or an ashy deadness. Kindness gone! Tender-heartedness gone! Forgiveness gone! Christlikeness gone! Incidentally, is there anything more devilish than a loveless profession of "per-fect love?"

Don't Put Out the Spirit's Hunger Flame!

Finally we turn to Hebrews 3:7, where we read, "The Holy Ghost saith, Today If ye will hear his voice, harden not your hearts, as in the provocation, in the day of temptation in the wilder-

Harden not your hearts! That tenderness of conscience you have felt to-wards the truth of Christ was created by the Holy Spirit. Be thankful for it and act upon it, lest it turn stony within you. Those anxieties about the salvation of your soul were generated by the Holy Spirit. Recognize them as angels of grace and give expression to them in threshhold of light. Those urgings of the striving Spirit are not coercive; such is not God's way with His morally choosing creatures. You can stifle them all. By your persistent indifference you can kill them dog-dead within your breast. Consider now the peril of it, the shame of it, the ultimate and eternal cost of it.

But this passage before us in the Epistle to the Hebrews is particularly and properly a warning to the saved rather than unsaved. It is a plea addressed to believers who have begun with Christ in the forgiveness of sins but are hesitant about going on with but are hesitant about going on with Christ to the experience of sanctification and to all the higher ranges of holy living. By faith they should "enter in" to the rest that remaineth for the people of God; they should "go unto perfection;" they should partake of the "full assurance of faith;" they should "lay aside every weight and the sin which aside every weight and the sin which

doth so easily beset" them; they should "follow peace with all men and holiness without which no man seeth the Lord."

And what are they doing? Like their forefathers who stood hesitant and finally disobedient on the border-line of the land of Canaan, they are failing to advance with their light and enter into their inheritance in the Canaan of full salvation.

To hunger for heart purity and heart fulness without light as to the way of satisfaction, is pathetic; to have such hungers and aspiration with light but without obedience, is tragic. Such hungers, unappeased, will before long lose their strength. Heart-hardening will be the deadly process by which the once enlightened soul goes out into a hapless, hopeless eternity.

The alternative is obedience, abandonment to God, faith in the power of Christ, through the Holy Spirit, to make

us what we ought to be.


