Unfortunately, the matter of small yearly dues for the Charter was overlooked. making it possible for anyone to take up the Charter by paying the past dues. This has been done and the impression given that those who now hold the Charter represent the former Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ brethren. Stress has been laid upon alleged doctring differences and the brethren of the Colored race have been made to feel that they are to enjoy special privileges under the new setup. I am sorry indeed that such misrepresentation has been set forth.

Brethren, it will be well for you to pray and get the real facts before you allow yourselves to be led into an association which will be harmful. The coming of the Lord is very near and we should watch and be ready.

GOD WILL TAKE YOU THROUGH

This is an account of God's faithfulness to Paul and how He fulfilled His promise to him. The Apostle had a great desire to preach the Gospel in Rome but first felt constrained to journey to Jerusalem to minister to the saints in that city. While there he was seized upon by an angry mob of Jews and in the course of time was cast into prison. After a night or two in that place the

Lord stood by him and said,
"Be of good cheer, Paul: for as thou hast testified of me in Jerusalem, so must thou bear witness also at Rome."

It must have been a wonderful con-solation to Paul that the Lord "stood by him" in trouble. Jesus will stand by the weakest of His children when they call upon Him. Please note that the Lord made a definite promise to Paul that he must bear witness at Rome. Paul's life was to be preserved until that promise was fulfilled and that he was to be privileged to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ in the then world's capital. It was as though the Lord, in that dimly lighted jail, wrote out a "ticket to Rome" and handed it to Paul saying . . . "Here Paul is your ticket, I'll see to it that you get there."

We find that early the next morning "when it was day" that the Devil began his attempt to defeat God's purpose in the life of Paul. Forty men banded themselves together and planned a devilish plot to kill Paul (Acts 23:12). However, the Lord took care of him and he was cont to Coccare for a fetty. This was sent to Caesarea for safety. This was the beginning of his trip to Rome. True, it was only a few miles on his way, but nevertheless he was on his journey. Like a transcontinental train ticket with many sections, it was as if the "conductor" tore off the bottom section of his "ticket" as he went to Caesагеа

When Paul reached that town, he had a layover of at least two or three years. Christian friend, if God has given you a promise to fulfill something in your life . . . should you have to "lay over" for periods of time at some way stations in life, remember, these are not the end of God's promise, they are just

part of the plan.

Paul finally arrived in Caesarea, a prisoner, and was kept there for many months in prison. No doubt as Paul meditated many times upon the faith-fulness of God, he remembered that the Lord had stood by him in Jerusalem and considered the promise made to him about Rome and it encouraged and strengthened him during the long im-

prisonment. Finally in the providence of God, Paul found himself on a boat, with the beloved Luke, on his way again, but still a prisoner. In his "pocket" he still had his "ficket" to Rome (Acts 23:11). Another section was used as they were journeying over the waves of the Medi-terranean Sea. On the way a terrible tempest arose and for many days neither the sun nor the moon were seen. The situation became so desperate that the crew threw the freight and tackling overboard. At this crucial time the angel of the Lord said to Paul, "Fear not, thou must be brought before Caesar; and lo, God hath given thee all them that sail with thee." How marvelous and real are the promises of the Lord. Paul broke the good news to his shipmates and added, God, that it shall be even as it was told me." Paul's "ticket" still read "TO ROME." God was not going to fulfill just part of the promise but all that the Lord said to him was to be accomplished. Brother, sister, wayfarers on life's pilgrimage, don't let the enemy of your soul fool you into believing that God has forgotten His promise to you he said, "And lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the world" (Age) Matthew 28:20.

The ship that was carrying Paul to

Rome was finally wrecked but he and all that were in the ship were cast safely upon a lonely island. The storm still raged, as if it were disappointed at losing its intended victims, and as it was winter they made a fire from driftwood to warm themselves by. Paul was one of those that gathered sticks for the fire and as he cast his on the fire a poisonous viper came out from the heat and fastened itself upon his hand. Again the devil was trying to keep Paul from preaching the gospel in Rome by attemping to kill him by the bite of the viper. Perhaps as Paul shook the creative into the control of the viper. ture into the fire he might have been reminded of the promise that God gave him in the prison in Jerusalem about three years previously: "Thou must bear witness at Rome." Again God proved Himself greater than the cunning of Satan for the bite of the viper did Paul no harm. God protects and watches over His own even in the midst of some of life's darkest trials. The Apostle had another layover on the island but finally boarded another ship, another section was taken from his "ticket." The stub was continually getting shorter and shorter but the Apostle clung to it (the promise of God) tenaciously, and finally he was brought to Rome—the end of the line. For some time before he was put to death Paul was privileged to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ and his converts were even numbered among the members of Caesar's own household.

THE APOSTOLIC NORMAL... New Birth

During the past years of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, accompanied with the speaking with tongues and other signs, God has been putting a desire in us to earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the saints. Truly we are getting hold of truth in this going on with God. We naturally hold on to all the old teaching that we just did not have to give up at the time we sought the baptism. God finally broke the news to us as to the absolute absence in the Word of God of there being a second instantaneous work of grace. This truth nearly upset the the Pentecostal movement but believers of that phase of teaching are comparatively few. Now God is taking us a big step farther and showing us that there is an absolute absence of even two experiences taught or recorded in the Acts of the Apostles, gospels, or epistles, viz., the new birth and then the baptism afterwards. Neither can we find one reference to two acts of faith ever taught or recorded where any one was ever born of the Spirit under one act of faith and next filled with the Spirit under a second act of faith; 'tis not in the New Testament.

All of these years the question has been raised by many, "When were the disciples sanctified?" The answers were many; one was in John 15:3, but we see Jesus declared them clean in that sense in John 13:10. Next it was said that as Jesus' prayers were always immediately answered, they were sanctified in John 17:17, but we find that they could not really be sanctified until Jesus had shed His blood (Heb. 13:12). Then next and last they said it was done after His resurrection in John 20:22. We soon saw that the statement, Receive ye the Holy Ghost, did not prove that they did receive Him then and there, as Tesus had not departed (John 16:7) and gone to the Father to be exalted to His own right hand, having shed forth this which you do both see and hear (Acts 2:33). But we did quickly see that this was simply an equivalent command to Luke 24:49, to go to Jerusalem and tarry so as to receive the Holy Ghost when He came, which they did. And the fact that He breathed on them proves nothing in the way of the new birth. To me, this simply indicates that He gave them a tiding over blessing to encourage them during these trying days of their orphanhood (John 14:18 Mg.).

After we had this settled, God began dealing with us along the line of trying to place the new birth under any of these same texts. He began to show us

that there was no such thing in the New Testament, or in the Old either, as the new birth and after this the baptism. My! how some of us fussed again when our nest was again stirred up, but God was not letting us settle down. He is rapidly taking us on to the Apostolic faith and the practice of the apostles. You will now say, "Brother M., when were the disciples sanctified? and when were they born of the Spirit?" etc., etc. I answer, "This all took place in the upper room on the day of Pentecost." Up to the cross of Calvary they were under the blood of bulls and goats. They arrested Jesus while He with His disciples were up to Jerusalem keeping the feast of passover. (See Matt. 26.) We erred not knowing that these people lived under three different periods of time, viz., the Law, the period between Law and Grace called by Bible students, "The



overlap of the ages which meet." (See 1 Cor. 10:11 R. V.) And at last they lived under the Age of Grace. There is any amount of scripture to prove that the good people under the old covenant, like Anna, Simeon, Zacharias and Jesus' own disciples, were said to be not of this world, and their names were written in heaven, etc., yet they were not born of the Spirit, or perfected. These were shut up to the faith that was afterward to be revealed (Gal. 3:23-26). They were God's devout SERVANTS (Gal. 4:1-7). But the time came when the SEED of Abraham came to whom the promises were made (Gal. 3:19). This SEED was Christ (Gal 3:16). It was bruised (Isa. 53:5), crucified and buried (John 12:23-24): But He came to life to be alive forevermore (Rev. 1:18). He then went to the Father and on the day of Pentecost He came back, the incorruptible SEED of 1 Peter 1:23. (See Weymouth). This incorruptible SEED brings the new birth.

On the day of Pentecost the Lord suddenly came to His temple (Mal. 3:1). He also said, I will not leave you comfortless (Mg. orphans): I will come to you. Then you shall live also, and at that day you shall know that I am IN you. He, speaking of Himself, though many

PENTECOSTAL PROGRESS IN CENTRAL EUROPE

(An informative and challenging article, God may want YOU to do something!)

No Christian man or woman can come face to face with the crucified Saviour without a conviction that he or she is a debtor to all unsaved people wherever they may be. The trouble with many is that they limit their vision and burden for souls to their own immediate community and, like Moses, "look this way and that way" but there is no need of this when a man is acting with and for God.

Jesus said "Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." John 4:35. In His own words—THE FIELD IS THE

WORLD. Central Europe is a most fertile field -white and ready to be harvested but, sad to say, the laborers are very few. Enormous material damage has been sustained, cities and towns devastated, with heaps of ruins everywhere. The persecution and severe suffering which was the lot of millions during the late war—their privations, shattered homes, broken families, broken bodies, broken hearts and broken spirits, is something not to be taken lightly. Is it any wonder that the American people were moved with compassion and have rushed material and medical help to save people from cold and starvation. UNRRA has been doing the "lion's share." Charitable and social organizations have been doing their level best to eliminate as much as possible of the physical and moral consequences of war. The doctors and nurses are doing their utmost to help heal wounded bodies. Others are employed in the denazification of youth.

It seems to me that while this much needed help is being administered, the most important part is being neglected ... the saving of the souls of men and women. Material damage and physical suffering cannot be compared to the spiritual peril of the soul. People are groping in darkness and disillusionment in a world full of chaos where unrest prevails and the hearts of men are torn with fear and uncertainty over the fu-ture. Who will take the Gospel over 'and and sea? Who will answer the call gladly: "Here am I—send me."

We shall mention a few countries of Europe and especially Czechoslovakia, where my chief missionary efforts have been for years, but of necessity I will mention other countries also.

Let us begin with CZECHOSLO-

VAKIA, located in the heart of Europe. It is a democratic country, its people are cultured and socially advanced and very religious (Slovakia is 80% Roman Catholic). Being the birthplace of the great reformer John Hus, and also the great Moravian revival which John Amos Comenius was instrumental in promoting and spreading in many countries, including England and this country of America. It is said that the first missionaries that contacted American Indians were the Moravians. The Pentecostal message, however, did not make much impression upon these who were traditionally religious.

The late Andrew Huba, father of the writer, sailed for Europe in 1927 to take the Apostolic message to his own peo-ple. He was largely instrumental in pioneering the work there independently. God was pleased to bless his humble ministry, confirming the Word with signs following. He encountered much opposition from the Roman Catholic bishops, priests and also the laity. In 1930 I was led of the Lord to go there and help in the work. At that time I was very much inexperienced in missionary work and soon found that I had to change my methods of approach to the people and also in preaching. One must be definitely led of the Spirit of God in all things and depend fully on the Lord. In 1931 my brother, John, came to the country and soon engaged in active work for the Lord, preaching and singing this glorious gospel in missions and denominational churches. Ever since he went to Czechslovakia, he has been working hard, testifying, and yet the results have been very little sickness, tests, trials and hardships have been his portion.

Within this time the republic was going through great crises, three times the government changed which affected the work when it was in its infancy; then Hitler came with his hordes and invaded the country . . . but through it all the work of the Lord has progressed for "if God be for us who can be against us."

Brother John Huba reports victory and is beginning to see that the much needed and prayed-for revival is coming and as he puts it "slow but sure." He hardly can respond to all the calls he receives from different parts of that country and reports that in the past year he has accomplished more for the Lord than in the entire 14 years pre-

viously. He has traveled extensively and has made contacts with many Pentecostal people, groups, families and individuals with whom he had no previous contact. Often times he was greeted with "It is well that you have come; we are now ready to hear whatever God has for us." In one place a brother said to him: "You were sent to us by God." The work is now growing to such propor-tions that he is not able to cope with it. There is a real need for one full time worker, besides Brother John, and at least three partly supported workers. Other denominations are sending workers and money and in some cases have succeeded in winning for their cause promising Pentecostal workers.

Some might ask: "Why send mission-aries to nominally Christian countries?"

The answer is obvious. First, while the people are self-satisfied, yet there is a great need of a spiritual awakening. Second, the urgent and unfinished task of the 20th century is "the calling out of a people for His name." I firmly believe that God has raised this wonderful Oneness movement for this very purpose, therefore necessity and responsibility calls upon us to be more and more missionary minded.

The following poem by Oswald J. Smith expresses the sentiment of my heart and a spiritual application of our

text to postwar Europe.

Hark! The Master Calleth

Hark! The Master calleth: "Who will go for me?"

Some from every nation must the Saviour know; "Other sheep" are waiting for the Gos-

pel call,

Every tongue must praise Him . . . Jesus died for all. Harvest fields are bending, soon 'twill

HOW TO TAKE CRITICISM

If you live in the midst of human beings you are sure to be criticized. And if you are human you won't like it. No matter how much you may say you welcome criticism, what you generally mean is that you would welcome any other sort of criticism than the kind you get.

However, it does come. Gently or roughly, kindly or cruelly, the critics will have their shot at you. Somebody is sure to think you less than perfect and will not mind saying so.

How shall you take it?

Take It Without Hysteria Don't get excited about it. If you are in public life-being criticized is part of your job. The criticism may be true or false, justified or not; but you can't tell which until you stop breathing so

hard and perhaps glaring through your spectacles. Get yourself together and calmly and sincerely learn the lesson of being able to "take it."

Take It Without Hatred

Don't immediately jump to the con-clusion that everybody who criticizes you, hates you. The person who loves you most dearly and has the highest hopes for you may be your severest critic. (And why not?) Indeed, the Bible teaches us that the One whose love for us is greatest, is also the One who never spares the lash. And even when criticism is inspired by hatred, jealousy, or pure meanness, as it often is, it will do you no good to hate back. Even when it is inspired by your worst enemies, if all it does is to make a hot hater of you, then your enemy has had his way with you-he has made you worse instead of

Take It Without Humiliation Don't feel crushed by unfavoring words. All good people, all great ones, have been criticized. You are no outcast. If you were, no one would bother to point out your faults. To have failed once does not mean you are a failure. You can hold up your head again. Take

it without humiliation.

Take Criticism With Humility

To resent it means that you like to think of yourself as perfect. And as long as you think you are perfect and unimprovable, you will never be better than you are. God (as we know) is man's severest critic; but also his best friend. Even God appears to have no hope in the person who is too proud to admit that he makes any mistakes. You will never learn anything if you won't be taught. You will never climb any ladder if you mistake the bottom rung for the

Take Criticism With Honesty

That is, look squarely at it. Don't look the other way and try to think of something else. Look at it, analyze it. Consider the sources, for one thing. Maybe the critic really didn't know what he was talking about. Maybe he has it in for you and would call you names no matter what you do. Maybe what he says is completely "off the beam." Very well, then you can cheerfully and hon-estly forget all about it. Many times the motive may be love for you, or the critic may be in love with perfection. Be thankful for this. The poorest friend in the world is an easy-going critic.

Take It With Humor

But even when the critics are neither mean or unjust, keep your sense of humor. It will not only cushion the shock of vicious detractions, it will help you see the rightness of a fair verdict against you. For humor, essentially, is a sense of detachment, it is the ability to get off and look at yourself. And if you have a true gift of humor no one else can ever seem quite so funny and absurd as you do to yourself.

You may even learn, in time, to be that wisest of all persons, a critic of

WHEN THE FIRE FELL

The year 1906 was a time of wonderful revivals in the Pentecostal movement, particularly in Texas and Louis-iana. In April of that same year the marvelous outpouring of the Holy Spirit began in the old Azuza Street Mission, Los Angeles, and spread from throughout the whole earth. In Texas many ministers were conducting revivals in various cities and the fire of God spread through the south as well as through Missouri and Kansas and thence on into other states!

We labored in the state of Texas and it was the custom in those early days for a minister to head or lead a company of workers, sometimes five, six or seven young people, properly chaperoned, into new fields to hold meetings and revivals surely came when we earnestly prayed and preached the message

of Pentecost.

Many churches were established throughout the country. Brother W. F. Carrothers, who was a former lawyer and Methodist preacher, accepted the message of Pentecost. He was the pastor of a church in Houston and he, together with his congregation, accepted the latter day message, His church became headquarters for the work in Texas. Brother and Sister Layne were members of his congregation, Brother Layne being an inventor and manufacturer of oil well machinery, etc. He do-nated land near his home and helped finance the building of a large tabernacle at Brunner, a suburb of Houston, where the first Pentecostal camp meeting was held in the summer of 1906. (We have a picture of this camp.

This camp was in charge of Brothes C. F. Parham, It was in his bible school at Topeka, Kansas, that the Pentecostal baptism first fell. At about the time of this camp meeting Brother Carrothers was chosen Field Director of the United States and I was chosen Texas Field Director of the Apostolic Faith Movement, as it was then called. Brother Parham was, of course, considered the founder of the movement. This was the first form of any organization in the latter rain movement and it worked very successfully for several years. As the work spread, many problems arose that had to be dealt with by those authority. Some of the ministers, be-cause of persecution and opposition, failed the grace of God and gave up, but thank God many more moved on in the things of the Lord.

It was a real battle against great odds as most of the larger denominations were very much opposed to the truths that were preached, such as divine healing, the baptism of the Holy Spirit with speaking in other tongues as the evidence, and even some of our ministers took the position that all did not need to speak in tongues when they received the baptism of the Holy Ghost. In the early winter of 1907, Brother W. F. Carrothers and myself arranged for a bible training school at Waco, Texas, and all of the workers in Texas gathered at this meeting for prayer, study of the word and spiritual recuperation. The ques-tion of "Do All Speak in Tongues" came up in this school for discussion,

and was settled as far as we were concerned.

I was especially moved to see in this last paper the picture from India of Mother McCarty's work where we had the great privilege of laboring about six years. May God bless those dear children and young people who were baptized. Surely our hearts burn to do God's will and it is our hope to eventually return to the field God has called us to.

Before I go any further I will thank all most heartily who have sent packages of clothing and also offerings. It is a great encouragement and help and we pray earnestly that God will reward you and bless you abundantly (Hebrews 6:10).

I have a surprise for you this time or should I call it a prayer request. My aunt is home from America and has told us about certain treatments taken for tuberculosis. Since Brother Tefre has to take these treatments we thought it would be a long time before we could come to America. However, inasmuch as he can take these same treatments in America and perhaps work at the same time we thought it might be possible for us to come to America next fall when my aunt returns there. She is a widow and also a Christian and I think she would be willing to take care of the children while I travel. News From North China

Greetings in the name of Jesus our Lord. Your welcome letter at hand and I thank you very sincerely and may the "blessing of the Lord that maketh rich and addeth no sorrow therewith" be your portion.

Just a short time ago I received a letter from Sister Stieglitz and one from Sister Hendricks saying that they had their passports and visas and (d. v.) would be coming soon so I shall be staying on here. At the present time things on the line from here to my station look somewhat more hopeful but on road to Sister Stieglitz' station there are some terrible battles going on.

In another place there is a large vil-lage with a Catholic church, school and hospital, etc. The Reds (Chinese) beat and kicked one of the priests to death some "sisters" (nuns) who were present, clasped their hands together in an attitude of prayer which made the Reds angry and they tied their hands together and hung them (the sisters) on the limbs of trees in the compound—then made all who belonged stay inside—all others to leave and the Reds took over the place and to date no one knows how things are inside. A Swedish missionary - a very spiritual woman and who is a dear friend of mine was taken prisoner, with others, by the Reds and has just been released. She is getting better and I will get her testimony and send it in a general letter so people will know something of conditions but if ever China needed Christ Jesus our Lord, it needs Him now. Many of the common people are getting their eyes open to what Communism really is-they thought they were to have all things common-have lands, homes, good food, etc., like what only the rich formerly had, but they are finding out that they get nothing and lose what little they formerly had-their homes ravished, sons and older men taken to war, girls and young women to help and cheer the soldiers, etc., etc., and the poor deceived people have no way to help themselves.

The Communists have no use for missionaries, the gospel or foreigners, especially Americans, because of the presence of Marines but if there were no Marines it would be someone else. The days are passing—the world is getting worse and worse, the signs of His coming come thick and fast. May God help us to be as wise virgins having oil in our vessels—ready and waiting.

There is a great movement toward God among the youth at present. Some of it seems real and I pray God may deepen and establish them in Him but also I am afraid if Jesus were here He would say to many leaders now what He said to Peter . . . "Thou savorest not the things that be of God, but those that be of men." God help us to humble ourselves in prayer before Him, waiting on Him for the message for the hour—the anointing of the Spirit and trusting in Him for the harvest—it will be sure. I covet your prayers at this time.

their fathers, and their fathers, clear back before the days of Luther were taught about the "Blessed Trinity." How come? The Church of Rome held that tenet to the very forefront. If you would know its dogma look up "Trinity (Blessed)" in the "Catholic Encyclopedia." But I notice it does not go back far enough, even though one division of its proof is headed, "Proof from Tradition."

To find where the Trinitarian idea originated we must go back into history, since the Word is silent on the subject.

Alexander, called the Great, who at the age of twenty succeeded his father Philip as king of Macedon, was a remarkable young man. A successful military leader, he soon controlled all of Greece. Then, working eastward, he subdued Asia Minor, Egypt, Mesopotamia, and on to the borders of India. His Empire is described by Daniel as the "Belly and thighs of brass" of Nebuchadnezzar's image-an empire which included most of the known world. The career of Alexander began three hun-dred and thirty-five years before the birth of Christ. The Greek influence, which Jesus summed up in the sentence, The Greeks seek after wisdom," lasted long after Alexander's death in 323 B.C. Even after the Romans had acquired most of the Greek Empire, one writer says; "Greek, for some centuries before and after Christ, was the language of educated men from the Adriatic Sea to the Persian Gulf."


One of the most prosperous fragments of Alexander's short-lived Empire was Egypt. Here, in a city named for the Emperor, there sprang up at Alexandria an influential centre of education. The language was Greek. For this reason the Jews of Egypt were forced to translate their scripture into Greek because so few knew Hebrew.

Printing was unknown and postal systems likewise; therefore students came from all nations to study at the library and the museum which was erected in glory of the Muses. Hence this became a centre for the development and exchange of ideas. Ideas on all subjects were studied, including religious ideas.

Here met men of every race, comparing their many gods and religious systems. They found that the gods, by whatever name they were called, were very much alike. They even saw the possibility that there might be only one God who was known by many names. A strong resemblance was seen between the Roman God Jupiter, the Greek god Zeus, and the Egyptian god Ammon or Baal of the Babylonians. Osiris, a diety of the common people, became merged with Ammon and were later considered the same as Apis, which at Memphis was worshipped as the sacred bull. Under the name Serapis he became the supreme god of Alexandria.

The goddess Hathor or Isis, which had been represented as a cow, was now raised to human form; and was shown holding the child-god Horus.

This process of joining god to god is called "theocrasia" and was very prominent at Alexandria. Only two peoples resisted this tendency: the Jews who had their faith in Jehovah, and the Persians, who were sun worshippers.



This is the month of February when the birthdays of two great heroes of American history are commemorated-George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, Each was called upon to perform an almost impossible task. Both, however, were men who believed in God and His Bible. Our country is great today because men like Lincoln and Washington believed in righteousness and depended upon God for help and quidance through the dark periods of American history. They are and ever shall be "heroes" to the people of America. May God help us to get back to the principle of "Righteousness exalts a nation but sin is a reproach to any people."

It was Ptolemy I, King of Egypt, who set up the "Serapeum," a temple devoted to the worship of a trinity of God. This trinity was composed of the god Serapis, the goddess, Isis, and the child-god Horus. Almost every other god was considered the same as some one of these three aspects of the triune god.

"They were each other, they were three, but they were also one," or so their doctrine stated. Does this not sound familiar? Yet it is a direct quotation from a well-known work of History ("The Outline of History," H. G. Wells) describing events centuries before Christ.

We are told that images of Isis and the child Horus were crowned as Queen of Heaven and candles were burned before her. Priests of this cult served long in preparation and took vows of celibacy.

In this worship of Serapis, widely accepted throughout the world in the second and third centuries before Christ, we see a marked resemblance to the forms that dominated Europe for centuries after Christ under the Church of

Rome. Again I quote:

"The living spirit of Christianity was a new thing in the history of the mind and will of man; but the symbol and formula that Christianity has worn, and still wears in many countries to this day, were certainly woven in the cult and temples of Jupiter, Serapis and Isis, that spread from Alexandria throughout the civilized world in the age of Theocrasia in the second and first centuries before Christ."

Here was the origin of the Trinitarian idea.

Later on the Christian early church, spreading into the countries surrounding Palestine, came into contact with this belief wherever it went. New converts all brought in their traces of it until by the beginning of the Fourth Century A.D. the early church was seething with division on the subject of the Godhead.

The historian previously quoted, in speaking of the life and work of Jesus, says—"We shall see how later on all Christendom was torn by disputes about the Trinity. There is no evidence that the apostles of Jesus ever heard of a trinity—at any rate from Him." Yet in spite of all the friction, the early church had enough of the Spirit that Rome could not subdue it by beast or ax or flame. So much so that the Emperor Constantine, whose empire was starting to crumble, recognized the Power that held the Christians together and tried to introduce some of this adhesiveness into

his policies. So he courted the Christians and invited all factions to a council at Nicaea. Here it was revealed that the Alexandrian germ had so infiltrated the church at this date (325 A.D.) that the Nicene creed—a strictly trinitarian document—was formulated, passed by the Council and approved by the Emperor who, although not a baptized Christian, had presided at the Council.

Under Constantine's wing the church at Rome gained influence until later the Bishops of Rome became Popes and for nearly, a thousand years religious life over much of the Continent was controlled by this organization. People believed what it taught—or else! Is it surprising that in the short time since the return of the Latter Rain the old spots and wrinkles have not all disappeared?

The traditions accumulated during more than a thousand years die hard.

LATTER DAY TRUTHS

By W. T. Witherspoon, Columbus, Ohio

From time to time God has been pleased to reveal His truth to those who are seeking for His best. Beginning with Luther He has been taking us backward (not forward) to Apostolic doctrine, standard and practice. This has had to be done by degrees as set forth in the 28th chapter of Isaiah. Each step or each "line upon line" has been fought by those who walked in former light—in other words, God's truth has been continually rejected on the basis of former truth, and God has had to call out a new company to take into new pastures.

new company to take into new pastures.

In the final analysis, the revelation of any truth purposes to make us more like Jesus, and when we fail in this, we have nothing but the "letter that killeth," regardless of how much we know. "Grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." Grace without truth gives us no scriptural foundation for our experiences and leads us into error. Truth without grace gives us the mere shell of doctrine, leaving us as sounding brass and tinkling cymbal

as sounding brass and tinkling cymbal. Some seem to see in the 3rd chapter of John two evidences of salvation, or we might say, an alternative. This cannot be. There is just one Lord, one faith, and one baptism. Some believe that where Jesus said, "The wind bloweth where it listeth; thou canst not tell from whence it cometh or whither it goeth; so is everyone that is born of the spirit" that this is speaking of that invisible move of the spirit which makes a person a child of God and answers to what the churches teach as salvation, justification, etc. This they call the conversion of the New Birth, when you accept Christ and become a Christian.

The passage referred to has nothing to do with the New Birth, but simply explains the spiritual life of the one that has been born of the water and the spirit. This is later corroborated by Paul who said "they that are led by the spirit of God are the sons of God." The same thing is brought out by Mark who says, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved . . . and these signs shall follow them that believe." The following signs were not the evidences of salvation or the witness of the New Birth but the spiritual manifestations that would be in the life of the believer.

We dare not catalog our experiences except by the Bible. This is so strongly objected to by those who plead their past experiences rather than by the Word. We have a perfect example in the Bible of each condition that we find today. They that believe not the Gospel are lost. They that are not taught concerning the Bible New Birth but have thoroughly repented and lived what they know of the Christian life will be on His right hand at the white throne judgment not in the rapture, nor in Heaven, but will be delegated to the kingdom "prepared from the foundation of the world." Those who have been baptized in Jesus' name and have not received the Holy Ghost are in the womb of the church and must be brought forth. Those that have been baptized with the Holy Ghost and do not have the light on Jesus' name will be found in the household of Cornelius and must be commanded to be baptized in the Name of the Lord Jesus. Those that believe the message and have been baptized in Jesus' name but have never repented will find themselves in the company of Simon the sorcerer, having no part or lot in the matter, and they must thoroughly repent. The multitudes that have been baptized in Jesus' Name and received the Holy Ghost speaking in other tongues will all find their places in the Epistles. Some are in strife, division, and sin, even as the Corinthians. Some have gone to keeping special days and establishing their righteousness by the works of the law. These have fallen from grace and must repent. Some have received not the love of the truth, and they are in one or more of the various delusions that are sweeping the country. Some have let their lamps go out and will miss the Bridegroom. Multitudes are in lethargy, have lost their first love and are giving up looking for the coming of the Lord. Some have completely crucified their Lord and have put Him to an open shame and are facing nothing but eternal night. Some are sitting in our midst feasting without fear, spiritual scavengers, clouds without rain, sailing high like vultures seeking to destroy the flock of God.

Finally, thank God, there are many that have not defiled their garments. They have kept themselves pure and unspotted from the world. They love the Lord with all their hearts. They are crying in the depth of their souls "Even so come quickly Lord."

Be sure that you get the right start—repentance, baptism in His name, and the Holy Ghost speaking with other tongues. But be sure that you hold the truth in love and endure to the end.

Another Soldier Has

Brother Cleve Kerley departed this life at Mt. Vernon, Illinois, November 27, 1946, at the age of 54 years. He was well known in Oneness Pentecostal circles having been in the ministry for some 36 or 37 years. He began his ministry when a very young man and has made a host of friends all over the country. yea eternal life; all synonymous terms (John 6:47-58). Before one could eat His flesh and drink His blood He had to undergo a change, viz., physically die and then be raised and come back in Spirit form, in the Comforter. His blood came back in the power of the Spirit, and from the day of Pentecost they freely ate of His flesh and drank of His blood as an ever satisfying portion of the sons of God in these glorious days (John 6:35). The eating and drinking here, and the dwelling in Him and He in them are identical and it is said to take place at a specific time. (Compare John 6:55 with John 14:20). At that day, don't refer to any day in general, but to a specific time, viz., the days of the New Covenant which began at the day of Pentecost, and we are still in that day. I repeat it, The birth of the Spirit and the receiving of the Holy Spirit are identical. This one normal class of New Testament believers had signs following them. There was no other class; this was the common Christianity of Apostolic times. This was the common salvation of Jude 3, enjoyed by the people of God in those days, who had the common faith of Titus 1:4. The experience at the Cornelius household, in Caesarea, is said to be a like experience to that of the Jews (Acts 11:15): From this we get many good points; of this man it is said, He was devout, gave much alms, a just man, and one that feared God (Acts 10:22). Yet God shows he was not saved (Acts 11:14). Had this man died before the resurrection of Christ he would have gone to the underworld to await the blood of the everlasting covenant (Zech. 9:11-12).

Confusion is being brought in by some of our good brethren by way of extreme reasoning. They will tell you that unless you are filled as per Acts 2:4 and 38 that you have nothing and this discourages honest souls. Now then, under the old covenant God is spoken of as the God of their salvation (Isa. 17:10; Psa. 68:19; etc.), and not only that but the Word says that they had salvation. (See Psa. 13:5; 20:5), After David had sinned he prayed for God to restore the joy of His salvation (Psa. 51:12), and then speaks of those back there who love thy salvation (Psa. 70:4); while the new covenant brought a greater fullness and therefore, called the so great salvation (Heb. 2:3), and eternal salvation (Heb. 5:9). This greater fullness was brought about by the blood of Jesus and the fullness of the Spirit. Now, if they had a personal knowledge of God in what they had under the old how much the more we would have under the new, even though we have not broken clear

through to the fullness of the new. I know that I had a real experience back in those years before I came to Pentecost, and what followed was that much more of the real thing of God.

But my point is this, that when the new covenant came in, perfection came (Heb. 10:14). Previous to this they were not perfect in the new birth sense. (See Heb. 7:11-19; and 10:1-2.) They were under the old covenant till Calvary at least, and the new was not ushered in until Pentecost. Hence the cross of Calvary, the resurrection and the sending forth of the Comforter were the hope of the people. (See Heb. 9:8-14.) Well, Paul plainly says when the new covenant was opened and in operation, that, We have come to the spirits of just men made perfect (Heb. 12:23). Cornelius was one of this kind (Acts 10:22). Peter's message in Acts 2 was to the Jews, devout men, etc., (Acts 2:5), while Cornelius had heard the message given under the first commission (Acts 10:36-37), yet this did not make him a Christian. This message was a message of repentance, for the kingdom of God was at hand; this was sent to the lost sheep of the house of Israel only: It was very limited (Matt. 10:1-15). It is called, The preaching of PEACE (Acts 10:36); but the message under the second and great commission was to ALL NATIONS (Matt. 28:19); ALL THE WORLD (Mark 16:15). The message was different, viz., Repentance and remission of sins was to be preached IN HIS NAME, among all nations (Luke 24:47).

God finally framed up the whole commission, that is scattered out by the evangelists in Matt. 28:18; Mark 16:15, 16; and Luke 24:47, through Peter as he breathed out under inspiration all of this in a nut shell: "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38). It was while Peter was carrying out his Lord's commission, at Caesarea, that the Holy Ghost fell on the Gentiles. Some who fought for the second work as well as some who now contend for the new birth separate from the baptism in the Holy Ghost are trying to make two or three experiences here, but the fact of the matter is that they received the gift of the Holy Ghost. The theology of Peter's band was this, They acknowledged that the Gentiles had received repentance unto life (Acts 11:18), called by Paul elsewhere, Repentance unto salvation (2 Cor. 7:10). Through this we find the disciples truly believed on the Lord Jesus Christ (Acts 11:17; see A.R.V., also Weymouth).



Are You Drifting?

Then the day of Pentecost was the first time when they believed on the Lord Jesus Christ. Peter had acknowledged Him before that, as the Christ, the son of the living God (Matt. 16:16), i.e., he acknowledged Him as the Messiah (I understand the Greek word Christos corresponds to the Hebrew word Messiah, etc), this was simply a revelation to Peter that Jesus was the Christ. Again it is thought by some that because it is said, Many believed in his name when they saw his miracles (John 2:23-25), that they were then and there born again. They fail to see that it was simply the same as in Peter's case. They acknowledged that He was their long looked for Messiah; but we have no record anywhere that people were saved before Pentecost according to Mark 16:16-17, with signs following.

Jesus did not become the full Saviour until Pentecost, that is, the new covenant did not open until then. He took upon Himself human form and was called JESUS; later on at the age of thirty He was anointed with the Holy Ghost and with power at which time He was made Christ; and at the resurrection He was made Lord (Acts 2:32-36), victor over death, Hades and the grave. He is called Lord fifteen times in the last two chap ters of John, after He arose from the dead. Well, even if they did believe in His name, it says, Jesus did not commit himself to them for he knew what was in them, viz., He knew they lacked the Spirit birth, and would carnally want to crown Him king.

It is also argued that John 1:11-13 teaches the new birth while Jesus walked on earth, but it does not. Jesus does not say they were there born of God; it is John who is writing, some time between 90 and 110 A. D., over fifty years after Pentecost, or after they actually did receive Jesus Christ into their hearts, (Eph. 3:16-17), He coming in through the Spirit. This was the time when they believed on Him; two times mentioned in John 7:37-39. This kind of faith in Him made them New Testament believers with signs following (Mark 16:16-17).

"But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 13:14).

Do you boys and girls want a new suit or a new dressone that money can't buy; one that will fit anyone; one that will never wear out or get out of style? You say, "There isn't any suit or dress like that." Yes, there is, and I'm going

to tell you how every one of you can get one.

You know, Jesus is the central theme of the Bible, and it is interesting to notice how many different things He is compared to in the Word. If you want to have fun some Sunday afternoon, get out the Bible and see how many different things you can find to which Jesus is compared. You will find He is called "A Light," "The Shepherd," "The Rose of Sharon," "The Lily of the Valley," "The Pearl of Great Price," "A Lion," "A Lamb," "A Rock," "A Cornerstone," etc.—Our text, however, compares Jesus to a dress, a robe or a garment which we "put on." Put ye on the Lord Jesus

You will remember that when the prodigal son came home, the father said, "Bring forth the best robe, and put it on him." That robe covered all his dirty garments and the signs of his sin and poverty. That is what Paul meant when he said, "Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ." Here Jesus is compared to a garment which you can "put on" and thus be clothed in His righteousness. This is a wonderful suit, dress or garment that I am talking about. It's wonderful for many
