

So universal is the acceptance of the Bible as the record of the revelation of God to man that most people simply believe in its authenticity without any spe-cial personal inquiry. The Bible is the message of the divine to the human and it provides man with the knowledge of how to live here in this present world and how he can prepare himself for the world which is to come. It is a record of the past and of God's dealings with mankind and man's victories and fail-ures, it provides material for the satisfaction of heart and soul through life and gives him an insight into that which is to come.

The history of the preservation of the sacred writings of the Holy Bible, which were written during a period of two thousand years and have been further preserved through almost twenty centuries more constitutes a record of preservation of truth unparalleled in history.

The Bible itself explains how it came to be written, "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." (II Peter 1:21.) To receive God's messages, and to record them, was the task of the faithful at a time when the medium of language and the facilities for writing were most meager and difficult. Wars and persecutions and physical decay acand persecutions and physical decay account for the destruction of all the originals of these writings. Not one of them is preserved. What we have today are copies of copies many times recopied.

The Old Testament was originally written in Hebrew and the New Testament in Greek. The version of the Bible in use at the time of Christ was the Septuagint, or version of the seventy as it was called, as it had been prepared by 70 learned Jews of Alexandria and was a translation of the Hebrew Scriptures into Greek made at different times be-ginning about 280 B. C. There were also available at that time many manuscripts of the Hebrew Old Testament books written in that language.

After the beginning of the Christian Era, after Christ, the earliest translation of the Scriptures was that of St. Jerome who completed the Latin translation known as the Vulgate between 380 and 400 A. D. This Latin translation became the version upon which all other translations were founded previous to the time of the English revision of 1881-As recently as the middle of the 19th century discoveries were made of old manuscripts and versions and writings of the early Fathers, most of which were dated in the 4th century or earlier. This was brought into the English revision and to other revisions that have been made since that time. The Rheims and Douay Bible of the Roman Catholic Church is a direct translation from the Church is a direct translation from the Vulgate by Catholic scholars. Likewise, from the Vulgate, is the Authorized or King James Version of 1611, which is still most widely used as the Bible of the English-speaking peoples.

The confirmation of the Bible by these

ancient manuscripts newly discovered in the last century became one of the startling evidences of its historic genu-ineness. Three of them stand out with highest significance. All are in Greek and were written probably between 300 and 450 A. D. They are as follows:

1. Vatican. This is believed to be the oldest of the three and lies in the Vatican Library at Rome. It was not permitted to be copied or studied until the time of Pope Pius IX (1846-1878) when facsimilies were allowed. It consists of

700 leaves of the finest vellum about one foot square. It remains clear and legible after a lapse of nearly sixteen hundred years.

2. Sinaitic. The second oldest but most recently discovered is the Sinaitic manuscript. This was found at the foot of Mt. Sinai in 1844 and 15 years later was procured for the Russian emperor. It remained in St. Petersburg until it was sold in 1935 after the Russian revolution to the British Government and is now in the British Museum.

3. Alexandrian. The Alexandrian manuscript was presented to Charles I of England by the Patriarch of Constanti-nople in 1628. It is also in the British

Museum in London.

The manuscripts in the original languages and St. Jerome's Latin Vulgate constituted the only Scriptures available for the early Anglo-Saxon peoples with

only a few exceptions.

John Wycliffe in 1380-84, completed the first translation of the whole Bible in the English language current at that day. Wycliffe was a stern critic of the evil practices of his time, both within

Next to Wycliffe the great place in the history of the English Bible belongs to William Tyndale. Although he translated some parts of the Old Testament, his chief work was that of the New Testament. It was his work which persisted in all the subsequent revisions and translations very much as it was in the original. Tyndale and others suffered severe persecution, and though he fled to Germany, he was pursued and finally suffered a martyr's death in 1536 by being strangled and then burned at the stake.

The invention of printing in 1445-50 marked the passing from the Medieval to the Modern era, not only in history but also in the development of the Bible. When John Gutenberg's press printed the first printed Bible, a Latin Vulgate edition, the means had been discovered whereby the Book of Books could now be reproduced with the facility that would permit wide circulation. Within the next hundred years we had the appearance of Luther's great Bible in German, and of the series of English Bibles which culminated in 1611 with the King James Bible or Authorized Version. Two important major revisions were made since. The first culminated

in the English revision of 1881-85 and the second in the American Revised Versions of 1901. Since then many modern translations have been effected, such as those by Moffatt, Weymouth, Goodspeed,

Smith and others.

The scriptural truth and authenticity of the Word of God is a miracle in itself. Its truths have been preserved by God himself through inspiration to man and though many have lost their lives in its preservation it has come down to us today as the most read book in the world and it can be purchased for a mere pittance or it can be procured for great sums. It is God's word to man.

What the Bible Is

The Bible is the Word of God to man. It is one book-The Bible, but also it may be correctly called a library — arranged in two volumes with a total of 66 Books.

These 66 books were written by some 44 persons—the Old Testament Scrip-tures in Hebrew and the New Testament scriptures in Greek-during a period of

at least 1600 years.

The word Bible is from the Greek word Biblia, signifying "the books."

This word has been in use since the 5th century, the earliest name for the whole Bible being Scripture.

The meaning of the word "Testament" is "Covenant."

The Bible has two great divisions — Old Testament and New Testament as follows

There are two kinds of influences exercised among individuals which are recognizable. They are Godly and Sa-tanic. The one emanates from the God of this world; the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience. Eph. 2:12. The other from the God of heav-en; the Lord of glory. There are many examples recorded in the Bible of evil influences emanating from the ungodly. When Solomon was old, his wives turned away his heart after other gods: and his heart was not perfect with the Lord his God, as was the heart of David, his father. II Kings 11:4. This scripture and many others prove the fact that the power of evil influence is operative in the lives of individuals. We witness one way or the other.

We are aware of the fact that wrong bears sway; wickedness prevails, gross darkness covers the earth. Sin runs riot everywhere. But, "where sin did abound, grace did much more abound." Rom. 5:20. If one has the vision of Jesus Christ and His great redemptive work, one will find challenges to his best abilities. "Ye are the light of the world and the salt of the earth." These two words are a figurative expression which Jesus uses to describe the task of the disciples in the world; what it really means to the effectiveness and influence of a saint's personality. "Ye are a city set on a hill that cannot be hid." A city set on a hill that cannot be my.
on a hill will radiate light; will send out man walk in the day, he stumbleth not, because he seeth the light of this world. But if a man walk in the night, he stumbleth, because there is no light in him." John 11:9-10. The beloved disciple said of Jesus, "In Him was life and THE LIFE WAS THE LIGHT OF MEN. And the light shineth in darkness, and the darkness comprehended it not." John 1:4-5. James Moffatt's Transnot." John 1:4-5. James Moffatt's Translation says, Amid the darkness the light shone, but the darkness did not master it.

Influence is not so much of what we say as what we are. There are a chosen few who are truly the light of the world and the salt of the earth. Their very lives command respect and admiration from their fellowman because of their value, of whom the Apostle Paul says of being "Blameless, harmless, the sons of God, without rebuke in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, AMONG WHOM YE SHINE AS LIGHTS IN THE WORLD." Phil. 2:15. The question is, not whether we have influence but what SORT of influence do we have as sons of God? Does the light of God in our lives give to those about us an impressive effect? Am I living a Christlife, endeavoring to promote His great cause on the earth to the best of my God-given abilities? We are either all for God or the enemy. "No servant can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon." Matt. 6:24. He that is not with me is against me.

If one desires to employ heavenly influence (which will be rewarded with great dividends), possessing the spirit of God is the first qualification. Jesus of God is the first qualification. Jesus says, "Without me, ye can do nothing." Ye shall receive power after the Holy

Ghost has come upon you and ye shall be witnesses unto me." The reception be witnesses unto me." The reception of the spirit of God will give a resolute purpose in life and a wholesome desire to stand for principles of truth and righteousness. When it is once known that an individual stands for a worthy cause, he becomes a power for the good of humanity. This can only be realized as we allow God to have complete control of our lives; which means obedience to His command, "Come out from among them and BE YE SEPARATE." Our habits, conduct and speech must be above the commonplace. We must possess the Holy fire of His spirit to kindle or arouse others. We must have life to propagate life. This takes place when we are lifted out of ourselves by His spirit. The fruits of the spirit will produce holy character and it takes character to influence others. Excellence of character is found in saints who possess the fruits of the spirit: love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, meekness, etc.

Influence means the power of producing an effect without apparent force or direct authority. An excellent example of a Godly effect is found in the story of Elijah and Elisha as set forth in the book of II Kings 2:9. Elijah was a true prophet of God. Elisha perceived in the life of this unique man, Elijah, the mighty manifestations of God. He followed Elijah everywhere he went. The expression of God in this prophet fascinated Elisha. He became so affected, that a desire was created within him for the inspiration Elijah possessed. When asked what he desired, Elisha said, "I pray thee, let a double portion of thy spirit be upon me." Jesus says, "If I be lifted up, I will draw all men and the men "Our spirituality and men a unto me." Our spirituality or growth in God will determine the degree to which we influence our fellowman. Our unto me." ability to induce others will depend on ability to induce others will depend on our Christ-likeness. What was it that drew men to Jesus in His day? Wherein did His power lay? It was in the Holy Ghost or God. God is love. He drew men to His path, not by carnal weapons but by the irresistible power of love. His winsome manner made its appeal to the hearts of men which brought instantaneous response. Jesus was so real, He affected people. His presence disturbed them. Even though He met rebuff from many, there were those that believed on Him.

God must have vessels or instruments in which to express Himself and to work His holy purpose among men. "We have this power in earthern vessels, that the excellency may be of God and not of ourselves." II Cor. 4:7. This excellency or holy influence is expressed through "Manifestation of the truth, commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God." II Cor. Truth is supreme and excellent; it is above man's intellect. Pilate asked,

What is truth? Jesus said: "I am the truth." Truth is forcible and powerful. For whose personality has ever been more potent than our Lord Jesus Christ as He walked among men from day to day? He still stands today as the central figure of goodness and purity. "For this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth." John 18:37. He towers above all the great men that have gone on before through centuries of time. There have been many great men whose lives have compelled recognition, but none have surpassed this man of Galilee. His Name is still above every Name. None have compared with Him; none spake as this man. He is the rose of Sharon; yea, He is altogether lovely.

Jesus said: "Let your light so shine that men may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven."
Light doesn't do a thing of itself; it just shines; it doesn't make any noise. To shine is to display. We let our light shine through righteous living; by allowing His life to shed forth its beauty through us to others. "In Him was life to the light of men" Our and the life was the light of men." Our influence is our life. "Let them that love Him be as the sun when he goeth forth in his might."

In this world with its disillusionment, how men and women are needed to stand for Jesus Christ. What do others think of when they think of us? Do they think of Jesus, His love, purity and goodness? Do we remind others of God? Is His life manifested in us; does His splendor shine forth? Jesus was the express image of God.

Paul further admonishes us, "Commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God." To commend a thing to another is to recom-mend it; to show forth its finest qualities that the other may be persuaded to accept because of its value. When we allow God to express Himself through us, then there will be a spontaneous outflow of His energy to our fellowman. The great Apostle Paul attained this ascendancy which is the highest point of development or influence for he said, "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live, yet NOT I BUT CHRIIST LIVETH IN ME." For to me to live IS CHRIST. These scriptures show the pre-eminence of the Christ-life. Herein lay the secret of Paul's influence and success. God worked in him mightily.

Our magnetic power is Jesus Christ. He will recommend Himself to the unfortunate, whose souls are parched and hungry if we will but allow His spirit to have sway in our lives. "No man can come to me except the Father which hath are the same to t hath sent me draw him." A holy life will attract men to Him. One writer said, "There is no power in the world so irrepressible as the power of personal holiness." Our lives can be a blessing to those about us. We preach not ourselves, but Jesus Christ. Jesus says, "I can of mine own self do nothing; the Father that dwelleth in me; He doeth the work."

May the Lord grant each of us the desire to be influential servants of Him. "He that saith he abideth in Him ought himself also to walk even as He walked."

I John 2:6. We become inspiring examples to others when we live at our best: being unreservedly yielded to Him; loving Him with all our heart, soul, mind and strength. "Ye are our epistle known and read of all men. Forasmuch as ye are manifestly declared to be the epistle of Christ." II Cor. 3:2-3.

Today there are only 11 states out of the 48 where resident Federal employees do not exceed the number of those employed by the state. One out of every nine persons employed in the United States is a government worker-Federal, State, County or City.

The Illinois Temperance News tells us that in 1934 about 31% of the people of the United States above the age of 20 were drinkers. In 1950 the rate was 55% of those over 16. At this same rate, by 1977 those over 18 will be heavy drinkers to the percentage of 85. God help our future generations.

Statistics released during the recent World Sunday School Convention in Toronto, Canada, showed that there are 27,944,454 pupils enrolled in Sunday schools in the United States and 9,442,-830 in other lands, making a world total of 37,387,284 pupils. With the addition of 3,351,180 teachers and officers there is a grand enrollment of 40,758,564. It is reported that this is a 75 per cent increase since the conference held in Oslo, Norway, 14 years ago.

According to reliable information the Red "liberators" of China have exterminated millions of Chinese who disagreed with their policies. We cannot do business with the Godless elements of any country. It was certainly a sad day for America when we recomined the day for America when we recognized the Russians and seemingly we have been in trouble in one way or another ever since. Christianity and communism simply do not mix.

Communism in Africa. We have not heard very much concerning communism in Africa but according to a recent report it is spreading very rapidly in that land, and there is a possibility that missionaries may be forced from that country within the next ten years if commu-nism continues to spread. The entire continent of Africa is in the throes of this nationalistic spirit. With that spirit is a wave of anti-missionary, anti-God teaching. The people there are being taught to resent missionaries as forerunners of foreign imperialism.

A large Brewing Company is reported to have spent over five million dollars in advertising during 1950.

During the year 1950-every 5 minutes someone in the United States was feloniously assaulted or killed, according to the F.B.I. During each average day 146 persons were robbed and the cars of 468 others were stolen. Each day 1,129 places were entered by bur-glars and every 30 seconds a larceny was recorded.

There is some talk of the Jews re-building their temple in Jerusalem. When they do, it is not likely to equal Solo-mon's temple in magnificence. Calculations have been made which would indicate that a duplication of the temple today would cost over 87 billion dollars. Here is the breakdown: Gold, silver and brass—\$34,399,110,000; jewels — about the same; vessels of gold—\$1,876,481,-515; vessels of silver — \$3,246,720,000; robes and vestments—\$10,385,440; trumpets—\$1,000,000; food for workmen—\$344,385,440; rough material—\$12,726,-685,000.

Something to think about — Between the News reports the following: "The cost of modern weapons has increased enormously — the cost of one modern tank would build a whole village of good six room houses; one torpedo costs as much as a medical education. It takes more gasoline to run one bomber in an attack over Korea than an average motorist would use in three years; it costs more to give the average light cruiser or destroyer a routine overhaul than most business men earn in a life-

An English Earl's daughter recently sold the 46th Gutenberg Bible, one of the world's oldest printed books, to the United States publishing house of Charles Scribner and Sons. It is reported that Lady Christian Martin received substantially more than the \$105,-980 paid for a Gutenberg Bible in 1926. This 46th copy of the Bible was last heard of in 1824. Its existence was disclosed when she sold it. The Bible was left to her by her sister. It had only five of its 643 pages missing.

Residents of the United States received personal income totaling \$223,-000,000,000 last year, a considerable increase over the previous record of \$210,-000,000,000 reached in 1948. This may seem fine on the face of it but we won-der what the REAL value of this huge sum was in view of the greatly reduced purchasing power of the dollar.

The latter half of the 25th verse of Luke 21 carries this message: "And upon the earth distress of nations, with perplexity; the sea and the waves roar-

ing."
The Bible presents a conglomerate or over-all picture of events and signs preceding the coming of the Lord Jesus. Not only are the heavens disturbed, but on earth, distress of nations. The earth will be filled with confusion and distress-another herald to Christ's coming.

No one can deny that our present generation is teetering on the brink of another global conflict that threatens to wipe out civilization. We in America are feeling a certain pride in the recent success in the south Korean country side, and again we are tempted to sit back and "Well, that finishes that"; but my friend, sad to say, that no sooner is one problem solved than another problem with greater complications and larger dimensions takes the place of the previous head-cracker. No wonder there is distress of nations.

Newspaper Testimony

On the front pages of our newspapers recently we were treated to a word deunited Nations delegates in a perplexing meeting. I am quoting from the Indianapolis Times, "Pandemonium broke loose as Urdaneta suspended the meeting. The Soviet bloc representatives shouted over the hubbub demanding that they be given the floor. The meeting had to be suspended for ten minutes to bring a semblance of order.

A world that is horribly sick of bloodshed, bombings of innocents, wars and rumors of wars, and sundry other devastations and destructions sits in a grim uncertainty waiting and knowing that some-how, somewhere, another blow will strike to shake the very universe to its foundation. But the key to the whole sit-uation is faith in Christ. Note that Paul is talking about the power of God unto salvation and telling us that the faith that enters into such a transaction is linked forever with righteousness.

"And upon the earth distress of na-

My friend, wend your way to God's house. Use your influence in its sphere to point men and women to the way of truth and peace. Take your children to the place where they can know God in the place where they can know God in His fullness. Apply yourself to faith in God. Take steps to save yourself from this untoward generation. Kneel at the cross; go back to that place where the suffering Christ opened the way to eternal bliss and personal satisfaction and "Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

Our Missionary Secretary Reports From the Mission Fields

We greet you again in the name of the Lord Jesus from the mission field. God has been with us since our last writing. Truly the "harvest is great, and the laborers are few, pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest." Our hearts are torn as we see the needs, and so few who are really concerned. One month ago we were in India with Brother and Sister Scism. We had met Brother Burns there and were preparing to leave for Ceylon.

On April 4th, we bade Brother and Sister Scism goodbye at the railway station; after twelve hours riding we reached the airport, and the next day took a plane to Ceylon where we were greeted by the rest of the Burns family and Brother Buck. God is blessing our Brother and Sister Burns and we

are sure there will be a harvest of souls for Jesus Name on that beautiful island. The opposition from Satan has been stiff (yet no more than any true child of God can expect when they pioneer a new field. It is a mistake for anyone to think the devil will not attack them and contest every inch of ground. I have often said: There will never be any need of a new devil for the one in existence is doing his job well): but we are MORE than conquerors through Him that loved us.

A few months ago God wonderfully healed Sister Burns of a growth in answer to prayer. In their hour of desperation, when the doctor had told them it was serious, and Sister Burns had been suffering all she could stand, God spoke to Brother Burns to lay his hands on his wife and even told him the words to say, and to rebuke the growth in Jesus' Name and command it to leave. As he did, God healed her completely,

and in two days she was well after suffering for months — JESUS LIVES — Hallelujah! Since January there have been 42 baptized in the Name of Jesus, and the end is not yet. We are in hopes that Brother and Sister Mowatt will be able to get to Ceylon this fall. Also, "we have hope, when your faith is increased" (to support and help us more) See 2nd Corinthians 10:15, 16 to send at least another couple to Ceylon to help in the fray. There are 8,000,000 people there, and over 90% are Buddhist. We need a headquarters church there; also many other needs over the Island.

Monday morning, the 16th, we were up early as the plane was to leave at 9:30. Brother and Sister Burns and family, and Brother Buck accompanied us to the airport twenty-four miles away. We were sad at the thought of leaving, but happy indeed in Jesus, and to see the way He was working in both India and Ceylon. After a six-hour non-stop flight we arrived in Karachi, the capital of Pakistan. There we had a two-day layover, awaiting a connecting plane to Baghdad, Iraq, the land of ancient Babylon. We arrived in Iraq at 3:15 a.m. Thursday, and were met by Brother Howell Youkhanan and his brother-in-law. We spent three days with them, and had three services. I was impressed with the opportunities for the gospel there. The people are of a fine type, and I believe many could be reached with the gospel. The seed that Brother J. B. Thomas planted over twenty years ago is still growing, and there is fruit to show for his labors. Brother Youkhanan was only a schoolboy when Brother Thomas laborated by the province of the school o er Thomas left. He has carried on in a wonderful way. God has given him a fine wife and family and his wife is a real help to him. The needs there are great and I only wish it were possible to visit them more often. It seems the visiting of mission fields is an indispensable part of the work, if we are going to do missionary work. Brother Youk-hanan has held a General License with us for years, and has been giving full time to the ministry for a long time. On Saturday night, April 21st, we ordained Brother Youkhanan to the ministry,

praying that God would anoint him for the job in even a greater way to carry this message to that field. However, there are needs. We should eventually have the UNITED PENTECOSTAL CHURCH recognized in Iraq. Then we need a church building in Baghdad. Brother Youkhanan will need help in doing this in both visits and outside help as well as money. Again, where are the reapers? You can help us with your money, with your intercessory prayers, and by going in person if God opens the way and calls.

On Sunday, the 22nd, we left Iraq by plane for Damascus where we immediately took a taxi for the Holy Land. While in Palestine we stopped with Sister Hogg, an Apostolic Church of Pentecost (in Canada) missionary. One day we visited Ramallah where Brother Bayne has a work. We found a good bunch of live workers and Christians there; some were refugees from Sister Dickson's work in Ramle. Their place of worship was small but the house was full. We believe a good work could be done in Palestine but we also believe the time is short. If and when the Jews take the rest of the land, the Arabs will be driven out. Sister Hogg is doing a good work and has the respect of all the people and missionaries there. We held three services with her, and God blessed.

On Sunday, the 29th, we took a plane again from Damascus to Cairo, and from Cairo to Johannesburg, arriving there on Tuesday afternoon. We were met at the airport by Brother Beetge, Brother and Sister Freeman, and Brother Jeremiah, a native preacher. We went straight to Brother Freeman's home for supper, then to a Young People's service in Brother Beetge's church where we said a few words. It was good to see them again. Brother Beetge is waging a great battle in this land for the truth of the Name of Jesus. We expect to spend the entire month of May here before going on to Liberia. Brother Freeman now has 56 congregations of natives. Pray for us as we try to minister here, and see what the needs are to help the cause most. I rejoice that the truth is marching on. We must preach it in love. There is no room nor time for compromise. Let us get behind the missionary work of the United Pentecostal Church as never before, and see God work. Pray for us.

While in Assam we saw the need of a church building in the capital city of that section. I promised the brethren we would help them. Some walked 87 miles through tiger and elephant infested jungles on mere trails to get to our convention. They came in with a shout and went out the same way. Barranquilla, Colombia, South America

Surely a new day has dawned in our missionary work in Colombia. During February and March — 20 Colombian workers gathered in Barranquilla for a time of conference, Bible study and prayer with the object of preparing themselves, or that is, letting the Lord prepare them to become missionaries to their own people. We rejoice in the interest the Colombians are showing in their desire to reach out to unreached sections.

Those who attended the conference were not teen-age youngsters, wanting some schooling, but they were mature men and women who left their jobs and homes at a sacrifice in order to have time to wait on God. Some have been in the Lord's service for years, branching out from the missionary established churches to surrounding towns, beginning new works. Others are just beginning to step out. None received salaries—all are volunteer workers. There are others who have been faithful who were not able to attend.

Several missionaries were able to visit at different times and help with the school—Brother Ball, Sister Johnston, and of course I'm here all the time. Many hours a day were spent in Bible studies and the students always seem to be drinking in the Word. There were special seasons of prayer and waiting on the Lord and the presence of God was very real. I think all received a second filling of the Holy Ghost. One boy who was not Pentecostal but wandered in by chance—or the hand of the Lord—received the Holy Ghost and spoke in English, a foreign tongue to him. Altogether it was a time of spiritual refreshment and "sitting together in heavenly places," a relief from the pressure of work and burdens.

The final day of the conference the group gathered around a map of South America, with their hands on the map, praying for this continent, and offering themselves for service. 

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THE USE OF LITTLE THINGS Evangelists Norman and Mary Alice Paslay

How very important Boys and Girls are in the sight of the Lord! God wants every Little Life that He might use it for His glory and for the promotion of His great kingdom. In the Gospel of Mark, chapter ten and verse fourteen, Jesus extended a great invitation to Boys and Girls to come unto Him and reminded those about Him that "of such is the Kingdom of God." Shall we read the exact words that were written about this special day and as we read them let the special day and as we read them felt us remember that the Lord Jesus feels the same about Boys and Girls today. Mark 10:13, 14, 15: "And they brought young children to him, that he should touch them: and his disciples rebuked those that brought them. But when Jesus saw it, he was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein." When we read these words we are reminded of a story we read sometime ago entitled "The Use of Little Things." We want to pass it along to you. It begins like this—"Somebody tell me, 'How many letters are there in the alphabet?' That's right, just twenty-six. Now, 'How many notes are there in the musical scale?' That is correct, just eight. One more question, 'How many colors are there?' Yes, there are seven primary colors.

Do you know, boys and girls, that all the books and all the letters and all the newspapers and magazines are printed with just twenty-six letters? Just think of it-all the libraries in the English language contain only twenty-six different letters! All the words that you write, big or little, hard to spell or easy to spell—they cannot have any more letters or any different letters than just these two dozen and two!

And all the songs you sing at school and all the songs you sing at church are made up of just eight different notes — do, re, mi, fa, sol, la, ti, do. Of course they are divided into half notes, quarter notes, etc., but all the beautiful hymns, and operas, and lullabies, and all the war-songs and folk-songs come from

just those eight notes! But what about those colors? Well, you said there are just seven. Do you know that all the colored pictures, the water-colors and oil paintings, are made out of those half a dozen and one colors? When you see a rainbow you cannot count more than seven colors. Do you know their names? Yes, of course, they have names—red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, violet. These colors have different shades and tones, but there are no more real colors than these seven I have named. Is it not wonderful that all the pretty pictures and all the lovely paintings you ever saw are based on just these few colors?

Let me tell you more about these little things without which the world could not get along very well. It is their relation to each other that makes them so useful. It is the way they stand each to the other that makes all the books and all the songs and all the colored pic-tures! When you spell a word wrong, it means that you have put the wrong letter next to the other letter. You have not put the letters together right. So when you sing or play on the piano and the music does not sound right, it is a discord—that is, the notes were not put together right. A picture in which the colors are not put together right is not a very pretty picture, is it? It is a mess, a daub!

Do you know it is the same way with children? Well, it is. It is our relation to each other, the way we stand toward each other, that makes life sweet and pure and happy. When you are unhappy, it means that something has gone wrong with you and somebody else! You are not in the right relation to one another! You did not treat somebody just right, or somebody did not treat you just right! You are out of sorts! You must "make up." You must put things right. God wants to use you, just as we use the little letters or the notes or the colors, and if we let Him use us and put us where He wants us, our lives will always be happy and useful, and we shall make others happy.'

A HOUSE FOR GOD Catheryn Ruh.

Many, many years ago a little boy only seven years old was made a ruler. The people put a crown upon his head and called him King Joash. Even though he was just a little boy Joash wanted to please God. So he thought of a plan whereby he could make God happy.

Until King Joash was seven years old he had always lived in the temple with his uncle. His uncle was a minister, or priest. Joash saw that the temple was little by little falling down. Nobody ever

took the trouble to take care of it.

Sometimes a piece of plaster would fall off in one spot. Then the roof would begin to leak. The rain would come in and make ugly streaks on the walls. When King Joash saw how the beautiful temple was provided to the contract of the strength of the ful temple was being spoiled, he sent for the priests and said to them: "Take the money that has been brought by the people who come to the temple, and hire some men to come and fix the building. Tell all the people, and let everybody bring gifts to make God's house beauti-ful again."

He told them all the different kinds of workmen they would need-carpenters, and stone-masons, and men who could work with iron and brass, for there

was much to be done.

The king supposed, of course, that the men would go right off and do as he had told them, but they did not. Did you ever put off anything that your mother or father or your teacher said you should do? That was what these priests did. When the king found that nothing had been done toward getting more money or hiring workmen, he sent for the priests again.

This time they knew there was to be no more disobeying the king. So the priest Jehoiada, who was King Joash's uncle, brought a big box, or chest, with a hole in the lid of it, and put it in the temple,

where everybody could see it.

Then the king's helpers sent word out among the people that the temple was to be all made over, and if they wanted to have a part in it they should bring their money and drop it in the box.

The people really loved their temple, for it was God's house. They brought so much money that the chest was filled clear up to the top. The money was taken out, and paid to the workmen who were by that time hammering and pounding and sawing.

Again the chest was filled, for every-body wanted to help. Bringing money was one good way of helping. The heav-enly Father had given them the silver and the gold and the iron in His great mines, and the wood from His great trees, and the stones from his great quarries. He was glad that they were remembering to do this work for Him.

The king did not want the temple made beautiful for himself. It was all for God, for though the people called it their temple, even the tiniest child was taught that the temple was, first of all, God's house.

out of the fields for the walls, and the men helped the carpenters and masons

to build the church.
"My gift for God's house is very little," said Mr. Kim sadly, "for I am a poor man, and it takes all my time to earn enough to buy food for my family; but I love God's house as much as anybody does, and I would gladly give more if I could."

Day after day Mr. Kim thought and planned how he might give more, but he could not find a way. Suddenly he had

an idea.

"I will give the two fine big stones that hold up the posts of my little porch," he said. "They will make God's house beautiful, and I can find smaller stones that will do very well for my own house.

So the little porch over the doorway of Mr. Kim's house was taken down, and the two fine big stones were carried over to the place where the church was being

built.

Now, when Mr. Kim goes to church, he sees a part of his own home built into the front wall of God's house, and when he goes home he sees under his porch the small rough stones in the places where the large, smooth ones

used to be.

PRINCIPLE OF BACKSLIDING

KENNETH V. REEVES, Trenton, Tennessee President Tennessee District Pentecostal Conquerors

Backsliding from God is something we must not do-but it is something that can be done, even without particularly intending to. The testimony of thousands upon thousands of backsliders will support this statement.

This article is not intended to glorify backsliding—nor to merely approach the Christian life negatively. But, if tens of thousands have backslidden from a glorious experience with God, then it is possible for others now serving God to do it.

How then do people backslide? What principle do they follow?

Actually the reasons or causes given are various: According to the parable of the sower in Matthew 13, (1) Some never get the word planted into their hearts, and are merely curious wayside hearers; (2) Others are merely emo-tional in their response to the gospel, and their shallow hearts are not fit for cultivating the fruits of a Christian life; cultivating the fruits of a Christian life;
(3) Still there are those whose hearts
are responsive to the gospel—but are
also responsive to worldly cares, the
lure of making money, and divers desires. Eventually all three types backslide from whatever effect the gospel
may have had upon them. All of us are
tested in some way; with Satan devising
whatever scheme is most likely to sucwhatever scheme is most likely to succeed with the personality he is dealing with.

But whatever strategy Satan may employ, he aims at uprooting the Word of God out of our hearts. Either he gets us to give little attention to the things we have heard, or to doubt it. Among many of our young people there is a flighty attitude toward the Word of God. Some of them think that instruction, correction or reproof is a dreary ordeal under which they must go, but with which they have little sympathy or appreciation. This is a wrong attitude.

If we pay little regard to the word of God, (especially the words of Jesus and His disciples), there is no way to avoid neglecting salvation. Salvation is based upon Words—the words of Jesus and His disciples who heard him. Salvation first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed by them that heard and was confirmed by them that heard Him. In short we are saved by faith in the preached Word of God. Hear little -know little-have little. I warn all of you—if you are not hungry for God's word—you cannot help but be in desperate danger of backsliding! Remember Israel!!

Not only a neglect of the gospel will tend to cause us to depart from the living God, but ignorance of Jesus Christ Himself will dilute our faith thin. As a doctrinal movement, we are in danger of neglecting the active government and leadership of the head of the church — Jesus Christ. We emphasize the doctrines of Christ, but our hearts must be awakened to look unto the Christ of our doctrines.

Jesus is the head of the church in His various offices, as was Moses over Israel. We are commanded to look "unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith." (In two separate visions in the last four years, I have had the privilege of seeing Jesus in visions. In both instances I was impressed with Paul's description of Christ's priesthood—and of Christ's covenant — and of Christ's blood.)

As our great High Priest, Jesus is "a merciful and faithful high-priest." He can be touched with the feelings of our infirmities. "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Heb. 4:16.

Until we are able to constantly keep in mind the living Christ—and stay un-der His control and guidance, we will tend to drift from God. It seems to me a necessity for every Christian to establish a vital contact with this living Christ through prayer; live under His constant keeping. In fact we should be in love with Jesus so deeply that no other thing can rival Him in our hearts. Faith in the scriptures—Faith in Christ.

There are three other powerful aids to a consistent victorious Christian life. These three vital elements of our faith are: the Name of Jesus; the Holy Ghost; and the blood. The devil cannot overcome these elements. He (the devil) is defeated by our trusting in them.

When Satan is entrenched, he must be blasted out by the Name of Jesus through the mighty Holy Ghost. When Satan tries to employ our members as servants of unrighteousness, we resist him steadfastly by insisting that we are redeemed by Jesus' blood and now be-long to God by purchase. Since we be-long to God, we know that He will fight for us.

Let us sum up this article: Lack of faith is the basic principle of backsliding. Unbelief in scripture promises — unbelief in the living Christ—unbelief in the Name, Spirit and blood of Jesus. That is we believe that the scriptures are true, but do not stand on the promises. We believe that Christ lives-but do not anchor our whole life in His leadership. We believe that there is a name of Jesus—there is the Holy Ghost—there is the blood of Jesus—but we fail to draw from them the blessings that they are designed to bring.

Active, positive, living faith is the one principle or law that establishes the righteousness of Christ in us—and anchors us to heavenly realities. Let us go on to Christian perfection—else we shall gradually unthinkingly lose out with God.

I have found the book of Hebrews the greatest source of faith and victory for my soul. I recommend it as a source of faith and patience for those who need enduring power. May God bless you.

Youth at the Crossroads

"This is the way, walk ye in it."

Youth at the crossroads! Most all of us have seen cartoons of youth at a crossroads experience in which they must decide if they are going to follow after the Christian way of life or the treacherous pathway of sin. It seems to me that there is another crossroad experience that is equally important.

It is the time when a Christian youth decides the direction of his future work. He stands at a junction with many paths leading in every direction. The majority of them lead to worldly fame, a glorious career from an earthly standpoint, or the chance of financial successes and everything that the natural man is looking forward to, but, somewhere among the maze of pathways leading into the future is the pathway of Christian service—future to be spent as a servant of Jesus Christ, with the promise that if we suffer with Him, we shall also reign with Him!

The secular world is making a great bid for the energy and ability of youth. The field of service is broad, there are many things to choose from and they lead to many possible experiences. What young man has not contemplated the future of engineering, aviation, chemistry, law, medicine, radar, or atomic energy? Young women are likely to survey the fields of home economics, education, journalism, or nursing. These all seem to hold promising futures. There appears to be plenty of openings and they all carry a certain feeling of satisfaction when attainments are reached. Secular schools have in the past and are even doing more at the present to see that each young person makes the proper vocational and educational choice. Guidance has become an integral part of the modern school system. I am wondering just how much effort we, as Christian leaders, are putting forth in an attempt to guide our Christian young people in the path that they should go concerning their future work for Christ.

Young person, have you considered a future career with Christ! I mean a lifetime spent in service for Him. The field is broad. Jesus said that it was the whole world. The opportunities are many, the openings varied. One needs only to drive a few hundred miles down any highway in America and observe the effects of

sin and the need of real practical Christianity to realize that there are open doors aplenty. Then if you will compare so-called Christian America with heathenism and realize what non-Christian countries are like, you will realize the need of the world.

You may feel that you cannot preach and maybe you can't, but somewhere in God's great corps of workers, there is a place for you to labor in His vineyard. Our Lord not only needs preachers, He needs musicians, journalists, authors, radio technicians, aviators, teachers, and a host of other types of workers in His program of evangelizing the world. Christian service is not just preaching the Word behind the pulpit of some great church, or in the jungles of some far off country, it is serving Christ where you are and with what you are doing.

As you face the future and make your decisions, consider these things. What kind of service will give you the greatest feeling of satisfaction when you come to the end of life's road and look back over your accomplishments. Would

As you face the future and make your decisions, consider these things. What kind of service will give you the greatest feeling of satisfaction when you come to the end of life's road and look back over your accomplishments. Would you rather build a few bridges across natural rivers, or build bridges from earth to glory for the souls of men? Would you rather make music for the sake of a great name, or for the touching of the heart strings of men and causing a melody of love and the harmony of peace with God to resound? Would you rather teach how to live in this life only (in secular fields) or how to live for eternity (in Christian fields). In short, would you rather receive the applause of men or of God, would you rather receive an earthly reward or a heavenly?

Christian service pays great rewards. Jesus said that whatever you give up for Him, you shall receive one hundred fold in return in this life and in the end, eternal life. What more could one ask

Christ is looking for volunteers. Don't sit back and wait for some supernatural experience to lead you out for Him. Enlist yourself in the army of the Lord. He will use you. He rejects no one. As you stand at the crossroads looking into the future for your life, don't you see Jesus on one of the pathways beckoning to you and saying, "This is the way, walk ye in it." He needs you! Can you reject His plea?

Bible is today the best selling book in the world. It has been translated into almost every known language in the world.

The Bible contains 3,566,840 letters, 773,693 words, 31,102 verses, 1,189 chapters and 66 books.

The 19th chapter of 2nd Kings and the

37th chapter of Isaiah are nearly alike. The middle verse of the Bible is Psalm 118:8.

The longest verse is the ninth verse of the 8th chapter of Esther. The shortest verse is the 35th verse of the 11th

chapter of John. The 119th Psalm is the longest chap-

ter in the Bible and every verse in it excepting 121, 122 and 132, contains a reference to the Word of God.

The shortest chapter is Psalms 117.

The word Lord occurs 1,855 times. The longest word is in the 8th chapter of Isaiah, first verse.

In the New Testament there are about 243 direct quotations from the Old Testament.

The first division into chapters in the Bible was made in the thirteenth century. The first division into verses was made in 1551 by Robert Stephanus.

The first book to issue from a printing press was the Mazarin Bible, printed in Latin between 1450-55 by Gutenberg. One of the very few complete copies is on exhibition in the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C.

The first Bible printed in this country was in the Indian Language in 1663 by John Elliott.

The first Bible in English printed in this country was in 1782 by Robert Aitken of Philadelphia, Pa. This Bible has the additional distinction of being authorized and recommended in a resolution adopted by Congress September

The first Bible printed in New York City was in 1792 and George Washing-

ton owned a copy.

250 titles are given Jesus in the Bible. The name Jesus occurs 973 times. The title Christ occurs 556 times. The title Lord occurs 730 times.

The name Jesus means "God who is salvation.

The New Testament may be read through in just one year by reading five chapters each Sunday. The Bible may be read through in one year by reading three chapters each week day and five every Sunday.

To understand the word of God is to be wise indeed, but to be ignorant of it is to be destitute of wisdom. It is a complete code of laws, a perfect body of divinity, an unequalled narrative, a book of lives, of travels and voyages. It book of lives, of travels and voyages. It is the king's best copy, the housewife's best guide, the servant's best directory, the young man's best companion, the school-boy's spelling Book, and the learned man's masterpiece. And that which crowns it all is—the Author is One in whom there is no variableness nor shadow of turning.

Such a book is the Bible-God's message to man—may we sincerely love its message and cherish its author and seek at all times to be like Him-who is the first and the last-the author and finisher of our faith-the beginning and the end—the only One true God—even Jesus Christ our Lord.
