Second, we must understand that angels do not preach the gospel, neither does Jesus our Saviour; but that God has put this job exclusively into the hands of man; He is counting on us doing it. When Cornelius prayed in Acts 10, God heard his cry and sent an angel to him; please note the angel did not preach the gospel, but sent Cornelius to Peter for the message. When Saul of Tarsus was knocked down on the road to Damascus, he said, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" Jesus did not tell him the gospel, but sent him into the city where there was a little ONE God, Jesus Name baptized preacher named Ananias, and said "It shall be told thee what thou MUST do." Ananias baptized him in Jesus Name and he received the Holy Ghost. My friends, God is willing to save anyone; but He is expecting, and waiting for us to go and tell them the "Way of Life." And, "Whosoever shall call upon the NAME of the Lord shall be saved." These are our marching orders. Let us go forward these two years as never before. May there be young lives laid upon the altar of God, and ourselves not spared in the


The afternoon session on the first day was devoted to a conference business session, during which time the annual reports of all of the various organization officials were given.

The speaker for the first night was Brother J. C. Cole of Parkersburg, West Virginia, who delivered to the conference a fervent and inspiring message from the Word of God. A large crowd had gathered in time for the night service and the downstairs portion of the spacious auditorium was nearly full.

The services on September 22nd were devoted to the Sunday School Department and the Pentecostal Conquerors Department and on September 23rd all services were in connection with the foreign missionary work of the United Pentecostal Church. The services on these special days are reported elsewhere in this issue.

On Monday morning, September 24th, a very large group of ministers gathered in Assembly Hall No. 2 for another meeting for ministers only. These ministers' meetings have become an annual feature of the conference and they have proven to be one of the most interesting meetings of the entire conference. Among the subjects discussed in this meeting was the possibility of a nation-wide radio broadcast sponsored by the United Pentecostal Church. We are

hopeful that in the not too distant future this will become a reality and that our glorious message will be sent out over the nation and the world by radio. This is something worthwhile to pray for.

Monday afternoon began the election of officers and there were a total of 477 voters present, which was the largest we have ever had. Brother A. T. Morgan, pastor of Faith Tabernacle in Port Arthur, Texas, was elected to be our General Superintendent for the next two years. The conference also decided that in view of the rapid growth of our work, we should have two assistant general superintendents, one to serve the west-ern zone of our work and the other to serve the eastern zone. Brother Oliver F. Fauss of Houston, Texas, was elected Assistant General Superintendent to serve the Western Zone and Brother Oscar Vouga of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, was elected to serve the Eastern Zone. The adding of one assistant general superintendent is a forward step and should prove to be a great help to our growing work. There being no more time left, the election of the remaining officers was postponed until the next morning.

On Monday night there was another large crowd assembled in the auditorium and there was truly a wonderful spirit of worship in the service. After a good song service and some special numbers, the conference choir brought another beautiful song titled "When The Mists Have Rolled Away." Then Brother Oscar Vouga, Assistant General Superintendent, brought another soul-stirring message from the word of God. It was wonderful to see the people of God from so many different places rejoice in the goodness of God as they left the auditorium that night after another wonderful conference day.

On Tuesday morning the election of officers was resumed and the results were as follows: Brother S. W. Cham-

bers was re-elected General Secretary-Treasurer; Brother Wynn T. Stairs was re-elected Missionary Secretary; Brother Calvin L. Rigdon was elected President of the Pentecostal Conquerors; Sister Ruby Keyes was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer of the Pentecostal Conquerors; Brother E. E. McNatt was relected General Sunday School Superintendent; and Sister Helen Hayden was re-elected General Sunday School Secretary. Also, Brother T. R. Dungan was reappointed Manager of the Pentecostal Publishing House and Brother Lester R. Thompson was appointed as Editor of The Pentecostal Herald. Brother Thompson is from Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and we pray that God will bless him in his new work.

Tuesday afternoon was also devoted to conference business during which time a number of resolutions of importance to our work were passed upon. One of these was the establishing of a Ladies Pentecostal Auxiliary for the United Pentecostal Church and the adopting of a policy for this department. We trust that the Lord will bless this new endeavor.

On Tuesday night there was still a large crowd present and the conference was favored with another good message from the Word of God. This time Brother V. A. Guidroz of Baytown, Texas, was the speaker and he addressed the conference in his usual able fashion. Once again there were many happy faces that left the auditorium and wended their various ways to their rooms for the night, feeling that all had enjoyed another great day.

The service on Wednesday morning was given over to the women with Sister Eva Hunt of Pana, Illinois, in charge. There were a number of women ministers who spoke in the meeting that morning and several special songs were rendered by the women. Following the women's meeting, Brother Earl Jacques

of Fredericton, New Brunswick, gave a Bible lesson to the conference and this was a blessing to all who were present. Many favorable remarks were heard concerning Brother Jacques' ministry and it was a privilege for the conference to hear this man of God and able Bible teacher.

The closing business session of the conference was held on Wednesday afternoon. Then on Wednesday night there was a good crowd present for the service even though many had left the conference for home and other places. On this last night of the conference we were favored to hear a very fine message from our newly elected General Superintendent, Brother A. T. Morgan. We trust that all of our people will pray that God will bless Brother Morgan in his new work and give him wisdom as he takes the leadership of our great organization. The responsibilities of such a position are many, but our God is great and will supply every need.

On Saturday night of the conference a check for \$1,000.00 was presented to Mrs. Mark Borror in payment of the insurance claim brought about by the death of her beloved husband, Brother Mark Borror of Mattoon, Illinois. This was the first claim paid since the group insurance plan was adopted by our organization and we know that it was much appreciated by Sister Borror. God bless her.

As we left this twenty-seventh annual conference there was a feeling of genuine satisfaction that God had definitely been with us and that great things were ahead for us. The special committees appointed for the conference seemed to function so smoothly, the special singing seemed to be the best ever, the preaching was anointed of God and even in the business sessions we were aware of the divine presence of God. Thank God for another great conference and for our hopes for the future.

This picture shows (taken from inside) part of the roof taken off by the hurricane in Jamai-ca. The damages done to the new tabernacle and our former headquarters amounted to about \$6,000.00. This is a great setback to the folks of Jamaica and our work there. We had just finished paying for the new tabernacle that was dedicated in April 1951 with over 1200 people present and was clear of debt for which we thank God and the people

at home that stood behind this work so loyally. This work had just become selfsupporting, except we support the missionaries, Brother and Sister Reynolds and family, and also gave "Mother" Russell \$75.00 per month. This is the goal we hope to and should reach on EVERY field, that the work take care of their own workers and they will if started and handled right; then the church will move on even if we have to leave. "Mother" Russell pastored and led that work for years. She is now incapacitated on account of old age and hard work for the Gospel. She labored hard for years with the assistance of our late Brother W. T. Witherspoon. Now we are helping her to the extent of \$75.00 per month.

We regret the necessity of coming back to you to ask again for the "Jamaica Building Fund" to be re-opened. But, we must repair these buildings and go on as before. We also regret there was no insurance covering the loss. Will you kindly help us again in this matter? Thank you. Send your offering to the Missionary Department, earmarked for the "repairs on the Jamaica buildings." We regret we do not have more pic-tures to show of the damage; Brother Reynolds had too many things to think of to get pictures at this time. We are thankful that there was no loss of life among all our people. Some of the country churches were flattened to the ground. Pray for Jamaica.

Kingston, Jamaica September 26, 1951

Dear Brother Stairs, greetings:

I received your letter last week asking for pictures of damage on the taber-nacle. Now I am afraid you are going to be somewhat disappointed. When the storm came I had no film in my camera, neither did I have any extra one. However, in time, I did get down street and bought four. I had four men here work-ing the next Monday after the storm and by the time I got around to taking these last pictures, things were getting pretty well back to normal. In fact, the storm came on Friday and by Sunday morning we were working getting things back in place. At such times you waste no time but go to work. At any rate I think I should have a picture showing the thirty feet of roof off on the tabernacle.

I can't tell you offhand the amount expended to date but I have spent everything that has been received thus far,



plus considerably over two hundred pounds. The tabernacle is repaired but this building has considerable work to do on it. We just nailed the zinc back on it but the zinc was so torn and on it but the zinc was so torn and twisted that the building leaks badly when it rains. To protect the building it should be shingled and re-plastered it should be shingled and re-plastered inside. However, we will do whatever the Lord provides for. We have only done so far just what was absolutely essential to protect the buildings and to get back to normal. I have put one thousand pounds insurance risk on the tabernacle for hurricane, earthquake and fire but this building is still only insured for fire. The rates here are sky-high. We have a very valuable property here and I would like to see them repaired and protected as much as possible.

We had a wonderful day last Sunday with baptismal service at night. This was the first since the storm. We will have special services in November and a Ministerial Meeting. We may go to the country next month as the gully is torn up behind us and the mosquitos are eating us up and we are feeling tough with a touch of malaria. We have already sent the baby up to Mother Rus-

# From the Land of Japan

We received your kind letter of August 16 and the enclosed draft. We were quite surprised to receive the extra of-fering. We do want to thank you for it; it encouraged us much and we surely appreciate it.

We trust that you received the information we sent last month concerning holding of property in Japan. May we repeat that it is possible to hold prop-erty in the name of the United Pentecostal Church Headquarters of St. Louis, Missouri. To do this it is necessary to have three trustees; one trustee must

reside in Japan.

This August we have had different opportunities to minister the Word in several parts of Japan. Toward the middle of August my wife and I went to Karuizawa for nearly a week to get away from the terrible heat spell in Tokyo. Here in the hills we assisted Miss Mabel Daniels and Brother Joseph Murata in their summer Bible School, which they hold during the month of August. Every day there was someone that was coming to the Lord and from one to three or four were filled with the Hely Chest nightly. Most of these were Holy Ghost nightly. Most of these were young people but amongst these was a middle-aged man, a Holiness member for many years and lately acting as an interpreter to some missionaries, who received a marvelous baptism of the Holy Ghost. Truly God is still pouring out His Spirit and we were greatly refreshed in body, soul and spirit during our brief stay in Karuizawa. Then on the 16th of August, the day after I returned to Tokyo, I left for Hokkaido, the northern island of Japan, with Brother Sasabe, one of Brother Murai's memer Sasabe, one of Brother Murai's members who is attending Ikoma Bible College. We were in Hokkaido a week and during this time 6 received the Holy Ghost. We had an opportunity to preach in a sugar-beet factory compound and here a young lady who had been seeking the Lord and the way of salvation for more than three years was saved and filled with the Holy Ghost. Another day a woman who had been a Christian for some years but had been hungry for a deeper experience and as we told her about the Holy Ghost she sought and was filled according to Acts 2:4. By the way, she had walked 7 miles to come to our meeting. After she received the Spirit, she invited us to her home to hold a meeting and so we walked the 7 miles to her place. The following evening many came out to hear the Word and after the meeting this woman's daughter-in-law received the Holy Ghost. She had been trying to live the Christian life in her own strength and had miserably failed so she was greatly distressed when we first met her. After she received the Holy Ghost, I wish you could have seen the vast difference in her face! Then Brother Kishino's (the young man who invited us up there) friend and two older brothers were also filled with the Holy Ghost. We truly thank the Lord for these souls who were saved and filled with the Spirit during our trip to Hokkaido.

Hokkaido has a population of 4,300,-000 and it is a good field for pioneer work—many places have not as yet been reached with the Gospel. There is only one Pentecostal Church on that island. We visited many places where the Holy Ghost message has never gone. The capital city of Sapporo has no Pentecostal work at all.

## **Missionary News**

The Missionary Board has approved the building of a new church building out at Bomi Hill Station in Liberia. This is a necessity and when completed can be used for both church and school. This will involve at least \$3,000.00, but will be a great help to our work in every way. We hope to lift the standard of the school to a high degree, which will give us a good standing in the sight of the government. The government will give our location to some other society if we do not have schools. It is a MUST with the government of Liberia that each Mission Society run schools for the children; but we do not have to board them; they can board at home which is a great saving.

Also we need to build at least two permanent homes for our missionaries at Bomi Hill as the present ones are only temporary and in the course of three or four years they fall down, being built native style. The new ones ing built native style. The new ones will be with cement pilasters, filled in between with dried brick and plastered and a metal roof. We will need at least \$4,000.00 for the houses and school but they will last for years and perhaps until the Lord comes. Pray and help us on this worthy cause. Just send it in designated for the new church and homes at Bomi Hill.

The Missionary Board has voted to raise money for a new car for the work in India. Brother Scism only has an old army jeep and it is well-worn and very uncomfortable for him and Sister Scism on their long journeys. While I was with them I rode in this jeep several hundred miles and it was hard indeed over those roads and even at its best it is hard and uncomfortable. Also the jeep is about worn out. Brother Scism put over \$200.00 repairs on it this year, and it is not fit for the job. We can buy a new four door sedan Chevrolet from the General Motors in New York for less than \$1,500.00 but the freight and duty will be high. We will need at least \$2,500.00 for this job.

Also approval has been given for a headquarters church for our work in South Africa at Pretoria. This will serve a double purpose, in fact, three purposes:

(1) Serve our local congregation in the midst of about 40,000 natives.

(2) It will be our native headquarters for all South Africa and our native conferences will be held in it.

(3) It will lift our standing in the eyes of the Government.

The District of Louisiana has already raised over \$1,000.00 on this church. We hope about three or four thousand will do the job for the glory of God in that land.


