



The Great Commission is summed up in four commandments or duties to be fulfilled, with a **promise in** connection, namely:

- a. "Go ye therefore."
- b. "Teach all nations."
- c. "Baptizing them in the NAME of the Father, etc."
- d. "Observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

And now the promise therewith, "And lo, I AM WTH YOU ALWAYS." So great was the Commission, that Jesus promised to accompany those who dared to obey it. His promise was not for just one short period, but "always, even unto the end of the world." His promise was given on conditions, and those conditions were the fulfilling of the commandments contained in His Great Commission.

The Great Commission was spoken to the eleven apostles and those gathered together with them at Bethany.

They received His commandment to evangelize the world. In His commandment to do so, He emphasized the "continued observance" of all else He had commanded.

It is wonderful, too, to note that they carried out His commission to the letter, as recorded by Mark in the closing verse of his gospel, "And they WENT FORTH, and PREACHED EVERYWHERE, the Lord working with them, and confirming the WORD with signs following." (Mark 16:20).

Therefore, we shall endeavor to analyze the Great Commission as follows:

1. The training and qualification of those commissioned.

2. The Commission emphasized by Matthew, Mark and Luke.

3. The records proving how and in what manner the Commission was obeyed.

(1). THE TRAINING AND QUALIFI-CATION OF THOSE COMMISSIONED.

We should notice how Jesus selected and called men to follow Him; how He instructed and trained them; how He proved Himself to them; and how He acquainted them with His Deity and Power.

For three and a half years He led them, and manifested His power and love to them. He let them behold Him as He did the impossible, on many occasions. He admonished them, "Be not faithless but believing." (John 20:27). He taught them, "When ye pray, FORGIVE," (Mark By Oliver Fauss,

Ass't General Supt.

11:25), and again, "What things soever ye desire, when you pray, BELIEVE you receive them and ye shall have them," (Mark 11:24), and, "All things are possible to them that BELIEVE." (Mark 9:23).

Jesus continually pointed them to a great future experience, the coming of the Comforter — the baptism of the Holy Ghost. He breathed on them and said, "Receive ye the Holy Ghost," (John 20:22), which was fulfilled on the Day of Pentecost. (Acts 2:1-4).

After three and a half years of training, teaching and manifesting Himself to His disciples, we notice the closing hours of these instructions given in a large upper room where He ate with them the last "Passover Feast" and instituted the "Lord's Supper" as a memorial.

The keynote of all His words to them pointed to that great experience He had come to give the world. That which He spoke of to the Woman of Samaria, and then promised on one of their feast days, when He stood and cried, "if any man thirst, let him come unto Me and drink; he that believeth on Me as the Scripture hath said, out of his belly (or intermost being) shall flow rivers of living water." (John 7:37-39).

Let us pay special attention to the last words Jesus ever spoke to His disciples. These words were spoken after His resurrection and having appeared unto them, "showing Himself alive after His passion by many infallible proofs, being seen of them forty days, and speaking of the things pertaining to the Kingdom of God." (Acts 1:3).

We notice that He commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, "But wait for the PROMISE of the Father, which, saith He, 'Ye have heard of Me; for John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence.' " (Acts 1:4, 5).

Although He had commanded them to go into all the world, yet He made them know they were not qualified until they were filled with the Holy Ghost. He said, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost has come upon you: and (then) ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." (Acts 1:8).

Those were His parting words to His disciples. The last emphasis He placed on all His commands was concerning the greatest and all important qualifications —the BAPTISM OF THE HOLY GHOST!

(2) THE COMMISSION EMPHASIZED:

a. Matthew. Matthew gives us his account of the Great Commission as follows (28:19, 20), "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the NAME of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I AM with you always, even unto the end of the world."

Matthew understood Jesus to mean to evangelize all nations, to bring them into the knowledge of the kingdom of God, and then baptize them in the (singular) NAME of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

What is the NAME of the Father? Matthew heard Him say, "When ye pray, say, 'Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed by Thy NAME!" (Matt. 6:9). "The NAME of the Father," indicates that the Father has a NAME, even so with, "Hallowed be THY NAME!"

Jesus also said, "I AM come in My Father's NAME," (John 5:43), and again, "I have manifested Thy NAME (the Father's) unto the men which thou gavest me out of the world." (John 17:6).

It is true that this expression as recorded in Matthew's account of the commission gave birth to the theory of three person's in the Godhead. Adam Clark in his commentary of the Scriptures said, "The orthodox, as they are termed, have generally considered this text as a decisive proof of the doctrine of the holy **Trinity**, * * but this I can never believe; I must abide by what I believe to be the meaning of the Scriptures." (Clarks Commentary, Vol. 5, page 284).

It is clear and plain that the NAME of "JESUS" is the NAME of the Father and of the Son, etc., for the angel had announced before His birth, "His NAME shall be called JESUS, (Jehovah-Saviour), for He shall save His people from their sins." (Matt. 1:21).

This was the fulfillment of the prophecy recorded by Isaiah (7:14), "His NAME shall be called **Emmanuet**, which being interpreted is, God with us." Let us also notice further, that the singular

EDITOR'S NOTE — The mighty God in Christ, and the question of whether God is one or triune, is one of the most discussed controversies in the field of religion. This month's message on the Articles of Faith of the United Pentecostal Church reveals our position and stand on this important subject. What we believe about this subject will finally prove our destiny in the day of judgment. Israel was cursed for giving devotion to other gods. Shall we not flee from this curse, and exclaim, "The Lord our God is one Lord and His name shall be called Jesus."

The One True God

We believe in the one everliving, eternal God: infinite in power, Holy in nature, attributes and purpose; and possessing absolute, indivisible deity. This one true God has revealed Himself as Father, through His Son, in redemption; and as the Holy Spirit, by emanation. (1 Cor. 8:6; Eph. 4:6; 2 Cor. 5:19; Joel 2:28).

The Scripture does more than attempt to prove the existence of God; it asserts, assumes and declares that the knowledge of God is universal. (Romans 1:19, 21, 28, 32; 2:15). God is invisible, incorporeal, without parts, without body, and therefore free from all limitations. He is Spirit (John 4:24), and "... a spirit hath not flesh and bones ..." (Luke 24:39).

"... The first of all the commandments is, hear, O Israel; the Lord our God is one Lord" (Mark 12:29; Deut. 6:4). "One God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all" (Eph. 4:6).

This one true God manifested Himself in the Old Testament in divers ways; in the Son while He walked among men; as the Holy Spirit after the ascension.

The Son of God

The one true God, the Jehovah of the Old Testament, took upon Himself the form of man, and as the Son of man, was born of the virgin Mary. As Paul says, "and without controversy great is the mystery of Godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory" (1 Timothy 3:16).

"He came unto His own, and His own received Him not" (John 1:11). This one true God was manifest in the flesh, that is, in His Son Jesus Christ. "... God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them" (2 Cor. 5:19).

We believe that, ". . . in Him (Jesus) dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily" (Col. 2:9). "For it pleased the Father that in Him should all fulness dwell" (Col. 1:19). Therefore, Jesus in His humanity was and is man; in His deity was and is God. His flesh was the lamb, or the sacrifice of God. He is the only mediator between God and man. "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Timothy 2:5).

Jesus on His Father's side was divine,

on His mother's side, human; Thus, He was known as the Son of God and also the Son of man, or the God-man.

"For He hath put all things under His feet. But when He saith all things are put under Him, it is manifest that He is excepted, which did put all things under Him" (I Cor. 15:27). "And when all things shall be subdued unto Him, then shall the Son also Himself be subject unto Him that put all things under Him, that God may be all in all" (1 Cor. 15:28).

"I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty" (Rev. 1:8).

The Name of God

God used different titles, such as "God Elohim," "God Almighty," "El Shaddai," "Jehovah," and especially "Jehovah Lord," the redemptive name in the Old Testament.

"... unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: ... and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The Mighty God, The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6). This prophecy of Isaiah was fulfilled when the Son of God was named, "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call His name Jesus: for He shall save His people from their sins" (Matt. 1:21).

"Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

THE BIBLE

We believe the Bible to be inspired of God; the infallible Word of God. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16).

The Bible is the only God-given authority which man possesses; therefore, all doctrine, faith, hope, and all instruction for the church must be based upon, and harmonize with, the Bible. It is to be read and studied by all men everywhere, and can only be clearly understood by those who are anointed by the Holy Spirit (1 John 2:27). ". . . no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:20-21).

The Great Commission

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NAME of the Lord Jesus is referred to by all the other writers recording the account of the Great Commission.

b. Mark. Mark gives his account of the commission, thus: And He said unto them, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned. And these signs shall follow them that believe; in MY NAME (singular) shall they cast out devils." etc. (16:15-17).

Mark went further to record, that they, "Went forth and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following." (16:20).

His account is in full harmony with Matthew and with Luke, and agrees with the record of how the commission was **preached**, **practiced** and **obeyed** in the book of Acts.

c. Luke. Luke makes us to know beyond the shadow of a doubt that the Apostles knew and understood the words of Jesus when He gave the Great Commission. For we read: (24:45-48), "Then opened He their understanding, that they might understand the Scriptures, and He said unto them, Thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in HIS NAME among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. And ye are witnesses of these things."

This makes clear the following:

- 1. What was to be preached.
- 2. How it was to be preached.
- In what NAME it was to be preached.
 Where this specific preaching would begin.

(3) THE RECORD PROVING HOW AND IN WHAT MANNER THE COM-MISSION WAS OBEYED.

a. Jerusalem. Let us keep in mind the four commandments or duties in the Great Commission: "Go, Teach, Baptize, and Observe."

We shall notice that after they were filled with the Holy Ghost (second chapter of Acts), they were ready for service. We have already learned that "repentance and remission of sins were to be preached in the NAME of Jesus," and that it was to "begin at Jerusalem."

Let us also bear in mind that Jesus had given Peter a very special commission in the sixteenth chapter of Matthew when He said (16:18, 19), "And I will give unto thee the KEYS of the Kingdom of (Continued on Page 6)

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From the title of this article you would expect to read a murder mystery or perhaps your mind would go to the garden where the betrayal of Jesus took place with the KISS of Judas Iscariot that led to the death of our Lord.

I will endeavor to bring an up-to-date Bible message on this subject. First of all the dictionary defines a KISS as: To salute mutually with the lips; touch gently; meet.

This form of salutation has been recommended in the scriptures by Apostle Paul, when he said in Romans 16716, "Salute one another with an Holy KISS." On three other occasions Paul urged the salute of a holy KISS. Peter, also, as he closed his message to the dispersed Christians in 2 Peter 5:14, uttered these words, "Greet ye one another with a KISS of charity". This was a common practice in the early church but not a new one.

We find in Genesis 29:13 a meeting between Jacob and Laban in which this custom was used. Another very touching scene was when Joseph's brethren came down to Egypt for food (Genesis 45:14-15). "Moreover he Kissed all his brethren and wept upon them". This, and other incidents of the emotional salute of brotherly love has prevailed since early Bible history.

The most beautiful story in the new testament is recorded in Luke 7:36-50, where a woman of the streets Kissed the Lord's feet and washed them with tears, then dried them with the hair of her head. This was a show of her great debt of gratitude. When the host criticised her action, Jesus rebuked him and justified her by saying, "Thou gavest me no KISS: but this woman since the time I came in hath not ceased to KISS my feet". As a tribute to this woman for this act, the Lord said, "Wheresoever this gospel shall be preached in the whole world, there shall also this, that this woman hath done, be told for a memorial to her" (Matthew 26:13).

Before we go further, I want you to know that I do not advocate the permissory of this kind of salutation between the opposite sexes in the church. We have heard that this has been practiced in some churches but we are prone to believe this would lead to "A Kiss of death" to the spiritual man.

In an article written by J. E. Shelly in

the (Advent Witness) he states, "At a recent swearing in ceremony in Bulgaria, all officers and men were made to KNEEL before the new regimental banners and KISS Stalin's name which was embroidered on them". You perhaps read the same in the newspapers but did not attach any spiritual significance to it. We firmly believe the anti-christ is trying to steal this age-long custom and to make it universally obligatory to establish his authority over his children. "And ALL that dwell upon the earth shall worship him, whose names are not written in the book of life." (Rev. 13:8).

We know that Satan is preparing to launch his last and great deception upon the human race. We are living in those "perilious times" of the last days. Earthquakes are shaking the west coast, while famine siezes the entire southland from drouth. Pestilences are in the land and signs in the heavens better known to the world as "Flying-saucers."

Dictators have risen and many have believed them to be the Anti-christ. Each have born a closer resemblance to the final production. Mussolini answered the description in part and Hitler was another. Everyone had to salute with a sign of "Hiel Hitler", but no, he did not fill the bill. Now the eyes of the world are on Stalin and one would think surely with his ruthless crusade of communism which is spreading over the face of the earth today, that he would turn out to be the King of the North. (Ezekiel 38 and 39).

But no, the devil remembers that the resurrection of Jesus Christ brought about his defeat and gave victory and assurance over death Hell and the grave. It is our opinion that the bible teaches that he will try to duplicate this feat by the healing of the deadly wound of the head of the Beast as recorded in Rev. 13:3-8, "And all the world wondered after the beast". Not only will he try but he succeeds to the extent that he is able to convince nations, kindreds and tongues and cause all to kneel and worship him. The position of kneeling is that of worship. They had to KISS the name.

In the 19th chapter of 1 Kings, after Elijah had slain the prophets of Baal and was threatened by Jezebel, he fled for his life. The 9th verse tells how he hid in a cave and the Lord came and ask him what he was doing there. He complained how Israel was all backslidden

and all the Lord's prophets had been slain, all but him, and they were after him. The Lord answered his complaint in the 18th verse and said, "Yet I have left me seven thousand in Israel, all the knees which have not bowed unto Baal, and every mouth which have not KSSED him." The apostate Israel signified their love to Baal by this sign.

Another beautiful example of this is found in Hosea 13:1-4. It tells of gross sin against the only Savior by making them molten images of gold and silver and then commanding them, "Let the men that sacrifice KISS the calves". So we see this is not new even for Satan. He knows "That at the Name of Jesus every Knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth. And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the father. It seems he is racing for time to get as many as possible to subscribe to his worship by KNEELING and KISSING the antichrist. This is the KISS of death.

It is said that the great stone image of Apostle Peter in Rome has been KISSED on the big toe by devout pilgrims and worshippers until much of it is worn away.

What is the object of your devotion? Have you Kissed the KISS of death or have you followed the careful instructions of the Psalmist David, (Psalms 2:12) "Kiss the Son, lest he be angry, and ye perish from the way, when his wrath is kindled but a little. Blessed are all they that put their trust in Him."

We have come to the time of decision, either we will Kiss the Son (Acts 2:38) and be among the Blessed in the first resurrection, or we will be compelled to worship the beast or to take his mark or the number of his name which will seal our doom forever.



The Best Seller -

Recently a leading American newspaper published a list of the most influential bocks published during the past 100 years. of the 113 works listed, only one dealt with a religious subject. It was Renan's "Life of Jesus." This book, however, robs Christ of His divinity. Many of the other works are of such a character that they were banned in this country, for they not only deal with sinful and abhorrent practices but also actually describe them in glowing terms. Some of the other works are philosophical attacks upon the principles of Christianity, which they try to displace through evolution and other atheistic theories. Although it is true that many great Chrisian masterpieces of literature have appeared during the past century, yet it is indicative of men's thinking that among those books which have made the most universal impact, not one would increase one's understanding of appreciation of the Bible. (It is still the best seller!)

Jhe Day Jhe Day Shall Declare Jt!

In the Book of Hebrews, the tenth chapter and the 25th and 26th verses, Paul tells us that a decline in church attendance and a neglect of going to services is willful sin. He, furthermore, exhorts us to increase our church attendance as we approach the last days. The reason that Paul has so consistently instructed us to be faithful and to abound in service toward God in these last days, is because we are beginning to note more and more the "abounding of iniquity". Therefore, in order to combat abounding iniquity, we must have abounding grace.

Actually, the Christian of today has the least excuse for unfaithful service to God than any generation that ever lived. With every modern convenience of travel, modern machinery for easing the burdens of labor, shorter working days, with greater pay, push-button household appliances that reduce the labor and time to a minimum . . . with all this, there is a spiritual decline in the land. The folks in generations past, with all their lack of modern conveniences, their slow means of travel, their long, hard days of labor, will rise up in the day of judgment and condemn this generation for their slackness and unfaithfulness to the house of God.

With all the good that has been presented to us, in this generation, why has sin and its effects increased more than one hundred percent? Some will say that sin always abounds in time of prosperity. However, this is not the answer to the question. Are we going to concede that good produces evil? God forbid. The real facts of the matter are; that many people that heretofore had not the ways and means to pursue evil, now find themselves in the position to carry out the desires of their hearts. Good and evil alike have presented themselves, and the desire that was in the heart of the people has now declared itself, and they have used the good to pursue evil.

In every unregenerated heart are the potentialities of offences such as: murder, adultery, lust of the flesh, lust of the eye and the pride of life. However, the real desire for the commitment of the act has been dormant, and has been restrained for the lack of abounding temptation. But now, with the avenue open through the means of modern ways of tempting man, the dormant spirits have declared themselves, and instead of that man possessing a demon spirit, that spirit has possessed him. For instance, Cain was a potential murderer for many vears. It was in his heart, but he was able to restrain from murdering his brother until the jealousy arose in him to the point that it overwhelmed him and he

literally slew his brother and was declared a murderer. Judas possessed a demon spirit of greed, yet he performed like a normal apostle until such a time that that spirit possessed him entirely. Then he was compelled, without re-straint, to sell his Master for thirty pieces of silver. After doing this unpardonable thing, he was then forced by the spirit that possessed him, to commit suicide. David, one of the kings of Israel, had the potentialities of adultery in his heart from birth, but was far from being an adulterer as long as he delighted himself in the law of the Lord and meditated upon Him day and night. But one evening he took time off for recreation, and that stroll brought him face to face with temptation. Through the lust of the eye a dormant spirit of lust to commit adultery germinated and ultimately possessed him. In due time, Nathan, the prophet, pronounced him an adulterer and a murderer.

Men need not fear so much that demon spirits from some one else will leap upon and possess them, but should rather fear that demon spirits hid deep within their own hearts, who are sometimes called trifles, tolerated and petted, will suddenly abound and possess him. Some people blame the lack of spirituality and power in the church today to our modern buildings education and conveniences. How foolish! Shall we continue in store fronts, under leaky roofs, kneeling in the dust, baptizing in the horse trough, traveling horseback, that grace may abound? God forbid! Give us the best, and if there is a demon of pride in us, it will declare itself and we can, with abounding grace and Godly service, defeat it. Temptation is the fire that brings up the scum of the heart.

We are not advocating "Lead us into temptation," but we are advocating . . . "deliver us from evil." If there was no evil in ourselves, there could be no temptation from without, for nothing evil could seem pleasant. Temptations without reveal desires within.

The cop begins his new position at the street corner directing traffic. He is kind, humble and courteous. Soon he wakes up to the fact that he has great authority; everyone stops or goes at his command. Suddenly he becomes hard, highhat, and seems to hate everybody. He is the same man, but the position has declared him to be inwardly a possessor of a malicious spirit.

We can possess our accomplishments and make them a blessing, or we can let our accomplishments possess us, and become a curse. When sin and temptation abounds, more grace and devotion must abound to combat it. The trouble today is, that we are trying to combat sin produced by modern day methods with eighteenth century service and de-votion. The same sinful nature is in man everywhere, in every age, but the ways and means of arousing that nature to action is not the same in every place and in every age. The generation that lived fifty years ago had the same sinful nature as this generation, but the ways and means of temptation, the opportunities for these sins to exert themselves were not one-tenth as strong as today. God bless our young Christian Pente-costal people in the battle they are wagng against the powers of hell. The devil has come down unto us with great power, for he knoweth that he hath but a short time.

Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter; every human heart that does not possess the holy spirit, possesses evil spirits, and today as in Noah's day and also in Lot's day, prosperity, modern conveniences, and easy living has nourished the flesh until the soul has died. Moral resistance has died. The demon spirits in the hearts of men has flourished until a man who once only possessed the spirit of the demon, is now possessed by him. He is not his own. He walks the streets of our cities, an uncontrolled murderer ... a maniac seeking whom he may devour. Do you not hear Paul say "Know also that in the last days perilous (dan-gerous) times shall come". Today men love their own flesh so much, that many who at one time were faithful church goers, cannot pull themselves away from the television show, ball game, and the funny papers long enough for the Sunday morning worship service. Some are so proud of their new home, new car, and new furniture that they have no time to go to service every service night. This proves that their devotion was not real, for when material things abounded, the offence that was dormant in their heart abounded also. The day declared what was in them. Such people have the same spirit of Lot's wife, who in the day of testing, turned back to look at her possessions and consequently turned to a pillar of salt. In conclusion, "every man's work (nature of his works) shall be made manifest for "the day shall declare it". Let us not be caught unawares but let us assemble ourselves together so much the more as we see the day approaching.

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Heaven." Jesus further made known that the action or words of Peter, pertaining to the setting up of the church, or His kingdom, would be recorded as the authority of heaven itself.

Therefore, it was necessary that the Apostle Peter speak first on the Day of Pentecost—the birthday of the church.

Peter spoke not alone, for we read, "Peter standing up with the eleven" (Acts 2:14). In other words, the rest of the Apostles were standing with and agreeing with the words of Peter.

His great sermon, proclaiming the gospel of the Lord Jesus, so stirred the multitude that three thousand souls cried out unto Peter and the rest of the Apostles, "Men and brethren what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37).

Peter answered with all the authority of Heaven behind him, in complete ac-Great Commission, "Repent, and be BAPTIZED EVERY ONE OF YOU IN THE NAME of JESUS Christ, for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." (Acts 2:38, 39).

b. Samaria. Repentance and remission of sins, on the Day of Pentecost, began to be preached in Jesus' NAME, starting at Jerusalem. The record shows further that when Philip preached Christ to Samaria, there came great joy to that city. We read in Acts 8:12, "But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the NAME of JESUS Christ, they were baptized, both men and women, IN THE NAME OF THE LORD JESUS." (V. 16).

c. **Paul at Damascus**. The persecutor, Saul of Tarsus, also received the same message when Ananias said unto him, "And now, why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the NAME of the Lord." (Acts 22:16).

d. Caesarea. God convinced the Apostle Peter and a number of Jews who were with him in Caesarea that Gentiles were included too, by an outpouring of the Holy Ghost. Peter made this statement, . that through His NAME whosoever believeth in Him shall receive remission of sins." (Acts 10:43). After God had so convinced Peter and those Jews, Peter then commanded them, those Sews, Peter then commanded them, those Gen-tiles, "To be baptized in the NAME of the Lord (Jesus)." (V. 48). e. Ephesus. About fifteen years later, or

twenty-three years after the Day of Pentecost, we find that the Apostle Paul had a revival at Ephesus. (Acts 19:1-6). He emphasized the baptism of the Holy Ghost, and so stressed water baptism, that the people were baptized over again in the NAME of the Lord JESUS. Then he prayed for them and they were filled with the Holy Ghost and spoke in tongues.

Nine years later he besought Timothy to abide still at Ephesus, that he might charge some that they teach NO OTHER DOCTRINE! (1 Tim. 1:3).

f. Corinth. Paul's first epistle to the Corinthians, in view of his own conversion and his manner of baptizing the Ephesians, makes it very clear that they (Concluded on Page 11)

COLOMBIAN ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. Psalms 133:1.

We felt the reality of this scripture during the three days of convention in this city of Barraquilla recently. It was our great privilege this time to have our Brother and Sister Rolston from Plaster Rock, New Brunswick, Canada, with us. It was a privilege greatly enjoyed by we missionaries and by the Colombian Christians as well. Brother and Sister Rolston arrived in Colombia January 26th. A telegram had been sent from Miami informing us about their arrival; however this telegram never got into our hands until hours after they themselves had arrived. Consequently there was no one to receive them at the airport. Columbia, naturally, is a Spanish speaking country and this fact made it very difficult for Brother and Sister Rolston as they were unable to make themselves understood. Again, as always, the Lord undertook and in a comparatively short time they found the church here even though they did not even have the street address. They only had the Post Ofice Box Number, We greatly rejoiced when we saw them arrive but at the same time we felt disheartened because we had been unable to receive them at the airport.

Thursday night, January 30th, the convention came off to a lovely start. Brother and Sister Drost and Sister Sallie Lemons had arrived from Cali and Brother Thompson had arrived from Bucaramanga. Compo Elias Bernal had arrived from Medellin with his wife and baby. Eduardo Garcia arrived from Cali accompanied by one other Brother from that city and from the city of Bucaramanga about one-half dozen Colombian Christians had arrived. The long distance and high cost of travelling made it impossible for any more Colombian Christans to attend from other parts of Colombia. This country has been in a state of siege and civil war for years and it is very difficult to travel anywhere except by air. Consequently the greater part of the congregation consisted of our ordinary crowd. Brother William Drost brought the message fom the Word of the Lord after the different visitors had been introduced and each had given a short message of greeting. Brother and Sister Rolston spoke in English through interpreters. Everyone soon fell in love with them and they quickly learned to love the Colombian Christians.

Friday morning there was a prayer service started at 10 o'clock and Brother Eduardo Garcia was the speaker for that service. Brother Garcia is pastor of a large congregation in one of Brother Drost's many out stations. The congregation under Brother Garcia's care has learned not only to believe on Jesus Christ but also to suffer for his sake. Some of them have even died for their faith. It was very evident from Brother Garcia's message that it came straight from the heart with no sham or no hypocrisy. The afternoon service on Friday afternoon was in charge of a few believers and workers who had arrived from Luruaco. Sister Rose Steeves directed the service while each of the visitors from her part of the Lord's vineyard had their part. The evenng service started at 7 p.m. with one hour for young people under the direction of George Blanco from Bucaramanga. After a number of specials and worship in song by the congregation the meeting was turned over to Compo Elias Bernal from Medellin who brought us the message from the Word of the Lord.

Saturday morning Sister Sallie Lemons gave us an inspiring Bible Study dealing with the different offices of our Lord Jesus Christ as Prophet, Priest, and King. The afternoon service was in charge of the Colombian workers from Barranquilla while at the same time we missionaries were gathered in a different room discussing the problems and needs of the work in Colombia at this time. Saturday night Brother W. J. Rolston brought us a lovely message from the Word of God with Brother Drost acting as interpreter. The Lord blessed the preaching of his Word and several received the Baptism of the Holy Ghost that night.

Sunday morning Brother Thompson from Bucaramange was the speaker, feeding our souls with rich food from the twelve years ago. He has been actively engaged in the work of the Lord for approximately ten years and has been tried and tested under severe circumstances in persecution. The presence of the Lord was felt as we laid hands on him after the charge had been given by Brother Rolston and Brother Larsen acting as interpreter.

It seems as though the convention had just merely started and every one was wishing it could have gone on indefinitely. Due to our limited facilities for feeding and housing the people it was impossible to continue and much to everybody's regret it had to come to a close. We are praying and trusting the Lord to supply us with the necessary facilities in buildings and equipment to enable us to carry on for a whole week or more in the future. It would be such a blessing to the work.

Looking back we are filled with gratitude to our great God for the way he had blessed. One free will offering was received each day and in this manner nearly all expenses were met. A goodly number of meals were served each day and everyone was more than satisfied. We had hoped to have a visit from our good General Missionary Sec'y., Brother W. T. Stairs at the convention but due to his extended trips around the world in the interest of the

scriptures. In the same service little Luz Amparo, the infant daughter of Compo Elias Bernal and Gabriella Bernal was presented to the Lord by Brother W. J. Rolston.

In the afternoon service Brother Rolston brought us a message on Baptism with George Blanco assisting as interpreter. Eleven precious blood-bought Colombian believers were then immersed in the Name of Jesus for the remission of their sins. The Glory of the Lord came down as the gospel was obeyed by these eleven souls. The convention was now drawing to a close and soon the time arrived for the Sunday night service, the last one to be held. In this service Compo Elias Bernal the pastor of the church in Medellin, was ordained. Brother Bernal was saved as a very young boy about work it was impossible for him to be with us at this time. A letter from Brother Stairs to the convention was read on the first night and enjoyed by all. Brother Stairs has secured a large place in the hearts of all the Columbian Christians that came to know him during his two visits to this country in 1947 and 1950. As for we missionaries I guess it is an established fact that all the United Pentecostal Missionaries and many others as well esteem Brother Stairs very highly.

In closing we wish to thank all of our good supporters in the homeland for the backing of this work. We are looking forward to greater victories in the future and we do continue to earnestly covet your co-operation in prayer and in every way as the Lord shall lead.

Many individuals of our modern world highly esteem fame, popularity, and riches. Some even seek the last mentioned and place their trust in them, and even worship riches as if they were God. However, Christ asks, "What is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul . . . ?" (Matthew 16:26) What could a man gain at the end of life, if he did gain riches here, serve satan and go to hell? An individual cannot buy his way out of hell, if he goes there, even though he may have riches. Therefore, from this Scripture, we conclude that God estimates the worth of a soul far greater than the world.

Christ once spoke a parable to illustrate the worth of a soul and it is as follows: . . . What woman having ten pieces of silver, if she lose one piece, doth not light a candle, and sweep the house, and seek diligently till she find it? and when she hath found it, she calleth her friends and her neighbors together, saying, Rejoice with me; for I have found the piece which I had lost. Likewise, I say unto you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth" (Luke 15:8-10). In order to easily understand this parable, we must look at the custom of the land in which it was given. When a Bethlehein woman marries, her groom gives her a wedding gift of ten pieces of silver. This gift she wears on a chain hanging from her curious helmet, with a central pendant. The bride prizes this gift very highly and guards it carefully. She realizes that any carelessness on her part would be regarded by her husband as lack of affection and respect for him. He would very likely think she had purchased a lover with the lost money and would naturally divorce her.

These coins were held very sacred by the Jews and could not be taken for a debt. Women could use this money only when needed, as in case of need in widowhood. The lost coin of Christ's parable was probably one of this chain of ten pieces of silver. We can now understand the woman's concern and anxiety when she lost the piece of silver, and why she rejoiced when she found it. Remember, she called her neighbors to rejoice with her when she had found the coin. Christ gave this parable to illustrate the value of a human soul. In fact, the soul is so valuable in Christ's sight that He gave His life for it. His life was sacrificed that the souls of men might have access to life; "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). Yes, Christ loved us so much that He even died for us

while we were yet sinners. The only way that we can know the intrinsic value of a soul is to look at the great price that was paid for it at Calvary. God has such great love for lost humanity that there is joy in heaven over one sinner that repents and comes to Him.

When we get a vision of the actual value of a soul and the brevity of this life on earth, we will work zealously and unceasingly, day after day, and year after year, as we have never worked before to gather precious souls into the fold of our Master.

There is no trouble too great, no humiliation too deep, no suffering too severe, no love too strong, no labor too hard, no expense too large, but that it is worth every effort, if the effort is spent in winning a soul.

The psalmist David asked, "What is man, that thou art mindful of him..."? (Psalms 8:4) Now an unbelieving business man would have us believe that man is merely a means of gain; others would delight in having us believe that man is a mere creature that will die and live no more; the agnostic will try to tell us that man might have a soul, but that it cannot be known. However, we know that man became a living soul when God breathed the breath of life into him. We have apprehended God with our hearts, intellects, and souls, and know that He lives within our hearts. Furthermore we know that His word is infallible.

God honors an individual who appraises the worth of an immortal soul. One can even measure a nation by its evaluation of a soul. Germany was defeated because of her lacking sense of value for a soul. America has become great because she has highly valued the souls of men. However, it is evident that America is fast losing her vision and consequently losing favor with God.

You should not think too highly of yourselves. However, the danger does not lie in thinking too highly of yourselves, but in not thinking highly enough of your souls. Remember, your souls are worth more than the wealth of the whole world. Do not sell your souls for the temporal pleasures of this world which last for such a short time. It is obvious that many are selling their souls for cigarettes and alcoholic beverages which deaden their consciences like cocaine deadens the nerves.

We have seen God's estimation of the soul's worth, and if He, in His infinite omniscience, values a soul above worldly glory, honor, and fame, yes, even above the whole world, what value should we place upon a soul?

Holiness is God!!!!

Holiness is acquired by not just one voluntary act of obedience but a continuous walk and acts of obedience toward God. Holiness is a goal to which we aim by the Grace of God. Holiness is the presence of Faith.

Holiness has been misconstrued and misunderstood by many to be solely concerned with an outward appearance. It is true, one that possesses Holiness manifests it by character, conduct, and apparel but this is not its primary concern.

parel but this is not its primary concern. We must understand that God's religion is a religion of the heart! There is the inner man of the soul that must be governed by the law of Spirit unto life. Motivated by the Holy Ghost, disciplined by the Grace of God, adding strength to our Faith, manifests from an individual something more tangible than the materialism of this realm called time.

Another thing we must understand, that Holiness which will enable us to see God operates only in those things which are Holy. Namely: those that have repented, been baptized by immersion in Jesus' Name and have received the Holy Ghost speaking in tongues (Acts 2:4, 38; 8:12-17; 10:44-48; 19:1-6). Holiness is pure. Holiness makes one live right and enables him to eat the good of the land. When the law of the Spirit says pray he prays, read the Bible he reads, fast he fasts, be obedient he's obedient, because Holiness is present in that individual's life.

Apostle Paul said, "I beseech you therefore, brethren (born again people) by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Jesus said, "that whithersoever the body is, thither will the eagles be gathered together." (Lk. 17:37). He further states that, "when we have done that which is our duty to do, we are to say to ourselves — I am an unprofitable servant." (Lk. 17:10) In simple terms this means there is no stopping place for the child of God. Just because someone has repented, been baptized in Jesus' Name and baptized with the Holy Ghost, it is wrong to believe that is all he needs. That's just the beginning. All through the Bible the people of God have been commanded to go on, possess the land, destroy sin, purge out the enemy. According to some there is nothing to endure and no battles to be fought. The flesh has no part with Holiness only subjection. We can't talk like the world, we can't look like the world and we can't conduct ourselves like the world. We must be a separated people, a peculiar people, to know the depth of His riches. Again to saints, "Be not conformed to this world." (Rom. 12:2) I have been grieved many times while

speaking to some Pentecostal people of walking with God to note that Holiness is an abstract; consecration is an un-known because they fail to give heed to the Spirit of Grace (Heb. 10:29: Titus 2:11-13; Is. 30:21). If we want to attain unto Holiness; if we want to make heav-"Eternal Security" is WRONG! The en. Apostle Paul striving diligently to attain the highest degree of Holiness cried out, "Oh wretched man that I am, who shall deliver me from the body of this death? (Rom. 7:24). "For we know that the law is spiritual: (What law? Grace has be-come our law unto Faith unto Holiness) but I am carnal, sold under sin. For that which I do I allow not; but what I hate, that do I. If then I do that which I would not, I consent unto the law (Grace) that it is good." (Rom. 7:14-16). Grace does not condone, neither is it some soothing spirit or operation of God. To think this, is erroneous. But, so many do. The old proverb is right that states, "actions speak louder than words." Grace is a teacher (and sometimes the assignments rough), a disciplinary force, a governor, a ruler to whosoever will. As strong as sin can bind the human soul and drag it to the deep depths of shame, debauchery and hell, so ought we allow ourselves to be bound unto Grace and know the deepest depths of God's riches. No place to stop! No place to stop and say it is enough. Not until we behold the King in His beauty. (Isa. 33:17). We must go on and battle this warfare to the end (Heb. 3:14; Matt. 10:22; 24:13; Mk. 13:13: II Tim. 2:3-9; Heb. 12:7; James 5:11). Holiness is the highest attainment of mortal man and not the easiest thing to attain to. Be not weary in well doing; you shall reap if you faint not. (Gal. 6:9; II Thess. 3:13).

Shall there come a parting of the ways for God's children? The Rapture hasn't taken place. Nothing as yet in our generation has demanded a declaration. Oh yes, we've been asked who we are, what do we believe but no final declaration. Whether you or I realize it, we are living in the midst of a crisis. The National Council of Churches have counselled with the products of a Laodician spirit and age; they have counselled with hell and are using one of the greatest instruments of a diabolical contrivance called the "New Revised Version" of the Bible. Their mission is to make a "super church", to dominate all Protestanism. (Christian Life). This program is not based on the Holy Scriptures and neither is it Godordained. What are they doing? Right under our noses they are denying Jesus' Virgin Birth, His deity, the supernatural. They discount our experience. Who does? Cigar smoking, short wearing, beer drink-ing, communist influenced modernists! What experience have we had that we can say nothing? This is a challenge. It is time for a declaration. Let the world know that we're Jesus' Name, One God people. We believe in the supernatural. Prayerless preaching and studyless sermons should not be. We'll stand with the King James Version until Jesus comes.

A life of Holiness is pure and clean and obedient to the cause of Christ — His Gospel. Corruption grasps everything material and even our bodies return to the dust from whence they came, but, by the power of His Holiness in our bodies, we shall see God. Holiness exemplifies God!!

too (as well as all others) were baptized in the NAME of Jesus. For he said, (1 Cor. 15:1-4), "Moreover, brethren, I declare unto you the gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand; by which also ye are saved, if ye keep in memory what I preached unto you (See Acts 19:1-6), unless ye have believed in vain. For I delivered unto you first of all THAT WHICH I ALSO RECEIVED (Acts 22:16). how that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures." He asks them in another place, (1 Cor. 1:13), "Is Christ divided? was Paul crucified for you? or were ye baptized in the name of Paul?" Who was crucified for the Corinthians? JESUS CHRIST! Into whose NAME were they baptized? JESUS CHRIST! the context will permit no other answer, for unless they were baptized in the NAME of Jesus, his statement would have no meaning whatsoever.

g. The Romans, Galatians, Colossians, and others. It is needless to go into detail showing all these were baptized in the NAME of Jesus, for such statements as we read as follows, will suffice: "Bap-tized into Jesus Christ," "buried with HIM in baptism," "baptized into HIS death," "planted together in the likeness of HIS DEATH." (Rom. 6:3-5; Gal. 3:27; Col. 2:12).

Let us remember, to follow the Lord JESUS in obeying His Great Commission, we MUST follow those that heard Him. Paul said (to the Thessalonians): "And ye became followers of US, and the Lord." (1 Thess. 1:6).

The Apostle Peter gave us the following admonition a short time before his execution thirty-three years after he had preached on the Day of Pentecost, "Reloved, I now write unto you; in both which I stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance: that ye may be mindful of the words which were spoken before by the holy prophets, and of the COMMANDMENT OF US (Acts 2:38) THE APOSTLES OF THE LORD AND SAVIOUR." (2 Peter 3:1, 2).

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On The Increase —

A record 52,000,000 cars, trucks, and busses traveled the highways last year, burning up a record 38,300,000,000 gallons of gasoline and Diesel oil, the Public Roads Bureau reported.

Motor vehicle registrations for 1951 shot up 2,750,000 above those of 1950, a rise of 5.6 per cent, the bureau said.

California, with 4,900,000, led all other states in number of vehicles registered. New York State was second with 3,900,000.

Religion At The Bottom —

Corporations gave more than \$300,000,-000 to charity in 1951, according to the Russell Sage Foundation. Gifts by corporations rose from \$30,000,000 in 1936 to more than \$200,000,000 every year since 1944, making corporations prominent philanthropists. Answers to a questionnaire sent out by the foundation indicated that 36 per cent of the contributions went to Community Chest and 8 per cent to other welfare agencies. Health accounted for 27 per cent of corporate giving; education, 21 per cent; and religious agencies, 4 per cent.

Let's Build More —

An acute shortage of churches exists in the United States today, according to the executive vice-president of the Board of Home Missions of the Congregational Church. Said Dr. Truman B. Douglass in a recent speech quoted by United Press: "More people in America are today beyond the reach of existing churches than ever before. There are more clearly definable communities and neighborhoods which are without churches than at any time since the nation was founded." This shortage, he pointed out, was, partly attributable to the growth in population and migration to newly settled communities.

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
