

WELCOME! Welcome to our church. Welcome to our city. Welcome to our country. And why not? Isn't it inevitably true that every business is interested primarily in its own growth and progress? Isn't the enlist-

ment of men and women the greatest single factor in the promotion of armies and of every private enterprise? Can we not rightfully say that the number one ambition of continents, countries, provinces, states, and individual leaders (both sectarian and religious) is to gain prominence among their fellows? The act of preferring one another may work and is commonly practiced within the bounds of one's own endeavor, but this behavior is not prevalent when it comes to the various differences that arise when a person feels that his product or religion is of extreme value. In this sense no one caters to be the subordinate. And rightly so, and for this reason the welcome sign is conspicuously displayed. This sign is usually hung

on the door or gate to convey a message . . . "Make yourself at home." But many times there is a different definition to the word, welcome. I speak in reference to the many denominations and churches that exist in our world today. The welcome sign on a church door generally means . . . come in and help us to promote our program. And by continual attendance and following that particular faith you will, like Peter the Apostle, be considered one of them even though you try to deny the fact.

Man, with his intelligence and ability to do many things, is an absolute necessity to growth both in the materialistic and spiritual realm. It is reasonably sure that men must work with men in order to strengthen their hands for the tasks they have selected whether good or evil. In this sense God is none otherwise minded. His eye is upon man, and His work is among men. The inhabitants of His church are unquestionably made up of humanity. And since all men are interested in other men to aid their own cause, the false church has its welcome sign displayed as well as the true church. Some will even dare to tear down the good to bolster the evil. Some do not care that others lose if it means their gain. A loss by some is generally going to mean a gain for others, for humanity will find lodging somewhere and will seek the welcome sign at someone's gate. To belong to something is the height of man's ambition. The only thing that matters to the majority is whether he belongs, and not so much attention is paid to that of which he is a part.

If he is welcome he feels fairly secure, and it becomes rather difficult to persuade him that he is choosing the wrong course. His unintelligent decision leaves us with one conclusion . . . he doesn't know where he wants to go so it is impossible to tell him which is the best road to follow.

Some Distinguishing Marks of True Greatness

TEXT: EPHESIANS 4:13-Unto the Measure of the Stature of the Fulness of Christ.

SPEAKING of Ideals, in a recent issue of a leading Farm Journal, the Editor gave the following quotation. It has been said that ideals are like the stars that guide the mariner. He can never expect to reach them, but in striving toward them he does travel in safety, and comes at last to his desired haven."

Doubtless, as every Christian could testify, this is true. It may be that we shall never reach, at least in this world, the ultimate of our spiritual and moral ideals—that fulness of perfection—that our spiritual eyes have at times glimpsed. Yet in fixing our unswerving gaze on their guiding light, we grow in knowledge and grace, in Christian maturity, and avoid many of the pitfalls that would otherwise await our unsuspecting step.

IDEALS OF CHRISTIAN GREATNESS AND CONDUCT

Moral perfection and human greatness are not necessarily measured by a man's wealth, his social

position, or even his reputation in a community or given sphere of endeavor. Many of the noblest and finest characters ever produced on this planet, were men who like their ideal and master, Jesus of Nazareth, made themselves of no reputation. Giants morally, spiritually and even in godly wisdom, yet paupers as far as earth's riches and renown were concerned. They were wealthy in those intangibles of which silver and gold are poor sub-

stitutes, namely: character; integrity; peace of mind;

the blessing of a clean conscience; the satisfying sense of noble and worthwhile achievement.

If in quest for a yard stick by which human greatness and moral character could effectively be measured, perhaps no set of propositions could be devised, no ideals established, that would be more searching or surer, than those set forth as follows.

First . . . the reactions of a man toward success. Or his ability to maintain modesty and humility in victory. Humility is a great ideal.

Second . . . the reactions of a man toward defeat. The ability to accept defeat gracefully, with courage and fortitude.


Third... one's conduct toward his enemies. Or the ability to retain a generous, manly, Christly attitude toward those who oppose us, use us despitefully, and are our enemies.

SUCCESS A DEADLY SNARE

According to an ancient proverb, "Whom the gods would destroy, they first make mad." A vain, haughty, exalted spirit is a deadly form of madness. A clutching satanic octopus, nurtured in the bosom of vanity and earthly pride, from whose deadly tentacles few victims are ever able to extricate themselves. Not every man can ascend the fiery heights of even modest success and remain unscathed. Success does either one of two things. "It re-

veals and enhances those qualities of humility characteristic of true greatness, or else it exposes the sordid meanness, the innate tyranny of a little man, stretched beyond measure, occupying a position for which his moral, spiritual and even mental constitution disqualifies him."

Certainly every channel of religious and spiritual endeavor, is filled with sunken derelicts, men who



could not retain their equilibrium, after having tasted the heady wine of success and power.

DEFEAT-THE TESTING GROUND FOR THE SOUL

But if success numbers her victims in the thousands, defeat has slain her tens of thousands. Success is the mountain top. Defeat is the valley, where the shadows lurk. Success is the positive. Defeat is the negative. Both are equally dangerous to the Christian, and doubly dangerous to the minister. Not every time does the human spirit possess the flexibility, the resiliency, the dogged determination to rebound in the face of bitter and utter defeat. Like a canker it tarnishes the gold of character, saps spiritual vitality, destroys initiative, warps the vision, leaving a bitter, cynical, disillusioned spirit, void of sound judgment.

One close student of human nature came up with this thought-provoking statement. He said, "A lot more work would be done in this world for Christ, if it didn't matter who received the credit."

Perhaps this is the reason why overmuch success and bitter defeat deal us such stunning blows. Our lives are governed too much by the opinions of others. The desire for greatness, for personal honor, a name, a reputation, far exceeds and many times overshadows our desire to please and honor Christ. Perhaps here lies the reason God does not crown much of our effort with success. A ministry with signs following, healing, the salvation of souls, come only by faith in God; by believing Him. Jesus said, (John 5:44) "How can ye believe which receive honor one of another, and seek not the honor that cometh from God only?"

CONDUCT TOWARDS ONE'S ENEMIES

Contrary to the psychology of the age, the golden rule is not a meaningless platitude, obsolete, outmoded and practiced only by a gullible, naive people. Unregenerate humanity is fickle. To them customs, and taste, rules of conduct, philosophies and political thought and even religion is something that out of necessity, must be revised with the passing seasons. But not so in the eyes of God. The golden rule is the very essence of God's moral law, ante-dating even creation, and is not subject to the eroding processes of time.

Wise and thoughtful men of all ages have discovered that to practice the golden rule is not a sacrifice, but rather, an investment, from which rich dividends may be reaped by those who follow the spirit of its teachings.

Jesus Christ, the greatest teacher of all times, uttered this bit of practical philosophy. He said, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you. Bless them that curse you, pray for them which despitefully use you. And as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise.

Biblical, as well as secular history, provides abundant proof that great men of all ages have followed the spirit of this teaching.

When historians, many years after the death of U.S. Grant, began the task of writing a biography of this man who played such a remarkable role in the

war between the states, few virtues could be found that would ascribe to him true greatness. Certainly, little could be found that would elevate him to a pedestal whereby youth of succeeding generations could pattern. Grant was a drunkard. Mentally he was a plodder. Slow, taciturn, slovenly in dress, he possessed little imagination. His campaigns, though victorious, could not in any sense of the word be termed brilliant. With dogged, ruthless determination, backed by a mighty juggernaut of flesh and steel and fire, he crushed a starved and weakened foe before him.

Even as president, his administration was tainted with corruption. Yet when the historians faced the final decision of elevating him to the halls of greatness and fame, along with such men as Washington, and Franklin and Lincoln, without hesitation they wrote, "Grant is a Great Man."

It is indeed passing strange, yet history records the facts. The one thing above all others that balanced the scales in his favor was not his reputation as a military hero. Neither was it his administration while President of the United States; nor was it his personal life as a private citizen. But the real mark of true greatness was Grant's sincere, courteous, gentlemanly conduct toward his defeated foeman—Robert E. Leewhen that great man came to him in defeat, asking for terms of surrender. Only great men, they said, could show such generosity to his foes.

Turning again to the Holy Writ, let us, for just a moment, look at David, the shepherd king, from the Judean hills. Of no other man has God ever spoken as he speaks of David. He said, "I have found in David a man after my own heart.

This man David, possessed a strange, complex, many-sided character. Savage in battle, ruthless to the point of extermination, he seemed at times utterly void of mercy. But David possessed another spirit. When the battle was over and the fires of mortal combat had died from his soul, he was as gentle and considerate as a mother with her suckling child. He was a man with a heart. A man of principle. He wept with the sorrowing, fasted with the oppressed, defended the weak. He sought for justice and fairness and equity.

But to receive a real insight into the soul and mind of this man, one must weigh David's conduct toward Saul, his mortal enemy. Because of rebellion, God had rejected Saul as king, and in his stead, anointed David. Perhaps it would be well to pause and note, that though David was chosen to be king in Saul's stead, yet never one time does he seek to take things in his own hands and depose Saul, or usurp the throne by violence and under-mining. He was willing to abide God's time for his inauguration.

But the acid test of character and true greatness finally comes to David. Finding Saul asleep, he comes with Abishai, and stands looking down at the sleeping, prostrate form of his helpless foe.

The voice of Abishai, which is the voice of carnal. selfish, human reasoning, breaks the silence. God hath

Second Annual Sheaves for Christ Day May 23, 1954

"Sheaves for Christ," is the international program of the Pentecostal Conquerors. It began one year ago, its first year of operation in 1953. This is its second year.

It is youth on the march! It is the program of united effort and endeavor in which every Conqueror can clasp hands with another around the world in this great fellowship of ours. We are united in fervent desire to do something. "Sheaves for Christ" is the avenue of this cooperative service; it is the tool that each of us can use and when used effectively, zealously, and devotedly, it will actually mean "sheaves for Christ," souls won for our Lord and Master.

PROJECTS IN '54

1. At home. The General Conquerors pledged \$2500 to buy the neon sign which you see in the accompanying picture for the International Headquarters. Also the letters across the beautiful edifice reading, UNITED PENTECOSTAL CHURCH. These have been purchased and put up on our

headquarters as you can see, but "Sheaves for Christ," in '54 must raise the money for the project. A nice plaque will be placed inside the building to tell all that this sign is a work of the youth.

- 2. Abroad. The project to provide equipment for our missionaries in '54 is to buy a truck for Brother and Sister Tolstad, in Uruguay. These missionaries are Pentecostal Conquerors who are working effectively in this land to the south of us.
- 3. To further the work of the Pentecostal Conquerors. Slogan: "Ten Thousand or More in Fifty Four."

Yes, our minimum goal and need is \$10,000 this year.

The month of May will be "Sheaves for Christ" month. International Sheaves for Christ day will be observed around the world on May 23, 1954. We hope many of the Conquerors in the missionary fields will sponger a special youth day on May 23. Jamaica joined us last year.

We invite every United Pentecostal Church to join in this great world-wide youth day. Emphasize the importance of youth in your local church.

Offerings: We have set our aim for every local group to raise at least \$1.00 per enrolled Conqueror. The offering is to be taken at the time and by the method which the local youth group with its pastor's consent feels most effective. If at all possible take the offering on May 23, but if such is not possible take your "Sheaves for Christ" offering as near to the above date as convenient, perhaps on the youth night of the church.

Competition: The General Conquerors' Committee in session at St. Louis last September formed a plan by which individual districts



will be placed in competition with other districts of similar size. This competition will be lively and quite stiff, and it will be interesting to find out at this General Conference which districts come out on top. The districts are challenging each other as follows:

Without God

A news item just received here in the news room tells us that all the rulers of the entire world will meet in a great camp meeting just as soon as time and place can be arranged. In six thousand years of recorded history, there has never before been a night like this. The entire world is at rest, it breathes easily, it is happy with the one true God at the Helm.

1. STARK REALITY

Please allow me the chance to let my imagination find its way to print in order to contrast a world with God to a world without God. The above imagined account would not be a drop in the bucket to the actual joy and glory if this world would receive God. Re-

luctantly we must leave our wishful thinking, and come back down to the real earth and to the hard facts.

"The whole world lieth in wickedness." I John 5:19.


"This know also that in the last days perilous times shall come. But evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived." II Tim. 3:1;13. Eph. 2:12, "... without God in the world." This is the tragic reality. The inhabitants of this planet are generally speaking, "without God in the world."

2. GOD BELONGS IN THE WORLD.

A person without education is illiterate, a child without proper mentality may be an idiot, a person without use of his limbs is a cripple, the person confined to his bed is an invalid.

The nation without food is in a famine, the country without rain is in a drouth, the crop without cultivation is a failure.

The continent without civilization is heathen, the nation without government is anarchy, the nation

without law is bedlam, the country without jobs is depression. When any of the above named things are missing, all are concerned, for they are necessary. But one thing is more needful than all: God. A world without God is hopeless, doomed.

These moderns have a lot of things that they can't

do without. How would we live without automobiles, telephones, telegraph, washing machines, radios, schools, colleges, etc. On and on the list would go, things we cannot live without. However, it seems convenient for millions to live without God, and the church, and the Bible. If anything goes, it is God. When expenses get heavy, God is cut off the list before anything else. The tithe is the first thing to be dropped.

America is bountiful. She is not a "without or havenot" nation. In this wonderful land of ours we only
have 6 percent of the world's population, but we have
70 percent of the world's automobiles, 50 percent of
its telephones, 45 percent of all the radios, 34 percent
of all the railways. America uses for its conveniences,
56 percent of all the world's silk, 53 percent of all the
coffee, 51 percent of all the rubber. America produces
for its convenience 62 percent of all the oil, 53 percent
of the corn, 50 percent of the cotton, 34 percent
of all the coal, 32 percent of all the copper, 30 percent
of all the iron. Rich America!

But we are miserably poor—twenty million young people under 21 are without religious training, only 15 percent of young people under 21 attend Sunday School, only 2 percent are in Sunday night service, while 60 percent attend the movies. The ratio of women drinkers to men in 1947 was 1 to 2. One third of our marriages end in divorce. Sixty percent of our population over 15 years old drinks alcoholic beverages. The liquor bill in America for a recent year was \$8,700,000,000, over 8 times that given to all churches. Juvenile delinquency is on a rapid increase, teen-age gangs fill our cities. Immorality, sex, and crime are the rule and not the exception in this sinful age. The thought life of the country is fed on indecency, empty wise-cracking, and foolish jesting.

We are not a nation without churches, but most of them are empty except on Sunday morning for an hour or so; we are not a nation without religion, but we worship with a form unknown to the Bible and believe doctrines that were never heard of between the lids of the scriptures. The 20th century has produced a religion that thrives on lifeless worship, spiritless services, spineless preachers, and sin-loving congregations.

God belongs in America. There should be a place for Him. The school system should have a place for God, the church should have a place for Him, the government should have a place for Him, from the precinct to the capital. He is an absolute necessity if this nation is to survive! Better to be without riches than without God; to be without luxuries than without God.

3. THE INDIVIDUAL HAS A PLACE FOR GOD.

Each one of us has a mind with which to learn, an intelligence with which to think, eyes to observe, ears to hear, a heart to love, and emotions to feel, but we also have a soul with which to worship.

It is an unbalanced life that sees that proper food

is received, proper rest is secured, a good education is obtained, and then leaves the spiritual nature empty and without its God. He who lives and dies without God has missed life's greatest possession. There is a place in that life that has never been filled. We have been created with a place within us for the God of heaven to dwell. We are tabernacles, and if God does not abide there they are desolate tabernacles, empty lives, wasted souls.

It is God that makes the difference. He balances the scale from defeat to success. Samson with God could kill 1,000 Philistines by himself, he could carry the gates of a city, but without God a little Philistine lad could hold him. Judges 16:26.

King Saul with God could prophesy, and rule a kingdom wisely, but without God he must seek out a banished witch for advice. Solomon with God can be the world's wisest man, without God become its greatest fool. Judas with Christ can be the trusted apostle, the treasurer; without Christ he becomes the miserable wretch who throws earth's mocking gains away, and dies in deepest disgrace.

At Princeton there is a tradition about Aaron Burr; how one night, when the college was shaken by a revival, he shut himself in his room, saying that before the night was over he would decide the matter of his relationship to God. Late at night the students living near him heard his shutters thrown open, and a loud exclamation, "Good-by God." Aaron Burr was destined to live one of the most lonely and friendless of lives. Though the brightest student ever to study at Princeton, and though he rose to the vice-presidency of the United States, his life was to be marked by tragedy, sorrow, distrust, and disgrace. Could it be that it was because he said, "Good-by God"?

Young people, we must keep God in our lives. Satan's temptations are clever and strong, but we cannot live happily without God. God belongs in your life. Let's keep him there.

No other person should have to live without God and die without hope. We have a responsibility as young people to reach out with truth and bring this knowledge to those who are without. Sheaves for Christ is one way by which we can help in the spread of the gospel of light and hope. Do your best for Sheaves for Christ. Let us pray that it will be an instrument to bring Him to those "having no hope, and without God in the world."

Our Altar Outside The Camp

On an ash heap outside the boundaries of the camp of Israel there were burned, upon certain occasions, the bodies of innocent animals who were victims of the stringent requirements of the law. This was the procedure in the case of the sin-offering for the priest and also the sin-offering for the people in the congregation of Israel. Neither the priest nor the people had a right to partake of the flesh of these particular offerings. Who did have access? Dogs, no doubt, who always eke out an existence on the outskirts of humanity. Or, perhaps, some hungry wayfarer who would not be welcome and who had no rights or privileges within the camp of Israel might find enough for a meal among the smouldering remains of a burnt animal.

It is to this "altar outside the camp" which the writer of Hebrews refers when he says "We have an altar, whereof they have no right to eat which serve the tabernacle. For the bodies of those beasts, whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest for sin, are burned without the camp."

This statement is found in the last chapter of the book of Hebrews. After comparing the old and new covenants and constantly emphasizing the greater glory of the new; after showing the real counterpart of the fittings and service of the tabernacle which were only types and shadows, this one last all-inclusive statement shows that the sacrifice of Calvary has gone beyond the limits of the camp of Israel and includes all those outside who will participate. It re-emphasizes the extremity of the Grace of God.

When Jesus was on earth, he repeatedly upset the pre-conceived notions of the Pharisees. He ate with publicans and sinners; He ate with unwashen hands; He healed people and plucked corn on the Sabbath; He extended mercy to the woman taken in the act of adultery; He asked a drink of the woman of Samaria at Jacob's well; He called Zaccheus down out of the tree; He

granted the request of the woman who was a Gentile "dog" by delivering her daughter from the power of Satan, even though the disciples advised Him to send her away; He showed the publican to be justified and the Pharisee to be unjustified when they both went up to the temple to pray; He told the Pharisees that after

they had compassed land and sea to make a proselyte, they had made him two-fold more the child of hell than they! Strong speech!

Actually the whole ministry of Jesus consisted of one invitation after another for the aliens and strangers from the commonwealth of Israel to come and partake of the "lamb slain from before the foundation of the world," which was soon to be offered upon the "altar outside the camp." And the Pharisees did not like it. They kept seeking out technicalities of the law and traditions of the elders to try to make a case against Jesus but His good news of Grace went deeper, farther, and included all. Their pet doctrines made up an ecclesiastical system which excluded all but a few.

The principle which held these hard-hearted Pharisees in its grip, was their reliance on a system of theology. They did certain acts of piety. They stood in the market place and made long prayers. They displayed their phylacteries prominently. They adhered to the traditions of men. They washed their hands before they

ate. But their whole philosophy barred the door to all except those who by lineage were born into their number. They thought that since they were the ones who did the service of the tabernacle, that they had the blessing. They could not grasp the idea of Grace. Everything Jesus did was wrong because it did not measure up to

their standards. They did not know the meaning of the "altar outside the camp" where Aaron and his sons could not partake. They forgot that just because no Israelite had tasted the meat from that foreign altar, it had not necessarily gone uneaten.

Is it possible that such a principle can be operating among us? There is much evidence that it can and is. Those who have tasted the "powers of the world to come" and then seek to be perfected by the works of the flesh, those who are "born from above" and then expect to grow by nourishment supplied from "below," have fallen into a kinship with the Pharisee. This is extremely dangerous and damaging both to them and to the spread of the Gospel. In His rebuke of the Pharisees, Jesus told them they were shutting up the kingdom of heaven against men by not entering themselves and because they were standing in the "lobby," so to speak, they were not allowing others to go through. So the horrible aspect of this condition was the effect it has on others. From the day of Pentecost until the present, this problem of "Phariseeism" has arisen again and again.

Even Peter, to whom the Lord had given the keys to the kingdom of God, almost failed to unlock all the doors into that kingdom by his compromise with the tradition of the elders. When he received a vision sent from heaven to enlighten him, he said that he would not eat the common or unclean, but the Lord said that anything which He had cleansed was not common or unclean. This almost amounted to an argument between the Lord and Peter as to whether or not the Gentiles were to be admitted to the kingdom. In spite of this vision, Peter again became a victim of another attack of "Phariseeism." He had been at Antioch ministering. In the course of his ministry he had occasion to eat with Gentile saints. But one day certain Hebrew saints came up from Jerusalem. Peter immediately snubbed the very ones with whom he had been enjoying such good fellowship! Paul was there and withstood Peter "to his face, because he was to be blamed!"

It took a council in the city of Jerusalem to settle the dispute which had arisen regarding the Pharisees contention that all should be circumcised and keep the law of Moses. There, in the shadow of the upper room where the Holy Ghost had not long ago been poured out, men were still unable to fathom the Grace of God. They thought that the Gospel was in addition to the law rather than superceding it. But Grace and law do not mix more than oil and water. They only stay mixed while you stir but it doesn't keep.

We cannot partake of law and Grace. We cannot eat at the altar in the tabernacle and still retain our right to eat at the "altar outside the camp." In His letters to the Galatians and Colossians, Paul comes up against this problem again. He told the Galatians they were foolish because they had received the Spirit and worked miracles by the "hearing of faith," and then they turned right around and sought to make themselves perfect by the works of the law. He told them Christ had become of no effect and they were

fallen from Grace. In Colossians he pointed out that if the constraint to holy living was merely adherence to a code of behavior, rather than a result of the operation of the Spirit of Grace, then they were no different than men in the world.

But how does this attitude express itself today? In the same way as it did then. It is easier for the flesh to justify itself by conformance to a set of rules than to "die daily" and be moved by the power of God. The significant feature of Pentecost was the manifestation of the Spirit of God in "vessels of mercy."

It is easier to say, "I don't smoke, I don't drink, I don't go to shows, I don't listen to the radio, I don't read newspapers, I don't wear lipstick" than it is to be able to honestly say "I do allow the power of God to be manifested in my body." Our bodies are the temple of the Holy Ghost. God receives glory only as he is permitted to glorify Himself. He receives no glory if we neglect the very essence of our salvation. It is easier to commend ourselves than to be commended by the Lord. But it is much more important that the dead men's bones within the sepulchre be resurrected than it is that the outside of the sepulchre be whitewashed just to make it look good. Jesus told these same Pharisees in one place, "Ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, faith; these ought ye to have done and not to leave the other undone." There is an acute danger of becoming a "Pentecostal Pharisee." But the moment this happens, we have no more right to the "altar outside the camp." It is impossible for us to establish our own righteousness. If we attempt to do so, the Spirit of God departs because no flesh is allowed to glory in His pres-

When we stop eating at the "altar outside the camp," we fall from Grace. If we become "Pharisees" we are no longer saints. If we become a sect, we are no longer the body of Christ. If we become a cult, we are no longer the Bride. If we go back and become priests after the order of Aaron, we cannot become a holy, royal priesthood after the order of Melchizedek. If we become occupied with the service of meats in the tabernacle, we cannot eat of the one complete, final, Sin-Offering, Jesus Christ. None of the sacrifices offered in the tabernacle ever made the comers thereunto perfect, but the bringing in of a lively hope did. Because our sacrifice rose from the dead! Hallelujah! Our place of blessing both to ourselves and to the world, is to eat the flesh and drink the blood of the one who was offered on the "altar outside the camp."

MOUNTAINS TO CONQUER FOR PENTECOSTAL CONQUERORS

Romans 8:37 — ". . . we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us."

Our nation's headlines a few months ago carried the news "Mt. Everest has been conquered." The world's highest mountain peak at last was scaled and two stronghearted young men became famous overnight because they accomplished the seemingly impossible. The world admired the courage of these young men who had braved the elements and the obstacles that made mountain climbing hazardous.

But while the world was cheering the conquering of Mt. Everest, there were young people in various parts of the world conquering spiritual barriers and side-stepping the snares of Satan. These victories are not being proclaimed by the newspapers but the angels in Heaven are made to rejoice when a young man or woman defies their own carnal nature and decides to let Christ be *first* in their life.

MT. SEPARATION:

Repentance, water baptism in Jesus' Name followed by the infilling of the Holy Ghest finds us climbing a mountain we have not scaled in life before, a mountain that has frightened many young Christians, but II Corinthians 6:17 instructs us "to come out from among them and be ye separate."

The three Hebrew children and Daniel approached this while captive in Babylon

but we read that they did not partake of the diet the King had provided for them because they were Israelites, or children of God, and we as God's children, cannot partake of the menu of Satan. We find this decision did not affect the wisdom or physical stature of these young men; quite the contrary, after they had separated themselves from the people of Babylon by not defiling themselves with the King's meat, the King said (Note, the King of Babylon) that the Hebrew boys were ten times better in wisdom and understanding than all the magicians and astrologers in his realm. They were conquering Mt. Separation.

Young people today find themselves scaling Mt. Separation by being in the world but not of the world; this decision does not cost us mental or physical handicaps

and not even popularity if we are desiring Christian popularity.

Recently an insurance company in one of our Southern States promoted a popularity contest among its employees. When the votes were tallied, the winner was a Holy Ghost filled, modestly dressed, Christian-looking, Pentecostal Conqueror. The employees saw something different in her character . . . what was it? She had learned the value of climbing Mt. Separation.

MT. CONSECRATION:

Mountain climbing is not always the task of climbing up. Some times to reach higher peaks we must cross deep gorges but we must remember the higher the climb, the deeper the gorges become; therefore, the word of God tells us there are deeper depths and higher heights we can attain in our Christian experience.

Romans 12:1 instructs us "to present our bodies a

living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." We must be scaling *Mt. Consecration* when Jesus comes, or die climbing.


Peter was reminded of his failing to conquer Mt. Consecration by the crowing of a rooster . . . the Apostle Paul found the foot of Mt. Consecration on the road to Damascus . . . the rich young ruler did not want to sacrifice the weights that would hinder him from climbing

... yet Zacchaeus started conquering the Mt. while sliding down a sycamore tree ... the publican praying in the temple, found the foothold that led to Mt. Consecration while smiting his breast and confessing to God the sin in his life, although the Pharisee, with the vain prayer, gained no altitude. The higher one climbs up Mt. Consecration, the more one appreciates Mt. Calvary!!!

MT. DETERMINATION:

This mountain has caused many young Christians to slow down in their climbing to higher heights in God, but we must decide not only to conquer this mountain ourselves but win some helpers to go along.

A young man, while attending high school, was



faced with the opportunity to write an essay on "Religion" in his English class. He chose for his topic,

"Pentecost" and later gave the essay orally before the class. His school friends and teacher heard the true plan of Salvation from the lips of a Determined Pentecostal Conqueror. A few years later one of his best friends walked down to the altar and gave his life to Jesus. Today this friend is in the United States Army and filled with the Holy Ghost, Determined to conquer Mountains in his own life.

II Chronicles 2:1 reads, "And Solomon determined to build an house for the name of the Lord, and an house for his kingdom." We will notice in verse 2 that Solomon had men for every type of work to be done, "...three-score and ten thousand men to bear burdens, and four-score thousand to hew in the mountain, and three thousand and six hundred to oversee them."

King Solomon must have chosen strong, able-bodied young men to hew in the mountain, but he had determined that the house of God must be built. We, as Conquerors, must condition ourselves through prayer and fasting so as to withstand the rugged challenge that *Mt. Determination* provides. If that be true, let Him find us conquering Mt. Separation, living a separated life, or praying at the altars in the lofty heights of Mt. Consecration and grasping for another hold to boost ourselves toward the summit of Mt. Determination.

delivered thine enemy into thine hand this day. Now therefore let me smite him.

How much did the throne mean to David? How much did life itself mean to David? When David speaks, he speaks with the voice of one who had gone down into the depths of his own soul, weighed his thoughts, his motives, his desires, on the eternal scales of justice, and came up with the answer. He says, Destroy him not. Who can stretch forth his hand against the Lord's anointed and be guiltless. The throne of Israel, physical well-being, even life itself did not mean enough to David, for him to stretch out his hand against the Lord's anointed. No wonder God could say, I have found in David a man after my own heart.

Though David, at an earlier time, did clip or cut off the skirt or garment of Saul, yet remorse smote him, and he repented before the Lord. Sad to say, but one of the tragedies of the day, (and I speak in a figurative sense) is that garment clipping has become almost a sport and a past-time. We clip the garments of our brother's character, his good name, his reputation. We deride and laugh at his efforts for the Lord. We seek to leave him without a covering, that we might gratify our own selfish desires, and cover the feelings of insecurity and mediocrity we feel in our own soul. God pity our littleness of soul and meanness of character. God have mercy on us, when we so callously and without regard for God, or our brother's feelings, prostitute the high offices of the ministry. One of the most insecure and dangerous places in the world for one to build spiritually, is on the ruins of other men's characters, reputation and good name, which we ourselves, by our selfish and insidious gossip and propaganda helped destroy. Have we no mercy? Have we no bowels of compassion? Have we no pity? Is all the milk of human kindness curdled in our bosoms, that like the sons of Jacob, we could look without feeling upon the agony of our brother's sout, and reject all his entreaty? May our lives be governed by higher ideals than selfishness. Let us reach for the stars.

I am filled with heartfelt thanks to the one and only Lord.

When I was going thru a certain deep trial, I considered myself to be the most sorry person in the whole world, however, I realize now that I was mistaken in my thinking. If God had existed, I hated and rebelled against Him for permitting this heartbreaking trial to befall me. I became irritable and as a means of escape I played on my favorite musical instrument and went to theaters. Shortly after that, my parents and relatives forced me to get married to a man whom I did not love. My hatred for God

and my husband grew daily and I soon became ill with a lymph ailment from which I suffered for the following nine years. I would not believe in God even if I died. But God permitted a big problem to come upon me and broke down my stubborn, rebellious heart. It was through my husband's degradation. When I was confined on my sickbed, I was told by someone that he had accumulated a debt of several hundred thousand yen. At this time for the first time in my life, I awoke to the fact that I wanted to save my husbard-restore unto my children a good father, even if I died. At this time my husband went with another woman. I knew he was not to blame. In reality I was to blame by my acting so I asked him to forgive me for my past attitude and deeds. We decided to start life anew with the children as the center of our lives. Half a year passed but my husband was still unsettled and unfaithful, but I felt I was responsible.

Finally, God knowing my wretched condition, gave me a great teacher, Rev. Muri. He taught me I needed the Holy Ghost, this is very important. At that time I was so nervous and frantic I was far from normal frame of mind. But, Hallelujah, the Lord gave me the promised Holy Ghost on February 22, 1950 at 3:30 p.m.

When God spoke through my lips in spiritual tongues, I realized

My older sister's family, and younger sister's family and friends were saved successively.

I have taken many people to Bro. Muri and there was taught God's plan of the ages. So gradually I realized how foolish I was to be in pains for the small things of this world and to murmur against God.

Three years have passed since I was saved. Many things have happened, but I have a word of thanks for all things. Jesus has been very patient with me all these long years.

Paul said I am the chiefest of sinners. The more I know God, the more I see the foolishness of my heart and uncleanness. Live or die I wish Jesus to be ever mine.

Today, my husband returned completely a good man. My family which Satan attempted to destroy are all saved. My home has been completely changed by Jesus. And my husband's business has been blessed.

From Colombia

April 2, 1954

Dear Brother Stairs:

It's been a long time since I've written you and I haven't even acknowledged any checks for some time. I've been letting office work "slide by" in an effort to be out among the people more in these days, thinking it was my last chance.

However, I haven't done anything toward getting my papers ready. Every time I have tried to do so it has been like in a dream when you try to get ready to go somewhere and never get it done.

Last night I read in the paper about the debates that have been going on over the proposed reform of the constitution that would do away with the clauses on religious liberty and liberty of conscience. I don't think there has been any congress for years but in the council or commission named to consider the proposition the liberals took a stand in favor of protestantism and religious liberty but the conservatives backed by the Church opposed it and the vote ended 8 to 6 to change the constitution. This will cut Protestantism down to mere "tolerance" not liberty and that within the one quarter of the country that is left. It evidently means to cut out any attempt to spread the gospel whether by word of mouth or by literature, tract, or magazine. In the missionary territory (the threequarters of Colombia where Protestantism is outlawed) where there has been an attempt to have public worship services the priests or mayors have closed them. The night is not approaching. It is here. The above mentioned attempt to change the constitution still lacks the official ratification, I think, but there seems little chance that it will be stopped.

Dear Bro. Stairs:

Greetings in Jesus Name. Get ready for some bad news. It looks as though that is all we can write here of late. On Friday, March 5th, we had a fire at the mission. I had taken Sis. Parks to the top of Bomi Hill, and left her there so that she could go to Bougbay, Bola and Balmo. I had been back about 15 minutes when I heard shouts, and saw that Sis. Regenhart's house was on fire. As this is dry time, and we were making bricks, we had no water on hand. Just before I heard the shouts, I had been unloading the drums on the pick-up, so that I could go after water. We used what little water we had in the house, but to no avail. Sis. Regenhart's house and the garage both burned down. We managed to get everything out of the garage, but in the house, Sis. Regenhart's clothing, all her canned goods, and Sis. Robinson's refrigerator, were all burned up. The fire started in the stove pipe, and thatch burns so fast.

We sent a runner to tell Sis. Parks about the fire. She sent back her bed and food, and went on to the other 2 villages. She walked a good 7 or 8 hours to preach in those 3 villages. She has been more than willing to walk to the villages, as long as God gives her strength, even at the sacrifice of leaving the two children.

Last Sunday, a Sunday School was organized in Bola, and they had 27. We hope to organize Sunday Schools in the other villages that Sis. Parks goes to, also. The people here in Bomi Hill seem to be picking up interest in the services. When our building is finished, it will make a big difference. We had 136 a week ago Sunday, and 111 last Sunday. We have several young men working the office at Bomi Hill, that come regularly to church. Our great task is to raise a standard at the mission for the name of Jesus. We long to see a church established

for the name of Jesus in Liberia. Not just bricks and mud, but human souls, filled with the Glory of God. We've started services in two villages on the road, and the people come out well. Also, we have started Bible School on Thursday night.

I got the brick machine for three days, and the men made 1200 blocks, but the company came after it, and said they had to have it for 2 weeks. We've really been hindered on the building program. Surely God is on the move, or we wouldn't be getting so much static from the devil. The company that owns the brick machine will put the church

building up, run the floor and top beam, for \$300. They do good work, and this is a reasonable price for this country.

I want to say that Sis. Russell has been a real blessing, and very co-operative, since coming to Bomi Hill. She's a soldier of the cross, and very sincere. She's doing very well with the school. In fact, people are saying it is the best school they've ever had in Bomi Hill. She is a hard worker, and we are thankful she is with us.

Who Wants a \$300 Blessing From the Lord?

We have faced, and overcome many difficulties in Liberia, and the work is moving along better. You will see by Brother Park's letter that they have had a fire on the Mission Station at Bomi Hill. Bomi Hill is without doubt the best mission sight and privilege in Liberia. God has put it in our hands through our late Sister Gladys Robinson. When Bomi Hill was just a jungle, no road, no railroad there, and only a few people, one day on a jungle trail Sister Robinson and a few native workers knelt before the God of Heaven in desperate prayer. Then God whispered in Sister Robinson's heart, "go to Bomi Hill and start a work," Sister Robinson knew it was God speaking; but she did not do anything about it until she consulted the Missionary Board. God soon made it real to us that it was the right thing, and for her to move there. She went, and with only a few natives she carved a mission sight out of the jungle. Soon after that the mines began to work in real fashion; many people from all parts of Liberia moved there to work. Then a road and railroad (the first and only railroad in Liberia, narrow gauge, fifty miles long running from Monrovia to Bomi Hills mines) was built and finished on April 16th, 1951. When I was there in June, 1951, I stood and marveled at what Sister Robinson had done there. She had built several buildings of a temporary nature lasting only three or four years at the most; but it was the very best she could do under the circumstances, and with the money and help she had. She planned to have permanent buildings later when the work got going—something like starting a church in a tent or "brush arbor," then building and building. Now, we have started to build. While Brother Petty was there we built one permanent house with aluminum roof for a fair sized family. Brother Parks is now living in it, and Sister Regenhart sharing one room since the fire. Also, Brother Petty started a fine big building of a permanent nature to house the school and church, one large auditorium and two smaller class or prayer rooms. The roof is on part of it but the building is not finished; they can get the floor run, the top beams in and I understand the walls in for three hundred dollars. This should be done at once. Then Brother Parks can be free to do other things.

Then, we must build a second permanent house costing approximately \$2,000.00. This will house the other missionaries there. You will note Sister Russell (Valda) is living in a house with a thatch (grass) roof, and walls of a non-permanent nature. Actually the walls are only sticks stuck in the ground with mud plastered on them. The rain washes the mud down, and the bugabugs eat the stick off, and the house may come tumbling down on you at any time. We want to make this the finest station in Liberia both in property and spirituality where there is no Christianity, no knowledge of sin and its awfulness and penalty-and no knowledge of Jesus. This is an opportunity almost unequalled in value as an investment for God, that will pay dividends here in blessings. Yes, we believe God will bless the givers materially too, if they do it with the right motives, and in heaven to come you will reap rewards and feel you have done something for Jesus that loved us so. I see by Brother and Sister Parks picture after being there only one year, that they are worn and giving their all for the work. Let's stand by them. Let's finish this school-church building, and build this new house at once. If someone would take this entire three hundred dollar need; and if others would take the other, doing what they honestly could, the house would go up, and God be glorified. Just say when sending your offering in, "This is for the Liberia building fund," and God will bless W. T. S. you.

The doctor recommended a specialist, who said he must be operated on at once. Bro. Freeman decided to go ahead with the operation. He is feeling fine now, tho still a bit weak.

Two of our colored brothers helped me pull the tent down. It is so dilapidated, it looked as though we should really set it on fire, but perhaps parts of it can be used. We had six weeks of services this time. Bro.

and Sis. Erasmus helped me every night, even though they had to come quite a distance by motorcycle. This series of services means another new assembly opened up. We lost count of the number filled with the Spirit, but in the last two weeks of services, there were 18 baptized in Jesus Name and 11 filled with the Spirit. Bro. land of Ur of the Chaldees, all the wicked and perverse attributes that are now present in every false religion sprang from this notorious city which was founded by Nimrod, the mighty hunter, who was not a hunter of game, but of the souls of men. This false church is still a head-hunter. She is statistical minded and loves applause and numbers more than the power of God. She is heady and high-minded, but God is not unmindful of the cup she bears that is filled with the blood of the saints and of the inhabitants of Zion. She has dealt treacherously with God's people since her inception, but God has not forgotten.

Yes! This false, antichrist church still welcomes all comers. Her standards are low, and the ticket to enter costs little. You can sin within her borders and no sign of victorious living is necessary. In her circles it is out of date to think in terms of purity and virtuous living. Yes! The price to enter a false religion is cheap, but if one dies within her gates, the awful price that is ultimately paid is a soul in hell for eternity.

On the other hand . . . we say, "Oh blessed city of Zion, the general assembly, the Church of the first born." How beautiful are the feet of those who walk her streets. She is the perfection of beauty. The scripture has said, "Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God hath shine." Zion is the complete and entire embodiment of the purity and loveliness of Christ manifested through His children. Within her borders there is peace and joy in the Holy Ghost. Some say to enter costs nothing. And true, the matter of cost is not involved. The price was paid on Golgotha, by Jesus Christ. Yet! It is a matter of rebirth, a matter of exchange, a matter of trading an old robe for a new one and the adamic nature for the nature of Christ. To gain entrance involves repentance, baptism in water, and receiving the Holy Ghost. To stay . . . ? It's a matter of behavior, good conduct and staying pure and holy before God. To stay

and retain your citizenship in Zion means a crown of Glory that fadeth not away . . . eternal in the heavens.

WHO IS RIGHT?

Some will argue that all religions lead to the same objective. If this be true there is no false way, but all ways are true. The Word of God undeniably points to the false as well as the true. David said, "I hate every false way." Jesus said, "No man can serve two masters." Solomon says, "There is a way that seemeth right, but the end of that way is death." Elijah asks the question, "Why halt ye between two opinions?" Jesus again says with authority, "I am the way," which is certainly an indication that there are other ways in which an attempt is made to enter the portals of glory. If all these statements are true, we must come to this decision . Everything that is not true is false, everything that is not right is wrong, everything that is not good is bad, everything that is bitter can furnish no sweetness. In reality, there can be only one church recognized of God. In reality, our doctrine is either Biblical and of Christ, or a theory and of the devil. In reality, we cannot believe anything we choose and be a member of Zion. We must be right Biblically and doctrinally to be an inhabitant of the church of Jesus Christ.

Some ask the question . . . who is it that constitutes the false church? Let Jesus answer the question: "Upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." You will notice that He has one church. He built it on the day of Pentecost. Then, if Christ has only one church, we must belong to it in order to be right. No one will deny that Peter was right when he preached his opening message to a multitude of hungry seekers. If he was wrong, could we not say that Christ gave the keys to the wrong preacher? But the signs followed, indicating that Peter preached the right doctrine. If we follow what he preached we will be right, if we do not, we will be wrong, for we cannot be right and wrong at the same time. In the midst of Peter's message, the people were so hungry they repented, were baptized in the wonderful name of Jesus and received the Holy Ghost. This and this alone caused the people to be born again, and anyone who is not born again shall never see the kingdom of God.

YOU ARE WELCOME! sign is on Zion's gate. And the gate is open day and night. But ere long the keeper shall close it forever. Are you on the inside looking out? Happy is the man who finds it so! When Jesus comes for His church, He will seek her out, and say, "He and she were born in Zion." Every visible church on earth will either be compacted together to make the one true invisible church in the clouds of glory, or else they will be compacted together to make the one false church that shall be cast into the lake of fire and be tormented forever and ever. In the final sum there are only two cities — Zion and Babylon; only two churches — the true and the false; only two leaders -Christ and the devil; and only two destinations—with God or without God. What welcome sign have you welcomed into your own heart? Is it over Zion's gate or Babylon's? "Choose ye this day whom ye shall serve."

If it were normal times with plenty of liberty and plenty of missionaries, I would be very happy for the op-portunity but in these days of the harsh attempt to smother out the few rays of light that have been allowed to enter it seems like we should stick to the job and do what we can while we can.


