


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FUNDAMENTAL DOCTRINE UNITED PENTECOSTAL CHURCH

Giants that Challenge the Church of God

I. Sam. 17:2-4; 9-10, "And Saul and the men of Israel were gathered together, and pitched by the valley of Eloh, and set the battle array against the Philistines. And the Philistines stood on a mountain on the one side, and Israel stood on a mountain on the other side; And there was a valley between them, And there went out a champion out of the camp of the Philistines named Goliath, of Gath, whose height was six cubits and a

span and the Philistines said, I defy the armies of Israel this day; give me a man, that we may fight together. If he be able to fight with me, and to kill me, then will we be your servants; but if I prevail against him and kill him, then shall ye be our servants, and serve us."

Israel was at war with the Philistines. Saul and the men of Israel set the battle in array against the Philistines. Both armies

were encamped on a mountain with a valley between them. Enlisted in the army of the Philistines was a champion, a giant nine feet, three inches in height. When fully dressed for war with all his equipment, he appeared a monster so great that every man from the commander to the lowest G.I. was sorely afraid. Appearing before them was not all, he challenged them, crying out, "Choose you a man for you, and let him come down to me. If he be able to fight with me, then will we be your servants; but if I prevail against him, and kill him, then shall ye be our servants and serve us. I defy the armies of Israel this day; give me a man, that we may fight together." This was a morning and evening occurrence for some forty days.

Jesse, the Ephrathite of Beth-lehem-judah had three sons enlisted in the army of Israel under the command of King Saul. He sent David, the youngest son, with provisions for his sons and to see how the battle was

progressing. When David reached the scene of battle, both Israel and the Philistines had put the battle in array, army against army. David left his carriage in the hand of the keeper of the carriage, and ran into the army, and saluted his brethren. As he talked with them, this champion, Goliath the giant appeared as before, openly defying the armies of Israel. Again, they were frightened and fled.

The situation was serious. So serious that Saul had offered to give his daughter in marriage, together with great riches and freedom for the family, to the man that would prevail against this great giant. A nice bounty for his head, but all were afraid to go out against him.

This lad David was amazed and asked, "Who is this uncircumcised Philistine, that he should defy the armies of the Living God?" He was ridiculed by his brethren in the army and charged with pride. Nevertheless he said to Saul, "Let no man's heart fail because of him; thy servant will go and fight with this Philistine." Saul thought of him as a youth, but he quickly assured him that he had slain a lion and a bear while he kept his father's sheep. Said he, "The Lord that delivered me out of the paw of the lion, and out of the paw of the bear, he will deliver me out of the hand of this Philistine."

Within a very short time David encountered the giant with a very modest weapon in the Name of the Lord. The giant was killed and David returned to the armies of Israel with the head of Goliath. When the Philistines saw their champion was dead, they fled. They were pursued by the armies of Israel and it was another victory for them.

Moses sent twelve men to spy out the land of Canaan. After forty days, they returned with samples of the luscious fruit and with the report that the land flowed with milk and honey. They said, "The people are strong, the cities are walled and there are giants in the land." Ten of the spies based their report on human reasoning, leaving God out, stating that it was impossible to take the land. However two of them, Joshua and Caleb, having faith in the promises of God, assured Moses that they were well able to possess the land.

Back before the flood we read. "There were giants in the earth in those days."

As Goliath defied the armies of Israel, I see the giants of compromise, intellectualism, human reasoning, worldliness, etc., defying the church of the Living God today.

We have a fort to hold! The church is founded upon truth — "THE WORD OF GOD." It is our duty to promote these truths and protect the New Testament standards of holiness against every giant that may stand up against them. Paul directs the method of combat in II Tim, 4:1-4.

One of the giants that has raised his head in open defiance of the church of God is worldliness. It is slowly creeping into the ranks of the United Pentecostal Church. As much as I hate to admit it, worldliness has entered in many places and New Testament standards of holiness are slowly fading away. The basis of New Testament truth states that the life of a Christian is radically different from that of an unsaved person. Your activities and appearance is different from that of non-Christians. A Christian is one that has renounced worldly standards in favor of New Testament standards and takes up his cross daily and follows Christ.

Worldliness goes farther than dress and appearance we all admit. But we can see many, today, leaving the old standards taught by our fathers in the face of strong protests from our pulpits. Immodest dress is creeping into the ranks of our Pentecostal women as well as bobbed hair and make up. This is against our fundamental doctrine of "holiness" and shows a disregard for the Word of God and lack of consecration. These practices are not right and God is displeased with it. It may be traced back to Pride and Rebellion in the heart. Three voices warn against the practice of women cutting their hair. It is the voice of God, conscience and nature. I shall not deal with this any farther since the October issue of the Herald carries an article dealing with the subject in a thorough manner.

I read an article in one of the St. Louis newspapers where the attire of some of the American women, wives of soldiers, stationed in Germany was so immodest that the Commanding Officer demanded that they return home and dress properly before appearing on the streets. Thank God for someone who will make a protest!

To think that separation means outward appearance only, is an error. The word of God condemns thinking like the world. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, acceptable and perfect will of God." To think like the world means to accept the world's standard of values, definitions of success and ideas of the purpose of life. The Christian must choose Christ's pattern of thinking to become spiritually minded or conform to the world's philosophy. "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace." Rom. 8:6.

Loving the world's pleasures and treasures is a sign of worldliness, "Love not the world, neither the THINGS that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him." "Love not the WORLD, neither the THINGS that are in the world." Its pleasures or treasures. One may not dream of attending a theatre or dressing immodestly and yet be worldly in God's sight if they "mind earthly things." Paul said, "God

forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world." Worldly conduct is the product of a worldly spirit. A valley separated the armies of Israel and the Philistines. There is a similar line of demarcation between the people of God and the people of this world; it is holiness and separation from the worldly life. Substitution of form for the Spirit is another giant. "Having a form of Godliness, but denying the power thereof: from such turn away."

For twenty-two years Jereboam led his people toward idolatry and sin. He made the same mistake as Cain, by attempting to substitute worship for moral character. He erected golden images of a bull with impressive rites and ceremonies to wean the hearts of Israel from the altars of Jerusalem. The devil has never discontinued the use of this sharp weapon. Jereboam's calves remain with us until this very day. We will always need the presence of the Holy Ghost in the services to have any effect upon sinners. Dead Pentecostal services are the dullest things I know anything about. I don't want fanaticism, wild fire, at any price, but give me the old time Holy Ghost saturated meetings with a sermon unctionized from above. Consecrated talent is a wonderful asset to the meetings and I do not want to underestimate its value, but there is positively no substitute for a God anointed ministry and a service where the Holy Spirit has right of way. We are Pentecostal! Let us stay Pentecostal!

Another giant! "Not knowing how to live with one another." An elder in a company of Christians remarked, "In our assembly we have learned all about the gospel, and all about prophecy, and all about church truth, but one thing we have never learned; we have never learned how to get along with one another." How true and yet how unnecessary! I heard one of our ministers make this statement in a District Conference: "There are churches and ministers hanging in the balance right now." Why can't we kill this giant and learn how to get along with one another? The New Testament is full of instructions to love one another and exhortations against envy, strife, evil speaking, quarrelling, etc. We are encouraged to forbearance, forgiveness, gentleness and kindness. Fifteen times we are told in the scriptures to love one another. We cannot afford to hate or dislike any brother or sister. "He that saith he is in the light, and hateth his brother, is in darkness even until now."

We are to forgive one another. "Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way, first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift." Matt. 5:23-24. Lack of love among the people of God is a reproach on the Kingdom of God. It will dwarf any church as well as shrivel the souls of the professed Christians.

Paul likened the church to the human body. "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body; so also is Christ." I Cor. 12:12 also "We are members one of another. Eph. 4:25. Each member of the human body has its special work to do and each member is (Continued on page 12)

The 1954 General Conference

I T WAS 12 O'CLOCK MIDNIGHT ON THE TENTH DAY OF the first month of the year 1491 B.C. But...before we go further, where are we and what is the memorable occasion? Geographically, we are in the land of Goshen, the most fruitful valley in the land of Egypt. It was 430 years previous that seventy descendants of Abraham had settled in this land which was given to them by Pharaoh, who was lenient to these people because Joseph, one of the descendants. Joseph, who came to Egypt as a slave, had been made prime minister and was next to Pharaoh in power and authority.

Now, in 430 years this Jewish race had multiplied to over three million people. It was now time for this people to become a nation of itself and dwell in another land. God had just spoken to Moses to lead the people out of Egypt into the land of Canaan. Pharaoh had been approached on the subject but refused to release the Israelites, but after a series of plagues which caused death and destruction, Pharaoh relented and bade Moses to lead the people to the new land.

At this point, we find that the children of Israel had just eaten the passover supper, their staffs were in their hands, their shoes were on their feet and their next move would be toward the sea. The stage was now set! Can you imagine the excitement and expectancy that flooded the hearts of the people? At the command of Moses they would begin to move towards the east in quest of a dream that for years had been unfulfilled. Sure, the Red Sea was out yonder. It had to be crossed, but God would make the way. Lack of food and water would be their portion, but again the God that had called them was able to provide. And it was true! After much unbelief, fears, calamities, perplexities, death and forty years journeying in the wilderness, the people finally entered the land that flowed with milk and honey.

As this incident marked a new era and step forward for the Israelites, so also the general feeling among God's people everywhere is that God is reshaping our lives and is preparing us for the final lap of this glorious race to eternal life. We feel that we are standing at the cross roads. It is now or never! As the Israelites had their preparation feast prior to their deliverance, so also this is our preparation day for greater and better things to come.

At the 30th Annual General Conference of The United Pentecostal Church which convened in Columbus. Ohio from Sept. 17 through Sept. 22nd, much was accomplished to make us realize our preparation day was here. Many serious problems were attended to in the fear of God. There was much weeping and crying. There was a depth of deep concern and longing for spirituality that superseded all previous conferences. Through the messages of the conference and other activities we were made to realize that as a spiritual nation, born of God, we must be ready to move at the command of the Lord. We, as an organization, have been challenged on every hand by worldliness and many ungodly doctrines. The General Board and the General Conference felt the necessity to curb and to eliminate some of the more deadly things that were creeping into our ranks, deceiving many. We thank God for the measures that have been taken to strengthen our organization against the wiles of the devil.

Someone mentioned this fact: "This is a different kind of conference." And, indeed, the saying is true. God's presence was so real throughout the six days of conference. Every minister that spoke seemed to feet the solemnity of the occasion and the brevity of time in which we live. As each minister unveiled his feelings, they seemed to be in conjunction with the feelings of those who had spoken before him. It was six days of heart-searching and deep meditation.

Time and space would not permit us to relate all the wonderful things that transpired at the conference but every day and every service was of the best spiritual

Resolutions Passed

By The 30th General Conference

Following is a list of the more important resolutions which were passed at the 1954 General Conference of the United Pentecostal Church in Columbus, Ohio, September 17-22, 1954:

1. RESOLVED that Article VI, Section 5, Paragraph 10 of the Manual be changed to read:

Any minister failing to pay his or her budget or dues for a period of one year shall be notified that after thirty days he or she will be suspended if no remittance is made or a satisfactory explanation given. In case a minister is suspended in this manner, he or she must fill out a new application blank and appear before the District Board before he or she can be reinstated.

2. RESOLVED that Article VI, Section 5, Paragraph 11 of the Manual shall have the following provision added to it:

The Budget Fee of such a minister must be paid up in full at the time the honorary membership is granted.

3. INASMUCH as the Board of Christian Education, after proper investigation by a committee from said Board, has duly recommended the endorsement of Conquerors Bible College of Portland, Oregon, and

WHEREAS the Board of General Presbyters has accepted the recommendation of the Board of Christian Education

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this 1954 General Conference does hereby grant endorsement of the United Pentecostal Church to Conquerors Bible College of Portland, Oregon.

4. BE IT RESOLVED that Article VI, Section 3, Paragraph 6 be changed to read as follows:

No minister shall be permitted to hold credentials or license with any other religious organization or association. Exceptions to this rule shall be made in the case of ministers residing where they cannot receive proper governmental recognition without belonging to an organization in that country. In such a case special permission shall be obtained from the Executive or General Board in writing for said ministers to belong to an organization in that country for this purpose only.

- 5. BE IT RESOLVED that the United Pentecostal Church take out a group insurance policy for the wives of our ministers, similar to the one now held on the ministers.
- 6. BE IT RESOLVED that the following be added to our Manual:

All applications for license or credentials and all evidence submitted with the application shall become the property of the organization, together with the action of the District Board.

7. WHEREAS there is a need for a more thorough know-ledge of the entire membership of the United Pentecostal Churches.

BE IT RESOLVED that a census be taken of our churches in the United States, Canada and foreign missionary fields during January of 1955. Such census shall include the following:

- 1. Number of members baptized in the Name of Jesus Christ above the age of 35
- 2. Number of members baptized with the Holy Ghost above the age of 35
- 3. Number of members baptized in the Name of Jesus Christ between the ages of 13 and 35
- 4. Number of members baptized with the Holy Ghost between the ages of 13 and 35

- 5. Number of members baptized in the Name of Jesus Christ under the age of 13
- 6. Number of members baptized with the Holy Ghost under the age of 13
- 7. Average Sunday School attendance for 1954
- 8. Number of classes in your Sunday School
 State age groups

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Headquarters office shall furnish printed copies of the census questionnaire to all District superintendents and District presbyters, who shall see that the questionnaires are filled out by all churches in their District and Section.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a complete report of this census shall be brought back to the next General Conference by the General Secretary.

- 8. RESOLVED that all business meetings in the General and District Conferences be conducted according to and in harmony with Roberts Rules of Order.
- 9. WHEREAS there is a growing tendency for a spirit of worldliness to creep in among the people of our churches and

WHEREAS if we allow this tendency to increase and prevail among us, it will eventually destroy the spirituality of our churches and

WHEREAS it is the desire of the United Pentecostal Church to lift the standard of holiness higher as we see the coming of the Lord approaching

BE IT RESOLVED that we add a paragraph to our Articles of Faith under the heading of "Holiness" on page 21 of our Manual as follows:

We wholeheartedly disapprove of our people indulging in any activities which are not conducive to good Christianity and Godly living, such as theatres, dances, mixed bathing, women cutting their hair, make-up, any apparel that immodestly exposes the body, all worldly sports and amusements, and unwholesome radio programs and music.

FURTHERMORE, because of the display of all of these evils on television, we disapprove of any of our people having television sets in their homes. We admonish all of our people to refrain from any of these practices in the interest of spiritual progress and the soon coming of the Lord for His church.

10. INASMUCH as the Board of Christian Education, after proper investigation by a committee from said Board, has duly recommended the endorsement of the Western Apostolic Bible Institute of Stockton, California, and

WHEREAS the Board of General Presbyters has accepted the recommendation of the Board of Christian Education with the provision that the name of the school be changed to Western Apostolic Bible College

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this 1954 General Conference does hereby grant endorsement of the United Pentecostal Church to the Western Apostolic Bible College of Stockton, California.

11. BE IT RESOLVED that this body of ministers send the following letter to the President of the United States of America and also Secretary of State John Foster Dulles:

The President

Washington 25, D. C.

September 24, 1954

My Dear Mr. President:

We, the ministers and delgates of the United Pentecostal Church convening in our 30th Annual International General Conference at Columbus, Ohio, September 17 to 22, 1954, regret the necessity of coming to you at this time with the matter at hand.

We wish by this letter to call your attention to the false accusations and attitude of the President of Colombia, S.A., toward the Protestant people in that country, which involves our missionaries.

President Rojas Pinilla, in his recent inaugural address accused the Protestant missionaries of making Communists, which statement we strongly protest. We, nor our message or people, have not made one Communist in Colombia, or any other country. This action has, and is adding burdens, difficulties and persecution to our missionaries and followers there.

We are asking that action be taken immediately, and that our missionaries be treated with respect in Colombia, the same as Colombians are treated in the United States. Our message and preaching does not produce Communists.

We would like to ask the President of Colombia who made the Communists in Italy and France today, and who made the Communists in Spain, that resulted in two years of bloody civil war? It was not the Protestants.

President Rojas Pinilla has lived in the United States, and received part of his education here. He knows better than to make such accusations, as was in his speech, and reported in the Time magazine August 23, 1954 issue.

Three thousand ministers and thousands of people in the United Pentecostal Church do strongly regret such erroneous assertions.

12. RESOLVED that Article III, Section 3, Paragraph 2, be changed to read as follows:

No person can hold two executive offices at the same time.

13. RESOLVED that Article III, Section 5, Paragraph 2 of the General Constitution be changed to read:

The presiding officer shall appoint a committee of not less than three members who shall act as a Tabulating Committee, which committee shall collect the votes after the first ballot, which shall be known as the nominating ballot, and return the names of the three persons receiving the highest number of votes to the presiding officer, unless one person should receive at least two-thirds of the votes on the nominating ballot, in which event the presiding officer shall declare an election. In the event that the one receiving the two-thirds majority declines to serve, a new nominating ballot shall be taken. Each officer shall be voted upon separately in the order mentioned in Article III, Section 1 hereof.

FURTHER RESOLVED that Paragraph 3 of this same Article be changed to read:

In the event that no candidate receives a two-thirds majority vote on the nominating ballot, the General Conference shall thereupon vote upon the three persons receiving the highest number of votes for the particular office and such vote shall be termed "electoral ballot," and any one of these persons receiving two-thirds of the votes cast on such ballot shall be deemed elected to the particular office involved.

14. RESOLVED that the following be added to Article XV of the Manual:

Section 4. Sections of the District.

1. A district may be divided into sections with the approval

of the District Conference. The number of sections shall correspond with the number of District Presbyters on the District Board.

- As far as possible the District Presbyter shall be a resident of the section from which he is elected.
- A sectional Secretary-Treasurer may be elected at a regular sectional conference to serve a term of one year. Qualifications shall be the same as required of District Officers.
- The duties of the Sectional Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep records of all sectional conferences, and the care of all sectional funds raised and designated for the sectional work.
- No resolutions or by-laws shall be adopted at a sectional conference conflicting with either the General or District Constitution.
- The District Superintendent shall preside at all elections
 of District Presbyters and sectional officers at the sectional
 conference. In the event the District Superintendent cannot
 attend the sectional conference, the District Secretary shall
 preside.
- 15. RESOLVED that Article II, Section 3, Paragraph 2a of the District Constitution be changed to read:

To receive and care for all district funds, and make all disbursements, to keep an accurate account of all such transactions, to hold the books open for inspection by officers or members of the district, and to make a report at each district Conference.

16. RESOLVED that Article XVI, Section 1, Paragraph 3 be changed to read:

Any new church, established by one of our ministers, shall automatically be affiliated with the United Pentecostal Church, and set in order by a member of the District Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED that a new application form for affiliating such a new church be prepared accordingly.

Long have we preached against the evil influence of the movies with the tendency to "choke out the good seed" from the heart as the thorns smother the precious plant. TV has brought movies into the home, and it identifies such homes with the world. To have a lust for this kind of entertainment is a symptom of "lukewarmness." Television, in itself, is a marvelous invention and powerful system. Its potential value could be unlimited for educational, religious, and constructive purposes. However, with TV channels available only at such fabulous rates, it becomes prohibitive to the less fortunate. And because of public demands, the constructive type program is unpopular. So TV channels fall into the hands of worldly sponsors, and almost predominately, undesirable programs are telecast with the occasional pause to advertise liquor and cigarettes in false claims, misrepresentations, and enticing slogans. The suggestive force of the "picture" depicts crime, trash, and lust before the vacuum-like minds of our youth which, of a certainty, will bring immoral and degenerative results. Television has been well named "hell's pipeline into the home" and a most penetrating channel of evil and "hotbed" of immorality, shame and disgrace of our generation. These ungodly telecasts have contributed much to the delinquency of our youth. It has brought a seductive stream of folly into the home replacing the family altar. Television is also replacing normal family life and is corrupting good manners of the home; and because of its hypnotic effect, people are carried away into spiritual indifference. Hospitality is no longer the same when this form of entertainment comes into the home. It holds its captives in a spell of undivided attention. There is much debate over the television issue today, whether it belongs in the Christian home or not. From a scriptural standpoint, there should be no doubt in the mind or question as to the evil of its presence. In the house of God, we are partakers of the

BILL DROST AND FAMILY NARROWLY ESCAPE DEATH

RELATED TO WYNN T. STAIRS BY LETTER FROM BILL DROST, MISSION-ARY TO COLUMBIA

I am not sure whether you have learned of the accident we had or not, but will try to write you a few lines today. I have not been able to write for the past several days. I expect Compo to be here soon, and he can mail this letter, although I am able to get out some, but do not have too much reserve strength. I will try to explain in detail how the accident happened.

We were on our way to Medellene. I had written you previously of the need of our going to this city. We left one Friday morning about six o'clock and were going along very nicely. We had packed a lunch and were going to drive until about noon, then stop and eat. We had picked up three boys who had wanted a ride and in about one-half hour they decided to get off As I was starting up again (going about 15 miles an hour) we were going across a bridge which had no railing to protect us from going over. The car gave a lurch to the right and I could not control it. I found out later that the steering rod was loose and disconnected. We went over the side of the bridge and landed 30 feet below in the water with the pick-up on its top. I found myself completely under water with my hands and head caught. I thought of Ruth and the children, but she had managed to get them and herself out. Finally. I got my hands loose then pulled my head free and crawled out. My son Wynn was cut pretty severely on the head that required 15 stitches. I needed surgery which required the pulling of the skin and flesh together which needed about 140 stitches. My breast bone was fractured also, but isn't too bad now.

My time here thinking and praying have forced me to realize more than ever the presence of God. I have heard the cry of many people here in the hospital. Yet, the agony of souls seems to mount higher and higher than that of the body. I have freshly examined the truth which the "Doctrines of the Apostles and Prophets" contain and have lifted my heart in honest praise to think that I am heir of such a wonderful and great salvation, which makes me a son of God. I, too, have considered the fact of the work bere, and have questioned whether there was any new way of doing things. The Spirit seemed to speak to me: "There is no need of new spiritual strategy. The Word of God still offers the only effective way to work for God." So, I pray that my faith will not fail and that I shall be obedient to the order of His Word.

I might add that the car will be covered by the insurance, but our expenses here in the hospital will be tremendously high. The motor to the pick-up was not hurt, but the body is in a twisted state. I was in despair as I thought of it, but was reminded that Paul, too, had accidents. I was only traveling about 15 miles an hour so it was an unavoidable accident.

Ruth and the children went to Cali last Sunday, but I will have to remain until perhaps Friday. My greetings to all and in return pray for us.

India's Need - - Christ

Dear Co-Workers in the spreading of the Gospel of Jesus Christ:

Greetings in that Name that is above every name, the name of Jesus from the needy land of India. Yes, India is a needy land in many ways. She is in need of economical development and the raising of social

and cultural standards. There is, however, another need far more important than those which have been mentioned — India needs Jesus Christ. Today, great effort is being made to take care of the other needs, but I am sorry to say that far too little effort has been made to reach India with the truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We missionaries are not certain of our opportunity to preach this message in the future; therefore we feel that today, while the door is still open, we must put forth every effort. We feel the weight

of a tremendous responsibility upon us, and we earnestly solicit the prayers of each one of you. We know that only the power of God can change the hearts and lives of men and women; therefore we want to be more filled with the power of God that our lives may be of real service to Him, who has done so much for us.

The Lord has blessed us with a new P.A. system with which we can reach many people. This very fine equipment and petrol generator were given to the work by Brother Urshan and assembly of Calvary Tabernacle in Indianapolis, Indiana. We cannot express the fullness of our gratitude to them in words, for their gift means much not only to us, but to all of our Indian workers. We have started a local program with this equipment. We have a service similar to a radio program. The PA system covers most of the village in which we live. Hundreds of people are receiving the word of life already because of this new equipment. We plan in the near future to go out on village itinerary work showing Bible pictures and holding meetings. In this way we shall reach thousands of people. Thus you can see what a blessing this new equipment is to the work.

On June 27th at seven forty-five a.m., while enroute to one of our stations, we had a car accident in which the other driver was definitely at fault. The missions car was sideswiped with a great deal of damage being done. It was only the Lord that spared our lives. Truly our faith in God is stronger because of this accident. The car is now under repairs. We are hindered in our work without the car but the vehicle should be ready after another week and a half.

We will now take you on a brief tour through the different parts of India, where the U.P.C. has mission work. As we live in Travancore, we will begin with Travancore. God has been blessing and the work is

growing. The other day Harry went out to visit an area where a revival has been going on. He cycled eight miles and then walked two and one-half miles to the meeting place. Here in Travancore, among the many churches, we have the Jacobite Church, which is similar to the Roman Catholic Church. In this place many of these Jacobite people have received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit within the last two months. There is a real stir and others are coming to see if this thing is real. Yes, God is moving in a mighty way. Harry heard a Malayalam lady speaking in English, a language which is not known to her. While speaking in tongues she said in English "seek ye the Lord." Yes, when we seek God with our whole heart, He will meet our needs. Here in Travancore God is moving in a wonderful way, but we want to see a great outpouring of the Spirit. There are many places here in the South that have not been told of the plan of Salvation, therefore we plan to go to an area which has not been given the truth of God's Word. There we will build a pandal, which is a thatch roof suspended on poles. Under this shelter we will conduct two or three weeks of meetings. We believe that in this way we can open new fields. The expense involved will be great when going to a new area. We estimate that one such meeting or campaign will cost approximately fifty dollars. Friends, here is an opportunity for you to make another eternal investment, and we are anxious that men and women are given this message of life. We want to hold several campaigns, and we know that you will back us up financially as you are able, because you have been faithful to help us in the past. It is of great encouragement to us to know that you are behind us as we labor for Christ here in this land. Please send your offering through headquarters, designated for "Evangelistic Campaigns in India." We want to begin these campaigns as soon as possible, so we will appreciate it if you will send in your offerings soon. Please make sure that you do not cut down on your regular missionary offering, when sending in this extra help. This would hinder the financial output from headquarters to other missionaries, so we ask that your offering be over and above your regular missionary support. We will keep all who contribute to this "Evangelistic Campaigns in India" posted on the progress of this great effort which you will be putting forth. We shall try to send a picture of the meetings to all who give a substantial donation.

Now we will leave Travancore and go north to Kolar Gold Fields which is in Madras Presidency among the Tamil speaking people. Brother Taylor is opening a new work there, though confronted by many difficulties. Pray for him.

Then we cross over to Mangalore in South Kanara where Brother Salins is carrying on a good work for the Lord. This field is also needy and we hope to be able to soon visit these places in this effort to witness for Christ. This is an open field and in need of the truth as it is in Jesus. North to Utter Pradesh finds the Lord blessing there. Then on to Calcutta where Brother

and Sister Buck are working faithfully. Many are being taught the deeper truths and many have accepted. We then go on to Assam where we see a good work being done for the Lord. In the Lushai Hills the work is steadily growing among these tribal peoples. The reports from there are most encouraging. There has been much persecution there, but God is rewarding the believers for their stand. As a result of the manifestations of the gifts of the spirit, many of their former persecutors are now interested in this message. In one place some damage was done to the church but those who did the damage became convicted and came and repaired the church. Yes, the Spirit of the Lord is moving in India.

Friends, do you realize that in all of India including all of these different fields and different language areas, with hundreds of miles between, the U.P.C. only has six missionaries? Obviously we cannot do justice to all of these places, even though all of these places are calling us to come, as our finances do not permit such a heavy program of field work. These six missionaries are the four members of the Scism family here in the south and Brother and Sister Buck in Calcutta. Our prayer is that God will give you all a great vision of the lost souls dying without Christ among the 365 million population of India. May God bless you and please remember us in prayer as well as the "Evangelistic Campaigns in India" program.

We appreciate the prayers of those at home for us, and for the work here in India. India offers a great challenge to all of us. We are thankful to the Lord for the progress of the work since our arrival here in India in March of 1949, but there is still so much to do. As the months and years pass one feels the physical wear of this very humid climate of Travancore. Many seem to have gained the impression that we will soon leave for furlough by the letters that we receive. The Missions Department has given permission for furlough in 1955 and we plan to sail from Bombay on August the eighth of that year. There is much to do in this year and we know that you will not let us down but will stand behind us in prayer, that this year may be the best ever and that our bodies will be sustained by the power of the spirit to carry on.

We appreciate the many who have prayed for Sister Scism and ask you to continue to pray for her. She is better but far from well, yet does not want to go home ahead of the rest of us. She is needed here. We plan to land in New York and then to cross the states to the West Coast. If all works out as we trust, we hope to be able to visit a few of the churches, enroute to the West Coast in the will of the Lord. It will be at least sometime in September before we will reach New York, as far as we know.

member of the body. There is no jealousy between my hands. The right one has always done the writing and the left hand has never been jealous. In fact, it is in sympathy with the right hand and cooperates fully by holding the paper. The same sympathy and cooperation is expected of members of the body of Christ. Actually I have seen disturbances in the church when the pastor made a change at the piano or removed some disobedient person from a quartet. Let's kill this great monster and giant and learn how to "prefer our brother."

In conferences we have seen displays of temper, heard words that sounded like unkind thrusts at another and some have been so rude as to interfere with someone while speaking on a resolution that held a view different from theirs. This is very uncharitable. We only want God's will in every matter of business. Let us listen attentively to both sides of a question, cast our ballot for the propositions that meet God's word and show proper Christian respect for one another during our discussions. While we are on this subject, I request every minister to refrain from any activities at this conference that is unbecoming to a minister of Jesus Christ. Loud, boisterous talking and foolishness is not becoming men professed to be called of God to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ. We should be sober. "And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient." II Tim. 2:24. "Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, (life) in charity, in faith, in purity." I Tim. 4:12.

Human reasoning is also a giant. This is an age of human reasoning. Like the ten spies, they were not able to go in and possess the land. They did not put God in all their plans. Many theologians and intellectuals base their articles and lectures on nothing more than reasonand some of it sounds good and reasonable. They make the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man sound wonderful. I read recently of a certain congregation (not Pentecostal) that was making progress under the leadership of a pastor, eight psychiatrists, five psychologists and three counsellors. - 1. Six of our districts reported Youth Conventions during the last year and they were great spiritual gatherings.
- 2. Seven of our districts had Youth Schools and Camps, some of them for the first time.
- 3. From the figures available it appears that over 1,000 or more young people were in Youth Schools and Camps last year.
- 4. Of this number 100 or more received the baptism of the Holy Ghost in Youth School and Camp. One school reported 16 receiving the Holy Ghost in one afternoon.
- 5. One District Youth Group built a Youth Tabernacle on the Camp Grounds of its district.
- 6. One Pentecostal Conquerors' as a district sponsored the building of an eighteen-room dormitory on its camp ground.
- 7. It was found that the Conquerors either publish or assist in publishing eight district papers with a circulation totaling over 10,000 copies per month.
- 8. Eighteen districts and Jamaica cooperated with "Sheaves for Christ" in 1954.

- 9. "Sheaves for Christ" nearly tripled its income over 1953.
- 10. "Sheaves for Christ," obtained the headquarters' signs and a truck for Uruguay this year. The projects for the coming year are: a truck for Liberia, a printing press for Indonesia, a truck for the Indian work in the southwest part of this country of ours.

Observations of the General Conference

I T'S BEEN A GREAT CONVENTION. BROTHER CLARENCE Nelson of Oklahoma remarked, "We've got better clothes now and a better brush arbor (we were in the Memorial Hall in Columbus, Ohio) than in the old days, but it's the same old Pentecost." And we might as well have been under a brush arbor in Louisiana for all the liberty in the Spirit that we felt. There was plenty of shouting, talking in tongues, and even dancing like old time Pentecost.

The conference rose to a high note Friday night when Brother Morgan, General Superintendent, preached an old fashioned holiness message. And speaking of that, we didn't notice so much fancy clothes and hairdos as in former conventions. It seemed to be more a congregation of humble folks who meant business with God.

Brother Guidroz thrilled us Saturday morning in a message calling the ministers to a place in God, worthy of their responsible positions. Brother Haskell Yadon followed with the same theme.

Sunday was missionary day. The services were saturated with the blessings of God. Sister Helen Anderson sang "If I Can Touch the Hem of His Garment," with tears flowing down her cheeks, turning to the missionaries while singing. Our hearts were broken and melted together. Eleven returned missionaries spoke: Brother and Sister White from Java; Sister Freeman, S. Africa; Sister Regenhart, Liberia; Sallie Lemons, Colombia; Brother Nukida, Japan; the Pair family from Jamaica; and Brother and Sister Burns from Ceylon. Six new out-going missionaries were presented: Brother and Sister Young to Nigeria; Brother and Sister Adams to South Africa; Brother and Sister Samuel Baker and Brother Morley to South America. (Sister Laverne Collins was appointed to Liberia after missionary day.)

Sister Freeman preached in the night service, telling of miracles wrought in South Africa and brought the power down. The over-all impression of missionary day was a world waiting for the gospel and when Brother Stairs gave a call for new recruits to bear this message to foreign lands, the front of the auditorium filled with young men and women, many sobbing and broken, answering the call. Missionary Day was a wonderful day

and we felt that many of you were praying for it.

Monday night was dedicated to home missions and we were thrilled to hear of the missionary work being done in the homeland. Some districts have established as many as 18 new churches during the last year. Some workers have gone out to new territories and suffered persecution and hardships that we thought were only met on the foreign field. One of two young ladies who have been helping Sister Eastridge in the Indian work in New Mexico and living on \$25 a month, said, "I'm not interested in money—just souls." Another lady who is battling in pioneer work in Kentucky said, "Do something for Jesus, and do it now." A regular offering was taken, but many people left money on the platform to help workers who are suffering privations, trying to evangelize the remote places of this country.

Tuesday night Brother Nelson, before preaching, began singing "It's Real, It's Real, I Know It's Real." Time and place were forgotten as the audience joined him. Some people had some real "brush arbor blessings" and the Pentecostal blessings fell.

Most of the afternoons were given to business. During the mornings, different departments of the U.P.C. work were presented: Ladies Auxiliary, Sunday School, and Bible Schools. We were impressed that a large growing church like ours must do more and more specializing in these different fields and yet the "mechanical" part of the work seemed subordinate to the spiritual and every department seemed not to be pushing itself forward but blending together in the evangelizing of a lost world. Praise the Lord for this great movement!

The last day was given over to Pentecostal Conquerors, and like the rest of the convention, was full of praises, shouting, and blessings on high. Surely the United Pentecostal Church has never had a greater conference. We were made to sit together in heavenly places. The organization officials were kept busy almost day and night in conferences and business but impressed us as servants, humbly and spiritually bearing the burden of our churches.


