

FUNDAMENTAL DOCTRINE UNITED PENTECOSTAL CHURCH

The basic and fundamental doctrine of this organization shall be the Bible standard of full salvation, which is repentance, baptism in water by immersion in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the baptism of the Holy Ghost with the initial sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance.

With the Bible One Hundred Fifty Years Ago

(Test your appreciation for your Bible while reading this brief story)

A LITTLE more than a century and a half ago, a girl's craving for her own Bible opened a new field of Christian endeavor which has had no parallel in history.

Then — as now — millions were without the Word of God. But little Mary Jones, daughter of a Welsh weaver, did not think of the problems of millions. She knew only that she wanted a Bible as her own and that it was her own personal problem.

The story of Mary, and how she got her Bible, is one of the most heart-warming tales of faith. First she had to learn to read, then spend six years saving. When at last she had accumulated enough for her purchase, Mary trudged barefoot for 25 miles to learn that Bibles no longer were being published in her native Welsh and that none was obtainable.

It was the Reverend Thomas Charles, of the village of Bala, in Wales, who gave the girl her Book in the year 1800. From that small incident in a remote hamlet, sprang a movement which has seen the publication and distribution of more than 1,200,000,000 copies of the Scriptures in more than 900 languages and dialects.

To the minister it had been evident for years that the supply of Bibles for the Welsh people had been pitifully inadequate and every effort to get more had fallen upon agencies already overburdened with other duties or had resulted in prices too high for the scanty means of the people.

In that same year 1800, an edition of 10,000 Bibles was exhausted in four months and whole districts failed to receive any. Two years later, Mr. Charles tentatively suggested to some friends on a committee of a Religious Tract Society his idea for a new Society. The society would supply Scriptures for the people of Wales.

The idea caught fire. The alert mind of Joseph Hughes saw its possibilities. "If for Wales, why not for the kingdom? Why not for the world?" Why not, indeed?

On March 7, 1804, the British Foreign Bible Society was launched. One hundred and fifty years later, people of at least 60 nations will commemorate the historic event. There are now 24 national Bible societies, all joined in the United Bible Societies and they are currently distributing 20,000,000 volumes of Scriptures each year.

Other Christian organizations, in Britain and Germany, had undertaken some responsibility for Scripture supply prior to 1804, but they had only signaled the coming event. With rare foresight, the British committee realized it could not accomplish its task alone. Representatives were dispatched to other countries in Europe and America and 48 Bible societies grew in the next 12 years.

In America, the first Bible Society was formed in Philadelphia in 1808 and a hundred others followed quickly, until, in 1816, a national body, the American Bible Society was established. Today, the American society provides more than half of the total world distribution.

Who Is This?

"Who is this that cometh from Edom, with dyed garments from Bozrah? this that is glorious in his apparel, traveling in the greatness of his strength. I that speak in righteousness, mighty to save." Isaiah 63:1.

HO IS THIS? This, virtually, has been one of the paramount questions of all ages. This question attracted the thoughts of Abraham, invoked a response from Moses and stirred the deepest emotions and loftiest praise of David as he sung his immortal songs in the plains and on the hills of Palestine. The celebrity in question was to be the entire theme of the Bible. He said in Luke 24:44-47, "These are the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which was written in the law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the psalms, concerning me. Then opened he their understanding, that they might understand the scriptures, and said unto them, thus it is written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day: And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." In Psalms 40:7 He said, "Lo, I come: in the volume of the book it is written of me, I delight to do thy will, O my God."

WHO IS THIS? This question has turned the wisdom of the wise men backward. Physicists have failed to find the answer in matter or energy. Astrologers, in their astronomonical deductions, have not answered it. Geologists, who have delved into the Palezoic, Mesozoic and the Cenozoic periods, have given us no light on this all - important question. Yes, it has rung down through the corridors of history, dipped itself into the far-flung

and remote corners of the earth and has confronted statesmen, diplomats, kings and potentates. Theologians, skeptics, agnostics and infidels have stood aghast and are unworthy of their names.

Since these supposed Titans are all leaky vessels and are unable to answer our question, we must turn to other sources.

LET US CALL IN A FEW WIT-NESSES. Isaiah, WHO IS THIS great being that is the mystery of the ages? Isaiah answers: "This is the mighty God, the Everlasting Father and the Prince of Peace." Now let us summons the angelic host that sang on that memorable day when Jesus was born. What did they sing? And did not their singing answer the question, WHO IS THIS? The answer rung throughout the world as they sang, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a saviour, which is Christ the Lord." Next, hear what the forerunner of Jesus said: "Behold the Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world." And next, hear what one of the greatest men of all said, even Paul the Apostle: "He is the image of the invisible God, the blessed and only potentate, the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords." Even doubting Thomas was brought to the stark reality of his false impressions and had to say, "My Lord and my God." Now, Peter, the apostle is on the witness stand: As this man, who was given the keyes to the kingdom, begins to speak, there is great silence in heaven and earth: "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved." He continues speaking in positive terms: "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ."

After hearing what Peter has said, Paul can hold his peace no longer. He must return to give more proof of the positiveness of Jesus Christ: "BEWARE lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ. For in Him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily." Writing to Timothy, his beloved son in the Gospel, he further states: "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifested in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory."

GREAT MEN TESTIFY

Now, that we have heard witnesses out of the Bible, let us listen to some of the renowned men outside the Bible.

- 1. Mr. O. DeWette, the great critic of Germany says: "This only I know, in Jesus only is there salvation."
- 2. Jean Jacques Roussean leaves this testimony: "If the death of Socrates be that of a sage, the life and death of Jesus are those of a God."
- 3. Napoleon, the mighty general, recognizes God as supreme. Though thou art a great warrior thou mighty son of valor, striding through the world like a colossus, and lighting the darkness at midnight with the fires of battle, what is your answer, WHO IS THIS? Napoleon says: "I think I understand somewhat of human nature, and I tell you, all these (the heroes of antiquity) were men, and I am a man, but not one was like Him. Jesus Christ was more than man. Everything in Him amazes me. I see nothing here of man. Near as I may approach, closely as I may examine, all remains above my comprehension . . . great with a greatness that crushes me. It is in vain that I reflect . . . all remains unaccountable. I defy you to cite another life like that of Christ."

Are You a Well-Balanced Christian?

T E PENTECOSTAL PEOPLE are known for our vehement desire to let the Holy Ghost have complete control of our lives. From the outset, I would like to make it crystal clear that when all humanity stands before the eternal God, the ONE thing that will make the difference where the individual spends eternity, will be this ONE fact: Did they or did they not have the Holy Ghost? Of course, we are dealing primarily with those of the "Golden Candlestick Age" or as is commonly called "THE GRACE ERA" which extends for approximately 2000 years from Pentecost to the rapture of the church. When the Bible speaks in such clear positiveness as to the disposition of those who have never received the Holy Ghost, it unmistakably clarifies our position as The Bible Spirit-Filled Saints. states in one place (without any trace of compromise in other passages) that "without the Spirit of Christ, we are none of His." This "scripture, alone, strengthens our hands to preach the necessity of being Spirit-filled. My whole being is enraptured with the thought of His being able to abide in temples of clay. And only as Christ remains IN us have we hope of the glory that is to come. We believe that to be Spirit-filled is the secret of holy living in these Godless and Christless days.

But have we forgotten the next most important factor in our Christian make-up? Many and varied arguments can be mustered to our defense, when preaching the necessity of the Holy Ghost which is the one thing that should make us spiritual people, but it is utterly impossible to be spiritual if we forget the practical side of our Christian make-up. I am very much afraid that the devil is using this forgetfulness to his own advantage

and is causing many to be led to spiritual death.

We must never forget that in spite of the fact that God has so wonderfully filled us with the Holy Ghost, we are still men. Often times we get carried away with ecstasy and with the effulgence of God's glory, only to find out that after we have had the feeling of angels, the power lifts and we are but men again. This only teaches us what we have always known: We are still free moral agents in spite of the Holy Ghost. We are only awakened to the fact of a truth that so many of us are forgetting, that is, the Holy Ghost will only keep us as long as we let it keep us. The Holy Ghost is not a blockade that will keep us from sinning if we have the desire to sin. We can do as we choose, but when we let the Holy Ghost make our decisions in all matters, we will always be led in the path of the just.

Why do saints get angry? Why are there contentions and babblings among us? Why the hate, the jealousy, the spiritual pride? Why the backbiting, the seeking for prominence, the gloating over a little success? Why the competition, the honoring of the big, the abhorrence of the small? Why the bribes, the welcoming of the rich, the despising of the poor? Why? Friends, if we are guilty of one or all, we did so in spite of the Holy Ghost. Is the Holy Ghost to blame? Why didn't the Holy Ghost stop us? No the Holy Ghost is not to blame: we well remember the power of the SPIRIT, but we have forgotten to do our part or to manifest that practical side of our Christianity. We remember the spiritual standard, but we have forgotten the moral standard. We have forgotten what part we are to play in this spiritual battle.

When I read the following scriptures, I become aware of the great part that I, as a man, play in the success of my salvation.

- 1. "Cleanse your hands, ye sinners."
- 2. "Come out from among them, and be ye separate."
- "Let us cleanse OURSELVES from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit."
- 4. "I will wash my hands in innocency."
- 5. "Awake to righteousness and sin not."

In all these scriptures, the moral obligation is upon us. Principle is involved. Being Christ's ambassadors, we are responsible for our conduct, and how we live before God and men.

IS THE HOLY GHOST NECESSARY?

In all trials, temptations and pitfalls, is it possible that I can survive without the Holy Ghost? Can I operate successfully on the moral standard alone? When we see people in the world that sometimes act better than some in the church, does this mean that God's Spirit is unnecessary in our lives?

May I say that there is nothing that is as important as the Holy Ghost. It is the very life of God. It is the only identification mark that we can have that makes us a child of God. It will take the Spirit of God to place us in the bride of Christ. It is only by the Spirit of God that we can be led in this dark world. "As many as are led (not driven) by the Spirit of God are the sons of God." It is only by

Water Baptism - - Essential

ANY PEOPLE today hold religious conceptions that are not scripturally founded. These beliefs are predicated upon ideas of man and not on the Word of God. It is eternally dangerous to arrive at a conclusive belief simply by heresay. I know you realize this to be a fact. Many people believe certain things about religion because they have heard others express their belief or conception. It is not enough for you to accept another man's expression. You must "search the Scriptures," and thus find the true interpretation.

Baptism has been a doctrine badly treated. There are numerous ideas expressed about its function. The majority of them are far from the truth because they are not anchored on "what saith the Word of the Lord." A popular conception which is totally in error is the conception that baptism is just a ritual and a form that has no bearing on the candidate's salvation. Along with this thought is the idea that baptism has no authority of cleansing; that is to say that one is not cleansed in baptism.

Arguments ensue along these lines which in many instances are not edifying and constructive. Let us allow the scriptures to speak the clear and illuminative truth as we by unprejudiced mind look into the perfect "law of liberty."

PAUL'S EXPERIENCE

Paul was the author of many of the New Testament books. His life consecrated to the Lord Jesus Christ is left as a memorial to this day of the worth of a man perfectly yielded unto God. Paul's conversion was a tremendous testimony of the power of God for he, Paul, was a strong persecutor of the Christian way. In the twenty-second chapter of the book of Acts, verses 12 through 16, Paul gave a testimony of his conversion: "And

one Ananias, a devout man according to the law having a good report of all the Jews which dwelt there, came unto me, and stood, and said unto me, Brother Saul receive thy sight. And the same hour I looked up upon him. And he said, The God of our fathers hath chosen thee, that thou shouldest know his will, and see that Just One, and shouldest hear the voice of his mouth. For thou shalt be his witness unto all men of what thou hast seen and heard. And now why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." Here is a definite and self-explanatory statement that signifies the strength and importance of cleansing through baptism. Ananias, God's vessel to bring the true message to Paul, advised Paul to be baptized, and wash away his sins.

PETER'S DECLARATION

Leaving this strong statement for a while, let us go back to the original statement by the Apostle Peter when the New Testament church was being directed into a channel of truth that had been entrusted into Peter's hands by the Lord Jesus Christ. Peter's statement is undying, and as long as the Gentile dispensation is in effect it is the one true Bible form of baptism. "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38). Notice how plainly it is explained that baptism is to be done in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins. This truth is correlative to the great truth that the angel spoke to Joseph: "Thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21).

THE POWER IN THE NAME

Did you ever consider the name of Jesus in baptism with reference to the blood that the priest took to the water with him in the OLD Testament plan? All through the law we are taught that the life of all flesh is in the blood. How quickly the man under the grace dispensation seems to forget his schooling under the law. We read that Jesus said of Israel, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly. (John 10:10). His important message to man was life. When we study His words carefully and the words of those who wrote of Him after His death, we find that both He and His disciples linked this life with His name, His name being the channel for the blood application in the New Testament.

John told us, "In him was life" (John 1:4), and then told how to get that life: "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that BELIEVE ON HIS NAME." (John 1:12).

This takes us back again to the Tabernacle in the wilderness where we watch the priest perform the function of the priesthood as he enters into the presence of God. First he kills and sacrifices an animal at the brazen altar and takes the blood from this animal to the brazen laver. Here we understand the strong truth that the life of the flesh is in the blood.

In the New Testament we find that the name of Jesus becomes the means of channeling the blood of Jesus Christ to the soul of man so that he is washed and cleansed in the act of baptism. The Bible states that "without shedding of blood is no remission" of sins. In Saint John 20:31 we read these words: "But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through HIS NAME." You see, as we use the

The Law of Life

"For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death." (Romans 8:2).

IT IS NOT necessary to think long or hard to find many examples about us that the world is governed by laws. Laws are constantly in force in the physical world. The law of gravity keeps us and things upon the earth. Throw an object into space and it will come down. We do not defy this law except by accident. None of us would presumptuously step into space, but rather we use ladders and stairways for our descent from high places.

Laws govern the chemical world. The chemist must know these and cautiously work in harmony with them or suffer the consequences.

Laws govern the mental world. We have no way of learning new things except as they are related to that which we already know.

Laws govern the plant world. "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." (Galatians 6:7). "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit." (John 12:24).

Paul tells the Roman church and us that there is a "law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus." The law of life in Christ is illustrated by Christ Himself in the preceding verse — John 12:24, "Except a corn of wheat . . . die." Life proceeds out of death. This then is the law — if one desires to live, he must die. If a man seeks to save his life he will lose it, but if he will lose his life for Christ's sake he shall save it. How paradoxical. How contrary to natural reasoning. Yet, how true to the facts of Christ and Christian living!

Not many years ago, King Tut's tomb was discovered and opened in

Egypt. There were found in it grains of wheat, perfectly preserved for over 3500 years. They had never been planted. Their life had been saved. They had never died. They had never brought forthfruit. They had abode alone.

The number of grains of wheat is not known by the author but think if you will what today's harvest would be if those grains of wheat had been planted — had died — 3500 years ago and thus had brought forth fruit. What a great object lesson the Great Corn of Wheat gives from "the corn of wheat" concerning the law of life in Christ.

I say "The Great Corn of Wheat" because this principle of life out of death was the guiding star of Jesus' ministry upon the earth. Many were his opportunities to save his life. Satan approached Him from every angle and through every conceivable source to turn away from Calvary — to save His life — to not drink the cup — to not die. Satan personally tempted him to leave the way of the cross. When this did not avail he approached through the lips of Peter in questioning the cross as the will of God. Christ could have been the popular Messiah of the people. He could have declared Himself the King of the Jews and the whole nation would have fought to the last man under His leadership for deliverance from Rome. He could have saved the reproach and rejection that were always His if he had lived to the flesh and "saved his life." To do so would have disqualified Him as the "Lamb of God which taketh away the sins of the world." His name might have been on the pages of history with Alexander, Caesar and Napoleon

but His name would not be the hope of the world for every generation and the salvation of all who will truly call upon it. He would have been fruitless. He would have abode alone!

"But," you say, "He died! How true. So may we. So must we if we are to live and bear fruit. The fruit-bearing death is not always a physical one though hundreds of Christian martyrs have planted their physical lives and by their dying many more have been saved. Yet, others have lived their sacrifice and have died to ambitions, self, pride, and the world. Through this dying many have believed.

Consider Joseph, the son of Jacob. Was he not cast into the earth as a seed when he was sold as a slave into the household of Potiphar down in Egypt? Was he not trodden upon as a seed in the ground when he was falsely accused of evil because of his virtue? Did he not die during those thirteen years of imprisonment, seclusion, and being forgotten by those whom he had helped? I am sure if any one of us went through a similar experience we would feel that "self" had been through a veritable "Hades."

Yet, from the seed that was cast into Egyptian earth, that was trodden under the feet of those not cast down, that died to ambition and the world, sprung a life-giver, a savior, a fruit-bearer for Egypt, his father and brethren, and all the world. Out of Joseph's death came the world's life — and his own. Because he lost his life, he saved it and the lives of others.

What then does this mean to us? Paul seemed to link his victorious, abundant life as an apostle to this dying process. He said, "If we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: ... Now if we be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him." (Romans 6:5, 8). Again he said, "For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify (put to death) the deeds of the body, ye shall live." (Romans 8:13).

Paul knew much about this dying and the cross in the life of the be-

SAIAH 52:3 and 4: "For thus saith the Lord, Ye have sold yourselves for nought; and ye shall be redeemed without money. For thus saith the Lord God, My people went down aforetime into Egypt to sojourn there; and the Assyrian oppressed

them without cause."

A Strange but True Story



Working in the Fields

WEALTHY farmer who cultivated some thousands of acres, had by his benevolence endeared himself greatly to his large staff of laborers. He had occasion to leave the country in which his property was situated for some years, but before doing so he gave his people clearly to understand that he wished the whole of the cultivated land to be kept in hand, and all the unreclaimed moor and marsh lands to be enclosed and drained and brought into cultivation; that even the hills were to be terraced, and the poor mountain pastures manured, so that no single corner of the estate would remain neglected and barren. Ample resources were left for the execution of these works and there were sufficient hands to have accomplished the whole within the first few years of the proprietor's absence.

He was detained in the country to which he had been called for many years. Those whom he had left as children were men and women when he came back, so the number of his tenantry and laborers was vastly multiplied. Was the task he had given them to do accomplished? Alas! no. Bog and moor and mountain waste were only wilder and more desolate than ever. Fine rich virgin soil by thousands of acres was bearing only briars and thistles. Meadow after meadow was utterly barren for want of culture. Nay, by far the greater part of the farm seemed never to have been visited by his servants.

Had they been idle? Some had.

But large numbers had been industrious enough. They had expended a vast amount of labor, and skilled labor too, but they had bestowed it all on the park immediately around the house. This had been cultivated to such a pitch of perfection that the workmen had scores of times quarreled with each other because the operations had interfered with those of his neighbor.

And a vast amount of labor had been lost, in sowing the very same patch for instance, with corn fifty times over in one season, so that the seed never had time to germinate and grow and bear fruit; in caring for the forest trees as if they had been tender saplings; in manuring the soils already too fat, and watering pastures already too wet.

The farmer was positively astonished at the misplaced ingenuity with which labor and seed and manure, skill and time and strength had been wasted with no result. The very same amount of toil and capital, expended according to his directions would have brought the whole demesne into culture and vielded a noble revenue. But season after season rolled away in sad succession, leaving those unbounded acres of various, but all reclaimable soils, barren and useless; and as to the park, it would have been far more productive and perfect had it been relieved of the extraordinary and unaccountable amount energy expended on it.

Why did these laborers act so absurdly? Did they wish to labor in vain? On the contrary They were forever craving for fruit, coveting

good crops, longing for great results. Did they not wish to carry out the farmer's views about his property? Well, they seemed to have that desire, for they were always reading the directions he wrote, and said continually to each other. "You know, we have to bring the whole property into order." But they did not do it.

Some few tried and ploughed up a little plot here and there and sowed corn and other crops. Perhaps these failed, and so the rest got discouraged? Oh, no; they saw that the yield was magnificent; far richer in proportion than they got themselves. They clearly perceived that, but they failed to follow a good example. Nay, when the labor of a few in some distant valley had resulted in a crop they were all unable to gather by themselves, the others would not even go and help them to bring home the sheaves. They preferred watching the weeds among the roses in the overcrowded garden, and counting the blades of grass in the park and the leaves on the trees.

They were fools, surely, not wise men? Traitors, not true servants to their Lord? Ah, I can't tell! You must ask Him that! I only know their Master said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," and that 1,900 years afterwards they had not even mentioned that there was a Gospel to one-half of the world.

"And why call ye Me Lord, Lord, and DO NOT THE THINGS I SAY?"

the Spirit of God that we can know what is the mind of Christ. To really know Christ is to be like Him, and we cannot be like Him unless we are Christ-like, and we cannot be Christ-like, until we have His life coursing through our mortal bodies. "As we have borne the image of the earthly, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly."

However, aside from the Holy Ghost, I notice these several things that make an impression on me, and makes me to realize the necessity for me to have my flesh under subjection to the Spirit, and at the same time make certain this fact: "That God only works through me as long as I remain an unclogged medium through which Christ can be conveyed to the world." The following proves to me that God and man must work together for the salvation, security and ultimate success of man:

- God opened the Red Sea, but it was Moses that stretched out the staff.
- 2. God caused Israel to drink from the rock, but it was Moses that smote the rock.
- God called Enoch home, but it was Enoch that did the walking and the pleasing.
- 4. God put out the desire in Joseph's heart to commit sin with Potiphar's wife, but it was Joseph that did the running.
- It was God that wrecked the ship, but it was Paul who told the men to abide in the ship in order to be saved.
- 6. It was the plan of God for Jacob to be separated from Esau and his house, but it was Jacob that had to come back and kiss and make up.
- We know it's wrong to have youthful lusts, but we are instructed to "flee away from them."

In the face of these evident facts, it can be plainly seen that we must "Present our bodies to God as a living sacrifice" in order to prove our acceptability before God. It is not enough to be Spirit filled, it is vitally necessary to offer God our bodies that He may prove to the world His worth to humanity in the practical way.

These are days when dietitians instruct us to have a well-balanced diet for the purpose of good health. We must be equally as careful and cautious in the balancing of our spiritual diet. If we seem to be spiritual with no practical aspect in our religion, our religion is vain. If we are so taken up with the practical side of religion and with the menial tasks of the church, we also are worshiping in vain.

It would be well to adopt a spiritual barometer in our lives to see if we are well balanced in our spirituality. If we can obey the following, we can almost be assured a future and happy Christian life that God will be pleased to use for the promotion of His great and endless work.

In order for me to be a well balanced Christian, I must be one,

- 1. Who can work for God, and care little who gets the credit in this earth. I know that the rewards will be given in heaven, and what I miss here will be given to me over there.
- 2. Who has a great desire to be in God's house and will do my share to contribute to every necessity, both in a spiritual and practical way. By this I mean, that I will not be one of those supposed Christians that spends half of his time in a whirlpool and the other half in the glory clouds, so as to be blinded to the practical needs of the church. My money will be as consecrated to God as my life.
- 3. Who can preach the Gospel, but not for filthy lucre. I am aware of the fact that the laborer is worthy of his hire, but I will never measure my worth in dollars and cents. I will, in my preaching, win souls for eternity and as Paul said, so I believe, that the seal

- of our ministry are they in the Lord.
- 4. Who will be as holy as my speech and as consecrated as people suppose me to be. I will honor humility, for the sake of peace, rather than to have my way in matters that no matter the outcome, it will not effect me either way.
- 5. Who will not infer that God has favorites because my brethren have more than myself. I will rather infer that God has given me what is due me. What my brother has, works no ill towards me. I am come to realize that while I may want what belongs to another, someone is at that moment wanting that which belongs to me. Therefore, I will be content with such things as I have.
- 6. Who will forgive and forget. One who will be slapped on both cheeks and still not retaliate. In so doing I shall be the greater victor, for I have kept Christ's command.

May God, in these perilous days, keep us in the middle of the road and may our lives give to God the opportunities that He desires . . . an avenue through which He can be beautifully portrayed to a lost and dying humanity.

scriptures for a foundation we can see the great truth of the name of Jesus as the conductor of the cleansing agency, the blood of Jesus Christ.

We have discovered, then, that we have power to become the sons of God through His name (John 1: 12-13). In Acts 2:38 we find "remission of sins" through His name. Again in John 20:31 we found that we receive life through His name. To bring a climatic and strengthening emphasis to this thought, notice the fifth chapter of Acts and Verse 28. "Did we not straitly command you that ye should not teach in this name, and, behold, ye have filled Jerusalem with your doctrine, and intend to bring this man's blood upon us." This curse that the Sanhedrin feared was the curse placed on them for not receiving the name of Jests the Apostles preached it.

The great truth that has been hidden through the ages is that in the name of Jesus lies the power and strength of the blood of Jesus Christ for remission of sins. Thus Paul washed away his sins in baptism as he called upon the name of the Lord.

WATER A TYPE

The water alone is not the cleansing agency in baptism; the water is a type of a grave for burial of the old Adamic nature. The water becomes a potent force for cleansing when the name of Jesus is breathed over the candidate in baptism.

Paul further emphasized this truth when he explained to the church at Rome the true meaning of baptism. "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have

been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin." (Romans 6:3-6).

In this instance Paul demonstrated the fact that the burial of the old man, meaning our sinful, corrupt natures, is accomplished in the watery grave, which is baptism. In this act our old man is crucified and buried with him. The old life of sin and fleshly destruction is buried forever. Thus we rise to walk in newness of life as "new creatures" in Christ Jesus. How marvelous to note that the act of baptism takes on the significance of identification with the death of Christ, and through its performance we "put on Christ."

NEW TESTAMENT CIRCUMCISION

Again in Colossians 2:9-13, the Apostle Paul likened our baptism in the name of Jesus in water as akin to New Testament circumcision. "For in him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily. And ye are complete in him, which is the head of all principality and power: In whom also ye are circumcised with the circumcision made without hands, in putting off the body of sins of the flesh by the circumcision of Christ: Buried with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead. And you, being dead in your sins and the uncircumcision of your flesh, hath he quickened together with him, having forgiven you all trespasses." This is the circumcision that avails the child of God much in the Lord. It is through baptism we understand that we put off the body of the sins of this flesh.

It is undeniably a Biblical truth that the act of baptism is important to the candidate and the church that preaches it. Cleansing of the human life is accomplished through the name of Jesus administered over the burial ceremony in the water. Paul sums it up like this in 1 Corinthians 6:11: "And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God."

4. Jean Paul Richter has this to say of Christ: "The life of Christ concerns him, who being the holiest among the mighty, the mightiest among the holy, lifted with His pierced hands empires off their hinges, and turned the stream of centuries out of its channel, and still governs the ages."

In the light of the witnesses we have heard, both from within the Bible and without, the opponents of Jesus Christ of today are mere pigmies so contemptible in mentality, and so questionable in morality as to be ruled out of every court of testimony where intellectual ability and moral worth have weight.

JESUS, THE MIGHTY GOD, TESTIFIES

As the Master appears to John on that rocky, barren island in the Aegean Sea known as a place of exile, we hear him say:

GREATER BETHEL TABERNACLE OF HOUSTON, TEXAS DEDICATED JANUARY 7, 1955

IN 1929, Brother and Sister O. F. Fauss had planned to seek other fields of labor for the name of the Lord. They were engaged in a revival in St. Louis, in the month of May. God spoke to both of them the same night that they should return to Houston, Texas and build a church for His name in that city. In a few weeks they had preached their way back to Houston, and began services July 18th, in a rented hall. Bro. Fauss' first text was: "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord."

For five years their places of worship were from rented halls to rented halls, from under trees and under tents. In 1935 a down payment was made on a house and lot at 116 N. Palmer St., which was converted into a place of worship, at which time Bro. A. A. Matney was assisting as pastor, while Bro. Fauss was holding meetings in other places until 1937. Then he returned and was determined to "build" for the name of the Lord. A new building was erected in 1940, and in 1954 was sold, and the new location purchased at 8902 Irvington Blvd., where the beautiful new structure now stands.

It was very fitting that Rev. V. A. Guidroz, District Superintendent of the Texas District of the United Pentecostal Church, was chosen as the one to preach the dedication message and dedicate this new building to God. Bro. Guidroz had dedicated the first building in 1935. He referred to the same text he used nearly twenty years ago: "We have a Building." His sermon embodied the theme: "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." It was indeed a message

liever. Perhaps the reason Paul's life was so fruitful was because he was "in deaths oft." In fact, "dying" was a daily routine with him. The life of the church grew out of his death for he said, "So then death worketh in us, but life in you." (2 Corinthians 4:12). Prior to this statement, however, his position was that of "always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our mortal flesh. (2 Corinthians 4:10-11). Remember, the corn of wheat must die to bear fruit.

Paul associated his hope of a resurrection and eternal life to this dying. In Philippians 3:10-11 he gives forth an utterance which should likewise be on our lips -"That, I may know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his suffering, being made conformable unto his death; if by any means I might attain unto the resurrection of the dead."

And finally, the glories that will be the believers' to enjoy throughout eternity are the rewards and part of the fruits of dying. "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God: And if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ; if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together" (Romans 8:16-17). How else may we "suffer with him" except by identifying ourselves with him and Calvary?

However, Sister Bailey will be staying on until Brother and Sister Jack T. Langham and family arrive to superintend the work. We hope that will not be longer than early spring. Liberia is not an easy field, and much prayer is needed for the work there.

A noble work could be done in our churches, if groups that are interested, and gifted with intercession, (that rare and uncoveted ministry) would meet together with your pastor's approval at least once a week, for prayer and intercession, for the different missionaries and fields and works, and for the fin-

ances to be provided to carry on. I believe we are more lacking in this more than any one thing: much more than we realize. Satan could be defeated, and finances would be forth coming to meet every need.

How many will join this "prayer warrior" group and meet at least once each week for an hour or two and pray. If you do not have a "Missionary Map" showing the pictures and location of our U. P. C.
