Who Are These?

E ARE fields of standing grain. We are millions of individual souls, unharvested, standing like millions of uncut stalks of grain in the harvest field. Like stalks of wheat have grains of value, so we, though still standing, are of value to the World's husbandman who has created us.

It seems that whoever will put forth the effort, the time, the sacrifice, the money and come and get us—we will be sheaves for them. Whoever cares enough about us to come and get us—we are theirs.

But we would like to be "Sheaves for Christ." If only His real, true church would come and gather us. We know that the Master does want us for He said, "The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest." And again He said, "Say not ye There are yet four months and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

The Conquerors want to help gather us. They have a program called "Sheaves for Christ," by which they wish to help the home and foreign missionary effort of the United Pentecostal Church. The Big Barns

ND HE said, This will I do, I will pull down my barns, and build greater, and there will I bestow all my fruits and my goods." Luke 12:18.

The farmer in this account was no doubt a young man, for he said "thou hast much goods laid up for many years." He believed that he had a long time yet to live. He was a man perplexed and troubled, but he was not troubled because he had not, but because he had. It was not the problem of too little, but of too much. He stands at the crossroads of his life, perplexed with success, and loaded down with abundance. "What shall I do?" he questions. It is not the question of the prodigal who is at the bottom, and to whom it seems all roads are closed. His was the more complex situation, because there were many things open to him. The decisions made at the top of the ladder are often more serious and full of more importance than those made at the bottom. As the young man stands there with the weight of many possessions on his mind, and the problem of management in his hands, he ponders the decision, and then announces with fervor and excitement his answer. The answer will be: "bigger barns, security in earthly possessions, soul take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry, thou hast much goods laid up for many years." Strangely silent in his decision is he toward God, the church, and the cause of God. All of these are completely absent from his plans. God was not included in any of his thoughts, neither were the needs of his fellow men. The only fellow considered was "I." There are far too many people who have "I" trouble.

As night shadows settled on the Judean or Galilean farm home, I think the flickering candle burned in the office of the rich young farmer. With pencil in hand, he roughly sketches the plan for "big barns." Day dreams frolicked through his mind. He saw himself the biggest farmer in the country, he saw his farm the talk of the whole territory, he saw bulging barns, lots of money, pleasure in living. The word that is the key to all his thinking is "greater."

But as his dreams grew, and his satisfaction abounded, into the stillness of his office came a voice, clear in its diction, powerful in its authority, plain in its words, final in its decree. In unrestrained and naked facts it spoke to the young farmer who looked up from his hastily sketched plans, "Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee, then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided?" And with this question the master leaves the account, and we are left to guess the horror, the awfulness of that night in the big home. A scream for mercy, too late. A call upon God but with the empty echo, "Thou fool." The struggle for breath and the final overwhelming victory of death are all a part of this tragic scene. On the vacant desk lay the plans for the "greater barns" but the Bible lay dusty and unread, no marks to show its use, no tear stains upon its pages. Big barns but no mansion; full granaries but an empty soul, known in the big city, but unknown in the Holy City.

I should like to bring this story of Christ down to the present day. If any parable explains the philosophy and thinking of our present day, it is this one.

The Twentieth Century is surely the century of the "big barns." Man has catapulted into the unknown future as if carried there by some supernatural power. In fifty years man has traveled more in industry, science and education than in all of the other 5900 years from Adam to 1900. In transportation he has come from the mud roads to the paved highways that cross and criss-cross our country like ribbons. He has climbed out of the stagecoach into the jet. He has traded the musket, which if successful in its aim, could kill or maim one man for the H-Bomb that can wipe out whole cities by its explosion and pollute thousands of square miles by the radiation fall out. Time does not allow the long list of unbelievable achievements that man has made in the past few years. The world has built "greater barns." Our barns are full. The world's powers are most concerned now with what we have on our hands. Where are we going to put all of these things. It seems that we are plagued by our possessions, enslaved by our power, and mocked by our knowledge.


Politically, the race is on. Whose barns are the greatest? Who has the biggest and most bombs? Industrially the same is true. Who can make the biggest car, and who can sell the most? On and on the story goes, with the key to our living "greater barns." No one is satisfied as the continual mad race goes on. But is it possible that the voice that spoke in that day so long ago is being spoken today, "Thou fool."

The Value Of A Soul

ND WHEN he had called the people unto him with his disciples also, he said unto the m. Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall save it. For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" Mark 8:34-37.

Let us carefully consider the word "soul," for a few moments. I cannot define it and I believe it would be impossible for you to define it to your own satisfaction. You do not have a soul, you are a soul. I cannot see you; I only see the fleshly temple you live in. We are clothed with a fleshly tabernacle, and we see through the physical eyes. We hear through the physical sense of the ears. We feel with the physical sense of the nerves. We speak with the vocal cords, but we are not the fleshly body.

We can search carefully through the New Testament and find many definite facts, concerning the soul. We learn from the story of Lazarus and the Rich Man that the soul is indestructible, and that it will live on after death, and will exist throughout eternity.

In school we learn through the study of science that nothing can be ultimately destroyed. Matter cannot be destroyed, we can only change its form. The same can be true about the soul. The soul of man can be changed in form and nature but cannot be ultimately destroyed.

If the soul of mankind is to live on forever, then there must be a high value placed upon it. Jesus is saying in our text, in other words, if a man could possibly accumulate all the wealth of this world, all the gold, all the silver, all the diamonds, all the money, king's wealth, queen's wealth, president's wealth, ruler's wealth, and put it all together until it becomes a great mountain of riches; yet the soul of man is of more importance, and is more valuable than all the wealth of the world.

The poet has said:

"To lose your wealth is much To lose your health is more, To lose your soul is such a loss That nothing can restore."

Men seek wealth in this life, thinking in doing so they are finding security. And I suppose if a person has enough money he can buy his way out of almost any condition. We are told in Zeph. 1:13-18. "Therefore their goods shall become a booty, and their houses a desolation: They shall also build houses, but not inhabit them; and they shall plant vineyards, but not drink the wine thereof. The day of the Lord is near, it is near, and hasteth greatly, even the voice of the day of the Lord: The mighty men shall cry there bitterly. That day is the day of wrath, a day of trouble and distress, a day of wasteness and desolation, a day of darkness and gloominess, a day of clouds and thick darkness, a day of the trumpet and alarm against the fenced cities, and against the high towers. And I will bring distress upon men, that they shall walk like blind men, because they have sinned against the Lord: And their blood shall be poured out as dust, and their flesh as dung. Neither their silver or their gold shall be able to deliver them in the day of the Lord's wrath; but the whole land shall be devoured by the fire of his jealousy: for he shall make even a speedy riddance of all them that dwell in the land."

There was a time when thousands of German people felt secure. They had their nice homes, and many fine possessions. They felt pretty much at ease. But war came along and bombs began to fall, troops began to march in, and within a short time their possessions were gone, and their homes were destroyed. There is no security in wealth. And though a man gain wealth of this life and

A Salute To Motherhood

WHO CAN find a virtuous woman? for her price is far a bove rubies."
Proverbs 31:10. This text is taken from the words of King Lemuel, the Prophecy that his mother taught him. The king then prints in glowing terms a word picture of a good woman.

The Pilgrim edition of the holy Bible has this to say about King Lemuel's description. "These words sum up the Hebrew ideal of honorable womanhood, secure in the home where God is obeyed. This is the kind of home in which the Lord Jesus grew up and as at Bethany was a welcome guest."

Matthew Henry says, "This is a description of a good woman of those days, but the general outlines equally suit every age and nation. This description let all women daily study, who desire to be truly beloved and respected, useful and honorable."

As we study this whole 31st chapter of Proverbs we cannot help but compare this description of perfect womanhood to that of our day. The trend of the world

is to glamourize body exposure of the female, and sex appeal tends to put one in the highest paying brackets. The newsstands are so loaded with reading matter advertising and portraying the human body that an upright person is ashamed to buy a newspaper at these places. Even some of the higher type magazines are slowly coming under the influence of this evil and their covers have such outrageous pornographic displays that a real Christian is ashamed for the postman to deliver them to the door of his home.

We are told that one out of every three marriages is destined to go on the rocks. Statistics are positively shocking but are quickly forgotten, but the terrible suffering brought into the home by divorce is all around us. Much of this unrest can be placed right at the door of these glamour magazines and television shows depicting a way of life and dress far beyond that of the poor little wife and Mother who thinks she is tied down to a humdrum existence taking care of a husband, house and babies. How far has modern thinking so warped our minds that the queen of the home is ready to exchange her crown for one of gaudy tinsel.

But there is a brighter side to this gloomy picture. Our great country was settled by God fearing men who had God fearing women by their side. On a cold November morning in 1620 the Mayflower, a small vessel, approached Plymouth Rock. On board were 41 men, women and children. From this small beginning a mighty nation was born, destined to be a leading power among the great nations of the

world. Great men have been her leaders; men from every walk of life, from the little log cabin to the stately mansions. What was the history of these men?

All of us have at some time wondered about what makes a great man great. Was he born that way? Was it environment? Was it chance? One woman decided to find the answer. She is the wife of a New Jersey Presbyterian Minister. After making a study of Mothers of famous men including President Eisenhower she wrote the book, "Mothers of America." She writes that what a child becomes depends on the Mother even more than his own efforts. She has analyzed the character of nineteen women including the Mothers of the president, Mark Twain, the Mayo Bros., Dr. Ralph Bunche, J. C. Penney, Orville and Wilbur Wright and James Whistler, the painter. The writer said she found all had one outstanding trait. They emphasized servantship in life rather than working for the sake of money. All these Mothers were deeply religious. All taught their children to take on responsibility and to share in household duties from the time they could walk. All were accessible when their children needed them.

To this number we would add the names of George Washington who had a Godly Mother. Abraham Lincoln whose Mother died when he was ten years old. A Godly stepmother reared him to fear God. President Woodrow Wilson's father was a minister, his mother's father was a minister. They wanted their son to be a minister but saw his desire was to become a teacher, so

In the Celebes

(One Hundred Three Baptized in Three Months)

WEREPORT that God is working with us and helping us here in Sulawesi, and as proof the United Pentecostal Church is progressing. Praise the Lord, who has fulfilled His promise in Matthew 28:20 toward myself and family here.

The Lord has moved and used me as a small vessel for bringing many souls to repentance, and release from sins such as gambling, smoking, theatres, drinking and other worldliness. Hallelujah! These have felt freedom through redemption by the blood of the Lamb, and we hope to see hundreds, and even thousands more receive this experience, for we know this is the will of God for the whole world—also for Sulawesi. Glory for Jesus!

Several months ago I sent a report of our work saying 80 had been baptized. Now we have had three more baptismal services. In September, twenty-seven were buried in His Name, in October fifty-three, and in the last baptismal service for the year of 1954, twenty-three in November. We pray that God shall watch over and establish these souls.

In August and November I had a conference with seventeen young workers and ministers from here. We talked over the work in general and also sent out some into the interior. Brother and Sister N. Puturuhu left for Toradja (my birthplace) in September. We have had a report from there that they have opened three churches with the help of M. Sanggi dan P. Songi from Makassar. These folks feel the call for God's work and are fine workers. Glory for Jesus! Although there is danger and persecution toward Christians, the Lord is helping. Brother Puturuhu dares to preach the truth and gave up a good position with a large salary to work 100% for the Lord. I trust the Lord will protect and help that the Lord's work may continue to prosper. You that read this and also feel a responsibility for souls, pray for us.

Brother and Sister Peter Jacub and Johannes Rerungallo are my helpers in Makassar. In February I began giving Bible studies to twelve young men, and now they also help Brother D. Surugallang and me in the work here. May the Lord call many young people who are willing to go out in this needy field.

November 30, the family J. Rakian went home to Langoan, Menado, Northern Sulawesi. They intend to open a work there. We trust the Lord will use them there and give us a church as evidence He is with them. We believe that God, Who has called them, will bless until every part of Sulawesi experiences a Holy Ghost revival in the coming year. May churches be established everywhere and His Name glorified. I, myself, hope to make a trip to the interior in 1955.

Besides those baptized, we are now seeing some filled with the Spirit, but are hoping for a real outpouring, for this is His seal upon our work. Also, we have seen miracles performed. Altogether four insane people have been healed and others healed of various diseases.

We request that you, who read and feel interested in souls in Indonesia, pray, pray and help until the truth wins and God's church is perfected. We thank you and pray that God shall pour out His blessing upon you abundantly.

THE DORCAS SISTERS IN BARRANQUILLA, COLOMBIA, SOUTH AMERICA

"Now there was in Joppa a certain disciple named Tabitha, which by interpretation is called Dorcas; this woman was full of good works and almsdeeds which she did." Acts 9:36.

THIS is the spirit of the Dorcas Sisters in Barranguilla. A little over a year ago, we felt the need of the sisters in the church, coming together in their own service, mainly, for Bible teaching and prayer. Many of the sisters had expressed their desire for more Christian teaching, that they might be better mothers and wives in the home. With this purpose in mind, the services were started. We did not realize, that as we sought more of the Lord, He would do, as He always does, exceedingly abundantly above all we ask or think!

Our meetings were composed of testimonies, songs of praise, a message from the Word of God, and prayer requests. Since we have these services, it seems, our sisters are melted together into a unity and love, that did not exist among us before. We have pledged to pray one for the other each day. Besides, we not only remember the prayer request in the meeting, but in our daily devotions, until God answers. And we could give many a testimony of definite answers to prayer. "Call unto me, and I will answer thee, and shew thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not." Jer. 33:3.

At the time we started our meetings, the church in Ponedera was being constructed. Ponedera is a nearby town, or what one would call, an outstation from Barranquilla. The work there is now established with a native pastor, and

also a school. As we were praying the needs to be supplied for the building, we decided to help with our offerings. The doors cost \$200. pesos, so we decided to try to pay for the doors. Not one of our sisters have money. We are all poor in material things, some are very poor, with no income at all. One old widow woman, was one of the first converts in Barranquilla, and has no income whatever. She arose one afternoon, and suggested that those who did not have money for the offering, would fast one dinner a week, which would be worth about 50 Colombian cents, and use that for their offering. At that time we had between 20 and 25 in attendance, and she said if each one would do that, we could pay for the doors, in the allotted time, which was five months. We did it. Praise God! Then, we went, in a body, to the dedication of the church. It had the floor laid, but it was not yet paid for. So, in the dedication service, one of the sisters presented the last payment on the doors, and also, made the announcement that the sisters wished to take the burden of paying for the floor in the church. At that moment, one of the women, who cannot regularly attend the services, and had not been able to share in the offering for the doors, came forward with a peso (Colombian dollar). We said it would be the first dollar toward the floor. Simultaneously, others started toward the altar with pesos, and

finally, Brother Larson said, that the pesos of the brethren were good, too, and they came forward, and we had \$68. pesos, to begin with at the end of that service. This was the end of May or first of June. We had to increase our offerings to make \$50. pesos a month, if we paid for the floor by the end of the year. There was only one month, we didn't make it, but the next month made up for it. The Lord was faithful, Hallelujah!

The first month of this year, we received \$54. pesos. With this, we desire to send forth a native pastor into the territory of the Magdelena. There is not one witness of baptism in Jesus' Name there. We are praying God to open this door to the Full Gospel—you can help us in prayer.

This month the offerings are to be used to fix the piano in the church. It is in a terrible condition and hardly serves to play at all. It was second-handed when we bought it in 1942. If it were in the North, they wouldn't be able to auction it for ten dollars! So, the ladies are going to do what they can to see if a man can fix the strings a little so we will not be without music, in the church.

Just today, a letter arrived from Maria Laya, the school teacher in Ponedera. They are having school out under a big tree. She said, "This will do, until the rains come." It looks like our next project, will need to be a roof, in the back yard of the Ponedera church. Praise God! We are happy in the service of THE KING. Hallelujah!

Stirring Account Of Joreign Missionary Secretary's Visit To South American Countries

POR MANY years Brazil has been on my mind and heart. In fact, Brazil was involved when God moved on my heart in June 1923 and put a burden on me for the missionary cause that has lasted. Brazil was uppermost, but soon it spread to all the world, and I felt I wanted to take the Gospel everywhere. I had been saved three years before that, but was converted again that night, this time to the missionary cause.

Brother A. Verner Larsen (Missionary to Colombia for eighteen years) and I left Barranquilla on the afternoon of February 24 flying to Caracas, Venezuela. That same evening we took a plane to Rio De Janerio. I was moved in amazement and wonder at the beauty of that city and country; actually it is unsurpassed. God moved on our behalf in giving us a friend, in the person of a young officer in the Brazilian navy that was traveling on the same plane with us. We soon became friendly. This young man was very kind, and took us to his home in Rio for lunch before taking us to a hotel. We found in him and his wife and friends what we believe to be a token that God had sent us, and wanted to work in Brazil. This young man spoke Portuguese, Spanish and English, he gave us much valuable information and help, even paid our taxi fare from the air port to the city. Also he engaged the hotel for us which we are sure saved us a fine figure. Living is very cheap at the present in Brazil; we got a fine hotel room with breakfast for \$12.50 for one week, each. The exchange is seventy five of their dollars for one of ours.

But, I was moved most of all with the challenge to us for evan-

gelism in the nearly 3,000,000 inhabitants in Rio De Janerio, and the 58,000,000 in all Brazil and NOT ONE BAPTIZED IN JESUS' NAME. There are several large coastal cities with population ranging from a few hundred thousand to two and three millions. San Paulo is only six hours ride by car on a good road from Rio with over two million inhabitants. I understand there is a Pentecostal group from the United States that has started in San Paulo with two large tents and having good results. What about us? When are we going to do likewise?


The Swedish Pentecostal brethren have been in Brazil since 1911, and have many churches. The country is open, and there is freedom of religion granted to all, even to the holding of street and tent meetings with police protection. After one week in Brazil we went on south to visit Brother and sister Tolstad in Montevideo Uruguay. We found Brother and Sister Tolstad working hard. They have done well in the time they have been there. Uruguay is not so easy as some places to win souls, on account of the life of ease and unconcern in which they live. This is a wealthy little republic with plenty of freedom and not much poverty, until the people are surely "at ease in Zion" so to speak. But, in spite of this, Brother and Sister Tolstad have a good start, and some very fine people that have accepted the Lord under their ministry, and the prospects for the work there are good. A brother Sly of the Jesus Name faith went there over twenty years ago, and after a brief ministry of about three years, he passed on in February, 1934, at the age of 68 years, and is buried there under the

Southern Cross waiting the resurrection and his reward. I am sure his reward will be great. I wonder why a man at this age had to go to the field? It must have been that God could not get any younger ones to go. John says, "I write unto you young men because you are strong." Brother Sly is still remembered by the people, and his good works and Godly life is still spoken of. We found three that had been baptized in Jesus' Name by him, and heard of a fourth. It was 19 years from the time Brother Sly died until we got around to sending Brother and Sister Tolstad there. They told us interesting things about this man of God, that God used such a short time in the Mission field. One day he went out to a nearby town to preach the Gospel. He was riding on a white horse. The liberty was not so good as now, and the persecution from the R. C. church was severe. The priest sent word to this town to kill the man that was coming to the town on a white horse. The mob was ready to obey the orders of the priest. But, Brother Sly's horse took sick just before he got to town, he did not know its sickness, but the horse just lay down and refused to go any farther; so he walked to town and preached. When he came back the horse was well and he rode home not knowing anything about what had happened. He walked unharmed through the midst of the men that were looking for him. And thus a great victory was won under the hand of God that day. Tent and open air services are permitted in Uruguay. We could even have a camp meeting there. One day Brother Tolstad took his public address system and tape recorder

"Greater Barns In Religion"

Nowhere is this philosophy more apparent than in the world of religion. The world's biggest religious meeting met last year at Evanston, Illinois, the World Council of Churches. As the dignitaries of the protestant church world came from all over the world, there it was another sign of the steady but sure march that is being made to a "World Church." The faint whisper of a generation ago, "church unity," is beginning to mount up to a strong cry. "Let's get together." Let's build a great big barn and include under its roof everything regardless of creed, belief, or doctrine. It's a religious world gone mad over numbers.

Much is made of the fact that over 90,000,000 Americans are now church members. Piously we shake our heads and say, "See, everything is all right—the barn is big." Something is wrong with this feeling, for even though 90,000,000 are church members, the crime wave is on the increase and stands at a record today, the prisons are filled to capacity, the drink bill of "Christian" America is over 8 billions of dollars, the gambling bill over 16 billions. Friend, who is doing all of this? Much of it must be done by that same 90 million who have their names on the church rolls of our country. The axe is at the root of the tree, and the Christ who twice purged the temple is not blind to the "spiritual wickedness in high places."

The New Barns

This young man was a revolutionist. "I will pull down." Today the "old barns" are gone. In their place we have the new modern and streamlined ones. Often the old message of repentance with godly sorrow is gone, replaced with easily attained church membership. Baptism in Jesus' name is gone from the church world as a whole, and in its place the man-

made baptism in the titles. The church world has completely destroyed, as far as they are concerned the baptism of the Holy Ghost as evidenced by speaking with tongues. The complete and absolute deity of our Lord Jesus Christ is either confused by the trinity or denied by the modernistic liberals. Bible standards of morality are coming down fast in our age, as a sex-laden and pleasure mad age indulges in sin, and lays the foundation for a new order based upon new moral ideas.

The Greater Barns Of The Pentecostals

Could it be possible that we Pentecostals are possessed by the philosophy expressed by this farmer? It is, if we depend upon new and expensive church buildings, trained and talented singers and musicians, education and sermon know-how, natural ability and personality at the expense of real consecration and prayer to God. New and fine churches may either be full of God's power or empty of the same. Talent may be worthwhile or it may be empty and dead. I feel that a great need is a humbling of ourselves before God, a weeping between the porch and the altar, a God given burden for the lost souls.

For some, new barns are needed, for the old ways do not fit into the old barns. There are a lot of things that are crying for admittance into the church today, but they will not fit. Worldly and ungodly television shows do not fit into the "old barns" of holiness, fads and fashions of modern dress contrary to God's Word will not fit. Pride, jealousies, and envyings do not fit; prayerless lives and unanointed sermons will not do. "Stand in the ways, seek and ask for the old paths, wherein is the good way, and walk therein."

Conquerors, What Are Your Aims?

This farmer was a young man. He felt that he had most of his life ahead of him. He was faced with the decision as to where to put it. For him, it was greater barns. It became a life lived for self and worldly gain. He knew nothing of giving himself to God

Because once they begin to sink into the awful blackness of eternity, they will never know any more goodness, or kindness.

I heard the story of a man who was an alcoholic, and his wife was a fine Christian woman. He would come in at all hours of night and make her get up and prepare him a hot meal. She always did it with a smile on her face and a song on her lips. One night one of his companions came home with him, and

encouraged him in that direction. President Coolidge's grandmother was a very pious woman and when he stayed with her she made him read the Bible every day.

During our last war a disgraceful situation arose when numbers of girls divorced their husbands after they were sent to foreign soil to fight. These were only a few in comparison to thousands of fine wives and Mothers who were faithful through the bitter months and years, keeping the home functioning smoothly and rearing fine upright children alone.

A notable example of these fine women is Mme. de Castries, wife of General Christian de Castries, who was taken prisoner by the Reds after the fall of Dien Bien Phu. Wife of an army man, she had followed him from place to place making a home where she could. Time and again over the years he had fought, been wounded and taken prisoner. Then on that memorable day, after holding out against the enemy for weeks, he had to surrender, he sent this message to the wife he knew was waiting for word from him. "Do not despair. We shall find each other again somewhere." With courage and patience Mme. de Castries waited, writing to boost his courage and sending him what things she could to add to his comfort. Finally, many months later he was released and his message to a faithful wife became a reality.

These are not pinup girls nor glamour babies we are speaking of now. These are women who can stand a test. These are wives and Mothers of real men. As one writer has so aptly said, "So long as life is one of moonlight and roses a beautiful but dumb wife may be many a man's cup of tea. If, however, life makes heavy demands upon him or draw him into danger, not once but again and again, he has need of a partner in marriage who has stamina and plenty of it.

In those times of stress and strain when she upholds and sustains him she is beautiful indeed to him."

Shall we not also pay tribute to those wives and Mothers whose sons and husbands will never return. Mme. de Castries' husband came home, but these women have their hopes and ambitions buried on some foreign soil or at sea. They must, in the face of desolation go on, teaching the children moral and spiritual values, always turning to them a cheerful countenance while the heart is filled with sorrow and eyes burning with unshed tears.

One of the saddest scenes in the Bible is that of a Mother as she stands at her window looking, waiting, longing for the son who went out to battle never to return. In the 5th Chapter of Judges we are told of Sisera, the great captain of the armies of Canaan. He had gone out to fight against the army of Israel. He is defeated but escapes, taking refuge in the tent of Jael the Kenite who kills him, driving a nail through his temple as he sleeps. At the going down of the sun, when he should be returning from battle, his mother stands at the window, and cries through the lattice, "Why is his chariot so long in coming? Why tarry the wheels of his chariots?" Her maids try to comfort her, to reassure her but she pays no heed. Her eyes are searching the hills, down the valley for the son who will never return. Though she was an enemy, yet Mother love is universal. From the beginning of time Mothers have given their sons in war and shall continue to do so until the end of time, but blessed is that Mother who has done her best to instil the love of God in their hearts. God will not leave her comfortless.

In the good word of God we have some outstanding examples of glorious self-sacrificing Mother-hood. We could not fail to mention the Mother of Moses who planned and carried out his escape from death because she saw he was a goodly child. And Hannah who suffered great humiliation until she prayed earnestly and God gave her a son, Samuel, the great prophet-



By the Executive Board:

to a small town and set it up in the park; the police even helped connect it up. There are a few Russians in Uruguay that were Baptized in Jesus' Name years ago in Russia. One day we drove out about 60 miles to visit a Russian farmer. He told us he was baptized in Jesus' Name in Russia in 1924, and that there were many of the Apostolic faith. He seemed to be well established in the oneness and baptism in Jesus' Name. The only draw back found in Uruguay was that Sister Tolstad was not in very good health, she has worked far beyond her strength, and needs our prayers that God will touch her body, and make it possible for her to remain on the field. If He does not touch her, she will have to leave. But, they are willing to stay and trust God if you will help them pray and believe. Who is going to pray the "prayer of faith" for Sister Tolstad's body? Many of you remember Sister Freeman telling us of her serious illness in Africa, and how God burdened one Brother in the home land to pray, and how God definitely healed her. Let's pray the same will happen to Sister Tolstad. Sickness is common on the mission fields where disease is more prevalent than at home, and conditions not so good. It is easy to get discouraged, and maybe leave the field before God's time - when He really wants to send a great victory, if we would PRAY IN THE HOME LAND.

After twelve days in Uruguay we jumped across the wide mouth of the River Plate to Buenos Aires, Argentina to where Brother and Sister Leonard Supulvda are laboring. Brother Supulvda belongs to the Apostolic Church of the Faith in Jesus Christ in Mexico. He is the brother that God used in Central America about five years ago to bring many into the Apostolic faith. He has only been

has a good little work started for the Lord. We also met a fine big Russian brother in his work. The first night in the service this brother broke down and cried out loud two or three times. He was crying for joy, and was so touched to see us. He said he knew there were many brothers in the United States and Canada, but did not know how to contact them. Because the Missionary that brought the message to Russia in 1912 and 1913 was from the United States and Canada, we tried to learn the name of this missionary, but he did not know it. He said this missionary baptized many in Jesus' Name, although he himself was not baptized until 1926 by a man that was converted under this missionary. He said that in 1912 or 1913 there was a general in the former Czar's army that got converted, and became a great preacher of this message in Russia, and that many accepted it in those days. Also he said a Catholic Bishop got saved, and preached this truth in those days before the revolution. We asked him about the work in Russia today. He said he knew there were many there of this faith, but he could not get in contact with them, he sends letters, but no replies come. But he does hear from them in Poland and East Germany. This man gave us the picture of the faithful exponent of the truth in Russia in 1926 that baptized him in Jesus' Name, if we can get a good cut, we will put it in the Herald. God bless this man. We hope he is still alive and preaching the Gospel. What a resurrection it will be! Pray for Brother Supulvda as he labors in this greatest city in the southern hemisphere. Liberty is not good in Argentina, but it looks like God is working; pray. Brother Supulvda is a fine worker, and his wife is a great help to him. Our three days with them will long be remembered.

some missionaries that are considering going to Chile soon, and we wanted all the information we could get. The work started in Chile in 1906 in the Methodist Church in answer to much prevailing prayer, the Holy Ghost falling on many. But after two years in 1908 those that had accepted this manifestation of the Spirit, were compelled to move out and organize. They organized under the Methodist discipline, accepting their doctrines and methods, only adding the baptism of the Holy Ghost speaking with tongues. This organization is the strongest protestant group in Chile with 120,000 members. On Sunday morning we attended their Sunday School. When we entered it seemed more like a "Tarrying Service." They were shouting, singing, seeking the Holy Ghost, and even dancing. It did not entirely stop when Sunday School started, some kept on seeking, but no one seemed much excited or took much notice of it, a few helped them pray. As the Sunday School proceeded Brother Larsen and I kept wondering and guessing how many were present. We guessed there were over a thousand. But, when the number was announced it was 1487, they seemed to show up from everywhere. The superintendent exhorted them to work harder as they were down a little that Sunday. It had been 1700 before that. One fine young man gave us much attention and information. He took us to their open air meeting in a large park in the afternoon. This service went on for two and one half hours with testimonies and exhortations and songs. There were 50 instruments in this service. Many testimonies were given to the marvelous grace of God to hundreds that listened. Young men and women were call-

ed on to speak by the leader, that gave thrilling words of what God could do. Their zeal and blessing was commendable. They told us to be sure to come to the night service, as the people would really be there. We began wondering what they meant, and if there could be more than was in the morning service and Sunday School. The service started exactly on time, and we arrived at the same time. But to our amazement we found the church packed, and many standing in the back. We elbowed our way through the standing crowd, and was led to one of the balconies near the pulpit where we could see all, and was given a seat on the steps. Again in this service they were dancing from the pulpit to the doors, and even in the balconies. But everything was "decently and in order" and the dancing stopped when the music stopped. There were 2,000 people present that night. We were recognized in the service, and a welcome given us, but we were not asked to speak; because the Bishop was away that day to the conference and he had not left word for anyone to be asked to speak. The assistant pastor brought the message. Also, they gave us a little information of what they are doing. He said they had several churches (four or five) in the city besides that one, although this was the head one and the Bishop was the pastor, and that they were all filled to the doors at the same time; and that they had to ask some of the folk from that church to attend some of the others to make more room there. We did not find any in Chile baptized in Jesus' Name, and as far as we know there are none. This field needs the full Gospel of the Apostolic message. You ask me what was the secret of their blessing and success. My answer is; good

organization, good leaders, and above all, they are workers. They really work, and get right down to where the people live and reach them. They granted liberty to the Spirit, too, as far as they knew which is a big factor in succeeding in the work of the Lord. "Without me ye can do nothing" said Jesus. What did this do to me? It inspired me to work more, and to try to use the native more, and teach them the doctrines of the Bible. It also made me cry—Oh! God, let young people with our message consecrate to Jesus. Remember these people were entirely native Chilians, leaders and all. We stayed in Chile from Friday until Monday evening, then journeyed on to Colombia where I have been in Brother Drost's work for two weeks. Brother Larsen with his good Spanish was a great help and blessing to me on this trip. Some of his friends in the home land made it possible for him to take this trip. Next month we will write you about the marvelous Apostolic Jesus Name revival that swept the Caluca Valley in Colombia where 1,000 people were swept into the Kingdom of God in the past four years under Brother Drost's ministry, and the revival is still going on.
