

THE 1955 GENERAL CONFERENCE

HE 31st General Conference of the United Pentecostal Church convened in Tulsa, Oklahoma from September 23-28, 1955. The happenings in this great conference are now history, but undoubtedly the events that took place will be relived in the hearts and minds, for many months to come, of the some 3,000 people that gathered for this momentous occasion. The Tulsa Municipal Auditorium which seated 2,868 was filled to capacity many times and on the Saturday evening service was filled to over-flowing. Most of the states of the Union were represented by either a delegate or a minister of the United Pentecostal Church. There were also some representatives of our missionary group namely: Brother Ellis Scism and family from South India; Brother W. R. Pardue and family from Indonesia; Sister Geneva Bailey from Liberia; Brother W. R. Pair from Jamaica; and we also had two representatives from the Apostolic organization in Old Mexico.

The blessings of the Lord were very rich indeed from the very beginning of the conference to the very last. Perhaps, we could say this was the most spiritual and beneficial conference that we have ever been privileged to attend. There seemed to be a deeper consecration and a wide-spread enthusiasm concerning the future work of our organization. The one single factor that possibly promoted the general good feeling among the people of God was the establishment of the 8:45 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. prayer meeting every morning. This prayer generated a wonderful spirit of consecration, worship, devotion, and enthusiasm toward the work of God.

We were welcomed to the city of Tulsa by the three pastors: Brother and Sister C. P. Williams; Brother U. L. Massey, and Brother B. L. Still. These fine folks proved to be a great blessing as host to our conference. The city of Tulsa also gave us a grand welcome and the newspapers high-lighted our conference services daily. All these things proved to inspire us to do what we could do and what our hands found to do to make the conference all the more enjoyable for all concerned.

Another great feature of this year's conference was the fact of the many messages that were preached. Never in our history has the conference furnished as many preachers to preach a message as it did at this conference. We were blessed by every message that was preached, and every minister that spoke did his best to convey to us what was on his heart. Every message was a masterpiece in its own right.

On the very first morning of the opening of the 31st General Conference Brother H. M. Hansford, Laurel, Mississippi, spoke to us for about twenty-five minutes on the subject "Great Dangers Confronting Our Fellowship." His text was taken from Revelation 2:1-5 and Luke 16:8-9. He brought out the fact that we of this present generation are enjoying the fruits of the pioneers, some of whom are with us today. He also said that to assure us of a continued great fellowship we need the old time power of God. He also stated that we do not need to seek other houses for the glory of God for we have God's glory in our own house just as the woman who lost the coin, lost it in her own house, and we need not look other places to find the glory of God, except in our own house. This truly was a good message from the Word of God. In the 11:15 service after the presentation of the General Board members to the conference, Brother James E. Petty, Indianapolis, Indiana, spoke to us for about forty-five minutes. He took his text from Amos 4:12, which

reads, 'Prepare to meet thy God." His sermon subject was, "A Date With Destiny." Brother Petty spoke under the anointing of the Holy Ghost and brought to our hearts many new things concerning our date with destiny. He brought out the fact that many people court God but they never marry Him. He also brought out the thought that some say that Nicodemus was a secret disciple of the Lord, but Brother Petty stated that there was never such a thing as a secret disciple, for everyone that was a disciple of the Lord would be willing to broadcast, even from the housetop, that he was a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ. Truly this message will ring in our hearts for many months to come.

On Friday afternoon at 1:30 there was a reading of all the reports of the different departments of the Church. Every department gave a very good report of the progress in their respective departments for the past year. God really blessed in a wonderful way, both in a spiritual and a financial way. In the evening service Brother A. T. Morgan,

the General Superintendent of the United Pentecostal Church, preached the conference message. Brother Morgan, as usual, delivered to the congregation a wonderful message, which can be found in this issue of the Herald.

On Saturday morning, after the usual prayer service, Brother N. J. Bibbs, District Superintendent of Indiana, spoke to us for about fortyfive minutes. His admonition and exhortation was very well received and was very helpful to all of us. The theme of his message was brought out as Paul spoke of himself, "I keep my body under subjection." Brother Bibbs spoke directly to the church and I am sure his admonition will be very beneficial to those present. Brother A. H. Browning, District Superintendent of the Texico District, was the other chosen speaker for the Saturday morning session. spoke a very well-rounded sermon on the subject, "Keeper of the Virgins." Brother Browning brought out many points of interest on this subject bringing in about Esther, who became the queen of King

Ahasuerus. He brought out the thought that the ministry was the one who was responsible for the saints of God and was in a sense the keeper of the virgins who were to be presented to the Lord Jesus Christ at His coming. The minister's responsibility is to keep them chaste and clean and pure through the Word of God. He was not to offer them anything that was not necessary and he was not to keep back anything that would be for their purification and for them righting themselves for the coming of Christ.

The Saturday afternoon service was the business service in which most of the elections were handled and in which a fine spirit prevailed. The results of the elections can be found on another page of this issue.

Brother L. J. McDaniel, Bossier City, Louisiana, spoke on Saturday night to an overflowing crowd on the thought, "God Disturbing the People." It was truly a fine message and provoked our thoughts to a

SALM 48:12-14, "Walk about Zion and go round about her; tell the towers (count of towers) thereof. Mark ye well her bulwarks, consider her palaces; that ye may tell it to the generation following. For this God is our God for ever and ever; he will be our guide unto death."

In modern, everyday language this would read as follows: "Walk or stroll about Zion, look her over: count the towers or inspect the towers thereof. Observe closely her bulwarks, consider her palaces; then pass the account on to your posterity."

living God. "The Lord hath chosen Zion. He hath desired it for His habitation." Solomon built a house for the name of the Lord. Tho' heaven and the heaven of heavens could not contain Him, yet His shekinah glory appeared in the temple at the dedication. Jehovah was present! "Ye are come unto Mt. Zion, the city of the Living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels, to the general assembly and church of the first born . . ." Hebrews 12:22-

True Church Composed of

The church is composed of Born-Again People: the whole number of

born-again persons from Pentecost to the time of the first resurrection (1 Cor. 15:52); Those who are united together and to Christ by the baptism of the Holy Ghost. We are members of the body of Christ — and members in particular.

True Church Superior to Mt. Zion:

Oh, how much superior the church of God is to the hill of Zion! Zion was great

but the New Testament Church is so much greater. The principal bulwarks of Zion were not the NATU-RAL objects of defense that could be seen, but were the unseen objects of faith; these they must set their hearts upon. With every natural advantage that it had, and it was well fortified (a natural fortress), but the bulwarks to be relied upon were not the natural but rather the unseen: 1. The special presence of God in Zion; 2. the wonderful benefits coming from Zion; the Divine Providence that watched over and protected Zion; 4. the beauty of holiness that God had placed upon Zion; 5. the marvelous promises He had made concerning Zion; 6. the Eternal truths

that were entrusted to it. "Consider the strength of Zion," says the psalmist, "observe the towers, the bulwarks, all in their full strength." The conflict has been severe, attack after attack has been made against Jerusalem but none of its defenses had been damaged or weakened. Not the slightest damage has been done! Tell this to the generation to come, tell it to your children, that they may do nothing to weaken it, that they may be determined to preserve the bulwarks of Zion against any future encroachment; that they may fight with all confidence against the enemy, never surrendering.

Jerusalem Thought Jerusalem was looked upon as impregnable: an impregnable

place. All the inhabitants of the known world, thought it impossible for an enemy to enter the gates of Jerusalem. The kings of the earth and all the inhabitants of the world, would not have believed that the adversary and the enemy should have entered into the gates of Jerusalem. And they never would have entered had not the people sinned away their defense, thereby losing their unseen help from God. Jeremiah clearly states the cause to be the sins of priests and people. The natural defense was not altered, but God's presence, protection, promises and blessings are contingent upon our obedience to His word. We are helpless without the hand of God upon us as a movement! When the disciples were showing Jesus the building of the temple, He said, "There shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down." To reject and forsake God is to be God forsaken!


The morning message was brought by Bro. Paul Leamon, District President of Ohio. His subject was, "A Witness for God."



SHEAVES FOR CHRIST WINNERS FOR 1955

IN AN impressive service on the last night of the 31st Annual Convention, the first "Sheaves for Christ" plaques were awarded. A tense and interested crowd awaited the announcement of the winners in "Sheaves for Christ for 1955."

The first of four beautiful plaques went to the district which had raised the largest offering. This award went to the Texas District which raised, \$1,951.75. The plaque was given to Bro. James Kilgore, the District President of Texas. In the second place was the Western District with \$871.20, in third place was Indiana with \$754.00.

The second of the plaques was awarded to the district which over subscribed its quota by the biggest percentage. The winner here was the Arizona District with 97% over its quota. Indiana was second with 43%, Ohio third with 37%.

The third plaque was to the church with the largest "per Conqueror" offering. This award went to the United Pentecostal Church of Hennepin, Oklahoma which gave \$12.20 per Conqueror. This church is pastored by Bro. Parkey, father of the District President of Oklahoma-Kansas District, Bro. W. C. Parkey. The 1st United Pentecostal Church, Saratoga, Calif. was second with \$4.00 per Conqueror, and the First Pentecostal Church of Stockton, Calif. was third with \$3.70 per Conqueror.

The fourth and final plaque to be awarded was presented for the local church which raised the largest offering for "Sheaves for Christ." This plaque was presented to Bro. C. P. Williams, pastor of the First Apostolic Church of Tulsa, Oklahoma which gave \$250.00. Sec ond in this contest was the Apostolic Pentecostal Church, St. Louis, Mo., with \$212, and third was the United Pentecostal Church of Hennepin, Okla., with \$122.00.

Two of the four plaques went to the host district of Oklahoma-Kansas. We are thankful for the great increase of interest and cooperation in this great program. 1955 offerings increased over those of 1954 by about two and one-half times. We look forward for even a much greater year in 1956.

From the Foreign Missionary Field

SOUTH AFRICA

THE work of the Lord is showing progress for which we are so thankful. The past weekend I was at the work in the Tzaneen District. Brother Erasmus was with me. It was his first all night native service since he has been working with the United Pentecostal Church. He got the thrill of his life. The Lord was present in a mighty way. Five were baptized on Sunday and at least one received the Holy Ghost in the Sunday morning service, as I had my hands on him when he began to speak in other tongues.

This work was opened this year and there is about ninety who have been baptized in Jesus' Name and most of them have been filled with the Holy Ghost. Not everyone grows to this extent so soon, but it does encourage our heart to see the blessings of our God.

The next trip that way I will need to take along a present for the chief and beg permission for a piece of ground on which to build a church building. The congregation will build it with mud and a grass roof with a little help from us. One, an old heathen woman at the baptismal service was kicking up such a noise as her daughter-inlaw was getting baptized. She wanted to know who was going to make beer for her now. Really it goes much deeper than just making beer. This daughter-in-law is the spirit medium and must be the one who led the demon worship in that household. Now Praise God she has been delivered of the demon and has received the true Spirit of the living God. The full details would make very good material for an article if only we had time to write them.

Please bring before the people the Durban Church at your next meeting. We trust that you will give us all the help that you can. As soon as possible, no doubt by the first of the week, we will send you a copy of the planned building. It will be a big building, double story with full basement for Sunday School and Bible School. This is one of the musts for recognition in this country.

The people there are working and will work to do their best. I would be so happy if we can get the ground broken and the foundation dug and the footing poured

before the first of the year. This is all very possible. Too the young colored brethren from Petora are so eager to go and help with the building. They are builders and only ask board. I plan to take them the next time I go and the services down there will be an inspiration to them.

Brother Ceramy keeps asking us when our missionary secretary is coming back for a visit. He is in better health now and if the Lord permits we too will try our best to visit with all the native works within the next six months. Some we have not seen for over two years, now. They send reports, but a visit from us will pay off in more ways than one. We will have to camp in many places. Please pray for us.

You will see by Brother Freeman's letter, and the picture of the lot—the future sight of the U.P.C. in that large city of Durban; that there is need. Brother Freeman has a good work there; many have accepted the Name of Jesus, and God is blessing. Brother Freeman has labored and prayed a long time to get this lot, and permission to build. This lot is paid for, but we need a church building on it. So far the U.P.C. is not recognized in South Africa, and we cannot get any more missionaries in the country. So much has been done there in the name of religion, and in the name, and by missionaries; that the government is not granting permission or recognition to any one. Let us help Brother Freeman in this struggle. They have done a commendable work with several thousand followers in all South Africa; but we need this recognition and building much. The Missionary Board approved this project, and agreed to do all they could for it. Will you pray, and if God lays anything on your heart, whether large or small, send it to the office designated for, "Brother Freeman's Church in Durban," and it will be used for that purpose. NEW MISSIONARY, A. W. POST, BAPTIZES THIRTY-SIX IN SIX MONTHS

GREETINGS in Jesus' Wonderful Name. Received your letter today, and was delighted to hear from you, and certainly appreciated the

good advice you gave me.

I really haven't faced any difficult problems apart from the beggars, and they nearly get me down —some of them just run a racket. I had a fellow come the other night wanting ten or fifteen rupees, I refused him, he said he would sit on the veranda awhile. I went to bed, and in the middle of the night, I heard this groaning. When I went to investigate, he was still sitting on the veranda, he wanted me to give him a mat to go to sleep on. When I got up the next morning I discovered two more had slept in the garage all night, but I guess I will weather it all right.

I had three folks call on me to discuss the question of our doctrine, and after some lengthy discussions I baptized the three of them in Jesus' Name. One young fellow had attended the Trinity Bible School, one man was a member of — and the third one was a member of the Christian Fellowship Centre for sixteen years. He didn't believe in baptism, and speaking in tongues when he first came, but is now seeking that experience. They went back to their own churches, but received a cold shoulder, so are coming here now. I am sending along a picture of part of the gathering at Rakwana, Bro. Navis work. I baptized thirty-six of those folks, all but four were adults.

I would like to go inland to try to establish a station to reach the tea estates, of which there are many. I am now seeking a Tamel teacher (to learn the language) as

most of the work will be among the Tamels.

Some one has prayed through for me, as those dizzy spells have gone; but I have fluid on the knees, and it bothers me, although I am not suffering from it, still I can't get on my knees without it bothering me a lot; and if I walk too much it bothers me, so mention it sometime to the folks. I am a strong believer that if enough people are praying a bout a thing, someone is very likely to pray through. God bless you.

THE JESUS NAME MESSAGE IN DENMARK

Dear Brethren:

It was a blessing to hear that there was a Jesus Name work in South America. I was born in Brazil, outside of Rio De Janerio. No doubt that you learned that I am saved according to Acts 2:4 and Acts 2:38, by being baptized in Jesus' Name and filled with the baptism of the Holy Ghost. I received this great salvation in San Francisco. I received the light on baptism in Jesus' Name in 1927 in a Jesus Only Mission in Aberdeen, U. S. A.

The way I came in contact with the United Pentecostal Church was by reading one day in the American library in Copenhagen. I was reading about the different churches and missions in the states and their teachings and doctrines As I was reading I came upon the United Pentecostal Jesus Name Church and my spirit witnessed forcibly in me that here were brethren of like precious faith. I have preached Jesus Name since 1929 here in Denmark and I have received fantastic opposition from all Christian associations, especially from the Apostolic Church of Wales and from other Pentecostal people—so called. All that I know about the Jesus Name faith is what God has revealed to me through the Scriptures and I am well acquainted with the Scriptures on this subject and stand fast in the

teaching. The only point I cannot quite understand is foot washing. I am not sure if this is merely Jewish ceremony, however I am open in regard to this. The tithing system is quite a difficult matter in Denmark. I myself believe that as the light and faith contained in the Jesus Name message is revealed the tithing question will take care of itself.

I have been an open-air preacher and as such have been forced to live by faith. I have had assemblies in Copenhagen two years. And one in another part of Denmark, but the opposition was too great from all sides and I had to give up before I could get sufficient brethren saved to help me organize and carry the load. I have witnessed over the greater part of Denmark, in part of Sweden and in Oslow, Norway. There are many here in Denmark who believe the Jesus Name message. I have spread this message all over the country by means of thousands of tracts and pieces of religious literature. Because of economic reasons it has been impossible for me to keep this work up the last few years. I used to pay for the printing myself and give everything out free of charge and it has taken all my funds.

The Jesus Name message and God in Christ can be heard now in Pentecostal circles here and the Salvation Army touches the subject but they don't fully have it. Nevertheless the message is reaching in everywhere and I believe that if the Jesus Name work here would come under your control one direction, then we would have a real break. I have had Sunday Schools in different parts of Denmark. Several have been baptized but they are scattered. This whole winter I have held meetings in a place and this I have done before. And I keep the message going and try to keep it alive in this part of God's vineyard. I have been the one who has had to take the opposition and persecution that accompanies the Jesus Name teaching. There is quiet now and I think it is time to organize the work. But I believe the way to do it is for some from America to take the leadership by sending us a missionary couple. I believe with missionaries from America there would soon be an established work and

congregation that could be self-supporting. My wife, daughter and myself and other friends here would unite with them. But God must send help in one way or another for I cannot bear the strain much longer. I place everything in the hand of God and trust that you will pray for me and the friends here. I send greetings to the believers in South America from a Brazilian Brother and greetings to yourself in Jesus Name.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA

Dear Brethren:

Our most sincere greetings to all of you in the Name of Jesus Christ our Lord. I hope that this letter finds you in the best of health and prospering in the Lord's work.

We are all feeling quite well at the present but we are not enjoying the cold weather that we have been having lately. Last night it was 41 degrees above zero. That doesn't seem cold until you sit in a cold building with no heat and worship as we do. However our cold weather will be over about the middle of September.

Just recently we have made a trip to Melbourne to meet our Brother and Sister Turnkinton. They have just rented a house and are just about cleaned up and it is quite liveable. The house is in a fairly handy position in that city. They are feeling the cold since returning from the hot climate of Java. Melbourne is much colder than Sidney as it is nearly six hundred miles south of here.

Brother Turkinton will be a real asset to our United Pentecostal Church here in Australia. He is already finding his feet on the ground and is very busy. We put him in touch with Brother Vicary and his group at Melbourne and then we all went out to Nar Nargoon to hold meetings with some people who have received the light of one God through Brother Vicary.

The people received us so very graciously. They are receiving the truth concerning the Name and some are to be baptized in Jesus' Name, including Brother Vicary.

Now Brother Turkinton is going out to this city twice each week to preach and teach them. The place is located 44 miles from his place, so 88 miles is the round trip. Also once a week they hold meetings in a house in South Melbourne and he lives on the North side of Melbourne. So it is several miles round trip. Brother Turkinton is anointed when preaching to the Australians.

As you already know he preached several years for the Four-Square Pentecostal Church before going to Java. I have heard nothing but good reports about his former work and conduct. The Four-Square has tried to get him to come back with them. Even the Four-Square missionary from Los Angeles has asked him to assist them. Bro. Turkinton has preached for them since arriving here but he was faithful with our message. He also informed them that he was a representative of the United Pentecostal Church of America and intended to work for us to help further our cause in Australia.

This family was in Australia about 27 years before they went to Java. Brother Turkinton knows the temperament of the Australian people. I feel he will be a real help to us. He pastored the best Four-Square Church in the Sydney area. He has many friends among them still and many are inquiring to Sidney. They want to hear from his own lips of the new truth he has accepted since leaving here five years ago. I am hoping and praying that he will be able to lead some of them to this glorious light. One of the leading pastors of the Four-Square has gone to Melbourne to see Brother Turkinton. He asked him if he thought baptism in Jesus' Name was necessary for all. Of course he said yes. This man said, "I am at my end. There is nothing in the Four-Square for me. Pray for me to be guided right."

I want you all to know how much the Bogue family does appreciate the help and support of the missionary board and the United Pentecostal Church. Our prayer is for you always with supplications and that you may know the will of God in all the weighty matters that rest upon your shoulders. May God bless you all and keep you in health.

RESOLUTIONS

• The following resolutions were adopted by the 31st Annual General Conference of the United Pentecostal Church held in Tulsa, Oklahoma, September 23-28, 1955.

INASMUCH as the Tupelo Children's Mansion has the endorsement of the United Pentecostal Church, and since this institution as such is caring for needy children

as the Lord provides,

BE IT RESOLVED that each minister and church is requested to pray for its welfare; and if possible to include the support of this worthy institution in the budget of the local church at least to the extent of a free will offering each year. Offerings as such should be sent direct to the Tupelo Children's Mansion, P. O. Box 327, East Tupelo, Mississippi.

BE IT RESOLVED that Article VI, Section 5, Paragraph 19, be amended to add the following:

No license or credential of any minister being dropped, disfellowshipped, or who has withdrawn. shall be accepted by the Headquarters Office unless accompanied by the decision of the district board, and the reason for the action of the district board in dropping or disfellowshipping said minister, or the reason why said minister has withdrawn.

BE IT RESOLVED that Article 3, Section 5, Paragraph 3, Page 84 of our Manual be amended to read as follows:

In case of a vacancy in the pastorate the church board may call a business meeting to choose a pastor, or to transact other necessary business; however, be it understood that their decision must be endorsed by a majority vote of the congregation, this by secret ballot.

RESOLVED that Article 13, Section 5, Paragraph 2 be changed to read as follows:

Each district shall also have a district Sunday School Secretary Treasurer which shall be one person.

RESOLVED that Article 13. Section 10, Paragraph 3 and 4 be changed to read as follows:

All district Sunday School funds shall be received by the district Sunday School Secretary-Treasurer. The disbursements of all district Sunday School funds shall be

Comparing the 1. The church for New Testament whom Christ free-Church to Zion: ly shed His blood on Calvary; 2. The church spoken of by Christ, when He said "Upon this Rock I will build My church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it"; (let the gates of hell mean death or the forces of the adversary — that's immaterial with me); 3. The church founded upon the Apostles and prophets Jesus Christ Himself the Chief Corner Stone; 4. The church established on the day of Pentecost; 5. The church begun in the upper room in Jerusalem where the 120 were baptized with the Holy Ghost and spake with other tongues; 6. The church with the message of full New Testament Salvation; 7. The church that answers the inquiry of anxious souls such as, "Men and brethren what shall we do?" with the same answer that Peter gave — "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the Name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost"; 8. The church with the fundamental doctrine of repentance, baptism in Jesus Name for remission of sins and baptism of the Holy Ghost is full New Testament Salvation.

Doctrine is important. A church cannot exist without a doctrine. Paul said, "Reprove, rebuke and exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." "May be able by sound doctrine to exhort and convince the gainsayers." Titus 1:9. "Speak thou the things which become sound doctrine." "In doctrine shewing uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity."

The security of the people of God is not a doctrine to be kept in the background. It must be taught! It must be kept before the church. It is essential.

Let us survey the church of Christ and observe closely its bulwarks, its beauty, strength, its doctrines and security. What precious promises and wonderful benefits, its towers; what eternal truths and message of salvation, its bulwarks. All of us agree that creation, Virgin Birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, Death, Burial, and Resurrection, the ascension, efficacy of the blood, miracles, heaven, hell, etc., are vital truths and are not to be overlooked. They are not being tossed aside as non-essential because they are not being discussed.

God Manifest The great revelation of the Mighty God in Flesh: in Christ, Jehovah God was manifest in the flesh. Jesus Christ fulfilled Isaiah 9:6, "He was the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace." Nowhere in God's word are three separate, distinct personalities taught, but rather three manifestations of the one true God. "Hear Oh Israel the Lord thy God is one Lord, there is none beside Him. This revelation was from God. It is orthodox. It is God's Word. It is here to stay. The whole Bible conveys no thought anywhere of more than one God. Jesus is God manifest in the flesh. This is true if we are not included in the world fellowship of Pentecostal people. This is true if general opinion and even Sunday School lessons are based on the Trinitarian theory. Pentecostal power has been given to the church to keep it moving on with God. To lose the Pentecostal power or Holy Ghost baptism and anointing of the Spirit would be the end of the Pentecostal movement.

Fifty days after our Lord's crucifixion and ten days after His ascension, the New Testament Church was born. The outpouring of the Holy Ghost on the day of Pentecost was the beginning of a new era. There was something different about it. It was not the cold, formal religion that previously had prevailed — the coming of the Holy Ghost brought life, divine life and reality to the souls of men. It was the fulfillment of prophecy — the fulfillment of the promise made in the ministry of John the Baptist, "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance, but He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire" — the fulfillment of the promise made by Jesus Himself during His ministry on earth.

FURTHERMORE, as this organization has gone down on record as being against television as a form of worldly amusement,

BE IT RESOLVED that any minister, whether licensed or ordained, having television, in his or her home, shall not be permitted to hold license or credentials with the United Pentecostal Church. This resolution becomes effective January 1, 1956.

BE IT RESOLVED that Article VI, Section 5, Paragraph 20, Page 40 of our Manual be amended to read as follows:

No minister who resigns or withdraws from our fellowship, whose conduct is under question, or who is dropped from our fellowship for any reason, shall be allowed to conduct revivals for any of our ministers, or pastor any of our churches. Any of our ministers who knowingly allows any minister who has withdrawn from our fellowship, because his conduct was under question, to preach in their churches, or to assist in the service in a public manner, shall be dealt with by the District Board in the District where the offense is committed, as said District Board sees

RESOLVED that Article 13, Section 10, Paragraph 5 be changed to read as follows:

Each local Sunday School with the approval of the pastor is requested to tithe or send a special monthly offering to the district Sunday School Secretary-Treasurer, who in turn shall pay the tithe of such income into the General Sunday School Department.

Book of Acts. Recorded in the History of Church: book of Acts is the (a) record of the Living Christ in-dwelling His church, the Apostolic church, the Pentecostal church, the Jesus Name church, the Holiness church. (b) The ministry of Spirit filled men. preaching Acts 2:38 as the message of full New Testament salvation, repentance, baptism in water in the Name of Jesus Christ, the baptism with the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking with other tongues. Speaking with tongues was the initial evidence of the baptism of the Holy Ghost then and it is NOW! It is our glorious privilege as well as our duty under God to preach that the birth-right of every believer is this wonderful experience of the baptism with the Holy Ghost. The church built around the message in Acts 2:38.

Tongues. The fight is still on over this strange The Strange Phenomenon: phenomenon of speaking with other tongues — no wonder that it is — for it is the initial evidence of the baptism of the Holy Ghost; it is an evidence that Christ arose from the dead. Peter's explanation of this speaking with other tongues, miraculous utterances on Pentecost was, "that Jesus whom His hearers had crucified seven weeks before was risen from the dead and had ascended up into heaven" and had "shed forth this which ye now see and hear." Every time a person is filled with the spirit and speaks with tongues, there is a visible, tangible proof that Jesus lives! In view of this fact, we must propogate this great truth with all our might. Under no circumstances may we water it down to stop the mouths of its critics.

Water Baptism Even the necess-In Jesus Name: ity of water baptism is challenged by the critics. Strange to say, we run into some people who almost reduce water baptism to a zeronil—a non-essential — having no bearing on salvation whatsoever.

John preached the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins— Peter said "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the Name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Mark recorded Jesus as saying, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved."

If it is a non-essential then what difference would it make how we are baptized and if we are baptized, why all the wrangling about baptism in the Name of Jesus, if it is a non-essential and contributes nothing to our salvation? If it means nothing why would it matter how it was done? It either means something or it is worth nothing.

Easy Religion The common Common Tendency: $t \in n d \in n c y$ is for an "Easy

Religion." Two kinds of Christianity is being taught: the artificial or weak kind and the real genuine kind. Medical science has perfected a vaccine for several diseases, that creates an effective immunity against the real disease. For instance small-pox; it is almost unheard of today due to this discovery. Medical Science is working on and I hope have perfected the Salk vaccine to prevent these annual epidemics of polio. The inoculation tends to produce a weak form of the disease in the human system. This develops a mass of anti-bodies in the blood stream which makes it next to impossible to contract the real disease, so the same is true in religion. Thousands are being inoculated with the weak kind and it is creating a very effective immunity against the real kind. What is true in medicine is true in religion. With the vaccine of "Will you take Him as your Saviour?" "Only believe." "Do you believe He died for you?" "That He was resurrected and ascended into Heaven?" many are inoculated against the real genuine old time religion.

Acts 2:38. Its Critics. The Message, A Must:

Acts 2:38 has survived the attacks of the critics and as vou count the towers and observe the bulwarks of the

church of God — note they are unscarred and without blemish. God is still with we people with this message. Pass the good news on to

the future generation. It is one of the "musts" for the United Pentecostal Church.

Holiness: Holiness is a tower, a bulwark of the church. "Follow peace with all men and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." Holiness is the message of the Bible. When one begins to mention holiness, someone usually remarks that "he will soon be on the clothes line, you just watch." Holiness is more than wearing apparel, but modest and decent attire is surely a part of the message of holiness for this generation.

Modernistic

Modernistic tenden-Tendencies — cies and worldliness Worldliness:: are gaining ground in most religious cir-

cles. This cannot be denied. The religion of Confucius or Buddha do not demand a change in life; Christianity demands a change — a new creature, old things passed away and behold all things are become new.

There are churches naming Christ as Saviour that do not demand a change — a change must and will come when one is born again.

It is not unusual now to see one occasionally among our own fellowship, men and women, who dress immodestly. Occasionally see a lady with ear-rings singing in choir or taking part in the services. Missionaries in the heathen countries are trying to get people delivered from such, while some over here

are going back to heathen practices. God saves people from such things!

Hair Question: The scriptures are against men having long hair or women having short hair that God has given them for a covering. Your hair is your glory my dear sister and God is not pleased with the practice. My daughter who attended the conference in Hot Springs, Arkansas many year ago had this said to her by a very prominent person in Pentecostal Circles at the time. "Oh, you are one of the old fashioned kind with long hair. I haven't had that 'stuff' for years."

The Dress Twice the commanding Question:

officer of the American forces in Germany has issued orders to wives of service men to dress properly or stay at home or go home. Probably he did not say it in these words but the meaning was the same.

The officials of the Kentucky derby have issued orders that women dressed in scanty attire not be admitted in the races. There is a theatre in St. Louis that will not admit a lady dressed in shorts. Perhaps we have not gone that far, but we must cry out against immodesty to prevent it from coming.

The outpouring of the Holy Ghost that descended on January 1, 1901, came down on men and women who lived and preached holiness. It has been the bulwark of the Pentecostal Church. Some remark that those who preach such things have nothing else to preach, are "slightly touched." I dare say if Paris, London, New York or Hollywood should suddenly bring a change in styles and it was ultra-stylish to have long hair it would surprise one how quickly some scalps that have been non-productive would suddenly produce—like the watered deserts of Arizona and California. If Hollywood encouraged modest apparel the missionaries would no doubt receive some packages of skimpy apparel to distribute among the heathen converts.

Christian
Principles:

A dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of the Lord."

Christian principles are to be adhered to. One must have holiness of heart — the kind that produces the fruit of the Spirit, takes away petty jealousies — produces fair and honest dealings, thinks of a kind word to say of the other fellow — chaste and clean in all moral life. Will produce tolerance for one another — takes your feelings from off your cuff — Do the right thing at all times and by all people. The square pegs of Christian principles do not fit into the round holes of carnality.

Unity: One of the miracles of the Bible is the perfect unity found throughout the book. The one true God speaks without a single contradiction. Personally, I would like to see a unity among our brethren on doctrine. How wonderful, if we all spoke the same thing! If this never happens may I urge you to develop a tolerance (no I did not say compromise) with one another on some things. I do not want you to misunderstand this statement but let us be Christians while we discuss our views. I would not intentionally hurt anyone, but please give me the liberty of my convictions. Let each of us work and labor to preserve unity among the brethren of our fellowships. We need unity of purpose.

Tell this to the generation following: The young people make up a large bulk of our congregation. I thank God for their consecration they must be taught these truths they must live these truths — they must perpetuate these truths. The natural defense of Jerusalem contributed to its strength but was overcome by the enemy, they came through the gates.

Natural things — higher education — scientific equations, etc., will not take the place of experience, truth — anointing of the spirit and the presence of God in the church. We must stay in touch with God to preserve the bulwarks of our organization, the United Pentecostal Church.

Count the towers — observe closely these bulwarks — it has made us — it is our strength — it will keep us going — pass it on from generation to generation.

Miracles:: Jesus said "These signs shall follow them that believe." We cannot let go the

teaching in James 5:14. God still heals. Miracles are performed in the Name of Jesus. The gifts are in the church, they still operate and God still controls them for His honor and glory.

Deception: God has not become so puny and weak that He needs a man to fake miracles and promote a lie. God needs no defense. His word needs no defense — God can defend His word and Himself — God wants to work in our midst. God help us never to push God out of our lives, services or our business. Avoid fanaticism! Hold on to the power of God.

Re-Evaluation: A certain group of Pentecostal people recently met together in their conference in Stockholm, Sweden to re-evaluate their doctrinal position concerning tongues as the initial, physical evidence of the baptism in the Spirit.

There was a settled fixed determination to continue internationally in their conviction concerning the relation of speaking with tongues to the wonderful Pentecostal Movement. I have been informed that this event was a struggle between the Old Timers and the New School of thought (a thought to gain popularity with the world). The old timers hold on to the necessity of being baptized with the Holy Ghost, others on the contrary want to water it down.

Israel said No! (II Kings 17:13-18). Israel refused to turn from their evil ways and keep God's commandments. They would not hear, they refused, they went after the ways of the heathen round about them. The Lord rejected them, afflicted them, delivered them in the hands of the spoilers, until he had cast them out of His sight.

We cannot ease up and No Time To Let Up get soft but must become more strict and tighten up. Holiness, clean living, must be adhered to as well as the message of Acts 2:38. This may sound foolish to us who know that these old landmarks still stand today. These truths are the bulwarks of the New Testament church but we must guard well lest we in time to come be found wandering doubting the necessity of these things.

This is our day! God is Our Day: opening many doors for this Oneness truth to be carried throughout the world. Doors are being opened in Europe for us other than those on the missionary field. We should and must be able to take advantage of these open dors. Ireland, England, Norway and Denmark have received this truth. We must be ready to enter with this message in every open door throughout the world.

False Doctrines, False doctrines new religions New Religions: have laid siege and bombarded the bastions of the Christian faith the last few years as never before. The church has withstood every attack. Its towers are yet unscathed and again I say this is our day.

The Lord is getting ready to perform a great work. Let us get ready to carry this message forward, plant it on every continent and in every city and town of our own land.

"And now I exhort you to be of good cheer." Acts 27:22.

N ADVERTISING agency gave the following notice to its art department: "Have a smiling face in every piece of advertising copy possible — tombstone and undertaking designs excepted." The idea brought them great success. We are drawn to the man or woman who smiles. Set this down: gloom, heaviness, selfish joylessness is poor business and is not true religion. A long-faced, solemn, funeral looking Christian, be he a preacher or layman, is a libel on genuine Christianity. Paul was an advocate and an example of cheerfulness. It was a part of his religion. It was religion's badge.

And yet there are plenty of hindrances to the cheerful life. It is pretty hard to smile when pain racks our body, when we are almost unenduringly wearied with the bed on which we have lain for weeks or months, when death-dealing disease creeps stealthily upon our vital powers and dooms us. Financial trouble, too, has killed its thousands and driven the cheer out of hundreds of thousands of lives. It is mighty hard to be cheerful when business fails, when the bank account is depleted and there are bills and an overdue note to pay. It is hard to lay the precious body of the loved one in the ground and still smile. It is hard to smile when in the lonely days that follow the death hour, memory, so often the sweet ministrant of joy and blessing, now becomes a messenger of tears and sadness. When things go against us it is hard to look pleasant. When our efforts in the cause of right are not appreciated it is difficult to keep sweet. It is not easy to be cheerful as the cares of life grind continually on our vital powers. And yet, if there is plenty of gloom to keep us glum there is plenty of gleam to keep us glad. With God the sun is always shining, and if we fellowship with Him we shall dwell in light. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world." That was why the shadows of the world could not lay hold of Him. In His light we shall see light.

If not for our own sakes, then for the sake of others we need to cultivate the cheerful spirit. Lincoln said: "Pluck the thistle and plant a flower wherever a flower will grow."

Cheerfulness is catching. A tune carried into the busy world's life, a smile while passing one in life's busy way, a word of cheer finds response in the heart of men like an echo at the mountain side.

If you want to win, smile. If you have an ambition to be popular, smile. If you want to succeed in business, smile. If you want to influence others, smile. If you want power, smile. Smiles give efficiency in work. "Give us, oh, give us the man who sings at his work," said Carlyle.

But how is one to get the spirit of cheerfulness? Use your will. Paul says in the first verse of the second chapter of 2 Corinthians, "But I determined this with myself, that I would not come again to you in heaviness. It is a matter of the will. Set your will to be cheerful. Erect cheerfulness as a habit in your life. It can be done. Magnify the good. Goldsmith says that one of the happiest persons he ever saw was a slave in Flanders. He had one leg, was deformed and chained to the fortification. He was condemned to slavery for life and had to work from dawn until dark and yet seemed to see only the bright side of everything. A Minneapolis man, who was away from home when his business block burned, was so disheartened that he thought of suicide. He was saved from it by this from his little seven-year-old daughter: "Dear Papa: I went down to see your store that was burned and it looks very pretty all covered with ice. Love and kisses from Lillian." The father smiled and his gloom-spell was broken. The ruined establishment was soon rebuilt. Cheerfulness came when he saw matters in a big way.

Cheer dwells in the heart whose outgo is helpfulness to others. His is deep and abiding joy whose talents are kept active in the current of service in the world.

If God lives to you, if life is splendid and of supreme significance to you, if you really have any of the sunshine of the eternal import of living, be cheerful, play, smile, laugh, sing, and those about you will catch the spirit of your cheerfulness and will be carried up away from the lowlands of sordid living unto the sunny hills of cheer where God is and the soul's splendid powers are quickened unto a new life.
