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FUNDAMENTAL DOCTRINE UNITED PENTECOSTAL CHURCH

The basic and fundamental doctrine of this organization shall be the Bible standard of full salvation, which is repentance, baptism in water by immersion in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the baptism of the Holy Ghost with the initial sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit gives utterance.

N EVERY generation, for more than nineteen hundred years, cynical skeptics have demanded from Christians concrete dence that Jesus actually rose from the dead. As a consequent, many eminent theologians have seen fit to accept the challenge. Great sermons have been preached and written solely to convince the gainsayers of the credibility of His resurrection. But, according to the laws of evidence, the



burden of the proof rests with the unbelievers—it is their responsibility to prove that He did not rise from the tomb, rather than ours to prove that He did.

Man has received incalculable blessings and benefits which would not have been his had Jesus not risen. The whole structure of Christianity rests upon just two great truths: (1) Jesus died for men's sins, and (2) He arose from the dead, to ever live.

It was Christ's resurrection, many years ago, which took the sting out of Calvary. Demons and their human confederates were overjoyed when Jesus died. But for one thing, His death on the middle cross would have been the greatest tragedy of all times. But, thank God, that one thing-His resurrection—turned tragedy, and seeming defeat, into the most glorious of all victories.

"Now is Christ risen . . ." What boundless joy is found in this sublime utterance of Paul's. As it has been said, "It is like the blast of the trumpet of victory. The very foundations of hell have been shaken."

Since Christ has, of a truth, risen, then our faith is not in vain; nor is our preaching vain. Because He has risen, we are not of all men most miserable, but are rather the happiest of all people.

Staff have again kindly made space available in this good paper for a special issue. We invite your attention to every bit of material relative to our work.

It is the desire of your Youth Officials to make 1956 "Sheaves for Christ" the greatest spiritual move among our young people ever. We are asking God to make this time a period of consecration, fasting, and prayer; together with the giving of our offerings for the carrying of the whole gospel.

It is with that in mind that I write this month. What have you and I done for the Master in the last year? Condemnation, and a feeling of guilt, no doubt rise in almost every heart because we have not done more. Perhaps we are saying in our hearts, as I have heard so many testify, especially around New Year's Day, "Please pray for me that I will do more in the future than I have in the past." However, too often our aims are not carried out. We keep on in our little rut, and gain no ground, do no more good, win no more souls. Then another year rolls around, and we make the same well-worn request. In the light of Ruth's experience, I should like to point out some things which will help us do more than wish in this matter. If we can conquer some of the same problems that Ruth conquered, we can be soul winners; we can do something for God.

Ruth Forsook All

In this is the secret of service to God: this thing called "surrender to God." Sacrifice is such a hated word among us. Suffering is repulsive to so many of us. Submission is such a hurdle to surmount. Ruth was so determined to go to the land of Israel, that she forsook her land, her family, her religion, and her

friends. She ignored the example of Orpah, and made her way, at the price of great sacrifice, to the land of Israel. There is power and blessing from God only as we surrender to Him. The will of the selfish flesh must be conquered by the will of the Spirit. Earthly ambitions must be smothered under spiritual burdens. God's call upon our lives, our talents, and our abilities must come before the call of ambition, the enticement of prestige, or the security of success. We must see souls instead of material gain.

I have discovered in my personal life the need of a deeper burden for God's work, and for lost souls. To this end I have prayed; and am inviting every young person to join me in seeking God for a burden for His great work. Let us seek God until self is lost in the bright glory of the presence of Christ; until we know greater sorrow for the burdens of others than for our problems, until we have wept bitter tears for lost men and women. There is power in sacrifice, blessing in surrender, and great glory in suffering. What has it cost us to live for God? How much are we concerned about the Pentecostal message?


Ruth Conquered Discouragement

I believe that discouragement is one of the greatest deterrents to our work for God. Even Elijah became victim to it, and asked God to let him die, rather than live and work for Him. The Psalmist let the prosperity of the wicked cause his feet to almost slip. Peter became so discouraged that he decided to quit preaching and go back to fishing. Preachers must fight discouragement, for it is the stepping stone to despair. It paralyzes our abilities, it kills our faith, it stops

Sheaves for Christ

HE QUESTION has been asked, time and time again, "Why don't we have an international program for our Conquerors?" The Pentecostal "Sheaves for Christ" policy was formed that our young people might have more to do, and feel a greater responsibility toward the United Pentecostal Church. This lets them feel that they are a part of this great organization. Also, when they are raising funds for "Sheaves for Christ" they will have the feeling that they are working with young people all over the country.

II. It Helps The General Conquerors Work Financially

Since there is not much money coming into the General Treasury, "Sheaves for Christ" retains 10% of offerings sent in, for expenses of advertising, etc. There are no Conquerors offerings received at General Conferences, therefore the only way the General Conquerors treasury can build up is through tithes sent in by districts, and through "Sheaves for Christ."

III. Each District Will Benefit Through The 1956 Program

This is the first year that each district will be strengthened financially through "Sheaves for Christ." Forty-five per cent of all offerings taken will remain in the district



to help promote home missionary projects, youth camps, and camp meeting equipment (equipment sponsored by Conquerors projects). We feel that this should encourage some to receive offerings who would not otherwise, since their district will reap some of the benefits.

IV. Because Our Youth Need To Stay Busy For God

This is a program the local church group can work at for many weeks. The deadline for offerings to be sent is August 31. Therefore you will have plenty of time to arrange a lively program for your Conquerors group. There are various ways to raise an offering for "Sheaves for Christ." Perhaps you would like to divide your Conquerors into two groups and see which side can raise the most money. (Sometimes a little friendly competition will do wonders for young people). Some churches have had bake sales. One district is using a march of dimes program. We feel that if each pastor will get behind this worthy project, and help his young people get enthusiastic about it, they not only will enjoy it, but it will be a definite blessing to them.

It has often been said "An idle mind is the devil's workshop." I feel that this is true, having had some dealings with young people. The more they can find to do for God, the less they will be discouraged. Our precious young people need to stay busy for the Lord.



Anything we can find to do to keep them working for God, we had better do it. Make a special effort to get them to attend all the youth rallies possible. They need the good Christian fellowship they can receive at the rallies. The world is bidding higher than ever before for our youth. We are well able to meet the challenge by keeping our young people busy, and encouraged in the work of the Lord.

As the churches over the country are preparing to receive their offerings, why not take one in your church this year?

Sheaves for Christ

Handfuls of Purpose

"And let fall also some of the handfuls of purpose . . ."

HIS WAS the deliberate command of Boaz to his servants (Ruth 2:16). During the harvest season it was nothing unusual for the harvesters to accidently drop some of the freshly cut grain. Neither was

it out of the ordinary for the poorer women from the nearby villages to come behind the workers and glean the few grains that fell from their arms in the loading process. But never had the harvesters heard such a command as this! They were to drop, not grains, but handfuls; and not accidently, but on purpose. To them this must have seemed unreasonable. Nevertheless those were exactly the words that the eyes and efforts of a strange woman had drawn from the lips of the wealthy Boaz. This is just another perfect example to us that exemplifies and illuminates the truth that sincere effort brings the unmerited blessings of God upon us, and often upon those with whom we come in contact.

Please notice again that these grains were dropped on purpose. May I point you to the fact that Calvary was no accident. What was suffered there by Jesus was for a purpose. You have perhaps often heard it said that Jesus spilled His blood on the cross. That is

a statement that must be refuted. When someone spills something he does it unintentionally, by accident. This is not the way Jesus gave His life's blood upon the cross. To repeat: it had its definite purpose. On Calvary God poured out, upon His eternal Sacrifice, handfuls of wrath. No wonder Jesus cried out,

"My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Paul declared in II Corinthians 5:21, "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin, that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." Jesus cried out in agony because He was being made sin—the very thing that separated man from God in the beginning. But wrapped

up in this sorrowful event we find this purpose of God: ". . . that we might be made the righteousness of God in him."

Even the stripes, administered by cruel hands to Christ's back, had their place in God's eternal plan. If it had not been for them we should never have heard such statements as "with his stripes we are healed;" or "they shall lay

> hands on the sick, and they shall recover; or "the prayer of faith shall save the sick."

> One day we shall stand in the presence of the One upon whose pierced hands and scarred back God's purpose for us was written. Written, yes, but not with pastel ink and soft pointed pens. We shall see where it was written with rusty spikes, lashing whips, and red blood. As we look upon Him in that day, what shall we read? Will He serve as a mirror to reflect back to us our dismal failures in this life? Or shall we be able to point to Him, and say, "Because the purpose of the eternal Spirit was worked out in your earthly life, and because of your grace and love, We stand here, unafraid to face

eternity."

Young people, may I exhort you not to live an accidental, slipshod, lukewarm life. Let your life in Christ be one of set purposes and well known goals. Everything that God ever did in His work was done with you and your eternal destiny in mind.

our work. Ruth could well have been discouraged; she had lost her husband, she was among strange people in a new and different land, she was a poor gleaner working among reapers. While others whom she observed had plenty to reap, she must glean. Only the corners of the fields were actually hers. She did not let her troubles or her poverty paralyze her efforts. She worked, despite all hindrances.

Ruth Accepted Her Lowly Lot

Ruth was a talented, able, beautiful maiden. She had known better days. Her talents and ability qualified her for better things than to be a gleaner. The commandment was that the farmer must leave the corner of his field (about one-sixtieth of the field's area) for the gleaners. These gleaners were the very poor. They existed on just the handfuls that the reaper left. It was a lowly lot, a humble task, a humiliating job. Ruth accepted the job of a gleaner. There are those who will not take the gleaner's job. When they can have a big church, they will pastor; when they can go to the big churches, they will evangelize; when they can have a prominent place in the church they will work; when they can win multitudes they will be soul winners. This is not the way it usually happens in the work of the Lord. It is almost always necessary to prove ourselves with small jobs, little tasks, commonplace efforts, before God honors us with place or power. The greatest need in our Church is not for better qualified preachers; it is for saints, personal workers, individuals who will serve God in the obscure task of witnessing to friends, inviting people to church, bringing people to Sunday School, praying in the secret closet, giving of material means to see the work progress, and many other things.



An Urgent Appeal For Liberia



IBERIA, on the west coast of Africa, has been a difficult field. We have spent time and money, and even lives (one life given, and others impaired), but at last it is showing signs of ripening fruit and harvest. Souls are being moved upon by the - Holy Ghost power. The news from there is encouraging.

Jesus did not say for us to find the "easy" places, and work there. He did say for us to "Go in ALL THE WORLD and preach the gospel to EVERY CREATURE," and that "this gospel of the kingdom SHALL be preached . . . for a WIT-NESS unto all nations, then shall the end come." So we can be pleasing God by just faithfully doing our best in this difficult land.

We need a great cloud of witnesses to act as "prayer warriors" for Liberia; to daily, and almost hourly, bring that country before the throne of grace, that God will move there by His Spirit, and send a great revival that will sweep hundreds into the fold. It has happened in other parts of Africa, and in other mission fields, and it can happen in Liberia.

We also need special prayer that the money for the airplane might be fully supplied. This airplane is needed specially to reach our outstation at Fassama, and other untouched tribes and areas. Sisters Gruse and Bailey first walked into this place about four years ago, and found a whole tribe untouched by the gospel. It had never had a mis-

sionary stay there in its history! Sisters Gruse and Bailey immediately made plans to reach this tribe with about 12 towns in the hinterland of Liberia. They have done remarkably well and God has saved some souls and the work is moving along but under difficulties.

Sister LaVerne Collins laid down her life there last August while alone with Sister Gruse. They had no way of contacting the outside world, nor even our main station at Bomi Hills, some 125 miles away, except by a foot messenger. This was done but it was too late-Brother Langham was unable to get there until the day after Sister Collins was buried. Sister Gruse conducted the service alone with the aid of the native believers. It was sad, and hard indeed to do. With the airplane (that we are appealing for again) Brother Langham could have reached there in plenty of time, and perhaps been of help to Sister Collins before she passed on. A life might even have been saved.

The landing strip has been built, and is ready, but we have no plane. Brother Langham took flying lessons before leaving America, and has a private license, but no plane to fly. It will take at least \$8,000.00 to buy this plane and ship it to Liberia. We have made appeals before, and there has been a very good response, but not yet sufficient to buy this airplane. We still need around \$2,500.00 before we can order the plane. This is the

time for us to do so, and get the plane to Liberia for the first part of the dry season, which is only a few months ahead.

Will you pray and ask God to move, that this need may be fully supplied soon? Whatever He may tell you to give, will you send it to the office, designated for the "LI-BERIA AIRPLANE FUND"? We plan to purchase a plane like the one pictured above.

If you live in Canada you may send your offering to our Canadian Office; Box 1116, Saint Stephen, New Brunswick. If you live in the United States, or elsewhere, send it to 3645 South Grand Boulevard. St. Louis 18, Missouri, and it will go for this purpose. We are trusting God that this will enable us to have the airplane on its way to Liberia by September of 1956. May the Lord richly bless you.

DO YOU CARE?

o YE into all the world" was the command that Jesus gave unto the apostles. I wonder if we are carrying out this commission as we should. The homeland is far from being evangelized. There are souls that folks pass by right at our church doors who have not heard the gospel.

Have you taken a few moments



to knock on some door? Have you asked someone to ride in your car to church? Or is it the same condition that confronted Mary and Joseph at the inn when Mary was to give birth to the Christ Childno room in the

inn? Is there room in your heart for lost souls? Is there time in your life to give to God to speak to the lost souls? Who will go? Who will pray? Who cares? America awake! But how can she until we sound the trumpet? How can she when we are so quiet, busy with the cares of life and with no time for God?

Perhaps we spend too much time murmuring while millions are crying for help. As Jonah hid down in the ship fast asleep, trying to hide from the presence of God, the shipmaster said unto him, "What meanest thou, O sleeper? arise, call upon thy God, if so be that God will think upon us, that we perish not." Souls are perishing while folks are drunk on the cares of life, sleeping and slumbering

like the five foolish virgins. It's time to arise from our sleep and call upon God for the dying that they perish not.

We are the ones to whom God has given the command of carrying the gospel to the lost. All are not preachers, but He said, "Ye are my witnesses." If you are not qualified to knock on doors, get down on your knees in prayer and pray for those who can knock on doors for personal contact.

We are "living in the 14th chapter of St. Luke." Jesus said to go out in the streets, the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in that His house may be filled.

Why are our churches full of empty seats? These are a testimony against us that some are not doing their work in the home churches as they should. COLOMBIAN PASTORS' BIBLE CONFERENCE

Our two and one-half weeks of Bible Conference for native workers, which began soon after the convention in Medellin closed, has been a great blessing. Brother C. L. Cross from Brockville, Ontario, helped with the Bible teaching and was really used of the Lord. As we were not in condition here in the city of Cali to receive a great number of visitors, only 30 workers who are actually pastoring churches, or those who show signs of a definite call to the Ministry, were invited. Many others would have come if we had opened the doors wider.

Colombia is divided geographically into departments, which correspond to states or provinces. It is noteworthy that seven years ago the United Pentecostal Church had works in only two departments. Now these pastors and workers represent 14 churches in 8 departments, besides new field work that is going on in the same departments, and others. There are also two churches which sent no representatives to the conference. Two other former churches were not counted because they are closed on account of the persecution.

Our hearts were made to burn as we listened to the reports of these brethren from their respective fields of labor, not only as to what they are doing, but of their vision for the future to launch out into new territories. There were three brethren present who, until a short time ago, were workers in other churches. They were not won to this Jesus Name Apostolic message by any of our people. One of them received the revelation directly from God, and won the other two, as well as other people not present.

Surely this is God's time for this message in Colombia, and that in spite of, or along with, the heavy trials and opposition from the enemy. Pray for us.

Sometimes young people seem unable to accept the real place of Christians. They must be among the most popular in the high school, they must go to the activities of the school, they must look, and dress, like the world. The consecration of the born-again Conqueror seems too drab and humiliating. Sometimes people are irritated by the great and strong churches of the denominational world, their crowds, their beautiful and expensive edifices, the society folk which they carry on their rolls, their educated ministry; and they become discouraged with their church and their work. We must be willing to accept and embrace the true cross of Christ. It has never been popular. It has never known prestige and position. Humility and sincerity have been its traits of character. Let us not despise the work of the gleaner. If we cannot do big things, let us do little things. If our churches are not big, let us work to help them grow.

She Achieved Success in Her Lowly Work

Ruth went out as a gleaner, but in the pursuit of this lowly task she found success. She went to the field of Boaz to glean. Soon she found favor with Boaz. Instead of eating her little morsel alone in the corner of the field, Boaz let her come and eat of the bread, and dip her morsel in the vinegar. He gave her parched corn with the reapers. She ate until she was satisfied. When gleaning time came, she was not sent to the corners of the field, but, at the command of Boaz, she gleaned even among the sheaves, right in the middle of the field! More than that, she became the bride of Boaz, and gained the coveted position in the ancestral line of the Lord Jesus Christ. Hallelujah!

Do you not see the glorious truth? If we are willing to go out

in the lowly places of work, like Ruth, we shall receive great blessings. Our heavenly "Boaz" will do more for us than was done for Ruth. His promises are like these: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matt. 6:33. "If we suffer, we shall also reign with him." 

III. DATES TO BE REMEMBERED

A. April 15, 1956. This is what we call "Kick-Off" day. The 1956 program will actually get under way that day. This will be called "International Sheaves for Christ Day." Please note: This is not the only day to take "Sheaves for Christ" funds. It is just the opening day of the program. Funds may be collected at any time.

B. Date Deadline. All "Sheaves for Christ" offerings to be counted in the program for 1956 must be sent in by August 31, 1956.

C. Award Day. Awards will be given in the evening service on Youth Day, October 24, 1956, in Memphis, Tennessee.

IV. ADDRESSES TO REMEMBER

An important change is being made here this year. Instead of the offering being sent directly to St. Louis, the offerings should be sent to the District Pentecostal Conquerors Secretary-Treasurer. 45% of the "Sheaves for Christ" offering in the District will be retained in the District for Home Mission projects under supervision of the District Board, and Youth Officials. This comes as a suggestion from various districts, and is meeting with approval. Some are planning to buy tents, sponsor new works, buy other equipment, etc.

The remaining 55% will be sent by the District Conquerors Secretary to "Sheaves for Christ," 3645 S. Grand Blvd., St. Louis 18, Mo.

V. PUBLICITY

Pastors, watch for a poster for your bulletin board, with accompanying information. Any Pastor seeking further information may get in touch with his District Youth President.

SUGGESTED WAYS OF RAISING FUNDS

1. "Sheaves for Christ" Coin Folders. This year we are having special "Sheaves for Christ" coin folders prepared for use by the local church Pentecostal Conquerors. These folders will provide an interesting way for the group to collect their "Sheaves for Christ" offerings.

To receive these coin folders, contact your District President, or the General President, Calvin L. Rigdon, Box 78, Carbondale, Illinois

- 2. One district has set up a contest in the district with churches divided into different classes according to the average Sunday School attendance in March. The district will award pennants to the winning churches in each class at the Camp Meeting.
- 3. An offering may be received once, or more than once, and tagged as "Sheaves for Christ."
- 4. Some districts are having special "Sheaves for Christ" rallies with the funds from these rallies going into this program.
- 5. A district is tithing all the rally money that comes into the treasury, to "Sheaves for Christ."
- 6. One local church last year had a scrap iron drive, and the funds from this went to "Sheaves for Christ."
- 7. "Talents" may be used. Give each young person so much money, and let him see how much he can make from that amount.
- 8. The Buffalo Hunt. Get the young people to collect all the Buffalo nickels they can find. You might be surprised at the amount that can be raised in this fashion.
- 9. Other methods that a person may discover or invent.



SHE HATH DONE WHAT SHE COULD

HERE are several stories in the Bible concerning the work and devotion of women. One of them is found in the fourteenth chapter of Mark. It is the account of the woman who broke the alabaster box of ointment

She was in the house of Simon the leper. The Scripture does not state her name; it merely says "a woman." But even if her name had been written, the reward would not have been any greater. The world cannot pay us for the work we do for God. Honorable mention, crowns, rewards, praises—these last but for a moment. The world does not know this woman's name, but Jesus said of her deed, "... this also that she hath done shall be spoken of for a memorial of her." Either here on earth in some way which we do not know, or in heaven with the immortals, it shall be spoken of her.

Why did her deed seem so important? For the answer, let us probe into the situation.

First of all, she was a woman. That was against her, so far as a public show of service was concerned. She had to pass that obstruction in order to arrive at her heart's intention, but she DID it.

In the second place, she had to fight the spirit of public opinion. She fought this battle inside her heart, because she knew that her deed would not meet the approval of the people around Jesus. Oh, how much work would be done were it not for the fear of what people will think or say! We often use this as an excuse, but this wom-

an proved that it can be conquered. Things can be done in spite of what people think or say, IF WE WANT TO DO THEM BADLY ENOUGH. So you see that before the bottle was broken, things had to be decided on the inside. Wars are fought on the inside. It is there that we win or lose. Please do not misunderstand me. I do not think that a woman should rise to defy the men, and the authority of the church. Not by any means. I speak



of the things that should be done in and around the church—things that go undone because people are afraid of public opinion. This woman fought and won the battle.

Finally, she had to decide what to do. She knew that she wanted to do something—something that would mean very much to the Lord and to her, but what? Here is where another battle is fought. This is the battle of "the sense of values." Maybe she had heard Jesus talk on the greatest commandment, where He said, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy

heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength . . ." The Lord must have meant a great deal to her. But what did she have that could match what he had done for her? So the battle begins with the things we own—earthly things.

We have a tendency to hold on to our material possessions for what they are worth to us, or because of what they may mean to us in the future. This woman had in her possession an alabaster box. The box was so named because it was made in Alabastron, Egypt, and made of alabastron clay. In the box (or bottle) was a very expensive ointment. Her decision was made. She would break the bottle, and anoint the Lord with the ointment.

Now before she could carry out her plan she had to overcome those things mentioned above, and many more which we do not know. She had to overcome the sense of her own needs, and the needs of the poor. She might face ridicule. There was a chance that she might be doing the wrong thing (perhaps the thought that many people had done the wrong thing, bothered her). She could have said to herself. "What difference does it make anyway? no one knows me; it is just as well that I keep it, and go my way. I have myself to care for. God won't notice it if I do or don't. Someone else will do it, if I don't." Think of all these things for one moment, friend.

Let us say that you are a woman. Being a woman, you may think, automatically leaves you out of God's work. But you are wrong. The fact that you are a woman indicates that you have qualities sel-

dom found in men. You have sympathy for life, because you are the 'giver" of life. You are acquainted with suffering, therefore you understand the meaning of comfort. You have a God-given intuitiona voice speaks within you that men never hear. You are not obligated to punch a clock, as men must do. Think of all these things, and you will change your mind.

It is the act that really counts. We may often plan some things: but we get no rewards for plans. The giving of the cup of cold water is an act. No one can receive the benefit of the water in a plan alone. There is an old story of the little boy who heard his father testify in church, and say this: "I aim to start giving, I aim to come to church more often, I aim to pray more." His little boy asked, Dad, why don't you stop aiming, and go to shooting?"

She broke the bottle, and the answer came. Was it right, or was it wrong? Was it accepted, or was it rejected? In Mark 5:4, 5 we read, "And there were some that had indignation within themselves, and said, Why was this waste of the ointment made? For it might have been sold for more than three hundred pence, and have been given to the poor . . ." But Jesus answered, "Let her alone . . . she hath done what she could"

Many times you precious women of the Lord have surely asked yourselves this question: "What are we; and what can we do?" In answer, I would say, "Just look and see." Maybe you have something precious, which you hold dear. Can you sacrifice it for such a cause. Put your "hand to the plow." Never look back. There is work for willing hands.

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
