ABSTRACT, CONTRACT FOR DEED, AND DEED

When we buy any kind of property we want to know what we are buying, if the property is clear or if there is any indebtedness against it. We go to to the county court house and get an abstract. That abstract shows us from the time that it was homesteaded (taken from the government) to the time we buy it, who had it, what was against it, and if there is anything against it now. We know just what we buy. The three Gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke are called Synoptics or Abstract.

The first verse of Matthew begins with the book of the generations of Jesus Christ and gives us the lineage of our Lord. It tells of how He was conceived of the Holy Ghost, not of man. Thus He became the Son of the Holy Ghost, the Son of the Father, God Himself, and also the Son of man through Mary's side.

This book gives us His life, what He did, how He foretold His future, etc., to prove to us that God walked in that body He had prepared, and was finally nailed to the cross to redeem the world from sin. We can see from the time He came from His Father (from the government), if His title is clear, and if it is safe to build on Jesus, or do we say with John while he was in prison, "Must we look for another?" Thank God we have the abstract. We know it is He, of whom Isa. 9:6,7, has prophesied "For unto us a child is born,.....His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace."

Matthew, Mark, and Luke write of the same thing but bring it out in a different way as they saw it. They write of His life, of what He performed, and what authority He exercised to prove that He was God in the flesh (God Himself walking in this body of flesh).

John in his book is trying to persuade or to urge us to buy this property (this pearl of great price. Matthew 13:44). His is a book of love telling us of the love of God, how He gave His only begotten Son, (that flesh He walked in), for the sins of the world. John 3:16. The prayer He prayed which still stands for us today is recorded in this book Chap. 17. The intercessory prayer the Lord Jesus prayed just before He ascended is still in effect for the people of His name as in the day He prayed it. Verse 20. He also tells us what we must do to receive this valuable property (chap. 3 to be born of water and of the Spirit). "He that cometh to God must believe that He is" God. Now if we believe there is a God we must believe His Word. In John 3:5, He said, "Verily, verily I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, He cannot enter into the Kingdom of God." Believest thou this? Then find out how to be born again. Just move on to the book of Acts. If you believe, you

are taking a contract for deed. A contract for deed is that you agree to pay so much for the property you buy until it is paid, then you get the clear deed or title. Now you believe that God is and that He came to save you. You want to be saved so you must agree to pay what it takes to be saved. I don't mean in money, but yourself. Be obedient, do what is required and receive a clear title of eternal life.

You cannot find this in any other book in the Bible than the book of Acts. The book of Acts means what the Apostles acted out or put into action so you and I may understand.

In Matthew 16:19, we read that the Lord gave Peter the keys into the Kingdom of Heaven or in other words how to be born again. In Acts 2:38 we find that Peter used these keys on the day of Pentecost. It is in this book where we find how to baptise. Peter said, "Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the Name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins,...." Then we see they obeyed it. Acts 10:48 and 22:16. Acts 10 tells us of Cornelius,, a righteous man who prayed always yet had to be baptized in Jesus' Name and filled with the Holy Ghost.

Paul writes in Rom. 6:3, Gal. 3:27 and Col. 2:12 about the same thing where it was put into effect. Now if we believe that and obey we pay up the contract for deed and receive the gift of the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking in other tongues which is eternal life," or the clear title (or deed).

Many people are paying, sacrificing, and laboring for years yet pass into eternity without ever receiving the clear deed of eternal life because they fail to pay their debts. They will not obey God's Word but rather take some man's word. Some day they will have to stand before God, having their contract for deed but never have paid up. All their self-righteousness, good deeds, and sacrifices will not give them eternal life or the clear deed.

KEEP PAID UP

Now when we have this clear deed (the Holy Ghost) we have to keep it. All the other books from Acts on through Revelations are written to the Churches or, in other words, to the people that have this clear title, the Holy Ghost. We find there what we can or cannot do, and what we must do in order to retain our deed. When we have a clear deed on property we have to keep it clear or the first thhing we will have to get a mortgage on it, and before we know it we will lose that clear deed again. We have to keep up the taxes for sure. Some people never pay their tithes (taxes) to the Lord not to mention anything about the duties toward God that they neglect. They lose out with the Lord, their deed, the Holy Ghost, is taken from them, yet they still

JESUS TELLS A STORY

Memory Verse: "God be merciful to me a sinner."

At the time that Jesus lived on the earth, there were men called Pharisees. These men were leaders of the Jewish people. The Pharisees were very proud. When the publican prayed, he stood afar off. He remembered all the times he had offended God. He felt ashamed, so the publican bowed his head, and beat his breast, crying, "God be merciful to me, a sinner!"

How do you boys and girls pray to Jesus? Do you tell Jesus how good you've been, and that you're not like that bad Billy Jones? Or do you bow your head and ask Jesus to please help you live better, for you know you've been bad?

The crowd of people were anxious to hear what Jesus had to say about the two praying men. They knew that Jesus was preparing to say something very important to them. FIVE THINGS A PREACHER NEEDS

In my private devotions I frequently pray about five needs, and if perchance others may be profited, I herewith mention them.

First, Purity. It is not enough to have at one time obtained the blessed experience of heart purity. No, I must meet the Lord frequently, and feel His purity surging through my being. This will imply not only purity of heart, but purity in thought and deed. When I leave a person or a home I must leave it as pure as I found it; yea, in a better shape if possible. In short, I must be clean in spirit, in person, and in contact with others—a good representative of Jesus.

Second, Humility. Dear Lord, let me be truly humble; so humble I will reflect Thy humility; so humble I will not be conscious that I am humble, and yet others will be reproved and inspired as they behold Thy gentleness in me. As Andrew Murray would say, "Let me have perfect quietness of heart, and never be fretted, or irritated, or sore, or disappointed; so that I expect nothing and wonder at nothing that is done to me, and feel no resentment at anything done against me; to feel at rest when nobody praises me and when I am blamed or despised. To have a blessed home in the Lord where I can go and shut the door, and kneel to my Father in secret, and where I am at peace as in a deep sea of calmness when all around and above is trouble."

Third, Charity. By charity I mean that I want to be so magnanimous that I will put the best construction on the deeds of others; saved from a critical spirit so that the reputation of others will be safe in my hands. Lord, forbid that I should find it easy when preaching, or in conversation, to go out of my way and cast a reflection upon another when he is not able to explain. Let me always practise the Golden Rule and "do unto others as I would that they should do unto me."

Fourth, Chastity. I want to be so chaste that anything which savours of coarseness and suggestiveness will have no place in me. I must not shock the most refined with anything that borders on looseness and rudeness. Let me never use language or gestures in the pulpit which tend to cheapen the Gospel of the Son of God.

Fifth, Brevity. Let me know when and how to quit. I fear that I sometimes preach people under conviction, then preach it off. Better not finish my sermon and have a fruitful appeal, than preach ten minutes too long and lose one seeker. More than once have I started in the Spirit, and I fear ended in the flesh. In other words, I reached a climax and failed quickly to draw the net: some of the fish escaped. What a pity! Lord, have mercy! Once more I plead for Purity, Humility, Charity, Chastity, and Brevity.

TWENTY-SEVEN QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON THE NEW BIRTH

- Q. Whose doctrine is the new birth teaching?
- A. The doctrine of our Lord Jesus Chhrist. See John 3:1-5. Also 2 John 9.
- Q. Is it necessary to preach this doctrine?
- A. Yes indeed! Because we are commanded to do so. See 2 Tim. 4:1-3. Also 1 Tim. 4:16.
- Q. Does not the doctrine of the new birth as the Lord taught belong to the Jews only?
- A. No, it is for the Jews first, then to all as well. See Rom. 1:16. Also Gal. 6:15. Acts 2:9.
- Q. Is there any difference between the kingdom of God and the kingdom of heaven?
- A. Yes, the kingdom of God is strictly the kingdom or life belonging to celestial beings, converted ones and the holy angels; but the kingdom of heaven means the Lord ruling among men on earth. For instance, the kingdom of heaven contains both wheat and tares, good and bad fish; that is, such are found where this kingdom is; but nothing unrighteous or unclean can enter, appear or inherit the kingdom of God. So there is a difference. See Matt. 13. Also 2 Peter 1:5-12.
- Q. What is the position of those who have believed in Christ but have never been immersed in Jesus' Name, and have not received the Holy Ghost with the sign of tongues?
- A. Those belong to the kingdom of heaven; those are the good seed in the kingdom; these can go on and be born of the water and of the Spirit to enter the kingdom of God. Nicodemus and Cornelius once were of that type of men, also the Ephesians that Paul baptized. See Acts 19:1-6.
- Q. Would these folks be lost if they had not gone on to the water and Spirit birth?
- A. No, for when they continued to walk in the light they had, they consequently entered into the deeper and higher divine experiences. 1 John 1:4-7. Also John 8:31-36.
- Q. Is there any difference between being begotten and being born?
- A. Yes, just as the baby must be begotten or conceived and developed in the womb, then be born; even so, spiritually, some first hear the Word and embrace it until the life of God begins in the heart: this is spiritual conception of the Word and when continuing in the Word, the Word grows to a birth and that is being born of God or the Spirit after being begotten by the Word. Christ, the first of this new order, had to be begotten and conceived before He could be born of the virgin Mary. Many call conception of the Word the new birth, but that is a mistake.

- Q. Can one be called a child of God before he is born of the Spirit?
- A. Yes, just as a baby is a child of the parents before birth when conceived, likewise those who have a real conversion or conception of the Word in their life. Of these it is said, "Because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the Spirit of His son into your heart, crying, abba Father." This is the Holy Ghost language. See Gal.4:6,7.
- Q. Were the apostles children of God before the day of Pentecost?
- A. Yes, just like the above answer, they were adopted and begotten but not born again. The birth of the New Testament Christianity took place on the day of Pentecost when the apostles among the 120 received the gift of the Spirit as promised. The disciples were children of God also because they were specially chosen Jews, the sons of Abraham and this being so, they were worthy to be born of the Spirit with the rushing wind on the day of Pentecost as Jesus said, "He that is born of the Spirit is like the wind blows," etc. See John 3:7,8. Also Luke 11:9-13.
- Q. Why do the denominational churches pronounce one who believes on Christ and has accepted Him as his Saviour and Lord a born again person then and there without even being immersed and baptized with the Holy Chost?
- A. They gather their theory from the following verses: Acts. 16:30,31; 1 John 5:1, etc., but these forget that the first reference is connected with water baptism and the joy in the Holy Ghost, and the latter reference is followed by water, blood and the Spirit. Acts 16:32,33; 1 John 5:5,6. These both show the water and Spirit birthright in connection with believing on Christ being the Son of God and faith in His Name. The faith that causes the new birth is a gift from God and is given to those who intelligently believe on the Name of Christ. Many have the mere belief but have not the saving faith of God. These should continue believing on Jesus' Name and be baptized and seek to be filled with the Spirit and be born again through the faith of God. See Eph. 2:8,9. Also John 6:44; Mark 16:15,16.
- Q. The folks that believe on Christ's Name and repent but are not baptized by water and the Spirit,—where do they stand?
- A. They stand on the same ground that the saints of the Old Tesament stood; they were saved by faith not receiving the promise of the Spirit. They are not the real Spirit born children of God, but they are the people of God and adopted children. See Heb. 11:39,40, and 1 Sam. 12:20-22, etc.

TWENTY-SEVEN QUESTIONS and ANSWERS on the NEW BIRTH—Contd.

- Q. What is the difference between the adopted and born children of God?
- A. The difference is just as large as the natural adopted and real born children in a home. Sometimes the adopted children are more loyal to their foster father and mother than real children are intimate with their parents and therefore more careless and naughty, while the adopted are more reverent because of the fear of those who adopted them. Compare the life of the Old Testament heroes as described in Heb. 11, with the church at Corinth. You will see this fact. Yet, Jesus said the least in the kingdom of God is greater than all the prophets including John the Baptist.
- Q. What is the new birth?
- A. It is being created anew, or to become a new creature in Christ Jesus. See John 3:1-5 and 2 Cor. 5:14 19.
- Q. When can one be born again?
- A. When one gets in Christ Jesus and Christ gets in him.
- Q. When does one get in Christ?
- A. When he puts on Christ by being baptized. Gal. 3:26,27.
- Q. When does Christ enter into us?
- A. The Word of Christ gets in us when we truly believe on Him and accept Him as our Saviour, and when we receive the Holy Spirit baptism we become the temple of the resurrected and glorified Christ and then we are not only begotten but also born. Begetting commences when we receive the Word of Christ and the new birth follows when we receive the Spirit that raised Christ from the dead, then we are in Christ and Christ is in us and we become the new creatures in Christ Jesus. To understand this fully one must read 2 Cor. 5:14-19.
- Q. When does a believer become a part of the body of Christ?
- A. When he is baptized by the one Spirit into that one body, and not before. 1 Cor.12:12,13.
- Q. Where are we before being baptized into the body of Christ?
- A. We are in ourselves or in the flesh, or in the womb of the church conceived, being prepared to come forth and be joined to Christ. Rom. 8:6-10. The type for this experience is in the children of Israel. They were people of God while in Egypt and under the blood there; yet they were in the womb of Egypt, but when going through the Red Sea, under the cloud, drowning Pharaoh in water; then and there a nation was born of water and of the Spirit. They then became not only God's people but God's people free from the flesh pots of Egypt to follow God independently and drink from the rock, etc. The apostle uses this very illustration in 1 Cor. 10. Do not stop, therefore, with just a sprinkling of the blood, or eating the lamb but go on until you see the full salvation of God. See Ex. 14.

RASH VOWS

"Be not rash with thy mouth, and let not thine heart be hasty to utter anything before God: for God is in heaven, and thou upon earth; therefore let thy words be few." Ecc. 5:2.

How many of us have made some rash statements that we later found that we could not retract; and, even if we could, the spiritual and moral damage done could never be mollified. Saints find out, alas, but too late, that when they utter hasty remarks they have very much leisure time to repent. Yea, verily, words fitly spoken are like apples of gold in pictures of silver. Prov. 25:11.

My mind goes back to an Old Testament character who vividly portrays the folly that results from making rash and hasty vows. Yes, he, too, learned that haste makes waste. This particular individual's name was Jephthah. He was a Gileadite, a man of valor, and, because he was the son of a harlot, his brethren banished him to the land of Tob. When Gilead sent for Jephthah to be their captain and drive out the invaders, he sent a letter to the king of Ammon and remonstrated with him, but the king did not hearken. Jephthah then passed over unto the children of Ammon.

Then Jephthah made a fatal mistake. Without thinking, he vowed unto God that he would offer as a burnt offering the first thing that came forth from his house to meet him returning from battle if the Ammonites were delivered into his hand. We all know that the Ammonites were overcome and finally subdued; but, alas, when Jephthah arrived triumphantly home, his joy was turned to sorrow for as his only daughter came out to meet him he suddenly remembered his vow! Read Judges 11.

May I call your attention to one example in the New Testament? This character's name is Peter. Yes, Peter the impetuous one, who said, "Although all shall be offended yet will not I." Then he very vehemently cried, after the Lord had said he would deny Him thrice, "If I should die with Thee, I will not deny Thee in any wise." We all know how well Peter fulfilled these rash statements. He did deny his Lord thrice ere the cock crew twice.

Every now and then they play them back at Germany to prove to the German people just how well their fuhrer has kept his various promises and treaties, much to Hitler's chagrin. I am afraid that on judgment day many of us will be confronted with a long list of vows which we have foolishly uttered in the heat of strife.

Christ, speaking in Matthew 12:35-37, said in no uncertain terms, "Every idle word that men

DELINQUENCY

What does it mean? Where is it? To whom does it belong? It means one who fails to perform a duty, or one who commits a fault; one who is neglectful of or fails in duty or obligation; faulty; offensive, or someone who does the wrong thing instead of the right until it becomes very offensive, wearisome and troublesome. I am sure that delinquency is giving trouble everywhere.

Where is it? We used to read of it in a book that our parents kept for the family to read. This book was very carefully kept for fear someone would destroy it, for they wanted to save it for the youngest ones in the family as they grew up, thinking it would teach them about this molested life and what it meant for our younger generation to get into delinquency, that they might be warned against it and thus be saved from sorrow. This book told about an old house somewere back off a dark street. Not many people knew anything about it. All was dark except for the little red light in the window. That told the story. The people that did know about it were the kind of folk that lived their lives at the same low ebb. "Birds of a feather flock together." In those days when anyone was of that same group they were dismissed from the better class of people.

To whom does it belong? It does not belong to the better class but to those who do not care for a character which should be worth everything to all people. Girls, remember this is true: The church is of the better class and is made up of the best people with great characters. They are great folk. They can not and will not come down where delinquency is. We used to save the book to be read to the younger generation to warn them of what would knock at their doors some day. But today those who are in the delinquent group are closer than your parents' past knowledge. Those possessing that same spirit are already at your home, at your front door.

Mothers, do you believe this? If not, that is where our trouble is! We must get the parents to believe these things are as close to home as they are in order to work on conditions now existing, not back a long time ago, but in your own home, among your own children, especially of 'teen age. (But try to get the parents to believe their daughter is walking out the front door and going on into trouble, right out on the streets, and off into cars!) Oh, yes, some children of this age go to church with the parents very nicely, but when the preacher starts preaching they slip out the door very quietly and into a car or some place where it is dark, and then steal back in again by the time the preacher is done preaching so that they might keep their parents from knowing what is going on. (Was it your daughter that was out in the dark during services?)

Now mothers, will you read closely? Why don't you believe that this is true at your home and

at your door as well as in other homes? See for yourself where your daughter is and where she has been. Don't bother what others say about her nor where and what she says, but know for yourself. If I couldn't trust my daughter concerning where she goes, then I think I would be a pretty good bodyguard myself. Our 'teen-aged girls surely need someone, too, who loves them enough that they might tell their story of delinquent living to them, of their whereabouts, and what they are doing. They are indeed caught in a trap. No one wants to tell. Everybody is upheld, and it's all smoothed over.

But there is a reason I feel to explain: It's because I love the young people I think a little more than any one else and they are now on my heart that I have received a great burden. This takes the work of all preachers, teachers, and helpers, including the parents, to bring our children to freedom.

Girls, when you have to hide, or run, to do things in the dark, it is never done right, for we that are saved are no more of the night. We have awakened, and shaken ourselves, and arisen, and put on beautiful strength. If you so desire you are able to do the same if you arise and walk to shine in a new life. Then we stand able to conquer the Enemy! We are able to say "nay" at the proper time. Are you able or are you like a ship without a sail? Do you do whatever the other young people do? Perhaps you are like clouds without water; you can't tell just where you are going next or what you will hear next. Just wherever the crowd goes, or whatever they say will be all right—that's what you will do. Girls, you have lost your victory with the Lord; you are not where you were when you first found the Holy Ghost, or have you ever found Him?

I would advise you to let the rest of the world go by, and to do right if all the rest of the young people do wrong. You stand, and then you stand some more until everybody sees that you are immoveable, and then you will win some to come your way. When no girls or boys are won it is because there isn't anybody that wants to stand or attain to the cross; for it is the way of the cross that leads home. So many don't want to stand opposite the other one. That's the reason there is no cross.

Dear girls, come back to the Lord; come back to obedience. Take your stand for the right, repent of all your sins, and then stand and stand again, and keep on standing until Jesus comes. Stand until you are able to stand, and instead of losing your own soul, you will win and see the other girls coming into the fold taking their stand, as they saw you did, for the glory of the Church. The reason we don't have more young people come into the church and stand is because when they do come in and look around they see no one else standing, so they do the same. Hence, the condition is very serious. It's wearisome to the flesh. We call it delinquency.
