THE GLORIOUS CANDLESTICK

Radio sermon given by Elder S. G. Norris over station WMIN, Sunday, October 8, 1944

Good evening, friends. We are glad that you have tuned in to our Gospel program again today, and we believe we have a very interesting message. We hope you will enjoy it. We have been studying the Jewish Tabernacle Plan that God gave Moses and the children of Israel in the wilderness of Arabia, just fifty day after He delivered them from the land of Egypt. We are going to step inside that Tabernacle this evening and as we do so, the first piece of furniture we notice is the Golden Candlestick. There were two other pieces of furniture in the first room of the tabernacle, namely, the Table of Shewbread and the Altar of Incense. Today we will look into the blessing of the candlestick and its meaning for both then and now. The candlestick was, of course, used to give forth light inside the Holy Place of the Tabrenacle.

Light! Of all the elements of nature, light is the most mysterious and most beautiful...a characteristic of God. The Bible tells us that God is light and in Him is no darkness at all. There is a very interesting fact about this great subject of light, found in the very first chapter of the Book of Genesis. It is this. Light was created by the Lord God before the sun, moon and stars appeared. The source of our light today is, of course, from the Sun, but the beginning of light was not dependent upon the solar system or the sun as its great hub. Here is the record, "And the earth was without form and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters, And God said, Let there be light! and there was light! And God called the light day and the darkness he called night." During the very first creative day God made light. During the next creative day God made solids of gaseous substance that covered the earth and also separated the clouds from the earth and placed an expanse between the earth and heaven. That all took place during the second creative day. On the third creative day as recorded by Genesis chapter one, you will find that God said, "Let the earth bring forth grass and herbs and trees yielding fruit whose seed was in itself after its own kind." But still after three full creative days, there was NO SUN, NOR MOON, NOR STARS. These were not made until the fourth creative day. Gen. 1:14-18 And God said, Let there be lights in the firmament, two great lights, the greater to rule the day, and the lesser to rule the night. He made the stars also. So you see that the sun nor moon nor stars did not exist until long after God said let there be light! These great lights that God hande are really

LIGHT HOLDERS. Light already existed before the sun was made, so the sun really is a light holder, as is the moon which reflects the rays of the sun. The stars are also light holders in the heavens to give light upon the earth.

Light Holders!

There was a very definite reason why God created light before He made the Sun, Moon and Stars. These are LIGHT HOLDERS, or in other words, keepers of light. The candlestick in the Tabernacle was really a light holder. It held the light for the Holy Place during the night time. Each evening it was lighted by the High Priest, and in the morning, when the true light of day shined forth, the candlestick was put out. This candlestick, that stood in the Holy Place of the Tabernacle, was a very beautiful piece of furniture. In the first place it was made of pure gold. It was gorgeously decorated and had seven beautiful branches, including the stem. It was the only light in the Tabernacle. It was representative of many truths of today. For example: The light of the cadlestick shined upon the table of shewbread. This table of Shewbread represented the Word of God. So the light of the candlestick flowed down upon the shewbread and lighted it plainly during the shadows of night. No one could have seen the Table of Shewbread unless the candlestick had given forth its light. That would have meant, the Table of Shewbread would have been in darkness. When the Word of God is in darkness...where there is no revelation of light upon it...Then the letter killeth! But where the light of Divine revelation shines softly upon the Word, then the Word becomes a light to the souls of men.

The Word of God, or the Bible, can become either one of two things to you. First without the light of Divine revelation upon your Bible, it becomes just about the driest reading you can find. Jesus said the letter KILLETH! Yes, just the letter...just your Bible, even though it is the most precious to you, can become very monotonous and dry reading, until you wonder whether God caused it to be written or not. On the other hand, the Bible, when softly lighted by divine light. when the light of God's presence falls upon its pages, then my friends, your Bible becomes the most valuable Book in your home.

How many times have you heard this, "I don't read my Bible because it is so dry I don't seem to

MINUTES OF THE 15TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE PENTECOSTAL ASSEMBLIES OF JESUS CHRIST, INC. HELD AT ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI SEPT. 26TH TO OCT. 1ST, INCLUSIVE 1944

A very large number of ministers and workers from all over the nation gathered early at White Way Tabernacle St. Louis, Missouri, for the opening of the 15th Annual Convention of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ Inc.

The convention opened on Tuesday morning, Sept. 26 with Eld. Ace Summers of Mt. Vernon, Illinois, in charge. The morning devotional service was led by Eld. L. J. Hosch of Kilgore, Texas. This was followed by by an inspiring message by Eld. Wynn T. Stairs of St. Stephen, New Brunswick, Canada.

Earmarks Of The End

"Coming events cast their shadows before them." But why all this beating at our very doors? Why all this unrest? My friend, are you only a stranger in these parts, or has a Rip Van Winkle spirit seized you? Could it be possible that you have forgotten that there is still a God in heaven Who still possesses all power, and Who still sits at the control of our universe, and is able to direct the destinies of nations?

Do you remember that this same God that talked to a man one day in the long, long ago, and bade him write to the nations of the earth, warning them that a time of trouble was coming upon the earth such as never was since there was a nation, even to that time, and further states that time only those who shall be found written in the Book shall be delivered; and we find in the following verse that what he is about to record is associated with the resurrection, which thing is also conceded by a cloud of witnesses scattered throughout Christendom. "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness oof the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever."

get much out of it!" There are thousands of homes right here in the Twin Cities, where the Bible is never read! And no doubt hundreds of more homes, where people are sincere and would like to enjoy reading the Bible...and do read it because they believe they should, but really get very little from it. What is the reason? The answer is that they do not have the candlestick of God's presence shining in their hearts to lighten the pages of the Word to them. Jesus said He was the light of the world. In other words, He was that candlestick, come down in flesh and blood, so that we might understand God. Yes, Jesus is the light of the world, and when we receive His Spirit in our hearts, then we too, have a portion of that wonderful light of God which illuminates the Bible until it becomes a real friend instead of a book of darkness.

The divine light of God, or in other words, a revelation of God's truth, must be accomplished by His Word. Both must go hand in hand. Just as the letter killeth, where there is no revelation or divine light, so also where there is no letter or Bible adhered to, then divine light or revelation, becomes fanaticism. Some folks swing out to the extreme on revelation, but when confronted with the Word of God on the question, they refuse to consider it, claiming that God will lead them by revelation. That sort of reasoning is very weak indeed, because it does not correspond with the Tabernacle Plan that God gave Moses. And that Tabernacle Plan was a schoolmaster to bring us to Christ. In the Tabernacle there was both the Candlestick and also the Shewbread. The Candlestick represented the divine revelation of God's light and the Table of Shewbread, the Word of God. So, I might say, I have a revelation from God. But unless it can be backed-up and verified by God's Word, then my "so-called" revelation is fanaticism. On the other hand, I might say, I have the Word of God and I shall accept no additional light, no matter what...then my word that I cling so tenaciously to, becomes the letter that killeth and I will be left in darkness.

My friends, that Candlestick in the Tabernacle was very important. We simply dare not build a little fence around our theology and dare God or man to trespass. If what you have from God is His final work of grace in your life, you need not be afraid of additional revelation of divine truth. If however your experience does NOT measure up to the fullness of God's salvation for you, then you better search the Scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life. Of course the Candlestick in the Tabernacle represented Jesus Christ, the GREAT LIGHTHOLDER OF GOD ON THIS EARTH. Jesus said in St. John 9:5, "As long as I am in the world, I AM THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD." Where He walked, when He talked, whoever received His fellowship and believed His words were blessed with the Divine Light of God. He brought God's light to men, because He was God on this earth, and as long as He dwelt here, He was the light of the world.

But after His departure, He set up a kingdom of saints on this earth to be LIGHTHOLDERS that men might be led to HIM. I am quoting now from Matt. 5:14-16. "Ye are the light of the world! (He was speaking to His disciples,) Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid. Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your father which is in heaven." So just the same as God made light, several thousands of years before the sun, moon and stars were created, so Jesus Christ came first as the great light of God on earth. Then after His death, burial, resurrection and ascension, He sent the Comforter or Holy Ghost into the lives of His disciples on the Day of Pentecost to make them lightholders upon this earth. That wonderful Spirit of God is still being sent into the hearts of those who hunger and thirst after righteousness today!

Sad to say, very few are really interested in becoming a light for God in this present war-torn sad world. Very few will trouble themselves with any burden for souls of their fellowmen. Very few will really hold still long enough for God to put the question directly to their hearts. WHAT have you done with Jesus, which is called the Christ! Very few are willing to lay aside the pleasures of this life, come to the altar of repentance, cry out to God until they are filled with His spirit! Thousands are joining churches, many more are affiliating themselves with this or that religious body but very few have really been born again, converted by the Spirit of God until they shine as lighthouses for men and women that are stumbling down the broad, pleasure-mad highway to hell. There are plenty of men in this town that would gladly teach a young man how to smoke, or how to take his first drink. There are plenty of wo-men in this town that will teach a young girl how to smoke or to take her first drink. There are plenty of people that will teach you how to play cards or teach you how to gamble. There are plenty of teachers and leaders of sin but, very, very few that will teach a young man or woman, or older men and women, or boys and girls how to be filled with God's presence in their lives until they can shine as lights in the world.

One of the greatest curses we have in the world today, is the fact that there are so few men and women consecrated to God enough to shine as LIGHTHOLDERS of Jesus Christ. Most folks these days say the same as Cain said nearly six thousand years ago, AM I MY BROTHER'S KEEPER? In other words, I have all I can do to watch out for myself, why worry about anyone else. This present world struggle of war is simply the outcropping of selfish desires and interests, and a complete lack of understanding about the wants and needs of others. When the Christians fail to let their light shine when God's light-holders get so few that only a flicker shines forth to light the pathway for the souls of lost men, then BRUTE FORCE takes over, and that is what we are faced with today. Are you concerned about your own soul? Are you satisfied with belonging to a church without ever being concerned about the souls which are multiplied around you? Don't you believe it's time to seek God until you are filled with the baptism of the Holy Ghost, so that you can shine a little for Jesus Christ on this

The Bible Thanksgiving and the Thanksgiving Day

In this month a day is set apart and observed annually as Thanksgiving Day for this country, which is a good indication of acknowledging God and His goodness to us as a nation, and we, therefore, as God's own people, are more than glad to say, "Thank God, for He is good and His mercy endureth forever" with the rest of the people in the United States on that day. But the Bible Thanksgiving does not end with the sunset of a certain day, and that once a year. The doctrine of thanksgiving in the Bible occupies many, many Scriptures and its practice is demanded because it is a divine fundamental teaching; and to neglect it, means darkness and disasters. We understand from Romans 1:21, that the cause of heathenism was an unthankful heart. As the people of old began to neglect honoring God and ceased their thanksgiving, they at once became vain in their imaginations and their foolish heart was darkened and they became bad in character, in heart and mind so much so that they thought God was likened unto an image, like birds and animals, and they worshiped such. Even today, many have lost in character because of being unthankful and have grown proud, independent and high minded so that they even mock those who shout His praises continuously.

When To Thank God

To thank God both with heart and voice when all is good and well, is not enough, because we are told that "in everthing give thanks," yea in all circumstances, whether pleasant or unpleasant. Why? Because "for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you," 1st Thess. 5:18. And the same Apostle goes further than this and says, "giving thanks always for all things unto God; see Eph. 5:19, giving thanks not only for the prosperity but for adversity as well; giving thanks for health and also for sickness; giving thanks for friends and also enemies. Why? Because "for we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are the called according to His purpose." Rom. 8:28.

Murmuring

The sin of murmurng is equal with the sin of idolatry, and the sin of fornication See 1 Cor. 10: 1-10. You say you are moral and believe in one God, well, but if you are a cranky or murmuring Christian, you will be destroyed with idolaters and Adulterers. The spirit of thanksgiving is a submission spirit or humble spirit and it is a be-

lieving spirit and therefore a thankful spirit. Of what kind of spirit are you my reader? But one may say, if you only knew my many cares of life you would perhaps cry and pray for me more than asking me to say "Praise God! Hallelujah!" Well even for that, the same Apostle says, "Be careful for nothing, but in everthing by prayer and suplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Phil. 4:4-7. Here we see again that though we are admonished to pray and to supplicate, we are also told to do these both with thanksgiving—so according to the Bible teaching every day to us who believe, is a thanksgiving day, rain or shine, in joy or in sorrow and in temptation or triumph, and to fail this is to be out of the will of God which is in Christ Jesus. Many experimental instances can be quoted to prove that a thankful heart with praising lips brings the good change of things much quicker than just worrying and praying. Henry W. Frost, Director for North America of the China Inland Mission wrote some time ago—

"Nothing so pleases God in connection with our prayer as our praise, and nothing so blesses the man who prays as the praise which he offers. I had a great blessing once in China in this connection. I had received bad and sad news from home, and deep shadows had covered my soul. I prayed but the darkness did not vanish. I summoned myself to endure but the darkness only deepened. Just then I went to an Island Station and saw on the wall of the mission home these words, "Try Thanksgiving" I did, and in a moment every shadow was gone not to return. Yes the Psalmist was right, "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord."

And believe me it is a bad thing not to give thanks. Let us join Paul and say with him:

"Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." 1 Cor. 15:57.
