Back To The Altar

Radio sermon given by Elder S. G. Norris over station WMIN, Sunday, Dec., 31, 1944

Everyone of us is interested in victory during the year that is just ahead of us. Victory in Germany, victory in Italy and victory in Japan. That is our hope. That is our earnest prayer. My message today is an appeal for victory at the altar of prayer! If statistics could be obtained. I am sure that the Christians of America have responded in a splendid manner both in combat zones and on the home front for the Red Cross, U.S.O., war bond drives, production in war plants and other causes to help shorten the war. However, the church as a whole has a responsibility, which the church alone can meet, and in which I believe we have fallen far short of the mark. That responsibility and that mark is sincere fervent heart-searching prayer.

Right now, there is more confusion in allied diplomatic circles as to whom to trust, and how far to trust, than at any time since Pearl Harbor. Political science cannot be stabilized because forces in the spiritual and social lives of the masses have apparently loosed from the anchor of faith in God. The situation in Greece proves that there is a great division between Russia's views as to how a government should be run in a liberated country and just what Great Britian thinks about it. The very fact that Prime Minister Churchill had to rush to Greece this past week makes it clear that the three great powers of the earth today namely, The United States, Britian, and Russia, may have powerful armies but to restore peace and contentment in a liberated country is another matter. The Germans know this too, and some of the top men of our nation believe their recent drive was struck because of confusion in the allied political camps. And right this evening in multitudes of hearts here in America, people are asking themselves the question of what will the peace be after the war is won? Will it be like Italy? Will it be like Poland or Greece?

In America we have a right to fight, we have a right to give, we have a right to believe and act to win the war and we also have the right to think. My personal opinion is that thousands of sober minded Americans are thinking! My New Year's message this evening is to help us get back to the altar of prayer as quickly as possible so that we might think clearly and correctly. The spiritual roots of America are being torn up daily by sin and the results of sin which cause people not to seek God, therefore we cannot think clearly or correctly. Sin is still a reproach to any people, and any nation will be cast into hell that forgets God!

The churches of America have a grave responsibility before them. They must learn how to pray again! How did-any of our churches ever start? The answer is, by prayer. The very first church in the New Testament began on the Day of Pentecost when the one hundred and twenty disciples got down on their knees and fervently cried out to God in earnest prayer! They were filled with the Spirit of God...the church was started because of fervent prayer! The greatest asset the church has for the nation in 1945 is her ability to pray and obtain help from God. Unless we believe in a supernatural being called Jesus Christ our God, then we have no right to be termed Christians. If we believe God, then there must be a belief in His supernatural power to help and if ever a world needed help from God it is surely this present generation. How do you know there is a God? Well, you don't unless you have been to an altar of prayer sometime during your life and have felt God's power and presence in your life. If you know God at all it is because you first met Him as a Saviour. Unless you have met Him first as a Saviour, a Christ that could deliver you from sin, then your knowledge of God and belief in the supernatural is simply a mental build-up and not a soul "clean-up"! For you to try to understand God as the Mighty One, the Counsellor, the Everlasting Father, or the Prince of Peace before you find Him as your Saviour is an impossible task. You must find Him first as a Saviour and I repeat if you have, it was at some altar of prayer! Many folks have found the Lord Jesus as their Saviour in the field while working; others in a barn when praying, others in their kitchens, others at cottage prayer meetings, but most of us found God at some church altar when we were praying and seeking God with all our hearts.

The word "altar" in the Hebrew means "a place of slaughter, a place of death." The altar was where the sacifices were brought to be killed and offered to God as a substitute for sin. The altar was not very beautiful, but modern Christianity has made the altar a place of beauty, a place of gold and ornaments where it would be entirely out of order for a person to pray who really wanted to pray with all his heart. Many churches have side rooms or anti-rooms where people can pray and this is no doubt good, but it was not so when any of our churches was founded! Men and women, boys and girls sought God right at the altar of the church...prayed through and found Him. And if that church became so stiff and formal that they could not pray out loud to their God,

My Little Children

In these trying days this portion of God's Word is more applicable to His children than ever before, for we are living in a time when everyone is trying to do the very best he can. People often try to tell us that this is all that is necessary, but John wrote many centuries ago that we "sin not."

What Paul wrote to the Ephesians still holds good for today. We have "One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God." For we must not sin a little every day as some teach and tell us, for Jesus is able to keep us. John wrote in 1 John 2:12, "I write unto you little children, because your sins are forgiven you for His name's sake."

I have found as I went about my own way, fulfilling the desires of my own flesh and mind, there was no battle, but as I came face to face with God and His law I am trying to obey, I find sin rouses up, an works all manner of things in me contrary to the commandments of God.

So I find the law is therefore given to show the man himself, for once I knew nothing of the claims of God upon my life. I thought all was well, when all at once I came face to face with "Thou Shalt," and "Thou Shalt Not."

Some times things within me rise and fight against God's law; for how wonderful the plan of God is to show us what sin is and to make us know our need of salvation; to wake within us a desire to put sin away, and for need of deliverance. The need of a Saviour must be felt before the Lord can be welcome to come in.

Paul once wrote, "O wretched man that I am! Who shall deliver me from the body of this death?" He also wrote, "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord."

For there is a deliverance when we are ready to be delivered. "Looking unto Jesus" is the way of deliverance at every stage of our spiritual life.

We look at Jesus upon the cross, just as the children of Israel looked away from their dire conditions to the serpent lifted up in the wilderness so must we look away from ourselves in the death of sin to Calvary.

As we look we live and again as we "Look" and see ourselves crucified with Christ, and in the faith which unites us to Him we must reckon ourselves dead indeed to sin, and put away every known sin, refusing to let it reign over us, and as we honestly desire and expect victory—the Holy Ghost seals our faith with real deliverance.

Jesus is faithful, He can make something out of us, no matter who or what we are. He'll find us wherever we may be. He found many in the desert land, He led them out, He also instructed them. He kept them as the apple of His eye, because He loved them, and He will do that for whoever will let Him. "He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also to walk, even as he walked" 1 John 2:6.

"And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." Galatians 6:9.

there are some very important things to remember in praying. One is to always pray in the will of God. There is a permissive will of God and the divine will of God. There are three steps in praying. They are supplication, interceding, and travailing. Christ interceded and travailed for us in the Garden of Gethsemane inasmuch that great drops as of blood fell from His forehead. Such great love for the world was portrayed in that touching prayer that the Lord gave in His most trying hour.

Many people today ridicule those people who condescend to pray. But their mistake is in not obeying that impulse or instinct that God has instilled into all men to call upon Him. But sometime sooner or later every man shall fall upon his knees and cry out to God in prayer—but it is not always going to be soon enough. God is not going to strive and speak to the heart of man always.

Our birthright is when we receive the Holy Ghost, and are born into the Kingdom of God.

The liar thinks he shall not be discovered, but let us look at Joseph's brethren; it took years before their sin found them out. Gen. 42:21, "And they said one to another, we are verily guilty concerning our brother, in that we saw anguish of his soul, when he besought us, and we would not hear: therefore is this distress come upon us."

Rev. 21:8, "But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whore-

Achan found even though he covered his under the ground, he had to confess to God in obedience to Joshua. He did not want to yield but she tempted him and the result was: Judges 16:17, "And he told her all his heart, and said unto her. There hath not come a razor upon mine head, for I have been a Nazarite from my mother's womb: if I be shaven, then my strength shall go from me, and I shall become weak and be like any other man."

Anyone can be common and yield to temptation, but it takes a strong man to live for God, he does not have weaklings in His Kingdom. Are you a weakling or a man? Let us step out from among them and be a giant for God.

Is it better to please man or God? Some may say, "I cannot serve God because of my people." Jesus said, "Take up thy cross and follow me." You must forsake all to follow Jesus.

they would go out in the woods or fields, or go clear across the ocean, like the pilgrim fathers, so they would have freedom of worship and an opportunity to pray. Our little continental army, which was almost a joke in terms of military power, defied the English because there were plenty of people both in and out of the army that knew how to call upon God, and get heaven's help by prayer! Where in the Bible do you find anyone reading out of a prayer book for prayer? That may be well and good but if you were on familiar terms with a friend, you would no talk to him by reading some copy that another had written. You would speak for yourself, in your own sincere personal way. You would use your own words and not those of another. It's the same way with our great God and Saviour, Jesus Christ. If you are His friend, He's not so concerned about the articulation of your words or your fluent use of grammar or how perfect you may pronounce your words. He wants you...personal you, to pray to Him yourself out of a full heart, something that you really mean and something that you really desire. Surely if one sparrow cannot fall to the ground without the notice of our Father's eye, how much more will He be able to understand the cry of the honest heart in a prayer!

I want to say to you from the depths of my heart, unless enough people in America can get a new vision of the need of prayer, and find Christ as their Saviour so that they can get on friendly terms with Him in prayer, we will have many a dark day in '45. The church must simply get back to her knees, and I mean something more than just church ritual or ceremony of worship which sooths the mind but never touches the heart. Many of our churches have all sorts of prayer apparatus and paraphernalia until the real prayer is lost in ceremony, but my friends, the great revivals that have taken place in America have not originated from ritual, but from the prayers of worshippers who sought God in modest churches where opportunity was given for prayer. Our great responsibility as Christians for the coming year on the home front calls for more than War Bonds, Red Cross, U.S.O., community chest, and other worthy causes, it calls for a home front of Back-to-the-Altar-of-Prayer!

The little continental army in the day of Washington knew how to shoot straight and also get down in the snow, such as at Valley Forge, and call on God. America today does not feel her need of God in that manner.

Have we not proven we can turn out more bombers than any other nation? Have we not shown the axis that we can produce mass shipping and arms and equipment? Have we not vast resources of oil, coal and iron and skilled workers with factories and shops? Have we not over twelve million men in our armed forces and millions more if needed? Yes, all this is true and more, but just the same we need God's help. The least that we can do on the home front is to pray and work and then pray some more until God rends the heavens and helps us.

Noah erected an altar and offered offerings and sacrifices upon it to God Almighty. The world had just been destroyed by the flood and Noah started the new civilization on an altar of prayer! When Moses led the children of Israel out of Egypt, one of the first things he did was to erect an altar of prayer. The very first piece of furniture in the Tabernacle Plan that God gave Moses at Sinai was the altar! It was a place where people could find God. Joshua erected an altar when the children of Israel entered into Canaan Land because he knew they needed God's help! In the days of the prophet Elijah, when the nation was sinking in her own sin under her leader, Ahab, the faithful man of God, Elijah, called the people to Carmel with their king and false propnets for a great test at the altar. The wicked prophets were defeated and God honored Elijah at the altar of prayer and the fire fell from heaven...More than that the people returned to God and forsook their sins. When you really go to God's altar and pray until you touch the hem of His garment, sin will no longer have dominion over you. But to say you have been to the altar of God and get up to go out and continue in sin is simply making a pretense. The great King Solomon built an altar of prayer and used it for that purpose when he dedicated the Temple for the Lord. When he prayed the glory of God filled the place until the priests could not minister. All these great things were accomplished because of altars of prayer. Hannah prayed earnestly at the altar and God gave her Samuel! Daniel prayed even though the penalty of death hung over him for such a prayer in the Babylonian palace, but God answered just the same and closed the lions' mouths. The three Hebrews prayed in the fiery furnace and not one was burned! Hezekiah and Isaiah's prayers stopped the armies of the Assyrians and God delivered! Gideon prayed with a handful of soldiers The disciples and conquered the Midianites! prayed and God delivered Peter from prison. Paul prayed at Damascus and changed his religion from the cold formal belief of a Pharisee to a firebrand for God!

In the book of Genesis, chapter 8, verse 20,


