

The 7th chapter of Romans

This chapter seven in the Book of Romans can either be used in the proper manner that God inspired Paul to write, or it can be so misunderstood and misused that it opens the door for ungodliness and gives license to sin, until the Word of God becomes of no effect. For instance in chapter 7. verse 20, we read, "Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me." The wrong way to interpret that particular verse would be to blame any sin that a Christian committed on the flesh or body and excuse himself of the guilt because in his mind he has a desire to do right. In other words, the false doctrine derived from a misinterpretation of this verse and the entire chapter, is to attempt to divorce the guilt of sin from the soul, simply because it is committed in the body. In that case the body would be guilty but the soul clean before God, because actually in the mind of the party involved he really wanted to do right but his flesh was so weak that he could not resist.

Paul certainly would not be guilty of preaching such a doctrine in which the guilt of a soul or body would be separated. We are judged for the deeds done in the body and the only proof that the world has in watching the life of a Christian is to see his actions whether good or bad. Christ's life must be manifest in the Christian's actions... that which can be seen by the fellowman and not what that fellowman can imagine is transpiring in the mind or soul of the follower of the Lord. In other words, the old saying is still true that the things you do, speak so much louder than the things that you say, that I can't hear what you say. The reason any group in times past or present have made an imprint and gained numbers in this practical world is because others saw they were willing to suffer for their beliefs. No, my friends, the seventh chapter of Romans is not a denial of the fact that those that are Christians must live lives fitting of the Gospel. I'll grant you that some of the verses of this remarkable chapter seem to give a much desired leeway to the lukewarm disciple of Jesus but upon close examination we shall see differently. Please follow me as we discuss a few of these verses in Romans chapter seven.

Paul, in this book, is comparing the Law of Moses with the grace of the Lord Jesus. He is showing the great difference between Mt. Sinai

and Calvary! In verse seven we read, "What shall we say then, Is the law sin? God forbid, Nay, I had not known sin but by the law: for I had not known lust except the law had said, Thou shalt not covet." Here Paul pretends he is a man living back before the time that God gave Moses the Ten Commandments and other laws on Mt. Sinai. In other words, he places himself in the shoes of the heathen who had never heard that it was wrong to covet. Then, as he pretends again that he is that same heathen who lives at the time of Moses, under the law, he states that he had not known that it was wrong to covet but by the law which states, "Thou shalt NOT covet!" Paul is not pleading ignorance as a Christian, but he is pleading from the standpoint of a heathen who had lusted without its bothering his conscience, and then coming in contact with the law which condemned him. Therefore he says, "I had not known sin but by the law."

Verse 8 reads as follows, "But sin taking occasion by the commandment, wrought in me all manner of concupiscence. For without the law sin was dead." Here, Paul is still pretending that he is a heathen coming in contact with the law. The commandment of Moses not only showed him that, to covet was sinful, but the entire category of sin...all manner of concupiscence...all manner of sin was wrong. Before the law came, sin was not known in its true light so Paul states here that without the law sin was dead. In other words, the acts of sin had not pricked his conscience because he did not know they were wrong.

He further reasons in verse nine, "For I was alive without the law once; but when the commandment came, sin revived and I died." This does not mean, of course, that Paul literally died, he is still picturing himself as a man trying to live under the law of Moses. His sins were there all the time. He had been committing one sin after another but it had not bothered him because as a heathen he had no law that would cause him to know that he was doing wrong, however, when the commandment came, of, "thou shalt and thou shalt not," the sin-actions in him, were so strong and he saw that he was so far away from God, that he threw up his hands and said it is impossible! I can't live above sin...therefore I consider myself dead in trespass and sin.

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Excerpts from a letter from France

I can tell you more about our prayer meetings now, I think.

Joe Avram, one of the boys, and myself were going out on the edge of camp in an old hay-stack to pray. One night it was raining so we decided to arrange the bails of hay in a manner to keep dry and made a very small hole in the center of the hay-stack. Then several of the boys began gathering with us to sing and pray every night until the place became too small for the numbers out, so we had to tear down and build larger. We rebuilt the place a couple of times and finally the guards of the post found our location, therefore we moved to another hay-stack farther away and did the same there. This was a cozy place which stayed dry in spite of the continuous rains in England, but was not large enough after other troops moved in so we took time out during the day, and increased it to twice its size hoping that the Lord would fill it with boys who wanted to seek God and He did. One night there were twenty-five boys out in that little humble havstack seeking God, regardedless of rank, of which were privates and staff sergeants.

For a light we used candles and flashlights, as long as they lasted. The weather became more severe and cold, making it more uncomfortable, so we improvised a stove made from an old bucket. It was crude but served the purpose. The door was only a few inches in height and anyone coming inside had to humble themselves enough to get down on their hands and knees to crawl in.

After having this set-up we had regular services. One of the boys is a minister who pastored a church for some time and he preached some wonderful Pentecostal messages which stirred our hearts to press on. God will continue to bless if we keep humble before Him.

Sometimes we do not have chances to pray and study God's Word, so pray for us that we'll be protected and continue on in the Faith.

There is a difference in serving God overseas. When we feel a little discouraged or "down in the dumps," we cannot go visit with one of the brothers or sisters and hear a good word of encouragement spoken as we used to. There is no church to go to where God is blessing and you can feel His power and presence in the midst. There are no mats to walk on down the aisles but instead, perhaps a dirt floor. There is no pulpit to lay your Bible on and a disinterested group of rough men staring you in the face with their hearts far from God making it hard to pray.

Not only that, but sometimes a cold building without any heating system is used, and candles for lights are flickering from the wind coming through the roof where the steeple has been blown off by artillery fire. That is what the common soldier has to face in his spiritual battles.

Then at home, where all is content, there are a few folks who use natural circumstances as excuses in keeping them away from church and serving God to the fullest extent. Let us awaken out of sleep and be concerned about our soul salvation. My heart is stirred for there are many on the battle front who need God and it is our duty as Christians to hold them up in prayer for we are our brother's keeper.

By surprize, we ran upon a Pentecostal family in town. They are the only ones within two hundred miles of here and they have no pastor because the others in town will not allow them to have a pastor. Yet they are holding on faithfully through prayers and correspondence with a mininster in Paris.

He was telling me that when they received the Holy Ghost they didn't know what it was for some time, but they knew they had received something from God. It is something new in France and very few churches have been established. In 1930. the Pentecostal message was brought over from England, but held down by unbelievers and now from lack of fellowship due to war conditions. The brother wants to be baptized in Jesus' Name, so we have a job to do. Tonight we are going down to have prayer meeting with them and I am taking my guitar again for they love to sing and

Dan Maralis, a friend of mine in the outfit who is an ordained minister of the Oneness Faith is a great blessing to us boys, and can understand a little French so he helps me along with the French families that we visit.

WE DO NOT WELL

"We do not well: this is a day of good tidings, and we hold our peace: if we tarry till the morning light, some mischief will come upon us." 2 Kings 7:9.

This text is encircled with the story of the siege of Samaria by Benhadad, king of the Syrians. The seige was so severe that they had boiled their babies and eaten them. Prices had mounted until a donkey's head was sold for eighty pieces of silver. Starvation, death, and sorrow had seized everyone. All supply lines had been cut, they were hopeless. Two women had agreed to boil their sons for food, and one had done the deed. The next day the mother love of the second prevailed, and she could not think of boiling her little son although she had helped eat the other woman's son. The dispute was on and Elisha was blamed for all the trouble.

Elisha was in touch with God and promised or prophesied there would be plenty of food in Samaria on the morrow. God did not fail him for God never fails those that trust Him, and "stay put," and Elisha "stayed put." Four leprous men were sitting at the gate dying. They reasoned thus, "If we remain here, we will die; if we enter the city where there is a famine we will die. If we fall to the Syrians, we may die-why sit we They went to the camp of the Syrians. Before they had gotten there the Lord answered Elisha and made the Syrians hear a noise that sounded like thousands upon thousands of soldiers on the tramp with horses and chariots. Hallelujah! It was heaven's host on the move. Syrians fled for their lives and left everything as they went. The leprous men had decided right for in verse eight we read, "They did eat and drink until they were filled," and then they stored plenty away for the future, and were satisfied. In the midst of their great find of food, they made a great decision. They said, "This is a day of good tidings, and we hold our peace, we do not well, we should go and tell the dying in Samaria, those suffering and perishing should know it. They came to the porter of the city and told all and there were no more dying in Samaria for they had found plenty.

My friends, are we, the Church, not in the same place those leprous men were? Were we not starving and dying? Had not "death been passed upon all men, becasue all have sinned"? Were we not aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the covenant of promise, having

no hope and without God in the world?" Our Elisha, JESUS, came and broke the enemy's seige around the heavenly city and the "Tree of Life." Now He says, "I am come that ye might have life, and have it more aboundantly. He that cometh to me, I will in no wise cast out. I am the living BREAD that came down from heaven; if any man eat of this BREAD, he shall live forever. He that hath the Son hath LIFE, and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life." Did He not say to us, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel (Good News) to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned."

Have we not the message of life in our hands? Have we not the message of repenting, and being baptized in the Name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins and receiving the gift of the Holy Ghost, the message of being born of water and of the Spirit? Have we not the message that tells the sinner how to get this life that has been provided? We eat our fill, we enjoy our meetings and conventions, we feel so good, and are so blessed and so satisfied. We meet our friends and travel for many miles for a time of fellowship and have a good time. But oh! that we would wake up to the fact that "we do not well" that " this is a day of good tidings, and we hold our peace.' We make such a feeble effort for the perishing and dying in the heathen lands. We preach with such fervor and zeal to the few that listen to us in the homeland and linger and plead so in the altar call. When I think that if we were half as in earnest as we think we are we would do something more to reach the "regions beyond" and do more for them that have never had one chance yet. We ride in our nice cars, we build our nice churches, we get our fine salaries, until I fear some are paying more out in income tax than they are giving to the missionary cause. God help us, it seems almost like it was in Jeremiah's day, (5:31) "the people love to have it so, and what shall we do in the end thereof?" God help us! There is a judgment day when we shall give account of our stewardship. A "thousand million" souls will look us in the face that are scattered through out the heathen world, living in this our day and age. No one will be to blame for them but us. What are we going to do about it?

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The Crucifixion

Our subject for this evening is the crucifixion of the Lord Jesus. The resurrection of Jesus was glorious and its proof fills our hearts with rich hope of a better day. His ascension was even more glorious and the very thought of our being caught up to meet the Lord in the air makes us rejoice. His healing of the halt and the maimed, the opening in the eyes of blind Bartimaeus, the cleansing of the lepers, and the changing of the hearts of men from evil to good, are all great influences which have helped us to become followers of the Man of Galilee. However, the real proof of a man's conviction is his willingness to suffer for his cause. So, for a few minutes, let us consider the real proof, the outward proof, namely, the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus as a visible sign for us to know that His sincerity was sealed with His own blood.

Heroes have come out of this war because of their suffering. The right for freedom in the United States has not only been thought about, talked about, sung about, written about, and financed, but that right has been sealed by blood, sweat and tears of Americans who not only have the theory of freedom in their minds but have shown the world that they are willing to suffer and die if necessary that it might be perserved.

Jesus was more than a prophet. He was not a theorist. He was not simply a preacher. He was all that, but more. He was the God of heaven on earth, wrapped in human flesh trying to convince a lost world that heaven was a place worth suffering for to obtain. No Christian can ever become so discouraged that he cannot turn to the sufferings and crucifixion of the Lord Jesus and realize that He was not only willing to preach about a better life and a new world but also to die as full proof of his religion. He laid down His life for His friends. No sacrifice could be greater.

Perhaps no Scripture gives such a vivid discription of the events of the crucfixion as the fifteenth chapter of the Gospel of Mark. It will pay us to think soberly for a few minutes while we review that scene.

"And so Pilate willing to content the people, released Barabas unto them, and delivered Jesus, when he had scourged Him, to be crucified. And the soldiers led Him away into the hall, called Praetorium; and they call together the whole band. And they clothed Him with purple, and platted a crown of thorns and put it about His head, and began to salute Him, Hail, King of the Jews! And they smote Him on the head with a reed, and did spit upon Him, and bowing their knees worshipped Him. And when they had mocked him, they took off the purple from him, and put his own clothes on him, and led him out to crucify him. And they compel one Simon, a Cyrenian, who passed by, coming out of the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to bear his cross. And they bring him unto the place Golgotha, which is, being interpreted, The place

of a skull, And they gave him to drink wine mingled with myrrh: but he received it not. And when they had crucified hm, they parted he garments, casting lots upon them, what every man should take. And it was the third hour, and they crucified him. And the superscripton of his accusation was wrtten over, THE KING OF THE JEWS. And with him they crucified two thieves; the one on the right hand, and the other on his left. And the scripture was fulfilled, which saith, and he was numbered with the transgressors. And they that passed by railed on him, wagging their heads, and saying, Ah, thou that destroyest the temple, and buildest it in three days, Save thyself, and come down from the cross. Likewise also the chief priests mocking said among themselves, with the scribes, He has saved others; himself he cannot save. Let Christ the king of Israel descend now from the cross, that we may see and believe. And they that were crucified with him reviled hm. And when the sixth hour was come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour, Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani? which is, being interpreted, My God, My God, why hast thou forsaken me? And some of them that stood by, when they heard it, said, behold, he calleth Elias. And one ran and filled a sponge full of vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink, saying, let alone; let us whether Elias will come to take him down. And Jesus cried with a loud voice, and gave up the ghost. And the vail of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom. And when the centurion, which stood over against him, saw that he so cried out, and gave up the ghost, he said, Truly this man was the son of God.

Matthew also records that the soldiers that crucified Him sat down beneath that cross and watched Him...the watch of death, until He gasped His last. St. John records that the Jews besought Pilate that the legs of the crucified be broken so the bodies would not have to remain upon the cross on the sabbath day..."Then came the soldiers and brake the legs of the first and of the other which was crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs. But one of the soldiers with a spear, pierced his side, and forthwith came there out blood and water."

These detailed accounts of the suffering and death of Jesus prove beyond question the sincerity of His Gospel. He not only preached the kingdom of God was at hand but was willing to die for this truth.

Why did Jesus choose crucifixion for His death? We understand that of all the cruel punishments of a barbaric age, crucifixion was the most barbarous. In those days fashionable audiences crowded the amphitheatre to applaud the fearful horrors of combats which often ended in death. Crucifixion was chosen when an especially cruel

Proverbs 11:2

However, God was looking down at the heart of this little girl, and it must have made Him feel very sad to see such a little girl so full of pride. God doesn't want us to feel proud and think that we are dressed better or have better things than our friends. The next Sunday morning, when again she had her new dress on she went to Sunday School. When story time came this is what the proud little girl heard from God's Book:

Many years ago there lived a great king called Nebuchadnezzar. He had very beautiful flowers that he had planted. Then he looked at the fields that were filled with growing grain and he became very proud of himself. Holding his hand up high, he exclaimed, "It is I who have made this country beautiful, all by myself, alone. What a very great and wonderful being I am!" Now Nebuchadnezzar did not remember that it was God who helped him to do these wonderful things. He did not thank God for making him strong and wise to do this work. No, he just forgot about God and thought himself a very very wise king. Pride, you see, had filled his heart.

God cannot stand pride. He wants us to be humble and thankful, not proud. He wanted to teach Nebuchadnezzar that He, Himself, is the real ruler; that He is the One Who gives us everything we have and that nothing we do or have should make us feel proud of ourselves. One dark night after Nebuchadnezzar had gone to sleep, God gave him a dream. It was something about a very beautiful tall tree whose top reached far up into heaven and whose leaves were fresh and green. At last God sent an angel to chop down the beautiful tree, and then the king awoke.

He could think of nothing else but the strange dream he had had. He wished that he knew of someone who could explain the dream to him and tell him what it meant. He asked all the wise men in his kingdom to tell him the meaning of the dream, but not one of them could tell him what the dream meant. At last the king said to Daniel, "I know that you can tell me, because God is with you." Then Daniel went away and prayed, "O God, let me know the meaning of the king's dream.'

In about an hour he came back and said, "God has shown me, O king, the meaning of your dream. It is this: The tall tree stands for yoursellf. You are a great king. You rule over a broad and

beautiful country, and everyone calls you wise and good. However, the Lord wants you to thank Him for all these gifts, for it is He Who has given them to you. He wants you to be humble for He cannot stand a proud heart."

"This is why He has sent you the dream. O king, listen to God and obey Him and thank Him for helping your kingdom to become so great. In the dream you saw God sent lis angel to chop down the beautiful tree. This means that if you will not obey and thank Him God will take your beautiful kingdom with all these wonderful gardens and fields away from you. You will have to be punished for seven long years. God will have to do this to teach you not to be proud of yourself and the wonderful things you do, but to thank God for helping you to do them."

The king did not obey Daniel's words. He went right on in his sins spending his money for himself and thinking, "What a very great king I am!" He looked over his beautiful gardens and flowers and said as before, "I have made all these things myself." God was listening to the king's proud words. "O King Nebuchadnezzar, "God said, "because you are so proud of yourself and what you have done, you shall have to give up your kingdom. You will now become like a wild beast instead of a man. Men will chain you out in the meadow, and there you shall stay for seven long years."

They led the proud rich king away to the pasture to stay with the cattle and sheep and eat grass just as they did. The rain beat hard upon him and the sun was scorching hot. His hair grew long like eagle's feathers and his fingernails like eagle's claws. This seems like a terrible punishment, but remember that Nebuchadnezzar's sin, pride, was terrible, too. It does not pay for us to be proud of ourselves, or anything we have done.

At last seven years had passed. Then one day Nebuchadnezzar looked up into the sky. He wasn't a bit proud now. "God," he said, "I know now that Thou art the only Ruler, and we only have the things that You give to us." God looked down at Nebuchadnezzar. He could see that he was sorry for his pride, so God healed him and made him a wonderful king just as he was before.

He gave him his own right mind again. His kingdom was given back to him, also "Now," said the once proud king, "I shall not praise myself anymore. I shall give God all the praise for everything. For after all, everything belongs to Him." How happy Nebuchadnezzar was now. Never again would he be proud and haughty!

Dear Readers of the Outlook,

Greetings in the Name of the Lord from Bucaramanga, Colombia! We are very happy to send you our greetings again from this part of the great harvest, also, we wish to thank you one and all for the great interest you have shown in the work here. Our prayer is that the Lord may richly bless you all and that throughout eternity you may enjoy the richness of your labor here in Colombia.

It has been quite sometime since we last sent in a report of the work here, during which time we have been quite busy with the work of the ministry, as well as the school work. Last year we had both a day school and a Bible school, but this year we have only started the day school. This opened the 5th of February with an attendance of thirty. Most of these children come from Chritians homes, but some come from homes where the parents have never had any contact with the Gospel. Through the school we have been able to contact with these parents, now some of them attend the services and some of them have made a definite decision to serve the Lord. We also have been able to put Bibles in their homes as well as in the homes of many of their friends.

Due to the war there has been a shortage of Bibles. We have been able to buy only a few, these we have rationed out, selling only to those who show a real interest in learning about the way of Salvation. We have been able to buy all the Gospels we want, also quite a 1ew New Testaments. (Within the past few years we have sold a few hundred of these Gospels as well as New Testaments and all the Bibles that we have been able to get.)

Today I had the privilege of baptizing our twenty-sixth person in the Name of the Lord. Of this number some have received the baptism of the Holy Spirit, some are seeking very earnestly to be filled, a few have moved away and also some have gone back into sin. We are sure that many more would have accepted the Gospel, if it was not for the severe persecution one must endure. Quite a few have shown a great interest, but due to the fact that most of the people here are Catholics, they do not feel that they can afford to lose so many friends.

The opposition against the Gospel is great. Great numbers do not accept the Gospel, but we give thanks unto the Lord that a few have accepted and that more will do so in the future, if the Lord tarries.

We are still renting. Since our last report the owner of the hall has raised the price of the rent \$10.00. He refuses to give us a contract as he expects to remodel the building. We are very fortunate in securing this place and we would hate very much to lose it, as it is almost impossible to rent another hall, not only because of the opposition, but also because they are very scarce. We are still praying that the Lord will make it possible to buy property here.

James A. Hash, veteran of World War I, and son of Hederson and Rosie Hash, was born March 10, 1890, and departed this life, March 13, 1945, at the age of 55 years. He was the beloved husband of Claudia A. Hash.

At the age of twenty years he enlisted in the U. S. Cavalry and went to the Philippine Islands. There he spent three years in the service of his country. On January 5, 1917, he volunteered for service in the U. S. Army Field Artillery and March 31, 1918, and was discharged October 5, 1918. He held the purple heart, the silver star and the French victory medal which that government awarded him for heroism in the line of duty. He received the baptism of the Holy Ghost with the evidence of speaking in other tongues while coming out of a shell hole in France. sentence was placed upon the victim. Crucifixion was the extreme punishment for the worst crimes of that day. So terrible was the suffering caused by crucifixion that no Roman citizen could be put to death in that manner. It was reserved for the worst slaves and foreigners! This was a Gentile cruelty that the Jews looked on with great horror and every man cringed at the very thought of very being condemned to such a death. Even the law of Moses had placed a particular curse upon it. Yes, crucifixion was meant to inflict the most cruel kind of torture to the human body that was known to godless men. It was ungering death. The victim's very life was dragged from him in a battle that lasted many hours and sometimes several days. Every moment added new agony to an anguish which was at first almost unendurable. First, the victim was bound upon the cross as it lay upon the ground. The hands and feet were then firmly nailed to the wood. The cross was lifted up and placed in a hole dug in the ground to receive it. This act caused the body to be terribly wrenched. Many times the bones in the victim's body were dislocated. There hanging between heaven and earth the crucified was left to die. You can imagine the pain inflicted by the rays of an oriental sun beating down upon the body of the crucified... Yes, Jesus hung there for you and for me. He proved His Gospel by His willingnss to suffer for it. As the spikes were driven into the hands and feet, and left undressed, it caused festering and inflammation to set in. Shooting pains went to all parts of the body, and every attempt to secure any relief from this horrible cramped position only increased the suffering. An increasing fever raged through the body and this caused the head to throb until death would have been welcomed. One of the secrets of the torture of crucifixion was that death would not come quickly. Picture in your mind's eye the insects that swarmed upon such a body, adding more horrors to the crucified. Rome knew that no vital organ would be directly touched by crucifixion so that the pain continued on, sometimes for days. The victim would plead for death but that relief was just out of reach. The suffering went on, more and more each hour. Unconsciousness would have been a blessing, but even that was denied. It is recorded that the pain would become so cruel that sometimes even the hardhearted Roman soldiers would kill their victims in order to stop the suffering. That is why the mob that crucified Christ asked permission to break the legs of Jesus and the two thieves so that Christ would be dead before the Sabbath day which was a high day. That is the reason the soldiers came and broke the legs of the one on His right and His left. But Jesus had already died. So one of the soldiers, to make sure, and also that the Scripture might be fulfilled, pierced His side with a spear and forthwith came there out blood and water.

What caused the death of Jesus Christ? Was it this horrible suffering of crucifixion? Yes, but even more than that. Medical science has proved that the physical cause of Christ's death was not produced directly by the infliction of the cross but that Jesus died literally of a broken heart! The reasons are these: Crucifixion pro-

duced only a lingering death, lasting much longer than the six hours that Christ hung on the cross. No vital organ of His body was directly affected. Rarely did anyone crucified, die in less than twenty-four hours. You will remember that even Pilate was surprised that Jesus was already dead when Joseph came to claim His body. while suffering untold deaths, still conversed with the thieves on the cross and also to John and his mother to the very end. His death was sudden! Even up to the very last, His cry was not that of an exhausted voice, but He cried with a loud voice. My friends, His death was instant! Something remarkable took place. Even the centurion was astonished! Jesus died of a broken heart. His death was unlooked for, it was a shock to those that watched. Pehaps His suffering in Gethsemane the night before, helped to bring to pass this condition of His heart which literally was broken for the sins of men. You will remember that great drops as of blood, stood out on His forehead as He prayed in Gethsemane. a rare condition but not unknown to medical The palpitation of the heart and the intense mental excitement and the weight of the love for a lost world produced this bloody sweat on Mt. Olivet as He drank the dregs of the bitter cup which faced Him on the morrow. So we can easily understand that Jesus' heart was very, very heavy even as He stood before Pilate. Then, with the suffering produced by the crucifixion, the yearning over the souls of men who had turned a deaf ear to His pleas, caused Him to die suddenly with a broken heart on Calvary's cross.

When the soldier thrust the spear into Jesus' side it was no doubt for a double purpose. First of all to ascertain that He was dead and to insure it if He were not. Therefore, he aimed at His heart. When this was done, out flowed water and blood. Yes, His death was sudden! He died of a broken heart. His suffering was proof that He loved us. He was wounded for our transgressions and bruised for our iniquities, and still He calls even now..."son, daughter, give Me thy heart! Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be a snow, and though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool."

That Christ Who suffered under the finger of suspicion concerning his birth, that Christ Who waded through the traditions of religion to bring us the truth, that Christ Who trod the winepress alone, and fought past the flaming sword of death that man might have access again to the Paradise of eternal life, that Christ Who was tempted in all points like as we, yet without sin, that Christ Who loved you so that He was willing to hang on the cross as a sacrifice for your sins...Yes, the One Who broke the band of death and opened up a new and living way by conquering death, hell and the grave, stands in heaven this very evening longing and pleading through the Gospel that you might have life and have life more abundantly. The suffering Christ that I have pictured to you wants to be your everlasting friend. You're missing a lot by leaving this wonderful Christ out of your life.

places, lest we get our forces too scattered, and we lose the fight. I still believe in the "two and two" Bible pattern of going out to work for the Lord, so that if one fails, the other can help him up. I believe we should try to get several couples not too far apart, so they could get together occasionally and have fellowship.

Today there is a challenge and an open door to us in South America. The brethren from New Brunswick, Canada, have done a good work in Colombia, South America, during the last ten years, and a good number has believed on the Lord and been baptized in Jesus' Name and received the Holy Ghost. Then there is Uruguay and Paraguay far to the south. Brother and Sister Sly went there years ago and did a good work for God, baptizing believers in Jesus' and seeing them receive the Holy Ghost. Today there are Oneness baptized believers in both of these republics, (and I understand in Argentina, too) as a result of their faithful labours. Many of these believers are Russians. They have no one to lead and help them. Brother A. Verner Larsen, missionary from New Brunswick to Colombia, has been in touch with them by mail. He sends them Bible lessons. A picture of forty or fifty believers taken in Paraguay in 1943 was published in last month's Outlook. They are crying for help.

We are open for candidates for the field, especially for Colombia, Uruguay and Paraguay. We want the kind of missionaries that will work under a district superintendent, and be in subjection to the home organization. We have no time for any other kind. The candidates should be between twenty and forty years old, with a good strong body, and of fair education. They must be filled with the Holy Ghost, and baptized in Jesus' Name, and above all they must have the approval of their home pastor and district elder. We are ready to back up and send such missionaries. The New Brunswick, Canada, brethren are ready to work in conjunction with such a program.

Now a word about our missionary offerings and work. Since being put in office last fall at St. Louis we have been trying to build up a reserve. or rather an emergency fund. This fund is to be used for just such a work as described above or for any emergency. We have a few hundred dollars, but we need several thousand. Brother and Sister Elmer Ball, good P.A. of J.C. missionaries, have been labouring in Colombia for the past three and one-half years. Now Sister Ball's health is bad, and it is necessary for her to come home at once. We were able to send her some from this fund to come home. She will be here (God willing) by the time you read these lines. This is the purpose of our emergency fund, also to send missionaries out on short notice. Let us make a special effort and send our missionary offerings to the Missionary department without reserve and we will do our best for you. Let us not scatter our funds everywhere. Before you support every missionary that you hear from in South America, kindly consult the Missionary Board. We are aquainted with the entire situa-

THE 7TH CHAPTER OF ROMANS—CONTD.

Now let us look at Romans 7, verse 10. "And the commandment which was ordained to life, I found to be unto death. Does he mean that God sent the law to destroy man? Was it not given by the Lord God Himself to that wonderful leader of Israel, Moses? Was it not ordained to life? Yes, but Paul found that it was impossible for him, as a man under the law, to keep the commandments, for all have sinned and come short of the glory of God! The law, instead of giving him abundant life, made him feel so guilty because he could not live up to the righteousness of the law, that he felt as if he were dead spiritually. The more commandments he read, and the more he compared these laws with his own actions in life, the farther he seemed from God.

We might ask ourselves right here, "Why did God give the law?" The answer to that question is best answered by circumstances right in Germany and Japan this very evening. Would you want to live in a world where every man's law was right in his own eyes? Where murder, loot, destruction and war was taught as principles of government, and where the execution of those principles were left in the hands of lawless and ruthless men? Would you like to live in a country that did NOT have laws and a police force or an army? How long would you stay in St. Paul or Minneapolis if all laws were annuled and the police force disbanded? It wouldn't take long to find out what is actually in the hearts of some of our fair citizens. In verse 13, Paul explains that "sin, that it might appear sin, working death in me by that which is good, that sin BY THE COM-MANDMENT might become exceeding sinful." God was trying to show the people under the law how exceeding sinful sin actually was. We might ask what for? Well, if you did not know that sinful actions were wrong, then you would not realize your need of God! The law made Israel feel their need of God...their need of a divine help because they were condemned by the commandments of God for their wrong doings. Paul is still playing the role of a man under the law and admits in verse 14, that the law is spiritual, but that he is carnal and practically helpless to live a life that exemplifies the Law of God as given to Moses.

Then in verse 15, and my friends, this is a very important verse, if you have your Bibles, please note carefully this verse, "For that which I do, I allow not; for what I would, that do I not; but what I hate, that do I." In no sense, is Paul refering to himself here as a Christian, he is still pretending that he is under the law faced with the commandments, and knowing the wrong of sin, but not being able to overcome his carnal nature. For a Christian of today to use this Scripture as a cover-over for a sinful life is ridiculous. Paul, the apostle, was no hyprocrite and he lived a genuine Christian life, a life of holiness, void of offence toward God and man after his conversion at Damascus, but here he is showing that men under the law desired to do right but the commandments of Moses did not give them power to live justified before Goa. Verse that the law was holier than man had power to live up to, an admission that the law is good because it proved to anyone under the law that it was a better set of morals than was possible to abide by and fulfill in practical everyday living.

In verse 17, Paul says, "Now then, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me." Is he here trying to prove that a Christian can desire to do right, but if they do wrong, simply blame it on sin that dwells in them? No! A thousand times, no! If today you are guilty of sin, you are entirely guilty! body, soul and spirit. Paul is making no excuse for Christians' sinning a little every day, and God winking in ignorance at them because He has offered them no power through the Gospel to live above the sinful world. The Word of God tells us for this day and age...for those who profess to be Christians, "Every man is tempted when he is drawn away of his lust and enticed, Then when lust hath conceived it bringeth forth sin, and sin, when it is finished bringeth forth death!" Does that sound like the New Testament condoles or makes leeway for sinful acts? No, my triends, if you are taking any comfort in the seventh chapter of Romans for your carnal actions, you better stay with us a few minutes on this broadcast, because Jesus came to condemn sin in the flesh, and no matter who commits it, saint or sinner, sin is still condemned and who-so-ever commits it, is guilty before almighty God.

Some have tried to hide under the 18th verse of this great chapter of Romans, "For I know that in me (that is my flesh) dwelleth no good thing, for to will is present with me but HOW to perform that which is good I find not." IS THE MIGHTY APOSTLE PAUL finally admitting in this verse that Christianity is after all, impotent; that he has not been able to find a way to perform Christian living? No! a thousand times no! He still is pretending to be a man under the law, a man longing to do right but not having the power within to do so. He makes this great lesson even more clear in verse 23.

"I see another law in my members warring against the law of my mind and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members." Some people have actually used this Scripture to excuse their acts of sin, simply blaming their flesh and excusing their soul. Was Paul leaving man in that deplorable condition? No! He almost cries out in the 24th verse, "O WRETCHED MAN THAT I AM! WHO SHALL DELIVER ME FROM THE BODY OF THIS DEATH!

Paul expesses the very same emotion that thousands of Israelites experienced when trying to live righteous lives under the law. They found themselves without power to do so. And may I say right here, if the Lord had not provided the sacrifices under the law of the burnt offering, the meat offering, the sin offering, trespass and peace offering as a relief for their conscience, and

also the appearing of the shekinah glory cloud on the Day of Atonement as a forgiveness of Israel's sins that is for those who had offered sacrifices, they would have been desperate indeed. The ritual of keeping the sacrifices and certain feast and Holy days relieved their minds from the pressure of guilt which was made so exceeding sinful by the looking glass of the law, but it certainly did not give them power to live above those sins, therefore they had to keep bringing the sacrifices, month after month, year after year, observing holy days and feast days, over and over and over again, in order to relieve their conscience of the burden of sinful lives.

Paul expresses the very heart-felt condition that no doubt thousands of Israelites found themselves in, a longing, may I say a deep heart-felt longing to have such an experience with God that would make the ceremonies unnecessary and bring them in contact with a living experience with the Lord. Paul, of course, found such an experience and so, with a great sigh of relief, with a deep appreciation that he lived on THIS side of the cross, he almost sings the last verse of chapter seven...Listen to these beautiful words, "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord." Thank God for what? Thank God for a salvation, an experience that would wash away past sins and bring into the soul the Holy Ghost, that Spirit that Jesus promised that would give a Christian power! Power for what? Power to live above sin. Let the commandments come! Let the law be read! Let the righteousness of God be revealed! Yea, let even death dare to conquer the blood-washed child of God! Let even sin dare to have dominion! What answer does the born-again Christian have? The answer is found in 1 Cor. 15:55-57. "O death where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? The sting of death is SIN and the strength of sin is the law. But THANKS BE TO GOD, which giveth the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ! Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour in not vain in the Lord."
