

SATAN!

S. G. Norris

Good evening, friends, OUR subject today is Satan or that being commonly called the Devil. We wish to ask a few questions about him and by the help of the Word of God, answer them for you. First, Where did the Devil come from? If you would like to mark down these questions, it may help to remember them as we also will give you Scripture references for the answers. So, the first question: Where did the Devil come from? You often hear people say, "Why was the Devil ever made?" How did he ever come into existence? Well, the answer is found in the Book of Ezekiel, chapter 28, verse 13. My friends, the Devil is not the fool he is pictured to be with a red suit, tail and with a pitchfork in his hand. I only wish that was all the trouble he could make, but listen to this description of the Devil. "Thou hast been in Eden in the garden of God; every precious stone was thy covering, the sardius, topaz and the diamond, the beryl, the onyx, and the jasper, the sapphire, the emerald and the carbuncle and gold: the workmanship of thy tabrets and of thy pipes was prepared in thee in the day that thou was created." Verse 14 continues, "Thou art the anointed cherub that covereth: and I have set thee so, thou wast upon the holy mountain of God thou hast walked up and down in the midst of the stones of fire."

Satan Created by God

So here you see that Satan was created by God, not as the Devil he is today, but a beautiful anointed angel.

. . . the leader of all angels. He was beautiful to look at, so dazzling did God make him that the Prophet Ezekiel is forced to use many of the finest jewels of the earth to describe him. He was created by God to do good and to share in the glories of heaven. He was the anointed cherub and the freedom of heaven was his. If this marvelous angel that God called Lucifer, the son of the morning, had remained good and used his influence for the building of the hearts of men instead of destroying them he could have retained a grand place in God's great plan. But something drastic happened and that leads us to our next question.

What was the cause of his fall? Something happened in heaven! This great and mighty angel lost out with God. Jesus said, "I saw Satan fall from heaven as lightning." We need not guess at the reason why Satan was cast out, let us look in God's Word. Ezekiel 28:15 tells the story.

Iniquity and Sin

"Thou was perfect in thy ways from the day thou wast created, till iniquity was found in thee." So there we have the reason why Satan was cast out of heaven—iniquity was found in him. He was not satisfied with being the anointed cherub or angel of heaven, with every precious stone for his covering, but he also wanted to ascend up beyond God himself. Iniquity is rebellion against divine authority. Satan rebelled against the authority of God, so he was cast out of heaven. All of this took place before Adam was on earth, because we find Satan, as the evil angel in the garden of Eden trying to destroy the faith of Adam

and Eve. We often hear the phrase mentioned "workers of iniquity" in the Bible, and then again this or that man was a sinner. There is a difference between iniquity and sin. Sin has more to do with the outward actions of man. The Word of God refers to it as the works of the flesh. For example, some of them are listed in the 5th chapter of Galatians—adultery, fornication, idolatry, hatred, wrath, strife, envyings, and drunkenness. These are commonly called sins, and thousands of people with such sins in their lives have come to God, repented and turned to Him with all their heart and have been forgiven.

Most of us who are saved, were saved from one or more of these sins. However, the question of iniquity is far deeper. It involves a condition of heart, which rebels against divine authority. We have Saul, the first King of Israel, as such a one in the Old Testament. He rebelled against the divine authority of God. God told him to go to war with the Amalekites and slay their wicked King Agag. Instead, he kept Agag alive, simply because he rebelled against God's command in his heart. On another occasion, Samuel told him to wait at Gilgal for seven days, but when Samuel did not appear early on the seventh day, or just when Saul thought he should come, Saul offered a sacrifice, which was absolutely forbidden. In his heart, he despised divine authority. He would not take instructions from Samuel, God's prophet, and so one of the last acts in his rebellious life was at the feet of a witch, trying to hear from the God that he had so despised. King Saul was an example of this deep sin originally found in Satan. . . . It is called iniquity. My friends, never allow iniquity to get into your heart. Many men's sins have been forgiven, and they have turned from the blackness of the world to the light of the Kingdom of God. However, the man who despises the thought that there is a God that some day will judge him, or curses because he is restricted by the hand of God from doing wholesale evil-that man has very little chance of ever being saved.

Satan had iniquity in him and lost his place in heaven. He wanted God's place, he wanted God's power. He was cast out of heaven, but where is he now?

Where Is Satan Now?

So that's our next question—Where is Satan now? The answer is located in the Epistle to the Ephesians, chapter two, verse two. "Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience." So here Paul is explaining to the Ephesians, that they who were once dead in trespasses and sins, had now been quickened or saved by the power of God, but he reminds them in the second verse, which I have just quoted for you, that Satan is the prince of the power of the air, and his spirit works in the unsaved. . . . the children of disobedience. So we see here that Satan is no longer in heaven, itself, where the Lord is, but still operates as a prince of the power of the air. In other words, his domain is between earth and heaven,

- word "naughtiness" was a very strong word. Today it suggests a playful disposition that provokes a smile rather than a frown. Three hundred years ago James 1:21 was translated, "Superfluity of naughtiness." Time thinned the word down. In 1900 the American Revision Committee had to find other words to express the original idea. Their translation reads, "Overflowing of wickedness."
- 2. TEMPTED OF SATAN: Mark 1:13 says Jesus "Was in the wilderness forty days tempted of Satan." That led most people to believe that the devil in person came to try his skill against Jesus. Time thinned that down. Hurlbut's Life of Christ explained that the temptations came to the mind of Jesus in the way they come to us and He weighed the temptation. This thinning process explains that temptation came to Jesus. However, in Matt. 4:3, the Bible answers this by saying, "THE TEMPTER CAME."
- 3. BURIED: Romans 6:4 reads, "Buried therefore with him through baptism." Colossians 2:12 reads, "Buried with him in baptism." This has been thinned down to a few drops that have no use for the word "buried," The Bible still has that graphic word: "Buried." That will always be God's word to describe baptism. Men in their practice have thinned this down till THEY HAVE SOMETHING ELSE.
- 4. WITH THE MOUTH CONFESSION IS MADE: There is an example of that in Acts 8:37. That was before the thinner-downers got hold of the confession. Since that day the thinner-downers have taught and practiced: "Well, if a man wants to be baptized his very request for baptism proves he believes." But Philip, before this thinning process began to work, did not take a request for baptism as sufficient for qualification for baptism. In addition to the request there had to be the confession. That same old, vigorous way was outlined by Paul and followed by Timothy when Timothy made the good confession in the sight of many witnesses. So Rom. 10:10 still reads, "With the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

- 5. ABHOR: "Abhor that which is evil" of Romans 12:9 has been thinned down. A sort of mild spirit has taken hold of many to demand of them that they avoid all decided convictions and avoid all firm attitudes. They thin down the Christian spirit to a kind and sympathetic tolerance. They have lost all their intentions of abhoring anything. They think anyone who abhors anything is a radical. The New Testament was not written by the thinner-downers. One who knows what evil is has no difficulty in viewing the expression, "Abhor that which is evil," in its original strength. Evil will ruin your life and damn your soul forever. ABHOR THAT WHICH IS EVIL.
- 6. REPROVE, REBUKE: Paul told Timothy to "Reprove, rebuke." II Tim. 4:2. This has an unpleasant feature to it. So it has been thinned down. Pulpit polish has been substituted for pulpit integrity. Give us polish, the more the better. We don't want even the polish thinned down. Make it shine. But don't give us enamel. Don't cover the reproof and the rebuke UP. Leave them strong and true and they WILL shine.

The thinner-downers are out after the body and the soul of the gospel. They have thinned down the doctrine of God to an idea. They have thinned down the Sonship of Jesus to a life. They have thinned down the resurrection to an illusion. They have thinned down the Bible to the words of men. They have thinned down the church to a denomination. They have thinned down the worship to entertainment. They have thinned down the Christian race to a fox trot. They have thinned down the Christian flight to shadow boxing. They have thinned down the kingdom of heaven to a kingdom of this world. They have thinned down the sword of the spirit to a sword of steel. They have thinned down hell to a mental distress. They have thinned down heaven to a myth. If you put up with all that thinning you will find they have thinned you down to a beast instead of a man.

I mentioned that to say this: If I carried aspirins in my purse, no doubt I would think about taking one. But I don't get that close to them, or even buy them. Some of our young girls are like old ladies figuring on getting so sick, or because of over-taxation on their frail bodies. Are they really helping themselves by doing so? No. The more you take the more you will want to take, or will have to take. Soon you will be

a "dope" fiend if you are not that already.

Saved people live too close to the earth, and mind earthly things too much. Your help and health is far above these things. Likewise with the habit of smoking. Don't be tempted if some one should offer you a cigarette. And to be sure, don't carry them around in your purse! No one who hopes to be successful in any line can afford to adopt so detrimental a habit. Look-

ing back at grandmother's pictures, you will notice the dress of that time was quite a novelty, but it was designed for neither comfort nor health. Today our women, while they have failed along many lines in their dress as far as modesty is concerned, have adopted an economical, general, healthful mode of dress. It is not drawn, with excess, too tightly around the waistline, making it hard to breathe and injurious to the organs necessary in bearing a family. Not only our young girls, but our women-mothers and grandmothers—are trying to find something to retain their youthful look that is slipping away so fast. They are losing their feminine attractiveness while they puff the deadly fumes which fray their nerves, ruin their digestion, and rob them of physical beauty which they are supposed to be guarding so carefully.

We want the schools to teach and instruct the principles of health to our children. We aim to eat regularly and properly-balanced meals three times a day, to get eight hours of sleep every night, and to acquire all the routine that is necessary for a healthy life. But listen to me. After all our being so careful about the daily habits of our children, we send them to school, and there what do they see? The teacher is smoking. Smoking is free for all. Did you know that? Of course, they go to town to see the girls. There others smoke on the street. You go into a restaurant—there they are smoking. On the way home, you pass a car-and there she is smoking! Where can we go that there is no one smoking? Get saved, and you won't smoke, my daughter. Other girls that smoke are hollow-eyed and have an ugly cough. I think that cigarettes are a foul pestilence.

Some young girls and boys think that mother doesn't know, and that the world is all right. Well, all right, how many of you remember the late Knute Rockne's word on this phase of the question? He did not have the baptism of the Holy Ghost, either, but having lived here in South Bend, I know that he was an excellent sportsman. If you prefer the advice of the world, here is what he said, "Tobacco slows up and lowers morale."

All smoking advertisements are false and deceiving. Tobacco destroys personal charm and brings on a premature appearance of age. Anything endangering health also endangers personal attractiveness. Watching young girls that smoke, I have noticed they have a hard and unhealthy look. What do our young American girls hope to come to? What will the mothers of tomorrow be? After a mother has smoked one cigarette there is a change of the fetal heart beat averaging five beats per minute. Do you want to smoke?

Cpl. Michael Joseph Brobeck was killed in action September 9, 1943, at Salerno, Italy. He was born October 1, 1913, at Pittsburgh, Pa. His father passed away when he was a child and his mother met a tragic death in later years.

He spent some time in an orphanage and later went to live with the Brobecks at Valparaiso, Ind. He later changed his name legally to Brobeck. He came to Beloit in 1935, and made his home with his sister, Mrs. Gerald Lucas, until the Lucases left for Rock Island, Ill., in October, 1940.

Prior to his induction on March 15, 1941, he was assistant mainténance man for the Beloit Public

Schools.

He was a member of the Pentecostal Church of Jesus

Christ and was baptized on November 6, 1940.

Corporal Brobeck was with the Field Artillery and with the ill-fated 36th Division (only five of the original men in that division now live). He left for overseas April 10, 1943. Michael, with three other men, volunteered to get a radio transmitter set up on Salerno Beach, knowing that they had one chance in a hundred to come out alive. They set up the transmitter in a ditch 400 yards from the beach. Michael was against the side of the ditch with his rifle in firing position when a mortar shell fell near by. He and two of the boys were killed instantly; the other was injured so badly that he died without talking. These facts came from his commanding officer and from his buddies. Michael received the Good Conduct medal, a ribbon for Middle-East, and North African Campaigns. A Purple Heart and Certificate of Merit was sent posthumously to his sister. One buddy wrote that Michael is buried at Paestrum, Italy.

Pfc. Harlie L. Hays was reported killed in Germany March 30, 1945. Pfc. Harlie L. Hays entered the service December 5, 1942.

He served ten months in the Aleutian Islands. While there he realized his need of God and was permitted to come back to the States and was baptized in Jesus' Name at Essex, Mo., by Elder Purcer. He received the Holy Ghost after going back to camp in California. He was sent back overseas the first part of February, 1945. He leaves a wife, Mary Lillian, and a baby son, born the day he was killed, also his mother, two brothers, five sisters, and a host of friends to mourn his loss.

Our loss is Heaven's gain.

and before anyone can get to God, he must struggle with this evil force . . . this fallen angel . . . this wicked Lucifer, the Devil.

it will mean that no flesh could be saved.

We all know that Satan will not operate with such range and authority in the 1,000 years of peace as he does now or will in the tribulation period, so our next question is: Where will Satan be during the thousand years of peace? The answer is found in Revelation chapter twenty, verses 1, 2 and 3. "And I saw an angel come down from heaven having the key of the bottomless pit and a great chain in his hand. And he laid hold on the dragon, that Old serpent which is the devil and Satan and bound him a thousand years. And cast him into the bottomless pit and shut him up and

set a seal upon him that he should deceive the nations no more till the thousand years should be fulfilled, and after that he must be loosed a little season." So there is the answer as to where Satan will be for the 1.000 years of peace on this earth . . . in the bottomless pit, sealed up for the millennial age, but notice . . . after that he must be loosed far a little season. So we find him in this same twentieth chapter of Revelation being loosed out of his prison. This was to prove whether men were really walking with God of their free wills, or simply because there was no Devil to tempt them. Evidently he reaps a quick harvest because thousands will turn to him and lay siege to the beloved city of Jerusalem for battle. . . . The same old story-sinner against saints . . . light against darkness-Satan against God. But this time, his plans never materialize, and it brings us to our last question about the Devil.

Satan's Final Destination

Where is his final destination? The answer to this all-important question is found in Rev. 20:10. "And the devil that deceived them was cast into the lake of fire and brimstone, and shall be tormented day and night forever. So there my friends you see the final destination of old Satan, the Devil. He started out well. He had a marvelous opportunity but iniquity was found in him. He wanted to make his own laws and ascend above the very throne of God. For this he was cast out to become prince and power of the air and that is how he works today against the sons of men, trying to get them to sin and follow in his footsteps. He will be cast to the earth during the tribulation period and finally after 1,000 years in the bottomless pit, be cast into the lake of fire. He started in heaven, he ends in hell. Are you going to follow such a being as Satan? The end of his career will be hell or all that implies total failure. Would you trust a doctor who was a total failure? Would you place your war bonds in a bank that had failed? Would you? Certainly not. Then why follow a failure? Satan was beaten in the wilderness of Judaea, Gethsemane and on Calvary's cross. Jesus Christ started his earthly life in a humble stable in Bethlehem, but where is He today? Where will He be when Satan is in hell, or the lake of fire? THE BIRTH OF THE SPIRIT IN THE DAYS OF THE APOSTLES

For centuries there has been a crying of God's people to go back to Pentecost. Every advanced truth that goes out throwing light on the "path of the Just" has always met a storm of persecution from those who are supposed to be seeking more of God.

The Jews of old were so set in their doctrines that Jesus Christ Himself could do nothing with them. He tried with all His might to show them the way of eternal life, for which they had sought so long. Jesus told them, "You have drunk old wine for so long, you straightway desireth not the new." Luke 5:39. They thought the old wine was better. These Jews were so filled with the doctrine of man that even the Lord could not convince them of the falsity of their tradition.

Then Jesus said, "Full well you have laid aside the truth or doctrine of God to hold your own doctrine. Therefore, the word of God has no effect

on you." Mark 7:5-13.

Even in our days we have great difficulty to make people believe that the New Birth can be produced only by two elements—water and Spirit.

The Rest

The first verse we wish to bring to your attention is Matt. 11:28. The Lord Jesus told the people, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and

I will give you rest."

Most of us know that this text has been used by many pastors for the salvation of souls. No one can deny that what Jesus was offering here was nothing short of the New Birth or salvation. With this we must all agree: that "Rest" comes to man only when he is born again of water and of the Spirit. Without this experience he cannot enter into the Kingdom of God. Isa. 28:11.

Will you please compare the two following verses? Jesus said, "Come unto me and I will give you rest. For with stammering lips and another tongue will He speak to this people to whom He said, "This is the rest wherewith ye may cause the weary to rest." Isa. 28:11.

It was on the day of Pentecost that God spoke to the people "with stammering lips and another tongue." Acts 2:4. From these Scriptures it can be plainly seen that the "rest" came by water baptism and the Holy Spirit. That was the New Birth.

Born of Water and the Spirit

Jesus said to Nicodemus, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the Kingdom of God."

If a man is not in the kingdom of God, then where is he? He is out. He is not saved. He has no eternal life.

What Is Eternal Life?

I would like to bring something to you which you may never have thought of before. What is eternal

life? The answer is eternal life is God only. What is God? God is that eternal Holy Spirit. Then if man has no Holy Spirit he has no eternal life. Therefore, we read in Rom. 8:9. "Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ he is none of His." In other words, if he has not been born of water and of the Spirit he is not saved.

Again we read in Rom. 14:17: "For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost."

What About the Thief on the Cross?

The thief on the cross was not in the dispensation of the New Testament, but was in the dispensation of John the Baptist. So he was saved under the dispensation of John the Baptist. You see, the blood was not yet shed. Jesus was not crucified. Do you remember Paul said that if Jesus is not risen from the dead, we are all in sin? Also, we read that without the shed blood there is no remission of sin. Therefore, under the dispensation of the New Testament no man is saved if he is not born of water and the Spirit.

Again, remember Rom. 8:9. "If any man have not the Spirit of Christ he is none of His." In other words, he is not saved, or he has no eternal life.

Again we must know that no man is saved until he is in Jesus. 2 Cor. 5:17 says, "If any man be in Jesus Christ he is a new man." Not until then. Again, we read that the kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness, and peace and joy in the Holy Ghost. Rom. 14:17.

Again we read in Eph. 1:13-14, "In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation: In whom also after that ye believed, ye were sealed with that holy Spirit of promise, which is the earnest of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession, unto the praise of his glory."

We must believe that Jesus meant what he said to Nicodemus: "Ye must be born of water and of the Spirit or you cannot enter into the kingdom of God."

Let us take the Word of God. Then we will all see alike. If we claim we are preaching the same gospel that Paul preached, let us preach the New Birth as Paul preached it.

Paul tells us in Gal. 1:8, "But though we, or an angel from heaven preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed."

Therefore, it pays for all of us to do what the word of God tells us to do. My prayer for all of God's people is that they will believe and obey the word of God, because the word is power. The word is life. The word is the Holy Spirit.

So those who are expecting to attend the convention please write Brother Guinn and ask him to arrange for your room. I would suggest you do this as early as possible to avoid disappointment. Doubtless many of our ministers will have their friends in St. Louis or ones to whom they can write and perhaps there will be some who have been staying at hotels and can arrange their own accommodations without bothering Brother Guinn. We trust that this unavoidable and unusual circumstance will not prevent your attending this very important convention.
